obbying and developing relationships with political representatives, at Council, Assembly, Westminster and European level is fundamental to our commitment to represent the interests of our members and the thousands of small businesses who go through our enterprise programmes.

Two meetings of the All Party Group for SMEs took place in 2014. We invited a cross-section of the business community to meet and network with MLAs, ensuring that the issues they face are firmly on the political agenda.

The APG is chaired by Judith Cochrane MLA, with Enterprise NI providing secretarial support. The first event, in March, gave attendees the opportunity to direct their concerns around difficulties associated with starting and maintaining small businesses in Northern Ireland to guest speaker, Finance Minister Simon Hamilton.

Attendees also advocated the need for a strategic policy to encourage growth and an environment that supports and encourages entrepreneurs to start new and grow existing businesses.

Mr Hamilton said, "I am determined, playing my part as Finance Minister, to achieve the Executive's aim of growing a vibrant and dynamic economy".

speaker at our second event. He highlighted the work of his department in growing and supporting the SME sector, including the issue of addressing the skills gap, apprenticeship schemes and greater flexibility on employment law. The meeting was held at Law Society House in Belfast.

Further meetings of the All Party Group will take place in 2015, to ensure that SMEs first hand experiences enable political representatives in delivering positive outcomes for our economy.

#### <u>Engagement</u>

Dr. Caroline O'Kane, Information & Policy Officer, was invited to brief Shadow Secretary of State, Ivan Lewis MP on issues facing the enterprise support sector and youth entrepreneurship.

Gordon Gough was invited to meet with former Secretary of State, Owen Paterson MP, to discuss the current economic context in Northern Ireland for SMEs.

Gordon Gough and John D'Arcy met a number of newly appointed Chief Executives of the new Super Councils, to advise them of the LEA network's successes in delivering business start-up programmes and initiatives

The Enterprise, Trade and Investment Committee invited Enterprise NI to identify the potential for the development of a retail incubation strategy. Following submission of a paper, Enterprise NI were invited to lead on taking this work forward, in partnership with other key business support organisations.

## European Entrepreneurial Region 2015

Northern Ireland was selected as European Entrepreneurial Region (EER) 2015 at an awards ceremony in Brussels. The award is given to Europe's most outstanding regional strategies that foster entrepreneurship and promote innovation among small and medium enterprises (SMEs).

The award follows a joint application by the Northern Ireland Local Government Association (NILGA) and Invest Northern Ireland and was supported by Enterprise Northern Ireland. Welcoming the news, Enterprise Minister, Arlene Foster said: "This award is well deserved and recognises the hard work of all those involved in

making Northern Ireland one of the leading entrepreneurial regions in Europe."

She added: "While inward investment is essential for any country or region striving to make its mark in a competitive world, of equal importance is indigenous industry both in terms of the growth of existing firms and the need to encourage a greater number of people to start new, innovative and globally focused businesses."

The Minister praised the work of the local business community in supporting SMEs: "This fantastic achievement is another step towards creating a more vibrant culture of entrepreneurial spirit in Northern Ireland."

#### Headline Insights from our Chief Executive

nterprise Northern Ireland (ENI) undertakes three core strands of work on behalf of its members, namely supporting, networking and delivery. As I reflect on the past year, I thought it might be timely to update members on where we are in relation to these three strands.

#### **SUPPORTING**

Enterprise NI produces regular Policy Papers and Consultation responses on behalf of its members. These are available from the Members Section of our website. Our Information and Policy Officer, Dr Caroline O'Kane, has consulted widely with members on themes for policy papers to promote the self-employment and entrepreneurial agenda. With support from Ulster Bank, a significant policy paper is planned for 2015, focusing on key issues impacting on the small business and enterprise support sectors.

The All Party Group on SMEs (established by Enterprise NI in 2013) provides a voice at Stormont for the LEA network and small business sector. Two meetings of the APG were held in 2014, addressed by Simon Hamilton MLA, Minister for Finance and Personnel and Stephen Farry MLA, Minister for Employment and Learning. Future meetings are planned for 2015. I encourage members to attend these meetings and input into the policy agenda for SMEs in Northern Ireland.

Joint Purchasing is an area where Enterprise NI is able to make significant savings for its members. The current COBRA Business Advisers Toolkit is an example of this and Enterprise NI is exploring other areas to help members save money through joint purchasing, eg. recycling, insurance, telephony and Board Governance training. We do, however, appreciate the preference of some members to support "local" suppliers.

Local Government Reform is the single biggest strategic issue facing the LEA network since the amalgamation of LEDU, IRTU and IDB into Invest NI. Enterprise NI is responding to this through its strategic relationships with the Northern Ireland Local Government Association (NILGA) and the LED Forum. We are preparing policy and positioning papers promoting

the work of the local enterprise network for the new councils. These will provide thought leadership in enterprise and entrepreneurship initiatives. Enterprise NI is delighted to have joined forces with NILGA to secure European Entrepreneurial Region status for Northern Ireland for 2015.

The 2014 Members Survey will be available to members before the end of the year, providing LEAs with up to date benchmarking information to assist with business planning activities.

We launched the new Enterprise NI GRANT finder service earlier this year to provide a bespoke service tailored to the requirements of every LEA.

#### **NETWORKING**

As part of our advocacy service to members, we lobby government departments, and gather and disseminate information on issues affecting the LEA network. One example of this is our popular Business Brunch Brief series, which continued throughout the year. Our session "Spotlight on Vacant Rates" was particularly well attended by members.

We organised an information session for LEAs on the new Charities Registration, and invited the Charities Commission along to discuss the application process and the Public Benefit Requirement. Enterprise NI will continue to facilitate information sharing between members and act in an advocacy role and information disseminator during this process.

Meet the MEPs is an information event planned for 2015 on funding opportunities, timescales and application processes. It

followed feedback from the LEA Chairs' lunch hosted this summer by John D'Arcy in Belfast, that the EU should provide funding options directly for LEAs.

Since our formation in 2001 the value of contracts delivered by members on behalf of Enterprise NI is over £35m. This does not include the value of capital expenditure purchased by Enterprise NI on behalf of its members, for example, E-Commerce, E-Commerce II and Points of Presence signage.

As a membership organisation, Enterprise NI will continue to deliver a range of services to its members. The initiatives detailed here compare favourably with the range of services offered by other business support membership organisations. What sets us apart from other membership organisations is the number of business support contracts that we hold which are delivered by our members. These business support contracts complement the massive public investment in the LEA network over the past 20 years.

In conclusion, I would like to thank our stakeholders, in particular, DETI, DEL, Invest NI, SEUPB, Ulster Community Investment, Start Up Loans UK, local councils and the thousands of small businesses who have used our services over the past year. I would also like to thank the Chairman, John D'Arcy, and the Board of Enterprise NI for their commitment, support and strategic leadership and of course the Enterprise NI staff team at Limavady who work so hard to ensure that Enterprise NI fulfils its duties to members, stakeholders and small businesses across Northern Ireland

tool for Enterprise NI and its members. **In Focus** the Enterprise NI Quarterly e-zine, is a great way for LEAs to benchmark business support activity and to see what is going on throughout the network.

Our new **Business Buzz** e-zine for quality assured business advisers has just been launched and a new e-zine is planned for 2015 which will focus specially on enterprise and entrepreneurship policy areas and small business tips and advice.

## Starting

Since Regional Start Initiative began in 2012 we have dealt with over 15,000 enquiries from people looking to set up in business with more than 10.000 initial meetings with business advisers throughout the LEA network. 6,500 start-up business plans were produced surpassing our targets with Invest NI.

The current contract officially runs to March 2015 but may continue to October 2015 when the new councils assume responsibility for business start-up functions.

The Social Entrepreneurship programme has set up 89 new social enterprises and created over 220 new jobs since it started in 2012.

The Exploring Enterprise programme has helped 1700 people to attain the QCF Level 2 qualification in Understanding Business Enterprise with 79 going on into full time employment, 62 into part time employment and 286 into self-employment.

Since our appointment in 2013 as the Northern Ireland delivery partner for Start Up Loans UK, we have disbursed 143 loans across the region at a capital value of almost £700.000. In addition, the Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund has disbursed 104 loans at a value of £2.2m. These products position the LEA network as key sources of finance for small businesses.

The Tradelinks cross border trade programme concluded earlier in the year having assisted over 200 micro enterprises with 60% of businesses attending cross border networking events. Approximately 20 businesses were referred on to InterTrade Ireland, Invest NI and Enterprise Ireland support programmes.



#### **Tradelinks Bows Out**

This year saw the end of the Tradelinks programme, which was developed to enhance all-Ireland and international trade by assisting and growing the micro-enterprise sector across Northern Ireland and the border counties of Louth, Monaghan, Cavan, Leitrim, Sligo and Donegal.

The programme ended in August 2014, and by that date, had helped over 200 small businesses to become more sustainable and competitive by developing cross border trade opportunities and network linkages.

Enterprise Factor ran the programme in ten schools before a planned roll out to 50 schools across Northern Ireland. The loan supported investment in marketing and promotional materials.

Finance for the deal was provided by Enterprise Northern Ireland, which has been appointed to administer at least £3million of funding in Northern Ireland on behalf of the Start Up Loans Scheme

John D'Arcy, Enterprise NI Chair said: "This is an important addition to the funding spectrum in Northern Ireland. There is a direct and strong link between levels of new business start-ups and economic prosperity and this finance is an important part of driving growth in the Northern Ireland economy."

It has been delivered by Enterprise NI and the regional LEA network since it began in October 2012.


To date, Local Enterprise Agencies helped would-be business owners develop 6565 business plans, against a target of 6500 plans. This is a vital first step in setting up

The programme, developed by Carrickfergus Enterprise, provides a range of support for established businesses including one-to-one mentoring, ICT support, informative seminars on topics such as LinkedIn and Essential Fire Safety culminating with an annual 'Celebration of Enterprise' event to showcase local business successes.

After completing a comprehensive business plan through the Regional Start Initiative, John opened the doors of his North Street florists in October 2012. He quickly built up a reputation for his floristry throughout the Carrickfergus and Greater Belfast area.

Through funding provided under the Business Improvement Programme John launched a new professional and upmarket website, www.carrickblooms. co.uk to cater for customers wishing to place orders 24/7.


John explains: 'The support from Carrickfergus Enterprise via the Councilfunded Business Improvement Programme, gave my business a real boost. Today customers expect to be able to make an online purchase at any time of the day or  $night. \ This morning I came in to find three$ 

orders ready and waiting to go out. Paypal gives added peace of mind for secure payments. I simply needed this vital support to grow and develop my business'.

Kelli Bagchus, Manager of Carrickfergus Enterprise says 'We are delighted to be able to continue to provide such

support to our local business community. Feedback from past participants has been extremely supportive and we will continue to provide such support and guidance where it is needed most'.

John's business has now expanded further with an opening of a second shop in Larne, John Alan's Floral Design. He saw an opportunity when a florist had closed down in a prime retail location in the town. The ever-ambitious John is aiming for further expansion and hopes to open 3 to 4 further outlets in major retail locations across Northern Ireland.



#### **Pop Notch Idea**

Draperstown may not traditionally be the first location that comes to mind when Popcorn is mentioned.

That's changed, since August 2013 when So Popcorn was established by Declan McBride.

So Popcorn manufactures a range of exciting popcorn products under the 'Pop Notch' brand. With support from Workspace Enterprises Ltd in Draperstown, Declan credits the Invest NI Regional Start Initiative with helping him to consolidate his idea, develop a business plan and expand his product range.

According to Declan, 'Starting a business during the economic downturn was daunting, but having developed a successful business when times are tough, I would encourage others to take the plunge and follow their dream."



Declan initially starting producing around 800 bags per month of gourmet popcorn products using 16 domestic electrical products. The initial So Popcorn range features a range of flavours including Irish Cream, Salty Caramel, Chewy Marshmallow and Vanilla Chocolate.

Rapidly increasing demand led Declan to access a loan from the Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund, to invest in research and development to expand the popcorn product range into savoury products. He is also exploring export opportunities across the UK and increasing output to meet growing domestic consumer demand. Declan now products 2000 bags per week for distribution to high profile retailers including Spar, Nisa, Super Valu and the Odyssey Arena and cinema.

#### **Puppy Love for Fido Finesse**

A keen pet owner, Sharon Montgomery used her lifelong personal experience of owning and caring for animals to start her own business. With the help of the Regional Start Initiative, Sharon established Fido Finesse, a professional dog grooming service based in Antrim Borough.

Sharon credits the Regional Start Initiative as being the key driving force in making her entrepreneurial journey possible: "The main motivation for signing up for it and going into business was the economic climate. It created the opportunity for me to retrain and exploit the growth within the animal care industry. When I was made redundant my main motivation was to take control of my own employment and to look at the challenge of being self-employed".

#### **Plant and Play** Wildlife Garden

Zoologist Vikki Bustard is at the helm of the The Plant and Play Wildlife Garden in Bangor which opened during the year. The site comprises a unique working allotment and educational wildlife garden, which teaches children about seasonal fruit and vegetables.

The business also hosts horticultural and conservation workshop for adults and children's birthday parties, with an onsite retail shop selling plants, vegetables, gardening books and made-to-order, handcarved garden furniture.

Vikki, who has prior work experience in horticulture, conservation and working with children, also has plans to undertake school visits, wildlife garden design and creation consultancy services. The garden comprises sensory and imaginative outdoor play areas, encouraging children to engage in increased physical activity through play and gardening.



Vikki developed a robust business plan Organisation as part of the Invest NI Regional Start Initiative, which in turn helped her secure funding from Enterprise Northern Ireland Start Up Loans to develop the gardens and indoor areas. Vikki explains: 'None of this would have been possible without the Regional Start Initiative. I wouldn't have had a clue where to start, what funding was available and how to check if the business would be viable".

#### **Boxing Clever** in Business

Randalstown fitness instructor and personal trainer, Malachy McCann, is one of those lucky people who can say they have both job satisfaction and their dream job.

Having gained 11 years' experience working as an instructor, Malachy decided the time was right to start up on his own gym, and he signed up for Invest Northern Ireland's Regional Start Initiative.

Malachy says that as a result, "in a short space of time, the business has gone from strength to strength, with more clients coming through the door which has led to the increase of equipment offering different services for all."

#### **Ted Talks Business for Jane**

Jane Roberts new start up 'Jane's Teds - Made with Love' came from her skill in creating handmade teddy bears for all occasions. With the backing of her husband, she signed up for Regional Start and it gave her the opportunity to produce a business plan.

Jane explains: "That allowed me to focus my thoughts and ideas for the business by setting out and identifying the business objectives. I was able to identify the marketing opportunities for the business as well as identifying the business operations."

She added, "Our biggest reward for our hard work was achieving an interview with the National Museums of Northern Ireland, to discuss the possibility of selling the teddy bears within their establishments. In addition we have also secured a contract with the Titanic Quarter and I have now sold them 100 bears to sell in the shop."

# EE<sup>2</sup>P Winning Equation for Nana's Attic

esley Evans from Cookstown celebrated the launch of her online vintage and pre-loved clothing business Nana's Attic, following her participation on the Exploring Enterprise 2 (EE2P) programme.

Nana's Attic, was launched after Lesley, who worked in retail for several years, became unemployed and found it difficult to find new work. Lesley had always wanted to run her own business, and with the help of Dana McKenna at the Cookstown Enterprise Centre and the EE<sup>2</sup>P programme, she has now made that dream a reality, securing UK and international sales.

Lesley said, "At Cookstown Enterprise Centre I was introduced to Dana McKenna, who became my business mentor. I already had a business idea, and just getting started and getting some sound advice gave me the confidence to get going.

"Dana helped me to pull all my ideas together. She showed me how to set out my business plan in a proper format. I really couldn't have done it without her support and advice - it was really, really helpful."

Dana explained: "The programme provides an insight into starting a business and gets candidates thinking about the possibilities within their grasp. We can then help them take the next steps to help them fulfil their ambitions."

It is encouraging to see that by the end of the third year, 1,400 people have completed the **Exploring Enterprise2** Programme, with more going forward for the qualification in year 4.

The Exploring Enterprise 2 Programme is an Enterprise Northern Ireland initiative. It is offered free to people, aged 16+ years working 16 hours or less a week.

Participants can include the long term unemployed, lone parents, stay at home mums, people with disabilities or with low or no qualifications, young people not in education, older workers and the recently retired. There are no qualifications required to gain entry to the programme and it is delivered at a pace specifically

The programme entered its fourth and final year in April 2014, building upon impressive results and achievements.

At the end of March 2014, 1,400 participants had secured the Level 2 qualification, against a target of 1,176, an achievement of 114%.

In October 2014, a further 336 participants currently awaiting the outcome of the whether their Understanding Business

Following a number of health issues, Beverley took the first steps back into the job market as a self-employed reflexologist after completing the Exploring Enterprise 2 Programme through Causeway Enterprise Agency. Despite encountering many challenges, Beverley achieved nine GCSEs, a BTEC National Diploma in Caring Services and a degree in Psychology with Education.

Two years ago she took up her next challenge, a two-year course in Reflexology. Her tutors were concerned that her disability would stand in her way but she proved them wrong,

and completed the course. Beverley's mum then told her about EE2P and how it might help her to get a reflexology business up and running.

Inspired by the Programme, she said: "It gave me the insight into what is required to set up a business and really boosted my confidence. I've never allowed my disability to get the better of me and am determined to make

## **Enterprising** Programme Felt Different for Jane

Having set up her handmade felt crafts business, Namaste Nepal, earlier this year, Jane Prendy was struggling to get the most out of being self-employed. She explains:

"I called in to LEDCOM for information about joining a craft course and ultimately joined the EE<sup>2</sup>P. This gave me the opportunity to understand more about marketing, finances and business planning, and the chance to meet a great group of fellow entrepreneurs.

"Our tutor, Emma, was motivating and inspirational, and I loved every part of this very practical course."

the best out of life. But I could never have set up my own business without the support of Leo and the team at Causeway Enterprise and I'm more determined than ever to make a success of my business.

### **Ards and Crafts Explore Enterprise**

Newtownards curtain maker, Carol Buchanan, and interior designer, Siobhan McNeilly were among the first candidates from Ards Business Agency to benefit from the Exploring Enterprise 2 Programme.

Carol who had been out of work through chronic illness, and Siobhan who was made redundant from her previous job, both took their first steps into self-employment after completing the EE2P.

As a result Carol established an evergrowing soft furnishing business, called Lisbarnett Soft Furnishings, whilst Siobhan has set up her own flourishing interior design consultancy, Vonni Grace Interiors.

Carol Buchanan said. "Lleft school with no formal qualifications but worked my whole life. I also did a significant amount of voluntary work in the local community. I was hospitalised nine times in one year with a debilitating illness and I found it impossible to hold down a job.

"When I was in remission for approximately two years I wanted to get back into work as quickly as possible. I knew that my type of condition would require that I work from



home. This Programme provided me with the insight and confidence to get my own business started."

Siobhan McNeilly, who worked in the retail and property sectors before being made redundant had studied interior design

"Melanie, our business mentor, was

amazing and really helped build my confidence and self-belief to turn my dream into a viable business idea. I have now been running my own interior design consultancy for just over six months on a part-time basis and the projects have been steadily coming in. "

# Hola to the Spanish for Entrepreneur

hile on maternity leave following the birth of her first child, languages and teaching graduate Lynn Ross saw an opportunity for a language school for children.

Her business idea brought together her language skills and qualifications to provide language classes for under 4s and their parents. The Result? Hola Muchachos

Lynn said, "Language classes were ideal as I was already teaching Spanish to my daughter. It felt like a natural step into the market at the end of my maternity leave. I started up just one class per week alongside my part time employment with the South Eastern Education and Library Board where I travelled around schools teaching Spanish to children from P1 - P7.

Lynn credits the Business Boot Camp programme with helping her get her inventively named business Hola Muchachos' up and running, providing her with a robust business plan and



future direction for the company as well as strengthening weaknesses in her management of the business.

She says, "I am now at a high growth stage of the business and am preparing to take a leap into sub-contracting work out to tutors. I hope to be in all major towns in NI with my under 4s and after school clubs, and I am keeping the possibility of franchising open as an option in the future.

## Business **Boot Camp**

The Business Boot Camp Programme is run in partnership by Enterprise Northern Ireland, Full Circle and Advantage.

It is open to all budding or established 16-35 year old entrepreneurs based in the council areas of Belfast, Lisburn, Castlereagh, Newtownabbey, North Down, Carrickfergus and Donegal.

In the past 24 months, 83 young people have been through the 'Start' element of the Business Boot Camp Programme resulting in 61 starting their own business. In the same period, almost 83 businesses have participated in the 'Grow' element of the programme and set about developing business expansion plans for their businessesThe programme is now in its final year of delivery and it is expected that in total 263 (137 young entrepreneurs & 126 young business owners) will have participated on the programme when completed in March 2015.

It is funded under the European Regional Development Fund through the European INTERREG IVA Structural Funds Programme.

## A Lingering Success

The Síoda Lingerie label is a collection of delicate silk French knickers, ruched knickers, shorts, camisoles, cami-knickers, chemises, negligees, robes and accessories. Each exquisite item is designed and handmade individually in Belfast.

With support from Ortus, this is one local company that is still flying the flag for homegrown Irish products in the declining garment sector which was formerlya staple of the local economy. Having come from an entrepreneurial family, Mary was keen to turn her engineering qualifications into something more creative.

Mary says, "My parents and both my maternal and paternal grandparents were self-employed. We were always

## **Sense of Adventure Brings Expansion** for Rostrevor Firm

ounded in 1991, East Coast Adventure started out as a oneman operation hiring canoes on Warrenpoint beach.

Today the firm, headed up by Mark, Ian and Jennifer Cumming, employs 30 people and provides an outdoor education programme, leisure pursuits and corporate team building activities from five locations around Carlingford Lough.

East Coast Adventure received a boost to its business with a loan from the Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund, which enabled it to expand its infrastructure and create new jobs.

Over the last five years, the firm expanded to include a water-based activity centre, a mountain bike centre with the only uplift service in Northern Ireland, a golf driving

range and bunkhouse accommodation in the Knockbarragh Valley outside Rostrevor. In the summer it attracts up to 200 visitors per day. The latest investment allowed the firm to build six self-catering camping pods and create three additional jobs.

Mark Cumming, Managing Director, said: "The NI Small Business Loan Fund helped us expand our outdoor facilities. Camping has evolved over the last number of years with the emergence of glamping and these pod facilities, which bring a little bit of luxury to camping, have become very popular worldwide.

"The pods contain a table and seating area that can sleep up to four people, with one of the pods being converted into a toilet and shower facility. There is also an external camp kitchen and BBQ area for people to prepare meals. Recently we had a school

Operations Director, Ian Cumming, outlined plans for expansion and one-ofa-kind camping experiences: "We have plans to build a tepee, as well as creating a communal area for the camping pods with further job creation."



#### **InnovateHer A Positive Career Choice**

InnovateHER is a tailored programme designed to encourage entrepreneurship as a career choice for women.

Dungannon Enterprise Centre was awarded £20,000 by Ulster Bank parent Royal Bank of Scotland for InnovateHer.

The Centre received the support from the RBS Inspiring Women in Enterprise fund, and will use the funding to bring women's networking and skills development together in one tailored innovative programme. Project highlights will include mentoring and the 'Inspire Me' masterclass, where participants will

have the opportunity to meet with experienced female entrepreneurs to hear their start-up stories.

With the gender gap in Northern Ireland entrepreneurship showing no signs of closing, Denise Murtagh, Business Development Manager with Dungannon Enterprise Centre, explained: "Women taking part will benefit by being able to create their own opportunities and learn the skills and knowledge to take advantage of them. The funding will pay for masterclasses and experiential learning experience through 'off-site' best practice visits to role-model entrepreneurs".

The participants from the Mid-Ulster region of Northern Ireland (Dungannon, Cookstown and Magherafelt Council areas) will directly benefit from the programme, whilst the use of social media to share the journey of the project with others will ensure that its reach is greatly enhanced.

#### **Export Sales Slam Dunk**

Basketball Direct, located in Londonderry, has received support from the Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund that they say will help finance working capital requirements and enable them to break into new export markets.

Launched in January 2013, Basketball Direct is an online store that sells basketball clothing, equipment and accessories across the world, currently shipping to 90 countries. Owner Niall McDermott identified a gap in the UK and Irish market to launch a locallybased business since similar online retailers are American-based. The key strategic advantage is quality products at tighter pricing and quicker delivery.

The investment from the NI Small Business Loan Fund will allow the company to complete a rebranding exercise, develop their website and increase stock levels in order to pursue new export opportunities. The business is also receiving e-business support from Invest NI. Mr McDermott said: "Our aim is to continually expand and diversify our range of products. We have plans to increase our warehouse storage space in the next couple of months which means we can increase our inventory of stock and hire more staff.

We want to increase our export markets as basketball is a global sport. I approached the Fund to help finance the working capital requirements and to aid the development of our website that would enable us to break into new markets. The Fund was very supportive of the business and shared my vision for growth.

Established in 1985 as the Local Enterprise Agency and business and enterprise centre for the Borough of Larne, LEDCOM is an award-winning social enterprise with an extensive track record in local economic development. Since then it has provided over 10,000 mentoring/ information/advice/training sessions, helped over 900 new start up business which themselves support over 1500 jobs, and supported over 90 new social enterprises start ups which have created over 250 jobs.

LEDCOM Chief Executive Officer, Ken Nelson said the award showed the company's deep commitment to achieving excellence in developing and supporting its staff and continually improving its quality of service as a business support organisation. Paying tribute to the LEDCOM staff he said:

"This Gold award is recognition of the past 29 years of supporting local businesses and individuals wanting to further their careers."

A celebratory event was held in the agency's Willowbank Rural Conference Centre, with the special guest another great Northern Ireland success story, Michael McKillop. Michael is one of the most successful Paralympic athletes of all time, with 10 gold medals in major competition, five World titles, and three Paralympic wins to his name, including two world records.

Michael, who has a form of cerebral palsy and developed epilepsy at the age of 14, hasn't lost a Paralympic race since 2006. Michael, and his father Paddy - who just happens to be his coach and himself was awarded Northern Ireland Sports Coach of the Year - shared some of their secrets in achieving incredible gold medal success in sport, with application to any business or organisation.

## **Ground-breaking Success Story**

Big dreams start small and for one north coast couple, the journey from a two-man catering company to nationally accredited coffee shop chain has been nothing short of amazing.

With the support of Causeway Enterprise Agency, Darren and Karen Gardiner originally benefited from a modest loan to launch a catering company. Based at Loughanhill, the pair worked hard for the next three years, before deciding to invest in the Ground Espresso Bars brand.

Few could have predicted the explosion in local coffee culture, but the Gardiner's spotted a gap in the market which has paid dividends. "Our kitchens for Ground were originally based in the CEA premises," says Darren. "It was very useful to have premises available without having to sign up for long leases and it really got us going. We then outgrew those and got our own facilities. "We went to CEA again when we were expanding, with Ground going in to Waterstones

and Next."

Fast-forward 12 years and the Gardiners have gone from a two-man team to employing around 120 people provincewide. Says Darren: "Karen did the Start Your Own Business course with Causeway Enterprise Agency and in our first year, our turnover was £63,000. This year, it's probably going to be £4m".

Ground has been voted in the top 50 coffee houses in the UK by the Guardian and, with numerous other awards besides, for Ground Espresso Bars, it's onwards and upwards.





#### **Innovation Award for** Fermanagh Enterprise client

David Moorehead from Green Sword Environmental used 20 years of microbial liquid that breaks down oil.

A client of Fermanagh Enterprise Ltd, Green Sword Environmental won the start-up category in the Innovation awards jointly sponsored by DARD and Teagasc in association with JFC Manufacturing and the Irish Farmers Journal.

The cleaning product is a blend of bacterial spores and bio-stimulating agents that

break down oil in the soil, on water and on hard surfaces. The business's major strengths are the innovative nature of the product and its range of applications. David has been working with Queen's University and the University of Ulster to carry out tests, and he is also working with Invest NI and Fermanagh Enterprise Ltd to attract investors.

With field trials planned in the Middle East, David sees big potential for cleaning decommissioned oil platforms in the North Sea.

After visiting The Cube, Arlene Foster, Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Investment, recommended that members of the Enterprise, Trade and Investment Committee should visit Dungannon Enterprise Centre and see firsthand the thriving business Cube in action.

The new West Belfast Social Enterprise Hub is located on 129 Springfield Road, with two further retail incubation units located on the busy Falls Road. The new Hub offers business advice, free hot desks, free meeting and training space and business information sessions, as well as business clinics and free mentoring support. Retail incubation units allow social enterprises to test trade for up to six months rent free with access to heavy onstreet footfall.

The West Belfast Partnership Board have already started test trading with their new social enterprise business, a Craft Collective.

The West Belfast Social Enterprise Hub follows on from Ortus' success in delivering the Belfast city centre City Business Hub. City Business Hub, which was launched in November 2013, provides drop-in clients with comprehensive support services including business advice, referral services, free meeting and conference spaces, free information, seminars and hot-desks. As at August 2014, over 1650 people had used the services of the Hub.

raigavon Industrial Development Organisation (CIDO) took the next step in their pledge to Go Green by fitting a 20kw solar PV system on the roof of their head office, the i2 Innovation Centre in Portadown.

The i2 Innovation Centre in Portadown was built in 2008 and designed to allow natural light to flow freely through it. The building also incorporated an air to water heat pump as a renewable energy source. The pump absorbs heat from the outside air and this heat can then be used in the under floor heating system and hot water.

Sustainable energy specialists, Amber Green, installed a 20kw system consisting of eighty solar panels. As CIDO are such a high electricity consumer they will have little to export back to the grid but there will be a significant saving on their bills and reduced co2 emissions.

he Advance Programme, a £300,000 pilot aimed at encouraging young people into employment in social enterprises, was created by LEDCOM in partnership with Enterprise Northern Ireland.

Advance offers 24 weeks' paid employment and on-the-job training for young people. It created job opportunities for 40 young people across Northern Ireland, matching young people with social enterprises requiring staff.

The aim was to allow the young employee to demonstrate their capability with the goal that the social enterprise would then transform the short-term post into a permanent job.

Advance Manager, Audrey Murray explained: "Advance has been incredibly successful so far in sourcing the right person for the right job and there are a number of posts out there that are waiting to be filled. We've been really impressed with the young people who have applied for the scheme; they just want a chance to prove themselves."

Each of the young people will also complete Enterprise Northern Ireland's Exploring Enterprise 2 Programme, which gives them a recognised qualification in business studies. They will then receive mentoring support and attend interviews with the social enterprises.

Ms Murray added, "These are real jobs, not a placement and our goal is



that at least 50% of the recruits will be retained by the companies. It's up to each young person to make that

happen; they have 24 weeks to prove to employers that they have what it takes."

## NXT-GEN-BIZ

Fermanagh Enterprise Ltd was one of the first LEAs to be established in Northern Ireland, and this year they were awarded funding by the Royal Bank of Scotland to deliver NXT-GEN-BIZ. This is an exciting new initiative aimed at helping 24 young people in the Omagh and Fermanagh areas move into self-employment.

According to Siobhan Colton, Project Leader of NXT-GEN-BIZ, "The RBS Inspiring Youth Enterprise funding means this project can be delivered locally, in a rural area. It will give participants easy access to on-going expert advice without having to travel long distances. Since they'll be able to stay close to home, they'll benefit from family support as they develop their enterprises".

This is important, as family is acknowledged as being crucially important for individuals starting their own business by giving the entrepreneur access to additional sources of financial and emotional support.

NXT-GEN-BIZ is all about training and awareness with the goal of raising awareness of business and enterprise. Practical assistance with accessing business finance is offered, alongside workshops and mentoring support. It includes a Level 2 business qualification, driving lessons, business plan support access to incubation workspace, development of social media and presentation skills, and the opportunity to network with other like-minded young people.

The young entrepreneurs will be required to write weekly blogs and to participate in outreach events, including a 'Dragon's Den' style presentation.

### **Business support for** Lisburn graduates



Encouraging graduates to start their own business is a key priority. This was the driving focus behind Lisburn City Council's Graduate Into Business Programme delivered in partnership with Lisburn Enterprise Organisation.

The launch of a new phase of the programme saw tailored business support for local graduates who wish to start a business in Lisburn or who are already running a business. The scheme is partfinanced by Invest NI and the European Regional Development Fund under the Sustainable Competitiveness Programme for Northern Ireland.

At the launch, Alderman Allan Ewart, Chair of Lisburn City Council's Economic Development Committee, said, "With increasing competition in the job market and a lack of graduate level jobs, many students are embracing entrepreneurship as a means of building their future career. Research suggests this generation of young adults are the most innovative, creative and diverse. Over a quarter of graduates plan to be running their own business by the age of 25, while a third say they'll be their own boss by the age of 30. This programme of business support is an ideal opportunity for young adults in the Lisburn area to bring their entrepreneurial dreams to fruition. Lynn Ross owner of 'Hola Muchachos!" profiled elsewhere in this issue - is a past participant of the Graduate Into Business Programme and is encouraging others to take part. "Taking advantage of the support offered by the Lisburn Graduate into Business Programme I was able to avail of bespoke mentoring, market plan development and guidance in general business management to launch my new business. Hola Muchachos! I was also a finalist in the award-winning Fly or Die competition, which is part of the programme, pitching my idea for a prize fund of £1000."

Applicants must possess a HND or higher qualification, and reside or run a business within the Lisburn City Council area. Previous programmes led to the start-up of 54 new businesses in sectors ranging from fashion design to the manufacture of medical devices.

The next round of the programme has recently started, providing participants with an experienced mentor to guide them through the crucial business start-up phase.

#### **LEDCOM** celebrates adult learners



More than 130 local people returned to adult education over the last year, thanks to a joint programme between Northern Regional College and LEDCOM.

This was the first year of a three-year programme which aims to increase adult enrolment in essential skills and further education courses, and to increase the numbers achieving recognised qualifications.
