Ronald Blythe: Akenfield. - author worked at Colchester library, novel about East Anglian farming and countryside

Daniel Defoe: Moll Flanders. - Moll was born in Colchester

Barbara Erskine: Hiding from the Light. – the Witchfinder General's reign of terror

Jonathan Gash: The Lovejoy Novels. – the much loved antiques dealer.

Goscinny and Uderzo: Asterix in Britain. - the shrewd cunning little warrior is in Britain

James Henry: Blackwater. - a crime novel, procedural, set in old police station and Colchester area

Douglas Jackson: Hero of Rome. - Colchester/The Colonia/Camulodunum appears during the Boudican revolt.

Sarah Perry: The Essex Serpent – gothic Victorian novel set in Colchester and the surrounding villages

Ian Samson: Essex Poison. - crime novel set in 1930's Colchester, when the Mayors dies at the famous Oyster Feast
