It has been brilliant to see how the after-school Playing Out sessions have made getting to and

from school feel safer for all pupils walking up Arthur Milton street. Trying to change the driving culture on Arthur Milton street is one of the aims of the BS7 Road Safety group, and these sessions are a useful way to encourage drivers using the road at school pick up times to rethink.

The road safety charity Brake, Playing Out and the residents of Arthur Milton street organised the regional launch of road safety week outside Brunel Field School in early November. The theme of the week was Bike Safe - raising awareness of the vulnerability of cyclists to car drivers. So, one cold Monday morning the residents put out the roadclosed signs and invited children to cycle to school. They were welcomed by the Bike Doctor (Taylored

Cycles) who repairs bikes for free, a free breakfast and Bristol's 20 mph team, not to mention Brake and HTV! The launch was a great success and was followed up by a road safety assembly for the younger children at school.

While the after-school Playing Out sessions will continue next year, BS7 Road Safety group are also going to be focused on community speedwatch for Ashley Down Road. We know that 20mph is safer for everyone and people just need to change their habits. If you'd like a 20mph sticker for your rear window, please get in touch!

Author returns to Bristol school where it all began.

Bristol Grammar School was thrilled to welcome former pupil Jeremy Levett back to the school on Wednesday (5 December) to talk to pupils about his new book, The Illustrated World of Mortal Engines. Jeremy co-authored the book with Philip Reeve, creator of the Mortal Engines quartet of books.

A long-time fan of the *Mortal Engines* series, Jeremy met Philip Reeve at a Bristol Grammar School literary event in 2009, a year after he left the school. After talking to Philip at the event, the pair subsequently kept in touch and, when publishers Scholastic suggested creating The Illustrated World of Mortal Engines to Philip Reeve, he knew he couldn't write it alone, and that the person he wanted to write it with was Jeremy.

Reflecting on the project, Philip Reeve commented: "Jeremy's a long-time fan of the books, but his mind works in a completely different way to mine... Jeremy also has the ability to write all this stuff in a way that's both funny and informative. He has a glittering literary career ahead of him if he wants one, and I'm proud that it began in the world of Mortal Engines."

Scholastic commissioned the book to coincide with the release of the film adaptation of Mortal Engines. Produced by Lord of the Rings Director Peter Jackson. who also co-wrote



screenplay, the film had its premiere in London on 27 November 2018 and, thanks to his involvement in the book, Jeremy was invited to attend, getting to meet Peter Jackson and the film's stars.

Speaking about his return to BGS, Jeremy said: "Despite all the encouragement of my teachers and the BGS librarians, ten years ago I didn't really believe I'd ever actually be a published author. But it turns out they were right, and I was wrong. The Illustrated World has been a wonderful project to work on, and I'm so proud to have my name on the cover. I'm excited to be back to the place it all started - and I hope someone in my audience will be talking about their book in ten years' time."





Happy New Year to you all from SENDaWelcome



In 2018 SENDaWelcome has continued to work towards our area of Bristol becoming a model of best practice for inclusion. Inclusion means lots of different things to different people, but we want to ensure our children with Special Educational Needs

and Disabilities (SEND) have a place in their local community, a community where they are seen, heard and valued. Everyone has a role to play in this! Together we can lay the foundation for a better future for our young people and a more connected. stronger community for us all.

We are so proud of the great connections we have made since we started two years ago. We now have local provision for our children with SEND through the Golden Hill Community Garden, King's Tennis Club, the ICAN project at Circomedia and the Children's Scrapstore. We have had lots and lots of positive conversations with providers and facilitators which have seen a shift in their thinking about how best to embed inclusion into their ethos and practice.

Our window stickers displaying our logo are increasingly displayed and are a visual nod to the enthusiasm and commitment we have seen from local shops, cafes and families. This has all worked to ensure children with SEND and their families feel less isolated. less vulnerable and more connected with local people, groups and places.

But we want to do more! Over the last year our small team has been busy developing various projects, partnerships and connections to raise the profile for inclusion. We are working hard to keep inclusion high on the local and city-wide agenda; this is key to ensuring people see how inclusion is relevant to them, and how they can play a part in shifting our community to one that has true and meaningful inclusion for our residents with SEND. We are currently researching a Gloucester Road area pilot scheme linking up local business, Bristol City Council and existing schemes such as the council's 'Works Programme', to provide meaningful local employment opportunities for young people with SEND. We would also like to develop a SEND inclusion Kite Mark Scheme for employers, businesses and activity providers to demonstrate understanding and awareness for people with SEND and their families. Such initiatives will enrich our whole community and bring benefits to all local people not just those with disabilities. We have many other ideas

and projects in the pipe-line, as well as on-going partnerships and we encourage anyone to contact us to discuss our work further or to offer us some time and enthusiasm!

Local History Matters

Cholera at Horfield Barracks

In the 19th century a terrifying new disease struck Britain, Cholera – it was spread through the drinking of contaminated water and caused a series of major epidemics throughout the country. It mainly affected those living in slums and poor housing because of high population density, poor sanitary conditions and usually contaminated water supplies.

The disease was first recorded in the autumn of 1831 on the North East coast of England, having gradually spread across the whole of Europe. In July 1832 a women and child were found in a house in Bristol suffering from the disease. By the time the outbreak was declared to be over in November 1832, at least 1612 are recorded to have been infected of whom 626, 38%, had died. In some places – for example the Bristol Workhouse, St Peter's Hospital – the death rate was even higher. These figures are considered to be underestimates since deaths were not formally recorded before 1837. A further outbreak occurred in 1848-49, which had an even higher death rate and another with a lower death toll in 1854–55. A final outbreak occurred in 1866.

On 12 October 1854 the disease was seen in Horfield Barracks, two miles from the city where there was an outbreak and about one mile from the village of Westbury on Trym, which had also been badly affected. The following day William Budd, the well-known Bristol physician and epidemiologist, who had been involved in investigating the 1848–49 outbreak, was called to the barracks. When he arrived, he discovered that there were between 500 and 600 men in the barracks and five privies. These were reported to be in a very poor unsanitary condition because the drought of that year meant that the water pumps in the barracks had stopped working and water had to be brought to the barracks from some distance away. At that time four men were diagnosed with the disease.


Budd immediately put in measures to control the outbreak and reduce the risk of further spread of the



disease. These included disinfecting all the toilets twice each day. Toilets/buckets used by sick men contained disinfectant. All men were checked twice each day for signs of the disease and men from the barracks were prevented from visiting the city or neighbouring towns. Within a short time, the outbreak was controlled. In total between eight and ten men had caught the disease and through prompt treatment all recovered.

Later that year Budd was able to successfully apply the same programme at the Bristol Workhouse. In 1849 there had been 600 cases of infection and about 150 deaths. In 1854 there were three outbreaks in the workhouse; 30 cases of infection were seen and there were eight deaths. Budd said that if his measures had been followed with more rigour there would probably have been even fewer deaths.

We're open EVERY Weds for anyone to come along (10-3 in Jan and then back to 10-4 in Feb); you're welcome along for a 10-minute chat or to stay all day. You don't need to come every week and you don't need any experience or tools AND you can eat some delicious soup if you come at 1:00pm. News from Friends of St Andrews Park



Wow, what a summer to eniov our wonderful park. On one day in August 2018 there were 154 children and 65 adults in the dog-free area. It was standing room only in the padding pool. In spite of the massive

cuts in the budget of parks, St Andrews has got off very lightly. We still have toilets, the paddling pool and Mickey our great park keeper (I am confident that his real title is open space operative!). Also, it seems that there will not be cuts in the 2019/20 parks budget but in the following year it is going to be massive. This gives hope that the paddling pool will be open next year but possibly with reduced opening hours. FOSAP is trying to discuss the pool with BCC but so far have not been able to get a response.

It has not been all good news. FOSAP was turned down for a community grant to save the big tree stump by carving a large climbing frame in the shape of a snake plus our door gym equipment for children and adults. This is in spite of being the top project recommended by local co-op staff but rejected by head office. It has taken weeks to try to get answers but investigations continue! The sad part is that the stump will rot quickly and will have to be removed.

FOSAP had the renewal of the children's play area as its top priority for the year. Our consultation with locals in the summer met with a good response with

many helpful suggestions. We then agreed with the Bristol City Council that the redevelopment would be progressed in three stages, starting with the younger children's play area. Having considered quotations from three play contractors, we hope to submit a funding application by April 2019 and that work on stage 1 can start in autumn 2019. Major fund raising will be needed to pay for the work and discussions are already taking place with a grant making body.

For FOSAP it has been a year of change. The long-term chair and secretary both gave a year's notice of standing down. No one felt they had the time or confidence to take on the roles. At the last moment David Cemlyn put himself forward for chair; he was elected and immediately managed to find a secretary and a membership secretary. David is still in post and remains reasonably sane!

Due to the data protection act we had to contact all of our members. This proved very interesting as we discovered that we had two lists of over 500 people, a large proportion of whom had not been invited to meetings. Our membership secretary sorted the whole thing out and we have now over 100 committed members and 500 plus 'friends' who want to hear from us. One of our members talked about how the use of the park changes throughout the day – from early dog walkers, exercising mothers with their babies, youngsters in the play area, school children older children and the 'after darkers'. 

New community partnership addresses underage drinking & purchasing of alcohol

In spite of welcome evidence that fewer young people are drinking alcohol, British children are still more

likely to binge drink and get drunk than children in most other European countries. Regular or excessive drinking can be seriously damaging to their health and development while increasing the risk of excessive consumption in later life. In the Bishopston area I have seen some emerging issues created by young people and alcohol.

I have two teenage boys and I have been surprised at how easily cheap alcohol is available to them and their friends, primarily through some of our local convenience stores. I have felt helpless seeing emerging mental health problems in some young people locally too. It is not my view that young people should not drink, though it is my belief that the choices they make today will form the basis of their choices when they get older. That is why I am working with the Bishopston and Redland community to set up the first Community Alcohol Partnerships (CAP) in Bristol.

CAPs are run nationally and encourage local partnership working to tackle underage alcohol misuse and associated anti-social behaviour. CAPs are unique in that they recognise that retail is part of the solution and they have been shown to be more effective than enforcement alone. In December a small group of parents, retailers, Trading Standards and Police came together with Redland Green School to devise an action plan which is locally determined to encourage and include a focus on education, enforcement, public perception, communication, diversionary activity and evaluation.

We discussed how retailers and licensees are generally aware that it is against the law to sell alcohol to someone who is under 18, but it is sometimes difficult for them to know when someone is underage. Information and education will be provided to off-licensed premises through the CAP to help avoid incidents of underage sales. Additionally, training materials can be provided to premises for training new staff and point of sale materials are available to educate the public. Premises are going to be encouraged to use the Challenge 25 scheme so that anyone over 18 but looking under 25 is encouraged to carry acceptable ID.

There is an emerging body of evidence, from five independent national evaluations commissioned by CAP, and self-evaluation reports that all schemes are required to produce, that CAPs help to reduce alcohol-related crime and disorder and the acquisition of alcohol by under-18s.

Typical improvements in the key measures are:

- 60% reductions in weekly drinking among Years 9–11
- 40% reductions in youth alcohol related antisocial behaviour
- 85% reductions in seizures of alcohol from under 18s drinking in public
- Pass rates of 90–100% in Challenge 25 compliance following CAP training
- 41–65% reductions in attempted proxy purchase

National evaluation data shows the significant positive difference CAPs are make in reducing underage drinking and the associated harms in local communities around the UK. New evidence from participating schools taking part in CAPs show an average 60% reduction in the number of Year 9–11 pupils who are drinking alcohol each week as a result of the CAP.

CAPs have a clear mission and vision to reduce alcohol harm in local communities from drinking by young people under 25, with a particular emphasis on preventing underage drinking, and to help shape a society in which communities work in partnership to ensure that young children do not drink alcohol, and where young adults display responsible attitudes towards alcohol. I hope I can go some way to helping my children make sensible decisions by raising awareness through Bristol's Community Alcohol Partnership.





Once upon a time in a church hall in St Andrew's Park, a group of friends coerced another of their friends into producing a pantomime - just for fun! Remarkably, it turned out very well, and so it was repeated the following year. This was

the beginning of 'The Bartholomites', an amateur dramatic group (mostly known for pantomime) based in St Bartholomew's Church Hall.

We have managed to perform most well-known pantomimes and some more unusual titles. Our shows have featured all of the panto classic characters and jokes and, of course, there have been a few pantomime horses and cows. Even the 'Spice Girls' made an appearance one year, although they looked a little different from how they did on Top of the Pops.

Over the years the cast has changed, but a few regulars remain - three of the original have been involved in every one of the 49 shows so far and will be part of the 50th show in February 2019. One of our founding members - Wendy Hammonds - has even taken on the mammoth task of directing the show. At least we know she has experience to call on!

We are a much bigger team than are seen on the stage. We take pride in how home-made our pantomimes are and the standard we are able to produce by using the skills of the group. We buy in as little as possible, making our costumes, set and many of our props and our backcloths have always been painted by our extremely talented volunteers. Our shows would be nothing without teamwork. We have worked our way through several pianists, a couple of scenery painters, quite a few costumiers, and thousands of cups of tea and coffee.

We start looking for a script in June each year and (usually) have found one by the time we start reading for parts at the beginning of September. The real fun starts on the first Sunday in October when

anyone aged 5 or upwards who would like to take part in the chorus is invited to come along and learn songs and dances. It is surprising how many people who think they can't dance or sing have actually become an important part of the shows. Anyone is welcome to join us. Where else do you see 5-year olds and 80-year olds working together?

Generations of some families have passed through our group, and some have moved on to be ballet teachers, professional dancers and actors. One vear saw three generations of one family and four generations of another all taking part in some way. We have members travelling from Churchill, Backwell, Nailsea, Winterbourne and all places in

The rehearsals can be long and tiring, but not many go by without everyone having a really good laugh (usually at the expense of someone else!).

So here we are - 50 years on - about to give the public our version of Red Riding Hood. Performances will be on 14-16 February 2019 at 7.30pm, with a matinee on Saturday 16. Tickets will be on sale from 6 January. Enquiries can be

We have so many supporters who come to see us every year and we would like to thank all of you. We hope to see you and some new people in February. It's nice to have something to look forward to when Christmas is over, isn't it!?



Glos Rd Central traders were really pleased to welcome so many of you to their Christmas





Trojan Dogs

The Trojan Horse was used by the Greeks to enter the city of Troy and win the war. The horse had a hidden load of men inside who, once

inside the city of Troy, were able to creep out of the horse and open the city gates to allow in the Greek army, who destroyed the city.

We now have a similar new concept, the 'Trojan dog'. A Trojan dog is a dog with an unknown health history that has been brought into the UK for rehoming. These dogs are of particular concern as they are very likely carrying infections that are common abroad but which we are free of in the UK. Recently the number of rescued dogs entering the UK has increased quite dramatically, hence risk of diseases entering UK by this route has also increased.

These dogs are being imported legally by wellmeaning rescue societies under the Pet Passport scheme. However, the scheme was set up to protect human, not animal, health. Currently the scheme only covers health requirements regarding rabies and the tapeworm Echinococcus Multilocularis, both of which are zoonotic diseases potentially infecting humans as well as animals.

There is no requirement for imported dogs to have health screening prior to travel or even to have the standard vaccinations that we recommend annually for our own pet dogs here. As a result, we are seeing an increase in 'exotic' diseases in UK as travelled dogs may be harbouring disease. This can have serious implications for the imported dog itself as well as for the wider dog population in UK.

In an ideal world, a client thinking of rehoming a pet from abroad would first talk to his/her vet to discuss the implications. Ideally the dog would be screened for disease before travel; depending on the origin of the dog this may include diseases such as ehrilichia, babesia. leishmania. Dirofilaria immitis. Brucella canis and hepatozoon.

Ideally the dog should be treated for ticks as well as vaccinated with a standard vaccine before travel. Recently we have seen cases of Distemper in rescued dogs from abroad.

These measures are responsible for the pet travelling (as stressing an already infected dog could potentially worsen any illness), as well as responsible towards the rest of the UK dog population.

In addition, many of these rescue dogs will have been stravs in their country of origin so it is also possible that putting them into a home situation



will cause stress and result in undesirable behaviour.

Currently the British Veterinary Association and the Dogs Trust are lobbying parliament to tighten the pet travel rules once the UK leaves the EU next year. That will go a long way to helping reduce the Trojan dog risk. Meanwhile a plea to all who may be thinking of rehoming a rescue dog from abroad to consider the health risks and if you are determined then please ask for the screening tests, vaccinations and tick treatment to be performed before the dog starts on its journey to UK.





Something New for the **Old Bristol North Baths**


The renovation saga of the old Bristol North Baths, a building close to the hearts of many local people, has dragged on for more than a decade, but there is hope that in 2019 this will all come to an end!

The Edwardian, baroque-style building was built in 1915 originally as a swimming pool; it has an interesting history and many locals fondly remember swimming there themselves as a child and then taking their own children.

There were high hopes that this grade 2 listed building would become a medical centre, with the new library just next door. Unfortunately, it was necessary for Bristol City Council (BCC) to terminate its agreement with developer Chatsworth Homes in 2015, following a series of unacceptable delays with the project. In spring 2018, BCC put the building on to the open market with Alder

King as property consultants. Below images thanks to Crver & Coe architects

At an Open Day in late November 2018, I, with many other local people, viewed the plans of the council's preferred bidder, to transform the space into offices. I caught up with **Duncan and Matthew of Gloucester** Road based, award winning architects Cryer & Coe, who are working closely with the potential new buyer. They explained that while the buyer would occupy the top floor, it was important all ground floor with uncompleted



To attract these innovators the 14 ground floor offices will offer incentives such as favourable rents, a small staff gym with showers

and café, cycle parking, cycle storage and an attractive and modern light venue to work. And with Gloucester Road on the doorstep and all it has to offer – they anticipate a high interest. Who wouldn't want to work here?

We are aware that many local people feel strongly that this historical space should have retained some community access at the very least: the council's response is that this is fulfilled in the adjoining Bishopston Library. Although first floor with compartmented this may not be the outcome everyone consulting rooms

had hoped for, it will be good to see life breathed back into this building and for the historical space to be filled with people once again.

With 85% of the renovation completed by the previous developers. it is hoped that, with successful planning applications, the Bristol North Baths could be ready to receive the next Richard Branson by summer 2019.

News from our Ashley, Bishopston & Redland Councillors

Ashley ward news

We recently attended the launch of the Bristol @ Night advisory panel. This is a new initiative to bring together people who work across the city's night-life scene, aiming to address some of the key challenges it faces. More and more are choosing to live in and around the city centre, and this causes conflict between new residents and established venues. Venues are also in danger of being lost as the buildings they inhabit become attractive prospects for residential or office development. The council wants to ensure that the vitality and diversity of night-time activities can be preserved and supported to flourish in the years ahead.

The council has adopted a new Equality and Inclusion Strategy for 2018–2023, which seeks to drive forward their approach to equalities. The strategy has been adopted alongside the city's first Equality Charter, with a set of related objectives that individuals and organisations are able to sign up to. For more information, or to sign up to the charter, visit bristol.gov.uk/bristolequalitycharter.

At Full Council recently, councillors debated and passed a motion about the issue of period poverty. One in ten girls and young women are unable to afford sanitary products, which can result in bullying, distress and exclusion. Council resolved to work with partners towards the goal of eliminating period poverty in Bristol; to encourage schools to make sanitary products available to those who need them; and encourage employers in the city to do the same. The council will also play its part in making sanitary products available in civic buildings such as libraries and City Hall.

Bristol is now the first city in the UK to declare a Climate Emergency, after Full Council passed a motion to adopt an ambitious target to become carbon-neutral by 2030. This brings forward our previous target by 20 years. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change recently published a report warning that the world has only 12 years to adopt emergency action to prevent global warming greater than 1.5°C. Cities across the world need to lead the change in preventing this disastrous outcome, and we are proud that Bristol is setting the benchmark in good practice on this crucial issue.

Bristol City Council has now been officially accredited as a Living Wage employer. The council now joins more than 220 south west-based employers officially committed to paying the voluntary rate. The Living Wage rate has recently been increased by 25p to £9 due to rising living costs.

Redland ward news

Sale of the Bristol North Baths building

 Redevelopment of the old Bristol North Baths building is now at the stage of a new planning application. A drop-in session to discuss their plans locally afforded us the opportunity to discuss their plans for new offices for their company and other local office workspace users. We are hoping there is scope to support community organisations in some way once the company confirms their move will take place. Any profits from sale will be ring-fenced for affordable housing across the city.

Libraries 'engagement' – Fi and Martin are pleased that the council withdrew its proposed library closures for now, but a clear longer-term commitment and a well-worked strategy for libraries is still needed. The council proposes to 'engage' communities on ideas for the future. These discussions are meant to link issues around the future of community buildings and branch libraries – and in this area community activities have to share the one council-run space.

We don't know what background information is being provided, but we stressed that earlier ideas and responses from 2015 and 2017 consultations should be included if the council wants a practical discussion. It's likely that some funds for piloting ideas such as community management of buildings or co-locating facilities and activities could be available from underspent library budget. Planned events were being reviewed as we write, as there was a call for more evening sessions around the city.

Parking – Emergency vehicles were again trapped on the way to a call-out by bad parking. While the administration had promised officer support to look at potential solutions, this has yet to materialise; so Fi and Martin are pressing for some action on this. Matters became complicated by the resignation of the Cabinet member for Transport and her replacement by the Mayor, which caused a delay.

Meanwhile, we are conducting some door-to-door surveys in some of the affected areas. If your road is being affected by poor parking then please let us know and we will come and talk to residents in your street; or, consider joining the local residents' parking group, BOSA www.facebook.com/BOSAtrafficandparking or bishopstonstandrewstpgroup@gmail.com.

Bristol waste — In autumn entire streets had their recycling collections missed, with some waiting for several days before it was been picked up. Over 80 streets were missed one Friday. Clearly this is more than a glitch, so please let us know if this happens to you so that we get a clearer picture of the situation. Please do report missed collections via the council website so the extent of the problem can be logged and to remind the council to provide the service. New collection vehicles are finally going

to be purchased now so this decision should reduce breakdowns and improve the situation in 2019.

Fly tipping and lack of enforcement -

Several people have contacted us about the lack of enforcement from the council over fly tipping, even where residents have clearly identified the offender. We're pushing for increased resources on this, as once again, we feel that residents are doing everything they can but aren't getting the right support from the council, which is disheartening. We have, however, been told that the new 'litter police' are active on Gloucester Road so we are trying to get some feedback on how they have been doing in our area.

Tackling disposable plastics – Martin's petition calling on the council to eliminate single-use disposable plastics from its activities topped 3,500 signatures, securing a debate at Full Council in November. There was unanimous, all-party support for the council to take action. We now look forward to seeing the Mayor's response to the issues raised. Fi had started work as cabinet member to get rid of such plastics in council-owned premises such as parks and museums, but this stalled for the last year. We're therefore hoping that the petition from people across the city will kick start action by the council to play its part in reducing waste.

Bristol announces a Climate Emergency

We're proud of the motion brought by our colleague Cllr Carla Denyer who achieved another unanimous council vote to agree Bristol should declare a 'climate emergency' and take steps to go carbon neutral by 2030, 20 years sooner than was intended. The motion calls for the Mayor to bring a report back within 6 months to show how the council can deliver such a target. Bristol already has plans for ambitious carbon saving initiatives and this strengthens the work. This motion has recently been adopted by the London Assembly and looks set to be adopted in areas as far afield as Manchester and Brighton. The latest international reports give us 12 years to stop dangerous climate change, so we are hoping that Bristol will be a trailblazer to find ways of doing just that
