Volunteers Tea at the Houses of Parliament

David, who volunteers on Tuesdays, and me, Onika from Thursdays, were invited to a tea and tour at the Houses of Parliament by St. Albans MP, Anne Main. We first went through all the security and then into Westminster Hall which was very large and cold. This was the original law court and was built in 1097. Many famous politicians have made speeches here. Tea was held in the Jubilee Room and we met lots of other volunteers from St. Albans charities. We were taken on a tour and went to the Under Chapel which is very ornate and decorated in gold and rich reds and blues. MPs can marry



here and have their children christened. We saw the hall between the House of Commons and the House of Lords with the big dent made in the door by Black Rod when he bangs on it at the opening of Parliament. Anne Main explained the MPs voting system and showed us the House of Commons. The seats face each other and there is a red line in the carpet between the two sides. When MPs debate they must stay behind this line and hence the expression "toeing the line". The House of Parliament are kept as traditionally as possible.



We were able to see many statues of former Prime Ministers including Winston Churchill. The foot on the statue had to be repaired as so many MPs touch it for good luck.

We had a lovely time and told lots of people about our wonderful friends at Earthworks and what we get up to. Thank you for inviting us.

The art of wheelbarrows by James Kenyon

So far I've been working at Earthworks for $3\frac{1}{2}$ years. Work has been enjoyable. I managed to grow my own herbs and spring onions. Then one day I felt like trying something different. That's when the idea for giving wheelbarrows more colour and vibrance came up.

First, I designed 4 designs: one was with zebra stripes. Originally it was supposed to be a jaguar pattern but then there was a shortage of paint. The third design was multicoloured and the last one had stars.

This whole idea came about when I was asked to think of something new during a meeting. By the time it came to the



third, I decided to add a few finishing touches to both the front and back: a skull with a passing phrase "Respect" and another one on the front saying "Too much hate doesn't win". Overall I enjoyed painting each of them.

Seasonal Recipe of Creamed Leeks and Smoked Haddock on Toast (Serves 4)

300ml whole milk 3 fresh bay leaves 8 black peppercorns 400g undyed smoked haddock fillet, skin on

65g butter



600g leeks (from Earthworks!) cut into 1cm slices 25g plain flour 150mml double cream 4 thick crusty bread slices

50g extra mature cheddar, grated

- Put the milk, bay leaves, peppercorns and fish into a large saucepan and bring to the boil over a medium heat. Cover and simmer for 5 mins, then remove from heat and leave for 3-4 mins until fish is cooked through. Once cooled break into large flakes, discarding any skin and bones. Strain milk into bowl and set aside.

Preheat grill to high. Melt the butter in a pan, add leeks and cover and cook gently for 4-5 mins until just tender. Uncover and stir in the flour, 160ml of the reserved milk and then the cream. Bring to a simmer, stirring, then cook for a 2-3 mins until thickened. Season and then stir in flaked haddock.
Grill the bread on both sides until golden, remove and spread with butter. Spoon the haddock and leek mixture on top, completely covering the toast.
Sprinkle with the cheddar and put under grill for 3-4 mins until golden.
