Delivering


ENI holds national contracts with various public sector organizations. The contracts are delivered primarily by the member agencies. Programmes include:

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The Voice of Enterprise

In the Chair.

When I joined the Board of Enterprise Northern Ireland (ENI) four years ago, I did so with an insight into the work of ENI and of many of the Local Enterprise Agencies (LEAs) through my previous involvement with The International Fund for Ireland (IFI). In that capacity I worked with many of the LEAs in developing the workspace element of the businesses in Northern Ireland and with the County Enterprise Boards in the border counties of the Republic of Ireland. They are still producing a significant dividend for the investment. Many of the LEAs and Enterprise Boards, with the support of the funders, were able to expand their enterprises successfully to second, third and fourth phases.

The past year has been positive and productive. The award of the Tradelinks 2 Continuance programme means that the continuum of support that LEAs provide has been secured. LEAs are the only enterprise support network providing a continuum of support from capacity building (Exploring Enterprise), through to business start up (RSI), a bespoke social economy offering (SEP3) and a cross border business growth programme. All supported by access to finance through the ENI Loan Fund and the Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund.

The ENI structure although successful to date, must change if ENI is to remain fit for purpose. The future holds many challenges for ENI and its network. These include current economic conditions, tightening budgets and local government reform. Some also arise from the natural change and development to which maturing organisations aspire.

ENI has already set itself an agenda for change. It is clear to the Board (and indeed the majority of members) that the ENI structure although successful to date, must change if ENI is to remain fit for purpose.

There are for example, new contracts to implement that will require adjustments to current procedures. We will also want to direct our energies to improving the quality of our delivery in all aspects of our business activity. Our potential to impact on those who are suffering the demoralising effects of economic inactivity or who feel disenfranchised from economic progress, is a motivation to continue to build on the past and to repay the trust of those who made available the finance that has provided the infrastructure we currently



enjoy. The strong order book and stability of the corporate governance arrangements make this an opportune moment to review ENI.

As my tenure as Chairman draws to an end I look with pride on ENI and its members and what we have achieved. We have a clear strategic direction, a renewed board with ideas to implement and an executive team who are more than capable of driving us forward. I would like to record my sincere thanks to everyone involved with ENI. To LEA directors and staff, the ENI board of directors and staff team led very effectively by the Chief Executive Gordon Gough and to our clients and stakeholders.

Good luck to everyone for the future and remember...luck is what happens when preparation meets opportunity.

Chief Executive Summary.

Most economic commentators in the past twelve months are in agreement that we need to grow the private sector in Northern Ireland and move away from an over-reliance on public sector job creation. In other words, we need to be more enterprising and entrepreneurial. Easier said than done, some would say.

Against this backdrop Enterpris Northern Ireland (ENI) is responding to the needs of the small business community. Since our launch in 2000 as the umbrella organisation representing Northern Ireland's 32 local enterprise agencies (LEAs) we have played a significant role in stimulating economic growth and private sector job creation.

In every local council area in Northern Ireland, there is an LEA delivering a range of services and providing a continuum of support to help people set up and grow their husinesses

Over the past twelve months we have dealt with thousands of enquiries from people looking to set up in business. Some people say there has never been a better time to start a business. Recent research from Enterprise Nation UK shows that during 2012 the highest number of people in over a decade started their own business. Why? Because it is now perfectly possible to start and grow a business (even in your spare time and from home) on a small budget. And if you are looking for business premises then look no further than your LEA - across Northern Ireland they provide workspace for over three thousand small businesses.

Social economy businesses are big business in Northern Ireland. The LEA network over the past

year helped to set up forty six
new social enterprises with a
combined projected turnover
of over £3m, creating over one
hundred new jobs.

With the current dearth of start-up capital the ENI small business loan fund has never been more appealing to small business owners. During 2012 we loaned almost £750,000 to local businesses. Since the fund was established in 2002 we have provided over 1200 loans totalling £7.5m.

This year also marked the launch of the Invest NI Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund which ENI delivers in collaboration with Ulster Community Investment Trust. The spirit of enterprise is holding up well in Northern Ireland judging by the number of business start-up enquiries. People in their thousands are spotting gaps in the market or turning their hobbies into a way of making a living

So, back to my opening comments. Is growing the private sector in Northern Ireland easier said than done? Certainly organisations like the LEAs are well positioned to assist the Northern Ireland Executive to meet its social and economic goals. If the sector is given the financial investment it needs to continue to deliver the range of services that I have detailed, then its contribution to the economy and local communities will be immense.

Business Support Programmes

The Enterprise Northern Ireland Loan fund and NI Small Business Loan Fund. The Enterprise Northern Ireland Loan Fund provides loans to individuals starting a business.

The Loan Fund was established in 2002, and since then has provided over 1,200 loans totalling in excess of £7.5m to help businesses across the whole of Northern Ireland.

A decade later, the ENI Loan Fund is receiving more enquiries about its products than ever before. The Northern Ireland Small Business Loan Fund (www. nisblf.com) is part of Invest NI`s Access to Finance Strategy. The fund provides unsecured loans

to social enterprises and SMEs in the micro enterprise sector in the start up and growth phases. The fund helps to bridge gaps where other funding options have been exhausted.

Loans to recipients are in the £1k - £50k range. ENI works alongside Ulster Community Investment Trust (UCIT) as fund managers. Already in the first half of 2013 we are on schedule to lend over £0.5m to 21 businesses.

Access to finance remains challenging for small business. The ENI Loan Fund and Northern **Ireland Small Business Loan** Fund continue to provide an important financial lifeline for small business.

Regional Start Up Initiative.

The Invest NI Regional Start programme is the national business start up initiative for Northern Ireland. Regional Start provides a range of guidance, support, training and business clinics and also ongoing support to help develop and grow businesses.

In the past year the LEA network has dealt with over 7000 enquiries and assisted almost 3000 start up business plans via Regional Start. In addition more than 400 business plans have been produced in Neighbourhood Renewal Areas securing grants of over £400,000. In the same period more than 200 business plans have been produced from young people not in employment, education or training (NEETS) enabling over £300,000 of start up grants to be drawn down from Invest NI.

The Go for It Programme is provided by Invest Northern Ireland and is part financed by the European Regional Development Fund. For details, log on to www.goforitni.com.

LEAs have supported almost 3000 people into self employment in the past 12 months.

Exploring Enterprise² Programme

Exploring Enterprise2 develops employment opportunities for the long term unemployed. The focus is on helping people from disadvantaged backgrounds. One to one advice and training is available leading to an award in Understanding Business Enterprise.

2011 to March 2013, LEAs have delivered 117 accredited training courses throughout Northern Ireland. 1073 participants have completed the programme of which over 900 achieved the award in Understanding Business Enterprise.

We are also delighted to have various local councils involved as strategic partners including, Larne Ballymena, Carrickfergus, Coleraine, Moyle, Ballymoney, Roe Valley, Fermanagh and Dungannon. Exploring Enterprise2

Tradelinks

Tradelinks is our cross border business development programme designed to assist and grow the micro enterprise sector across Northern Ireland and the border counties of Louth, Monaghan, Cayan, Leitrim, Sligo and Donegal.

Tradelinks assists micro businesses on both sides of the border to identify and address barriers to cross border trade and development. Using a portfolio of business improvement techniques.

Tradelinks helps small businesses to become more sustainable and competitive

and generate greater added value. Particular emphasis is in developing cross border trade opportunities and linkages.

In the second phase of Tradelinks, the programme supported 580 businesses in creating 250+ new jobs and increasing sales by £15m. Tradelinks is a partnership initiative between Enterprise NI, the network of local Enterprise Agencies, and the Border County Enterprise Boards and is funded by the European Union's INTERREG IVA Programme.

Tradelinks enhances all island trade.
Participating businesses increased sales by £15m and there are more than 600 North/South business to business linkages.

Social Entreneurship

Social entrepreneurs bring innovative business solutions to some of the most pressing issues affecting society. Our Social Entrepreneurship Programme, delivered on behalf of Invest NI, provides business support and mentoring to social economy business start-ups.

The programme promotes sustainable models of finance as well as providing ongoing training to help sustain these businesses. The outputs over the past few years have been very encouraging:

- 175 new social enterprises set up, 450 jobs created
- Combined projected turnover of £9,5 million
- Export sales of around £1 million 68% of social enterprises being set up in the top 300 SOA of disadvantage in Northern Ireland
- 23 social enterprises have become Invest NI mainstream clients.

A key challenge is a joint economic vision for Northern Ireland.

Clanrye Retail Social Enterprise is an innovative enterprise developed by Clanrye Group with support from Newry and Mourne Enterprise Agency. Clanrye Retail Social Enterprise provides employment focused training, accredited qualifications and work experience for individuals with a physical disability or health condition focused on the retail / customer service sector.

Training is carried out using a social enterprise model that incorporates a gift shop; `Heart & Home', and a telesales / ecommerce site.

Billed as the gift shop with a `heart', Heart and Home is a retail social enterprise that allows trainees to train in a commercial retail environment. It is unique in that it offers `the local cottage industry' shelf space with well-chosen social enterprise and fair trade products. In addition it is setting out to manufacture high quality bespoke craft items for sale at local, regional and national level.

At Clanrye Retail Social Enterprise the focus is on ensuring that each participant is given the opportunity to train while fostering a sense of belonging and social inclusion.

Cookstown Enterprise Centre launched Exploring Enterprise during the year. The programme was launched by Cookstown's own star of the Apprentice Jim Eastwood. The Exploring Enterprise initiative helps those who are unemployed or economically inactive to develop skills to enhance their individual chances of securing employment or entering self-employment.

Speaking about the programme Jim Eastwood said: 'This is a very exciting initiative for the people of Cookstown and will allow the entrepreneurial spirit of local people to flourish while giving them the qualifications required to become more attractive to employer's at a time when competition for jobs is extremely high.'



The new Innovation Growth Centre forms an integral part of the Irish Central Border Areas Network's (ICBAN) Innovation Enterprise Programme (IEP). It also, provides a technology focused business environment to support growth companies and allow progression from the Technology Incubation and Resource Centre which was opened in 2005. The IEP which began in September 2010, has been supported with nearly £2.3million of financial assistance from European Union's INTERREG IV Programme, managed by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB).

Arlene Foster said:

"I am especially pleased that we have been able to provide

just over £2million towards the project through the INTERREG Programme. This new centre will provide the region with high quality, technology focused workspace which will complement the existing provision here at Omagh

"Job creation and the stimulation of private enterprise are crucial in driving forward our economic recovery in Northern Ireland. Projects like this, which create jobs, grow businesses and capitalise on our existing skills and infrastructure base in Northern Ireland, are particularly welcome."

Expressing her support for initiatives that seek to enhance the economic infrastructure of Northern Ireland and create jobs, the Minister added: "It is envisaged that the new centre will support the creation of at least 200 new jobs in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. In addition, the IEP project has been developed to help tenant companies increase their turnover during the three year life of the project."

Carrickfergus Enterprise has secured a contract to deliver a three-year business programme on behalf of Carrickfergus Borough Council. In the currently highly competitive consultancy market, Carrickfergus Enterprise beat off stiff competition from other large consultancy and training organisations to ensure the local delivery of the programme.

The Business Improvement Programme provides local Carrickfergus Businesses with a range of business and ICT mentoring as well as a range of seminars in topical business issues.

Kelli Bagchus says: "I am delighted that we secured this programme of support for our local businesses. We researched our clients and they wanted local delivery by an organisation who had local knowledge and a vested interest in the Carrickfergus Borough. Past participants of the programme have highlighted that such assistance was vital to their continued success and survival. We look forward to continuing to provide such critical support in today's difficult trading environment."

Claire Ferris, CEO from Work West Enterprise Agency was the first woman from Northern Ireland to be given the Queen's Award for Enterprise Promotion.

Claire received the award at a ceremony in London followed by a reception in Buckingham Palace.

Work West operates in an area of high socio-economic deprivation with little foreign inward investment. "We hope that will change in the coming years; West Belfast is a great place to do business and the message is getting out there," said Claire.

In recent years Work West has developed as a one of the market leaders in the field of social enterprise support and one of the high points of her career was the opening of the Social Economy Village in 2009. "I've seen the difference that social enterprise can make to a community and it's something that everyone in Northern Ireland needs to sit up and take notice of," she said.

"The creation of meaningful employment is also heavily reliant on our ability to grow our private sector. Interventions such as the Strategy in Business Programme which Work West has recently delivered on behalf of Belfast City Council will greatly assist in achieving this goal."

The Queen's Award for Enterprise Promotion recognises individuals who make outstanding contributions to enterprise culture in the UK.
The Awards are the UK's highest accolade for business success and are awarded to only 10 people per year.

They are made each year by The Queen, on the advice of the Prime Minister, who is assisted by an Advisory Committee that includes representatives of Government industry and commerce, and the trade unions.

The company caters for up to sixty languages and has 250 interpreters on its books. Key clients include the Department of Education, Ministry of Justice, Health and Social Care Procurement Department, Industrial Tribunals Court, private sector industries and individuals.

Enterprise Minister Arlene Foster said: "Ortus is an ambitious and forward thinking organisation and this acquisition is a positive example of their commitment to developing local enterprises."

Two local companies, the Kevin Watson Group and T McLaughlin and Sons have recently been successful in gaining accreditation for implementing quality systems with the help of Roe Valley Enterprises Ltd through the Tradelinks Programme.

Frank Quinn, Tradelinks Mentor, stated that both companies recognize the guidance and support provided by the Tradelinks Programme as businesses are finding it increasingly necessary to provide evidence of Third Party Certification of their Quality, Environmental and Health and Safety Management Systems to even enable them to reach the Tender Stage when seeking both private and public sector contracts.
