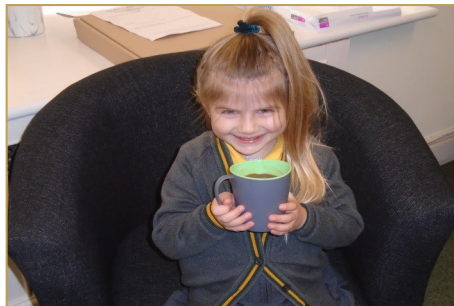
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Hot Chocolate Fridays

Fantastic GCSE Results

Once again, pupils at both Braeside and Normanhurst School celebrated an excellent set of GCSE results over

the summer.

At Normanhurst, half of grades were grades 7-9 and over 99% were passes. Pupils achieved particularly well in English, Modern Foreign Languages, Biology, Chemistry and Physics with 100% passes.

At Braeside, 96% of grades achieved were grade 4 or above, with 49% of grades at grade 7-9. This included 100% passes in English, Maths, Science, French, Spanish and Art.

We are so proud of all Year 11 pupils

for remaining positive and dedicated to their work during a turbulent few months and wish them well in the next stage of their education.

Black History Month

During October, Normanhurst pupils completed some important learning and activities during their lessons to highlight and celebrate the achievements of the black community.

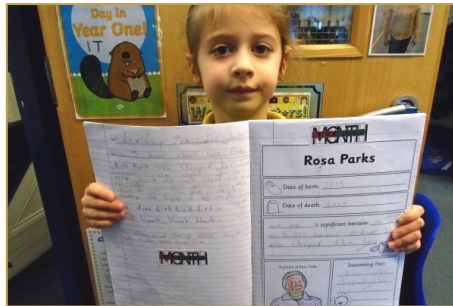
To launch the month, a special assembly was held to explain to pupils what Black History Month is and why it is celebrated. Pupils were also introduced to some key figures who they would learn more about in class.

Early Years pupils were given the inventor of the traffic light, Garrett Morgan, to research. They enjoyed finding lots of creative ways to make



traffic lights, linking the learning to colours, sequencing and road safety.

Year 1 learned about Sarah Boone, who invented the improved ironing board, and debated the key issues in the case of Rosa Parks. They then got creative making collages to design ironing boards and completed a Rosa Parks timeline to remember the key events.



Year 3 pupils chose a famous artist to research for their homework, including Stormzy and Emeli Sande. They also completed reading comprehensions on Usain Bolt and Rosa Parks.

Year 4 researched and created PowerPoints about inspirational people and completed a fun Maths addition worksheet to reveal a famous inventor. Whilst Year 5 studied former astronaut, Dr. Mae C Jemison.

Year 10 and 11 French and Spanish pupils translated songs and poems about social issues, such as immigration. French pupils then had to conduct some independent research about a person from the French speaking world who has made an impact culturally or politically and has helped fight racism.



It was a very important month of learning for all the pupils!

New 'Jigsaw' PHSE Scheme

This year, all of the schools have introduced the Jigsaw scheme to pupils in Key Stages 1 and 2. Jigsaw is a mindful approach to PSHE, which brings together personal, social, health education, emotional literacy, social skills and spiritual development in a comprehensive scheme of learning.

Pupils have been excited to meet the

entertaining Jigsaw Friends, as well as Jigsaw Jerrie Cat who reminds the children to stop and think.

Pupils have already enjoyed working through the first two topics — Being Me in My World and Celebrating Difference. They are gradually developing an awareness of their thoughts and feelings and are starting to use a range of strategies to help them deal with different situations. They are also beginning to expand

their emotional vocabulary so that they can express themselves more confidently. Well done everybody!



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Fun in the Wild Woods

Reception children at Oaklands have had lots of fun when exploring the 'Wild Woods' during their lessons.

They learned about all the natural materials that can be found in the Wild Woods and then put these to good use by creating self-portraits,



making their own mud for mark making and practising name writing. The children have enjoyed using the mud kitchen as well and have created lots of imaginative meals including some mud cakes for a birthday party!

Children enjoyed exploring colour mixing by making some spooky potions. They added in lots of natural resources to their potions to observe the effects.

KS1 also get to enjoy the Wild Woods during an after-school club. Pupils have created their own fairy gardens complete with fairies, goblins, trolls and mandrakes. They even planted flowers with woodchips to add the finishing touches to their gardens. Back in September, Wild Woods Club

spent three weeks taking part in a Big Bee Project. They learned all about the importance of bees through a pollination game and then made wildflower cannon balls and sowed wildflower seed in their new 'Bee B&B' area.

Children can't wait to see the wildflowers bloom for the bees!



Remembrance Day

Pupils from all four schools took part in a moving two minutes silence in November in order to remember the brave men and women who lost their lives in conflict during the wars.

Remembrance. They used lots of different mediums to create their poppies and purple poppies were included by Year 3 Crick in remembrance of all the service animals lost. Despite the usual Remembrance Day parade not going ahead this year, as is tradition Coopersale Hall still placed their wreath of poppies at the War Memorial in Epping.

Normanhurst pupils took part in a range of activities. Year 6 were fascinated to speak to Mr Brencher, who was a 4-year-old evacuee of World War II. Year 5 studied the poem 'In Flanders Field', and Year 1 made their own poppies and learned about significance of why we wear them.

In October, Normanhurst juniors celebrated Dyslexia Awareness Day by wearing red. They learnt about the learning difficulty and raised money to

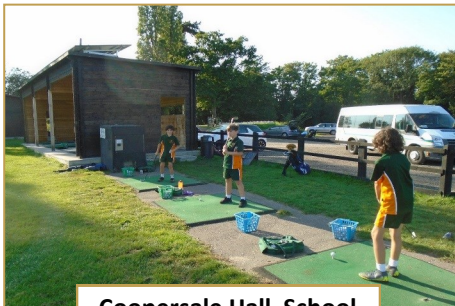
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Extra-Curricular Clubs

ISA Film and Digital Art Competition

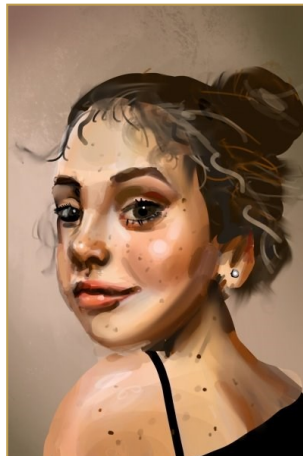
Well done to the pupils who entered the Independent Schools Association Film and Digital Art Competition.

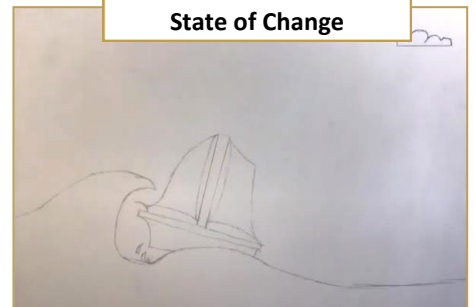

Art at the Oak-Tree Group

Pupils at Braeside have been studying a range of different art styles including observational art, Islamic art and Neurographic art. Pupils enjoyed learning about different styles and techniques and have explored line, shading, texture, blending and water colour. As a result, they have produced some excellent work.

Year 1 pupils at Coopersale Hall enjoyed incorporating their topic of 'Houses' into their artwork. They looked at the work of artists Lowry, Van Gogh and Chagall and then tried to replicate their paintings. After studying the Stone Age, Year 4 created some replica cave art drawings. They found various objects that could be

used to create colour and texture, including moss, petals, berries, grass and mud, and drew a variety of prehistoric animals, people and hands, all of which have been discovered in caves around Europe.

After learning about the festival of Diwali, Year 3 pupils at Normanhurst created their own Diwa Lamps. They used clay to make their lamps and then painted their own designs onto them using lots of bright colours. Year 6 worked on some 'Movement' themed art work. They designed silhouettes of animals, dancers and footballers, then stuck their designs on paper before painting over them with water colours.

They also studied Diwali and painted their own Rangoli Pattern and made Diwa lamps. In Art History, Year 5 studied William Morris.
