Glyn Nest's New Sensory Garden



Over the past few months the residents have watched with interest as Glyn Nest's new Sensory Garden area has been taking shape.

From what had previously been an under-utilised area that was difficult to access, Glyn Nest now has a beautiful, colourful space that provides both a safe,



enclosed garden, and an open seating area for residents to enjoy.



The first stage of the development was the hard landscaping. Previously a hard stone foundation has now been transformed to

create a rubberised, safe, and colourful surface. Surrounding the garden are attractive locally-made railings where the residents will be able to plant flowers in the hanging containers.



There is a large part of the garden that is readily accessible to residents from both lounges. This area gives them freedom and choices of where to sit and ponder the day with plentiful rustic seating areas with connecting colourful flower planters.

The garden planting has been designed for seasonal interest and variety throughout the year with plants selected for fragrance, texture, and colour, in a sequence of colour from spring to summer, summer to autumn, autumn to winter, and back to spring.



Everyone is so delighted with the garden transformation which has rejuvenated the outside space of our Home, and will benefit so many of our current and future residents.

Irfon Roberts, Chair of the Management Committee said, "Research has proven that Sensory Gardens provide deep memory prompts and can enhance feelings of serenity and well-being. Having this new area to explore and enjoy will offer our residents a greater sense of independence and pleasure. Having the opportunity to hear and experience the sounds, smells and seasonal fluctuations has been our primary aim in this transformation".
