### Paramedic and mobile phone app give purpose to Year 6 Geography topic

National Curriculum objectives for Key Stage 2 Geography require children to 'use maps, atlases, globes and digital mapping to locate countries and describe features studied'. Teachers at Newington Academy in Hull said this can 'lack a sense of gravitas and purpose around knowledge and understanding of the world [and] tends to lack purpose and connection'.

The project involved Year 6 children and focused on the use of the what3words app to locate accurately a 3m x 3m spot anywhere in the world – and to help direct emergency services to the location of incidents. Teachers felt that 'what3words could be used as it is locating areas within countries and can also be used to describe surroundings. An extension could be searching for different three-word addresses on the app and asking the children to look at the surroundings and to describe the geographical features, linking back to the curriculum objectives'.

A short informal greeting from a Paramedic was followed by a message telling children that 'getting an ambulance to someone quickly can sometimes mean that we save their life' and finishing with 'I hope you enjoy learning about the importance of knowing exactly where you are, particularly in an emergency, and how you might explain that'.

The team at what3words were enthusiastic about the project: 'This sounds fantastic, we would love to get involved! We have created a bunch of resources that I think could work really well for this project'. Children used the app to find the three-word addresses of different locations related to seas and coasts and they were given three-word addresses and asked to find the location.
