She would spend many hours devising interesting and challenging mounted games that would keep them entertained but also teach them new skills. In total, Nora volunteered with us for more than 20 years and in that time she made a tremendous contribution to our riders' progress and enjoyment.

Jo (née Brown) was a Tuesday volunteer for over three decades, starting with us in 1979 after retiring from Cheltenham General Hospital as a theatre nurse. She had always loved horses and the difference that they could make. She was a diligent



worker with exemplary standards in tack cleaning which is something she continued to do right up to 2012.

Our deepest sympathies go to the families and friends of Nora and Jo for their sad loss.

Nora and Jo both wanted to support our work with donations and, together, their funeral service collections, including gift aid and match funding by an employer, raised over £4,000, which will support the costs of over 400 group lessons for our riders. Our Kitty appears on **Good Morning Britain** sofa!



We are so incredibly proud of this young lady. Kitty appeared on ITV's Good Morning Britain show in June alongside Clare Balding who was there to launch her brand new book The Racehorse who Learned to Dance.

The new book is all about a young girl with a disability who learns to ride. Kitty, who has cerebral palsy, was asked by GMB presenters Kate Garraway and Ben Shephard how she benefited from riding with RDA. Her first response was that it helped her feel like a normal child, so she can be part of something with friends who have disabilities like her. She said she didn't like physio but that riding itself is great physio and a fun way to do her exercises. Asked if she had a favourite horse she named Bruno. Kate and Ben went on to ask Kitty how important it was to have a character in Clare's new book who has a disability. Kitty told her that most able-bodied people don't understand what's going on in disabled people's heads - they just think it is OK they're disabled and that they'll get through.

Clare said that she had had a long chat with Kitty about the book and what she related to in it. Clare went on to explain that she is fascinated with the relationship between humans and horses and wanted to write about challenges, friendship, and teamwork.

Kitty is such an incredible ambassador not just for Cotswold RDA but for Riding for the Disabled across the country. We hope that, having seen Kitty, many others will be encouraged to join their local RDA, and also to read Clare's new book.



Measuring achievement with the Outcomes Tracker

How do you measure achievement? That is a question that we get asked a lot, particularly by potential donors and our volunteers and coaches, but most importantly by our riders, who need to know they are getting the best possible experience when they ride with us. The answer can be found in the "Outcomes Tracker. Some of you may already be aware of how this contributes to what we do, but we'd like to share with you some of the background and explain how it works.

Six years ago RDA UK recognized the need to measure and show the benefits of riding in a simple but effective way. The need to prove outcomes in education as well as to report back to our funders was increasing. All of us who are involved in RDA know that the benefits for our riders are life-enhancing (and in many cases, life-changing!) but demonstrating this in an easy and understandable format was the challenge.

The result was the Outcomes Tracker. It provides a simple



way to measure the magic that is RDA and is used throughout the RDA family up and down the country. Our volunteer coaches "track" their pupils at the start of term against six key objectives, shown here to the right, and then, after consultation with the volunteers and staff who have worked with that particular rider during that period, they will be "tracked" again against the same set of

objectives at the end of term/year. This information is then entered into a computer program specifically designed to produce a colourful rosette-style certificate, which has the start and endpoint shown as a spidergram. This is presented to each rider to celebrate his or her achievements with us. You can see from the example (left) that the inner grey line shows the start point, whilst the black outer line shows progress over the course of a year.

Achievement doesn't stop there. Our riders can still work towards achieving the standards of riding that earn certificates from Grade 1 to 4, Bronze, Silver and Gold, as well as the Endeavour award that can be awarded for any special achievement.

Communication

- **1. No** attempt to communicate by any means.
- 2. Attempts to communicate, positively or negatively, by any means.
- 3. Communication is basic, quite limited but consistent and with clear intention.
- 4. Able to communicate and respond to communication from others.
- **5. Communicates** own wants, needs and experience freely.

- **1. Lacks** confidence, won't try to engage, blocks coach.
- 2. Willing to have a go, with guidance and support.
- **3. Trying** to learn, needs lots of reminding and support.
- **4. Doing well**, benefits from reminding and support.
- 5. Realistic and confident in their abilities.

Eniovment

- 1. Reluctant to get on pony.
- 2. Showing signs of enjoyment e.g. smiling, laughing,
- 3. Looks forward to sessions; keen to ride on arrival.
- **4. Positive** about own experience, people and ponies at sessions and when not at RDA.
- **5. Riding** is a favoured activity.

Relationships

- **1. Not** interested in other people or ponies, no interaction.
- 2. Interested, wants contact with people and/or pony.
- 3. Responds well to contact from others, initiates contact with people and/or pony.
- 4. Takes others, including pony, into account, tries to cooperate.
- **5. Will** encourage or help others, shows appreciation of help, enjoys relating.

Physical changes

- 1. Able to stay placed in sitting position with assistance at leg from two side-helpers at walk.
- 2. Able to stay in a balanced position at walk while supporting self.
- 3. Able to sit independently at walk e.g. hands free or holding reins.
- **4. Able** to ride independently at walk.
- **5. Able** to stay in a balanced position independently at trot.

Horsemanship

- **1. No** knowledge of how to relate to or communicate with pony using riding aids.
- 2. Shows understanding of how to relate to or communicate with pony using riding aids.
- **3.** Implementing communication with pony using riding aids when prompted.
- **4. Implementing** communication with pony using riding aids with little or no prompting.
- **5. Riding** with sensitivity to and control of pony.

Embracing technology! With our brand new online volunteer rota



This September sees possibly one of the boldest technological steps forward we have taken for a long time as we introduce a new way of working with our volunteers - a new online volunteer rota system.

Our volunteers have long been telling us that it would be great to have a system that lets them quickly and easily volunteer if they have any extra time, but also



enables them to let us know when they are on holiday or may not be able to volunteer for their regular day. For us, it is about knowing how many volunteers we have on any one day - it is vital that we have enough volunteers to operate safely. So the search for a solution began.

Needless to say, we did a lot of background research to find a rota system that was well recognised within the industry but also easy to use, as so many systems today are complicated. Finding something that was quick and easy was our primary aim.

Our search settled on a rota system that has been developed by a company called Three Rings. They have a proven track record in the charities industry and their system is used by many of the big national charities including Macmillan, Cats Protection and the Samaritans, so we are

in good company.

task was to make sure that our volunteer information was correct. All our existing volunteers will have received an email from us recently asking them to complete a short online form. That information will be uploaded into the system ready for September when we will be having a full training session. We certainly believe that this new system will be a big hit. The team and our Heads of Day will be able to view the information from home or at work to see if there are any gaps in the daily lessons and will use the system to alert

volunteers that extra help is needed. Volunteers will also be able to access the system from home or view on their phone or tablet so that they can manage their time with us.

I suffer from severe anxiety as I too am autistic and decided to pop into Cotswold RDA rather than summon the courage to call.

I arrived at Cotswold RDA shaking like a leaf and asked about volunteering. I was made to feel very welcome and asked to pop in the next day for a training session. I am so glad that I braved that first journey!

I feel so peaceful at Cotswold RDA. Working with the ponies has lifted my depression. I feel at home and feel like I am one of the family. Everyone has been welcoming.

I get so much pleasure in seeing how much the riders improve from week to week. The first time I heard one of the riders talk to his pony after riding (after weeks of silence) brought tears to my eyes. I felt so proud of him.

I am now going to support Cotswold RDA in a head of day role and I am honoured that they think that I can cover such a responsible role.

I would love to learn to ride but need to lose some weight so I am doing a sponsored slim to help to raise funds at the same

This past year has been amazing. My confidence and mental health has vastly improved thanks to volunteering at Cotswold RDA and I look forward to many more years at Cotswold RDA".
