# Thursday 16 February Alan Fell 'WWI Project - We Were There Too'

Alan Fell spent his working life in the Chemical Industry, Electronics and Construction. Latterly, he was a partner in a consulting company. He has either worked in, or consulted to, the 'Not for Profit Sector'. He has worked extensively overseas, including for the Israel Government on the reform of the Israel Social Welfare system. He was Project Director of a large digital history project on the Holocaust (www.holocaustexplained.com) now at the



Weiner Library, and currently a project funded by the National Lottery Fund commemorating London Jews involvement in the First World War (www.jewsfww.london).

Alan Fell will be talking to us about the Project the object of which is to encourage the community to find, or be helped to find, their family or other individual stories from the period and upload them onto the site. Our aim is a digital archive of real people's stories - creating a memorial to them, researched and uploaded by the community (or by volunteers if people cannot manage to do this themselves).

'We Were There Too' is a unique cross community project created to capture, record and preserve the impact, experience and contribution of London's Jewish communities during the First World War era.

At the centre of the project is this digital archive and interactive website, which will become a permanent record of the lives of Jewish men, women and families, 1914-1919, with details of their Military and Home Front activities, ensuring that their stories are not lost for future generations. 'We Were There Too' will provide an insight into Jewish life in London in the early part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

# Yad B'Yad Meeting - Tuesday 17 January

### **Speaker: James Morton**

Those Were The Krays.....

A packed house was present to listen to James Morton, who was for 25 years a criminal defence lawyer with a mainly organised crime clientele, and author of several books.

He reminisced about the various gangs who had 'reigned' over London's East End gangland for the past 100 years or so.

He mentioned different waves of immigrants who had ruled, starting with the Russian Jews, moving on to the Italians who controlled the racecourses and then West End pubs followed by the Kray twins, having been born in 1933, and others of their ilk.

Many of the names were familiar to some of the audience who had grown up in this area but many of us were blissfully unaware of these characters and the power they wielded over many.

Apparently, the Krays were talented boxers and were recruited, whilst boxing, to 'take over' the racecourses.

James Morton showed he had a phenomenal memory for names and places from the past.

He described some of the 'tricks of the trade' such as Long Firm Fraud. This involves setting up a seemingly legitimate business that builds a reputation by paying promptly for small orders and then obtains credit on large orders on that reputation. They then disappear with these goods.

His talk was followed by a question and answer session and a cheque was presented to the speaker for his chosen charity, the Royal Marsden Hospital. Gill Bernard

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On a freezing cold Thursday morning 14 intrepid walkers assembled under the clock at Waterloo Station.

We looked at the architecture of the station which was first completed in 1848 and then later rebuilt in the 1920's. ## Limmud - A Jewish Cultural Smorgasbord - 2016

Last year over the Chanukah/Christmas break Anthony and I returned again to the winter Limmud conference which for the second year was being held at The Hilton Metropole Birmingham. This was probably our 15<sup>th</sup> Limmud conference so that shows how much we enjoy it!

This time about 2,700 people attended Limmud from the Sunday to Thursday with about 500 coming for the preceding Shabbat.

The word Limmud to teach'.

The first Limmud conference was in 1980 and was inspired by the 'CAJE' (Conference on Alternatives in Jewish Education) in North America.

From those inauspicious beginnings it has grown into an international franchise with events worldwide. Its philosophy is that everyone can be both a teacher and a pupil; we can all learn from each other.

People attending Limmud vary in age, interests and degrees of Jewish involvement - for some people, the Limmud conference may be their only Jewish connection throughout the year. However, everyone is there to enjoy and participate in a wide variety of discussions, debates, workshops and presentations on Jewish life and culture - history, literature, music (coming so soon after the death of Leonard Cohen there were sessions devoted to his music), dance and film - politics (national and international with emphasis on Israel), religion and philosophy.

The presenters ranged from internationally known rabbis and professors speaking with authority on their subjects to lay people who had something interesting to say about local community projects and everything in between.

The hardest part of going to Limmud is deciding which sessions to attend. Sessions start from 8 a.m. and end in the early hours of the morning. When you calculate that each session, usually an hour long, has a choice of sometimes a dozen different options, you can understand the dilemma! However the choice is yours, no pressure to run from one session to another, the hotel where Limmud took place, offered a swimming pool as yet another choice.

Sometime we went to sessions together, sometimes separately, but between us we heard Deborah Lipstadt, the academic who fought off a libel action from the Holocaust denier, David Irving, talk about the making of the film about the court case, 'Denial' starring Rachel Weiss. Another session saw her being interviewed about her life using The Desert Island Discs format and this format was also used to interview the Chief Rabbi Ephraim Mirvis about his programme for Anglo-Jewry - it was interesting that two of the Chief Rabbi's choices were the Leonard Cohen's song 'Hallelujah' and 'Bring Him Home' from 'Les Miserables'.

Dr Anthony Luder of the Ziv Hospital in Safed spoke about how casualties from the Syrian civil war were being brought to Israel's border and treated in his hospital. Another session saw a standing ovation being given to a 15 year old Ahmad Nawaz, who aged 14 survived a Taliban attack on his school in Pakistan when 132 pupils (including his younger brother) and ten teachers were killed. Ahmad was severely

injured and brought to Birmingham City Hospital. He now attends school in Birmingham and goes into schools campaigning against violent extremism.

One of UK Jewish Films shown was 'Keep Quiet', a true story of a Hungarian Politician, Csanad Szegedi who became Vice-President of Jobbik, Hungary's far-right antisemitic party. He finds out that he is Jewish and that his maternal grandmother survived Auschwitz. His life turns 180 degrees with the help of a Chabad Rabbi.

The Holocaust was a major theme in various sessions and one involved the story of Russell Barton, one of 96 medical students who volunteered to work for a month at Belsen after liberation. His experience haunted his career as a psychiatrist fighting for a more humane NHS psychiatric care in the 60s causing him to comment "Belsen not too bad" which catapulted him into a Holocaust denial trial.

On a lighter note, Anthony went to a session about decluttering (did you know there was an Association of Declutters? No, me neither!) whereas I relaxed at a session listening to Daniel Cainer with his unique Jewish storytelling. Add to this mix it was Chanukah so every afternoon hundreds of Chanukiahs were lit in one of the two marquees, the other marquee being used for a communal Chanukah lighting. I consider it not a small miracle that with all these Chanukiahs being lit every night, there was no fire incident!

However, all this would not be possible without the help of volunteers - volunteers run Limmud from the Chair of Limmud to the two joint Chairs of Limmud Conference to all the organising of the conference itself. During Limmud "giveusanhour" campaign encouraged everyone to volunteer an hour on a one-off role.

Hopefully the above has given you a small taste of Limmud Conference 2016.

Why not come and experience it for yourself next year 24<sup>th</sup> - 28<sup>th</sup> December 2017? Or try a one day Limmud, the next one is Harrow's 'Limmud After Dark' on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> March 2017 in Northwood?
