## Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends,

As we leave the day(s) of stuffing and turkey, pies and mashed potato behind and move on to the season of colored lights, and carols, Christmas trees and poinsettias, I for one like to take the first Sunday or two in December to pause even if just for a moment, long enough to catch a sense of "the Advent." Rev. Fredrick Buechner, who can express such things in a more poetic way describes the search for "the advent" in this way:

"You walk up the steps to the front door. The empty windows at either side of it tell you nothing, or almost nothing. For a second you catch a whiff in the air of some fragrance that reminds you of a place you've never been and a time you have no words for. You are aware of the beating of your heart.

The extraordinary thing that is about to happen is matched only by the extraordinary moment just before it happens. Advent is the name of that moment.

"The Salvation Army Santa Claus clangs his bell. The sidewalks are so crowded you can hardly move. Exhaust fumes are the chief fragrance in the air, and everybody is as bundled up against any sense of what all the fuss is really about as they are bundled up against the windchill factor.

But if you concentrate just for an instant, far off in the deeps of you somewhere you can feel the beating of your heart. For all its madness and lostness, not to mention your own, you can hear the world itself holding its breath."

In the midst of the preparations for the celebration we call Christmas make sure you give yourselves a few of those moments, take in the sounds and smells of the season and hear the beating of your heart and the world holding its breathe in anticipation. If we can do this we just might find ourselves ready!

For thus said the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel: In returning and rest you shall be saved; in quietness and in trust shall be your strength. Isaiah 30:15




## Hallelujah Toffee Time!

This will be the 6th year that we have sold "The World's Best Toffee" benefitting OneLife Africa, a nonprofit group our daughter Stephanie and son-in-law Andrew started in 2011. One Life offers financial and emotional support for academically talented Christian boys and girls, allowing them access to the highest quality boarding high school education available. In Kenya, tuition is charged to attend high school and the children living in the slums and poor rural areas do not have the financial resources to pay for their education. OneLife Africa provides students with the educational opportunities allowing them the chance to get out of the

ghettos. The Congregational Church of Laconia UCC has sponsored two students and our latest one "Dawning Okuku" graduates in December. He will be applying for Kenyan Government assistance to attend University. In addition to church sponsorship, many of you in the congregation have supported students as well.



The biggest fund raiser of the year for OneLife Africa is selling Hallelujah Toffee. The toffee is formulated from an old Amish secret family recipe and is only available once a year. The students that have no sponsors are called "The Candy Kids" and the proceeds from toffee sales enable them to continue their studies in search for a better life. The toffee, with Linda's assurance of quality, will be available to purchase after church services at Fellowship Time in December. One pound is priced at \$20 and ½ pound is \$12.50. ## Look and See

submitted by Janet Simmon Michael Zoughbi has created a non-profit project for Christian artisans to create beautiful olive wood carvings: hand-made figures of Mary, Joseph and Jesus as well as Christmas ornaments.

The goal of the Olive Wood Project is to employ Bethlehem Christians as life is difficult for them living under occupation and unemployment is extremely high. The Christian population in Palestine has decreased tremendously from nearly 10% in 1998 to about 1% today. He seeks to create work for his carvers so they won't leave Bethlehem.

When he sings "O, Little Town of Bethlehem," Michael sings it as someone who knows it intimately. As a Palestinian, he traces his heritage as a Christian back 1,000 years. As a resident of Bethlehem, his homeland is the Holy Land. But, ironically, Christianity, according to Zoughbi, "is dying there." Only 1.7 percent of the population ascribes to the Christian religion, a percentage that "used to be over 45 percent." (That would be before 1948.) Many are leaving be-



cause of the economy. Part of the problem in Zoughbi's opinion are the restrictions placed on traveling between Jerusalem and Bethlehem, just five miles apart. In fact, it often keeps Zoughbi apart from his wife, a native of Jerusalem. They must live in separate homes much of the time.

"Jerusalem is important for us

as a Christian," he said, "A lot of things are going on there to practice your faith." "I need to

"We don't want to go through the process of permission. There are a lot of problems." An Israeli military checkpoint lies on the road between Jerusalem and Bethlehem. Zoughbi advocates access to the Holy Land for everyone. "Most of the Christians in the Holy Land are Palestinian."

Bethlehem is a town of about 35,000, while the area surrounding it has a population of about 180,000. Tour groups generally spend only a couple of hours in Bethlehem itself, but in his opinion, to know it requires staying in its hotels and eating in its restaurants.

The Wooster, Ohio, Trinity United Church of Christ, met Zoughbi through UCC's mission connection with the Holy Land. The UCC and other denominations have facilitated venues in the United States for Palestinian Christian wood carvers to sell their crafts. Related to the economic venture, "Michael set up a connection to be able to travel to the United States to tell his story -- what it is like to be a Christian in Bethlehem." "I am not a carver; I'm not patient enough to be a carver," Zoughbi said, but he does act as a middleman for olive wood carvings sold abroad. His other projects include bee hives and greenhouses.

Michael's message to all ethnic groups living in the area is: "We are different parts, but belong to the same body."

"Peace is important," he said. "Everybody in the whole world is interested in coming to the Holy Land."
