





Pioneering support services

Aphasia

Aphasia is a speech and language condition that often affects those who have had damage to the left side of their brain, often as a result of stroke, tumour or traumatic brain injury. It can leave those affected struggling to communicate and feeling isolated and depressed.

Currently, patients would usually receive four hours of therapy while in hospital, followed up by eight hours once they have been discharged. Profs Alex Leff and Jenny Crinion, wanted to change this, so have spearheaded a new intense service at Queen Square called The National Brain Appeal Aphasia Service. Doors have now opened to the first patients, who will receive 7.5 hours of therapy a day, five days a week, for three weeks -a huge increase on the current amount. Clinicians are convinced this will boost the level of recovery for these patients, making a huge difference to their lives.



We are very excited about this new service in Queen Square. It means that patients with language problems will get a kick-start to help them along their recovery journey. We expect patients to make significant gains – this will have huge benefits on their day-to-day lives.

Dementia

It's been more than 20 years since we began funding services for rarer dementias in Queen Square. Three years ago, we established Rare Dementia Support which brought all the various support groups for younger-onset and familial forms of dementia under one umbrella. Early-onset dementias can be especially devastating as people are at a stage in their lives when they still need to hold down a job, support dependent children or look after elderly parents.

The current support groups are used by hundreds of people – those with a dementia diagnosis and their families – and are a crucial resource. Now, there are plans to expand the service – growing the online community so that more people can access the expert help, increasing research into these more unusual forms of dementia; and improving education and training for professionals so they can diagnose them much earlier.

There are also exciting plans for the world's first centre for rare dementia support.



Around 20% of people with dementia have a rare form of the condition. We want to establish the world's first centre of excellence dedicated to bringing together social, emotional and practical support, with research and training about rare and young-onset dementias.


