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CHAIR'S REPORT

Competition for visitors in a city rich in history and culture such as London is a stimulating challenge. Couple that with economic austerity and ever more inventive ways have to be found to meet the challenge including admission charges. Benchmarking entry charges across like organisations indicated we were well below the mean. We took the bold, and not risk-free, decision to increase admission charges and re-structure our price offers. Happily, this did not result in a significant drop in visitor numbers and although total numbers were just shy of our target for the year, positive feedback on the visitor experience and the spend per visitor were encouraging. A major contributing factor has been the committed efforts of the museum staff team and Director.

The museum continues to have a strong international appeal. Overseas visitors were 66% of the total adult visitors of which 20% were from the US many of whom were practising or retired nurses. For our many non-English speaking visitors we provide information in ten different foreign languages.

Florence Nightingale's life and legacy continue to be a major draw for most visitors but without expansion of our offer and the space in which to deliver a wider range of programmes our audience share will become even harder to attract. The Trustee-led group set up last year to explore expansion and relocation options commissioned a Visioning Study from BT Consultancy, funded in large part by a grant from the Guy's and St Thomas' Charity, for which we were most grateful. The final report will provide the basis for our plans to secure a long term location that will allow us to meet our aims and provide a platform for growth.

Primary School visits make up 22% of our total visitor numbers and as reported last year, the First World War heroine, Edith Cavell, has been added to the Key Stage 1 curriculum now reflected in our offer with a specific display opened in September. A popular component of the display has been the loan from the Imperial War Museum of Edith Cavell's dog, Jack. All acquisitions, loans and disposals of the museum's collections are overseen by a newly formed Collections Sub-group of Trustees with the Director – an important good practice element of our application for renewal for Arts Council England Accreditation.

The extensive volume of letters covering a wide range of subjects penned by Florence Nightingale reside in collections both here and abroad. Launched in August, the Nightingale Online Digitisation project, initiated by this museum, has created access to the collections of the founding partners Boston University's Howard Gottlieb Center, the Wellcome Library and the Royal College of Nursing. Our plan is for other collections to join in due course thus creating an easily accessible international resource of a unique personal archive.

The annual Trustee and museum staff Away Day focussing on current and future issues took place in November as part of the museum's continued governance development. The annual one-to-one meetings between the Chair and Trustees were delayed to take into account views on the final Visioning Study report which fell outside this reporting period. During the year, Elizabeth Bennett, Board Secretary, resigned after eight years with the museum which included much valued work for the refurbishment in 2010. Trustees decided not to fill the vacancy until the outcomes of a planned Board skills review were known. Steve McGuire stood aside in September to become an Honorary Trustee in recognition of his invaluable assistance to the museum. Alastair Gourlay has joined the Board as a Trustee to fill Steve's position as a representative of the Guy's and St Thomas' Trust. Pat Smedley, a long standing Museum Member and observer on the Board also stood down. As ever, the museum is extremely fortunate to be served by a group of supportive Trustees with a wealth of experience and expertise willingly shared which is greatly appreciated by the Director, her team and myself.

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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees present their report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2015, which have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice issued by the Charity Commission in March 2005 and the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company and the Special Provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small entities.

The Trustees confirm that the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit has been considered in relation to the objectives of the Charity. The report below sets out those objectives and describes how they have been met in the current year.

OBJECTIVES OF THE CHARITY

The Trust's Memorandum of Association gives the object as:

To advance the education of nurses or those engaged in nursing.

In the furtherance of this objective, the governing document gives the trust powers which include the following:

- To establish and maintain a Museum for the preservation and wider display of the Nightingale collection;
- To receive donations of suitable items for the collection, or to purchase suitable items;
- To facilitate research into the history and work of Florence Nightingale, particularly in relation to the first training school for nurses at St Thomas' Hospital and consequential developments in the nursing profession. The Florence Nightingale Museum was awarded full Accreditation status by MLA in 2010.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

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STRATEGIC PLAN

The Florence Nightingale Museum's Strategic Plan was reviewed in March 2014, revising and updating the strategic objectives that inform the work of the museum. These objectives enable us to meet the museum's key aims, which are as follows:

- To secure a long-term location to allow us to meet our aims, and provide a platform for growth;
- To continue to be a financially sustainable and self-funding organisation;
- To increase unrestricted funds through an audience-specific marketing plan;
- To create an enjoyable, inspiring and enlightening experience for our visitors;
- To provide an active and innovative events and learning programme;
- To increase access to our unique collections;
- To be a centre for research in the history of nursing;
- To value the development and effective management of staff and volunteers.

GENERAL ACTIVITIES

The Florence Nightingale Museum has been extremely fortunate in being granted £1,000,000 by the Perseverance Trust. This will be used to create the Perseverance Endowment, the income of which will fund ongoing learning and engagement with the nursing profession. The Perseverance Trust is closing and is therefore distributing its funds to other organisations that share its objectives. Primary beneficiaries were the Florence Nightingale Museum, the Nightingale Fellowship, the Cavell Nurses Trust and the Florence Nightingale Faculty of Nursing and Midwifery at Kings College London. With the annual income from the Perseverance Endowment, the Nightingale Museum will fund a full time, permanent post dedicated to reaching and engaging with student nurses and inspiring young people to consider nursing as a profession.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the exhibition and associated event programme celebrating the role of nurses in the First World War. The Hospital in the Oatfield: The Art of Nursing in the First World War opened in March 2014, and received much positive press coverage, including a double-page article in The Times. At the heart of the exhibition were the newly acquired ten oil paintings by Victor Tardieu, generously funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, the V&A Purchase Grant Fund, and Guy's and St Thomas' Charity. Special talks for adults, activities for families and special interpretation created by the museum's Youth Panel formed the main thrust of the year's activities. We are grateful to Patron Fred Sharf for funding the illustrated book associated with the exhibition. The exhibition closed in October, and transferred to tour at Dunrobin Castle in the Scottish Highlands, and will transfer to Stafford's Shire Hall Gallery in September 2015. The paintings will return to permanent display at the Nightingale Museum in November 2015. The exhibition received good feedback from our visitors and this was borne out by the external evaluation which found that our audiences connected with the themes of the exhibition and were moved by the stories of the First World War nurses' bravery and devotion.

From mid-November to Christmas 2014, the Florence Nightingale Museum was honoured to host Eleanor Crook's art installation *And the Band Played On...*. This challenging piece demonstrated the advancement of plastic surgery within a military context and sparked some fascinating conversations with visitors. This was followed by a smaller exhibition about the history of St Thomas' Hospital, which proved popular with hospital staff.

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The Florence Nightingale Museum's school programme continues to be a successful and fruitful partnership with Spectrum Drama. The museum welcomes over 60 Key Stage 1 children each day during term time.

Working closely with our landlords, Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Foundation Trust, continues to be a priority for the museum. February Half Term saw the team from St Thomas' Simulation and Interactive Learning Centre (SAiL) and the Cardiac team from Evelina Children's Hospital lead demonstrations and show medical simulations. Families had the opportunity to learn how to do CPR, have a look at the heart with a 'Heartworks' simulator, listen to a beating heart and learn how to take blood. We had at least 200 families visiting who greatly enjoyed the day. Thanks go to the team from St Thomas' for their hard work and enthusiasm.

The reception area of the museum was refurbished during the winter, and the redesign has had a positive effect on visitors and retail purchases. The brighter design and information panels encourage visitors to linger in the shop area, and the shop and the reception are now more closely visually linked together.

In October, the museum suffered a flood caused by workmen on the floor above. Fortunately, no damage was caused and the museum used the experience as a base to review the Emergency Plan.

Learning and Access Manager Katie Edwards left the Nightingale Museum in September to become the Assistant Director of the Brunel Museum. Her position was filled by Stephanie Tyler, who previously was employed as Schools Coordinator at the Museum of London.

The museum's work is supported by a small and dedicated team of volunteers whose warm reception and enthusiasm is appreciated by our visitors.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Statement of Financial Activities (on page 10) shows that the funds of the Museum decreased in total by £56,925 for the financial year to 31 March 2015. This is caused by a reduction to the restricted funds of £69,852, which includes amortisation of the museum displays of £83,530. Unrestricted funds increased by £12,927.

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In accordance with Charity Commission guidance the Trustees have agreed a reserves policy based on a realistic assessment of their reserves needs. It is not their policy to build up resources by retaining funds as a matter of habit. Any annual surpluses made are held to provide a prudent provision for costs both foreseen, and unforeseen, which may be incurred in the future.

Maintenance of Reserves

The Trustees will aim to maintain appropriate reserves in the future by careful budgeting and monitoring of income and expenditure.

Review of the Policy

Now that the new-look Museum is well established, it is the Trustees intention to review the reserves policy annually.

RELATED PARTIES AND CONNECTED ORGANISATIONS

The Florence Nightingale Museum is located within the site of St. Thomas' Hospital. The Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Foundation Trust is represented by a Trustee but it does not have powers to nominate Trustees.

We are grateful for the ongoing support of the many donors and funders of the Florence Nightingale Museum. We are especially grateful to the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Wellcome Trust, Guy's and St Thomas' Charity, and Fred and Jean Sharf.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees (who are also directors of The Florence Nightingale Museum Trust for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the annual return and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

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STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the Trustees are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditors are unaware, and each Trustee has taken all the steps that ought to have been taken as a Trustee in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditors are aware of that information.

GUARANTORS

The Trustees are the Members of the Company which is limited by guarantee. In the event of winding up, the liability of members is limited to £1.

AUDITORS

Messrs RPG Crouch Chapman LLP have indicated their willingness to continue in office and a resolution for their re-appointment will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2015

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and the Companies Act 2006.
- b) Grants are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period in which they are receivable.
- c) Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are credited to restricted incoming resources when receivable. Depreciation of fixed assets purchased with such grants is charged against the restricted fund, unless the assets are used for the general purpose of the charity in which case the assets are transferred to the unrestricted funds.
- d) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Intangible income is recognised as an incoming resource where the provider of the service has incurred a financial cost. Volunteer time is not included in the financial statements.
- e) Stocks represent finished goods for resale, and are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. In general, cost is determined on a first in first out basis and includes transport and handling costs. Net realisable value is the price at which stocks can be sold in the normal course of business after allowing for the costs of realisation.
- f) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- g) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned based on an estimate of staff time attributable to each activity.
- h) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Fixtures & fittings lower of the remaining lease term or 10 years on a straight line basis

Office Equipment 4 years straight line basis

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £5,000. Depreciation costs are allocated on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

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1. Accounting Policies - continued

- i) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.
- j) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity.
- k) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.
- 1) The costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in raising funds for the charitable work.
- m) Heritage Assets as defined by Financial Reporting Standard 30 are not recognised in accordance with the exemption available under the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities.
