UNITY WITHIN THE JEWISH COMMUNITY

an address by LAURA MARKS O.B.E.

or our Unity Lecture of 2016 we were privileged to be addressed by Laura Marks. She is a vibrant, dynamic lady who has held many prestigious positions, including Planning Director of the country's largest ad agency AMV.BBDO, Senior Vice President, Board of Deputies of British Jews, chairing the Commission on Women in Jewish Leadership, chair of the Community Issues Division which deals, amongst other things, with regional communities and with

Jewish education. When in post, Laura wrote the Jewish community submission to the Prime Minister's Holocaust Commission, set up Jewish Connection (focusing on small Jewish communities) and campaigned for reform within the Board and established Women in Jewish Leadership. In 2016 Laura Marks was delighted to be appointed as Chair of the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust Board of Trustees.

After marrying Dan Patterson and having three children, the family lived in California for three years, where Laura first encountered the idea of Mitzvah Day. On their return to the UK she set up Mitzvah Day in 2005, which became a charity in 2008. It is a global day of Jewish-led, inter-faith social action based on the premise that we can all give some time to help others and that together we can really make a difference to our world. It leads the way in faith based social action and is proudly and visibly Jewish.

Laura told us how Mitzvah Day encourages people of different faiths to come together for a day of social action each year to engage with local charities, celebrating the values of justice, acts of kindness and environmental awareness, operating now in 20 countries. Now a well-anticipated focal point in British Jewry's annual calendar, Mitzvah Day galvanises people – regardless of age, faith, affiliation, gender or socio-economic position – to donate their time and energy.

She chaired the government's inter faith project - A



Year of Service - and is now adviser to the new Sedaqa Day, the Muslim community's own Mitzvah Day. In 2014, fifty seven such inter-faith partnerships took place where synagogues, churches, mosques, other places of worship and community centres built relationships throughout the year and on Mitzvah Day participated together in a wide range of local initiatives.

Laura is also co-founder of Nisa-Nashim (the Arabic and Hebrew words for women) and described

how it is dedicated to bringing the Jewish and Muslim communities in Britain closer together by setting up groups of women nationally to build personal friendships, grow as leaders and benefit wider society.

Laura made us aware that when we all work together as a team on issues that matter, we can involve people from large and also small communities, empower people to drive change and ensure that every single person can play a part. Our proven model of grass roots social action-based interfaith fosters collaborations centred on the mutual values of social action and giving. These result in initiatives that have not only made a very real difference to helping the needs of local charities but importantly, forge long-term relationships and understanding which leads to more cohesive local communities.

Laura shared with us her passionate belief in a strong, positive, outward facing and inclusive community where we are safe and free to live Jewish lives as an integral part of British society.

"There are not many people who can claim to have changed the face of Anglo-Jewry; Laura Marks has done just that" (Jewish Chronicle, November 2014).

She was awarded an OBE in the Queen's New Years' Honours list for her work in building inter-faith relationships.

ohn Levy was introduced to us by Lily and John Ainley in the early 1980s. We soon became friends helped by our shared interest in jazz as we were both saxophonists. We were soon involved in going to jam sessions and venues to play.

John loved music so much! Right up to the end he would practise his instrument whilst bedridden.

He was always convivial, considerate, humble, gentle and charming with a great sense of humour in conversation often displaying his wide intellectual interests and knowledge. His attributes also included the ability to speak five languages.

He was educated at St Pauls School and obtained a scholarship to Cambridge where he graduated with a First Class degree.

He later studied at the Sorbonne in Paris and had

a keen interest in sport and politics. He met and married Vivienne in the late 1980s. They both became members of our Lodge until the time they decided to relocate to Spain.

Whilst there, John applied himself to a new challenge by studying for a PhD in the history of the Jewish Golden Era in Spain which was cut short by ill health.

He displayed excellence as a stepfather to Vivienne's son and as Vivienne's health unfortunately deteriorated, he became a devoted carer to her too. Due to Vivienne's worsening health they eventually returned to London.

Five years ago came the commencement of his own illness.

John was a dear friend who will be sadly missed by us and John and Lily Ainley.






WELCOME 2017

FIRST UNITY LODGE MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS DONATION



The staff and pupils of Herzl Primary School in Qiryat Gat gratefully acknowledge the generous donation of the First Unity Lodge which enables the purchase of one trombone, one trumpet, one baritone and additional mouth pieces so that two students can learn on each instrument.

These instruments with add the depth of wind instruments to the school orchestra which at present is limited to string and per-

cussion instruments.

Three hundred and forty two children attend Herzl School. One third are new immigrants from the former Soviet Union, one third Ethiopian immigrants and one third children born in Israel. A large proportion are from

The staff and pupils low socio-economic homes.

This government school regards learning to play a musical instrument part of enriching the students' world and forming their personality. In addition, it generates a more relaxed and cooperative atmosphere within the school. Music opens new and additional channels of communication for the pupils and community.

The children are taught the history of music, to read musical notes and from the second grade to play a musical instrument. Eight musical instruments are taught at the school: cello, violin, guitar, mandolin, portable organ, darbuka, melodic and metalophone.

The pupils are taught in small groups of up to ten. Those learning string instruments receive individual, group and orchestra lessons. The peak of this activity is the end of year concert, which is of a very high standard.
