Let us support one another so that all children in Rwanda can learn and play together!



This booklet contains information to help us understand disability and some of our rights.

This includes something called the Global Goals for Sustainable Development to help countries including Rwanda help build a better world for everyone.

We will learn to understand the Goals and why it is important that children with disabilities are also included.

We must all work together – you, your brothers and sisters, your parents, your neighbours and your teachers - to make sure everybody can benefit from a better future through the achievement of these Goals before 2030!

There are 17 Sustainable Development Goals, but today you will learn about four of them.





































WHAT IS DISABILITY?

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

Some children are born with a disability. children

Some children might become ill and as a result have a disability.

It is not always possible to see a disability.

You cannot get a disability by touching a person with a disability.

Disability is not a curse on a family.

There are people with disabilities all over the world, not just in Rwanda.

If someone finds it difficult to do something because of their disability, this does not mean they find it difficult to do everything!

Remember!

Everyone has strengths and weaknesses! Nobody can do everything, and we should help each other so that everyone can be included.



DO

Be respectful – It is not nice to call people bad names or use bad language towards someone.

Focus on the things that you CAN do together.

Support others so that everyone can learn and play together.

Encourage your friends to include children with disabilities.

Treat children's supports with respect, such as a wheelchair or hearing aid.

Ask a child how you can help them if you are not sure.

DON'T

Stare at people. It is okay to notice somebody, but it is not nice to stare.

Call people bad names.

Hurt somebody because of their disability.

Tell somebody that they cannot do something.

Exclude children from playing with you. There is always a way that everyone can join in and play together.

Laugh at anybody who has a disability.

What are Some of the Different Types of Disability?

There are different types of disabilities.

Sometimes,
it easy to see that a person
has a disability, but
this is not always
the case.

They can affect
Children and adults
in different ways.

Disabilities cannot always be seen, and it is important that we are patient and take time to understand how we can all support each other together.

Some children might have more than one type of disability.

ALL children
should be included and if
you aren't sure how to help
somebody so that they can play
and learn with you, remember
that you can always ask
them!

Here are some different examples of disabilities..

Physical Impairment Some children may not be able to move around as easily as other people.

They might need to use a wheelchair or crutches to help them to move around more easily.



It is important to make sure we help children with a physical impairment to move around as easily as possible so that you can all learn and play together.

Some children
may appear to have
very pale skin, eyes
and hair colour

This is because their bodies haven't produced enough of something that is responsible for eye, skin and hair colour.

Albinism It is possible for children all around the world to have albinism and it can affect people of all races.

Sometimes, people with albinism may also have trouble with their eyesight, but they are just as healthy as anyone else.

It is only their appearance that is different.
Children are born with albinism and it is not contagious, which means that you cannot catch it from someone else.

Hearing Impairment

Some children may not be able to hear as well as other children.

They might not be able to hear anything at all, or they might be able to hear some sounds.

Sometimes, children may not be able to hear out of one ear, or both.

Some children might wear something called a hearing aid to help them hear.

Some children with a hearing impairment may communicate with their hands using sign language.

It really helps if you look at your friends so that they can see your face, and you can ask them to teach you sign language too!

Some children may find it more difficult to learn, develop social skills or be able to care for themselves as well as some other children.

They may struggle to communicate or not be able to read or write.

Intellectual Impairment

Other children
might behave differently to some
children in your community, or they
might not be able to cope very easily
with daily activities such as washing
or travelling to places.

It is very important that we are all patient and take time to understand how other children might need your help and support in the community so that they can be equally included.

Visual Impairment

Sometimes, children might not be able to see to their side, or they may not be able to see anything at all.

Some children may not be able to see things clearly when they are close by.

Other children might not be able to see things clearly when they are far away.

You might see children or adults who have a visual impairment wearing glasses.



If a person sees very little, they may use a white stick. This white stick is called a white cane and it helps people to feel what is around them so that they can move around more easily

Some children are born with restricted growth, which means that they are shorter than people who are an average height.

Little people can have shorter legs and arms.

Usually, little people do not require additional support and can do all the things that people who are an average height can do without any problems.

Little Person

Most little people are completely healthy, which means that they live long and fulfilling lives.

Remember, there are many more types of disabilities and it is important to talk to people so that you can understand the different ways that you can support people in your community! It is always good to ask questions.

Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all!

ALL children have the right to go to school and learn in a safe and positive environment!

Teachers must be trained and motivated to support children.

For older children, they can receive financial support to go to university.

ALL children should be in school.

This means that children with disabilities should also be in school because they have EQUAL rights.

This also means that schools must be INCLUSIVE and have teachers that are trained to support children with different needs.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOAL



This Goal hopes to:

Promote sustained inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all!

What Does Decent Work, Mean?

IT MEANS...

Everyone accesses an enjoyable fairly paid and secure job.

Employers try to keep down costs by using things like solar power instead of electricity. People access training to improve chances of getting a job.

Nobody is excluded from work opportunities! This means that it does not matter who you are, you should have the same opportunity.

Children ARE NOT made to work! Remember, all children should be in school, not working. Everybody is able to benefit from the growing economy in Rwanda.

All children with and without disabilities have the right to the same opportunities so that everybody can get a job when you reach the age to get a job.

We all have the same rights!

Reduce inequalities within and among countries!

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

Every person in Rwanda should have their rights protected and respected.



People living in poverty should get support and access so that they can get a job.

The Government make sure that the laws and practices in Rwanda include everybody and do not discriminate.

Children and adults who need more support, including children with disabilities, are protected.

People who either come to Rwanda to live or move to another country can benefit from laws that help protect them.

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
