The session will include;



- The stigmas associated with mental health.
- Different mental health issues.
- 5 ways to wellbeing.
- Where to go to for further support.

The delivery team is made up of seven Devon members and recent members along with me and FCN volunteers. Two of the team will come to your Club where ever you are in the County and deliver the session which takes about 90 minutes. If you would like to book in your Rural+ session please do contact me.

When we finally got to the airport, check in complete, bags were weighed (with some members at max weight already) we headed for breakfast. All aboard the flight for take-off, we ran down the run way with some members holding on tight to the seats.

Touch down in Estonia at 5pm we headed for the train station to catch the train to Janeda. At the other end we were greeted by some 4H members including Gerda and Eda. The evening consisted of settling in and ice breaker games and a walk to the lake.

DAY 2 - Mark's birthday! We started the day with more ice breaker games where all of us and some 4H members were baaing like sheep, eating chocolate with knives and forks and throwing shuttlecocks into pint glasses. After our famous potato lunch one of the local members gave us a tour around the town and let us explore in the Museum where we had a sing song on the piano with Katherine playing; this became a regular thing when a piano was to be found. We all then went for a swim in the lake and gave Mark a cake, a few cheeky presents and homemade card. We finished the evening with three hours of sauna, steam room and pool.

DAY 3 - We all headed to Rakvere Medieval Castle for a tour and a scary walk through the torture chambers. We also made gun powder and fired them off in a cannon. After having lunch by the big bull we headed to a youth centre for a game of basketball and a look around the town. When we got back we all headed down to the lake for a swim and a game of volleyball finishing in the evening with a talk about the history of the village.

DAY 4 - Everyone was so excited to do some farm tours. We first went to a new dairy farm with 80 milking cows and a birds nest on top the building as big as a mini car. We then headed to our second farm which was bigger with 120 cows and around 2,100 acres for arable farming. After the boys got very excited to see a combine (like they have never seen one before) we headed for our lunch. Once bellies were full we all went to have some fun







zip wiring and boating on the lake. With some members clinging onto the platform and not wanting to let go, I feel they all had amazing fun. On the way back we passed an amazing waterfall stopping for a well needed ice cream. Getting back to the guest house we headed down the lake for a swim and volleyball. The swimmers had fun jumping off a fallen tree into the water. In the evening the farmers came back to give us a talk about farming in Estonia and our members told them about our way of farming. We all learnt how they don't have many hedges and fences and how we have many. We also learnt some Estonian and the life style. We also learnt that an average Estonian person drinks 26 pints per year so you can imagine their shock when we told them our amount. We finished off the evening with some Estonian food and English tea and apple pies that Becky bought along.

DAY 5 – This started with a train journey to the Capital Tallinn to do some sight-seeing. We climbed the 286 steps up the Oleviste Kogudus Infoleht to some amazing views although some members couldn't make it out the door to see the views. With everyone excited for lunch we headed to McDonalds for a burger or two. After a short time at the market we got back on the train to Janeda for a swim in the lake and a game of volleyball with Grandad who was a sticker for the rules; him and Scott didn't become best friends. After a few games we headed for a late night swim in the lake.

DAY 6 - We headed to a Youth club to have a look around a School and the Youth Club; we played some games with the younger ones of the group and did some stencil artwork. In the afternoon back at the guest house we went for a swim in the lake and volleyball. In the evening we had another night of luxury in the spa.

DAY 7 - We all went to the forest for game of Frisbee golf. With some members doing well the other spent most the time searching for their Frisbee amongst the trees we gave up and headed for an ice cream. After lunch some members went for a boat ride, where members tried to sink each other's boat. Then some members did some Segwaying in the forest. Will and Katie took a while to return, when they finally appeared we learnt that Katie had fallen off in the woods and all Will could do was film her lying on the ground. 

BASICS OF STOCK JUDGING

PREPARING TO JUDGE

Ensure you have a white coat.

Wear it at all times and keep it
buttoned up. Be smart, look the
part. Have a working pen or pencil
(pencils work better in an
abattoir).

BEFORE YOU START

Establish what has to be judged.
Are you judging animals for breeding, finished or finished potential?

Establish how long you have to judge the class. Read the judging card to establish the criteria against which you will be judged.

COMING UP ...

STAND BACK

Have a good look from a distance at the group. Understand what you have to judge, its general appearance, type, etc.

First impressions are often the best. Make a judgement by eye and confirm by careful handling.

When judging livestock for slaughter refer to carcase quality and killing-out percentages.

Don't rush in.

GIVING REASONS

- Establish how long you have, usually two minutes are allowed.
- Memorise your reasons, as much as possible.
- Picturing the animals will help.
- Stand up straight and look the judge in the eye.
- Speak clearly and slowly enough for the judge to follow.

Describe the stock fully, refer to any distinguishing features (eg white face). As you deliver your reasons compare as much as possible, going from front to back or back to front using the same style for all animals in the class with emphasis on the important areas. This means that you are less likely to get confused and allows the judge to follow your reasons more easily.

Use the full time allocated, the clearer your reasons, the better your chances.

Thank the judge when you have finished – whether you enjoyed the experience or not. Judges rarely remember if you thank them, they always remember if you don't!
