W-PHS Picnic and Gates Hall Tour

The pleasant summer evening of August 7 was perfect for our Annual Picnic held in the Reformed Church Pavilion. As usual the variety of yummy food was much enjoyed. Dan Montondo provided a bit of song and a bit of history, while portraying Andrew Cornwall. That historical context served as a perfect introduction to our Gates Hall "Tour" led by Dave Frohlich.

At the Hall, Dave took us into the basement and pointed out supporting beams replaced and added, and floor repairs completed about five years ago during Phase I of repairs to Gates Hall. This step arrested the "sinking" of the building and stabilized the floor above.

We then climbed the stairs into the hall where Dave outlined Phase II of structural needs. W-PHS recently commissioned and received an architectural evaluation of the ceiling and supporting roof structures completed by Passero Associates. The architectural drawings were on display for questions and discussion.

Dave pointed out the sagging ceiling, which is a result of the failing roof structures. Because of the height and age of the building, remediation will be complex. Additionally, the shingle roof is reaching the end of its life, and will also need removal and replacement.

Dave also discussed briefly consideration of other needs, such as air-conditioning, handicapped access, lighting and correcting the Mezzanine supports. All of these are being considered now, so that when the Hall needs to be closed to allow the primary repairs to proceed, best use is made of that "down time" and future disruptions to use of the Hall can be minimized.

Gates Hall is our most historically significant building. It was built by the community and has repeatedly been re-purposed and repaired through community effort. You will be hearing more about what the Hall needs and our efforts to acquire adequate funds. We anticipate it will take multiple sources of funding, and significantly, demonstration by the community of pride in the Hall, through contributions to "match" any Grants obtained.

September Program

The Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society is pleased to announce an additional program to the 2019 line-up. It will take place on Wednesday, September 4 at 7 p.m. in historic Gates Hall when David Malgee will present a program entitled "Cowards to Heroes: The 111th New York Volunteers from Harper's Ferry to Gettysburg." Malgee, a member of the Gettysburg Foundation Board, will focus on the period between August 1862, when the regiment was formed, to July 1863, when they suffered among the highest casualty rates at Gettysburg where several Williamson men were killed.

Malgee will also talk about the military career and postwar life of Adrian Contant (his wife's great, great grandfather), a soldier in Co. D who was wounded at Gettysburg. Contant married a Williamson girl and settled in Williamson, where he farmed along the lake. He is buried today in Lakeview Cemetery.

David Malgee grew up in Williamson and earned a Bachelor of Arts in History from the State University of New York at Oswego and a Master of Arts in History from the University of Richmond. Malgee

served as chief Operating Officer of VSP Technologies, Inc. for more than three decades. Currently he served on VSP's board and retains significant ownership in the company. He is also the president of the Colonial Heights (Virginia) Historical Society. Author of two books and written works including Virginia State historical and Civil War Trails markers texts and historical pamphlets, he remains active in studying the Battle of Gettysburg, collecting artifacts and speaking on Civil War topics.




ANNUAL CEMETERY TOUR



"Our Gates Hall"

Here is the second installment of Florence Forbes Cornwall's summary of Gates Hall history. A good reminder for us all of the role this historic building has played in our community.

Our Village Hall—A Historical Sketch by Florence Forbes Cornwall (The July/August newsletter left off at the pews in Gates Hall)

According to tradition, a certain staunch old Englishman, who we will call Squire Joseph, had from the beginning owned a pew directly alongside one of the west windows. He could most conveniently cast his eye upon the beauties of nature should the sermon prove dull. But most unfortunately in the replacement of the pews, old Joseph was moved ahead of the window and he could only view a blank wall now with the tail of his eye. So what did he do but saw out his pew and set it all alone back by the stove. To show this tradition has some foundation in fact, it was found in 1893 when the building was remodeled, that one of the pews had been sawed out and was toe-nailed back into place.

We find in the minutes about this time the following: "Moved and seconded that the clerk be authorized to insert a By-Law in this Book to the effect that the chewing of tobacco and the cutting and defacing the slips in this House be dispensed with."

An interesting report occurs in 1861: The sexton reported that he had opened the house about 125 times for the Methodists and Presbyterians, for which he had received about \$13.75 and the subscription of about \$13 more. Also he received from all other meetings, including Episcopalians, Universalists, anti-slavery, temperance and Spiritualists, etc., \$17, making 37.5 cents for each lecture. We infer it is 37.5 cents, not an exorbitant wage.

We also find that a charge of \$1.00 is to be made for the use of the Union House for all lectures and views where there is a fee taken at the door, in addition to the sexton's charge for lights and fuel and cleaning.

During the next few years trouble seemed to be brewing for our United Church Society. Changes in the Constitution were considered. Discussion must have waxed hot for one clerk records that the "annual meetings" adjourned without prayer. The climax came when two of the religious societies determined to hold their respective Sunday schools at the same hour on Sunday afternoon, and we have the unique spectacle of one meeting in the main part of the church, the other in the gallery. The gallery Sunday School with the aid of a cornet out-sang their rivals. Six young ladies of this Sunday School and belonging to prominent families of the village were thereupon arrested for disturbing a religious service. No warrant could be obtained in the home town so the trial was held in the neighboring town of Ontario. One of the ladies arrested related to me the other day how the "six prisoners" packed their belongings in one trunk and drove in a carry-all to Ontario. They were accompanied by the entire population of Pultneyville. The trial lasted three days and they were acquitted. This was June 17, 1859.

So high did feeling run that an effigy was made of the minister who caused the arrest. It was ridden on a rail through the town, shot from the muzzle of a cannon and burned. The older residents who remember these times, and even took part in them, believe the dissension was not really on account of individuals but because the United Society was made up of organizations, and any society so made up will fail when any one of the organizations becomes stronger than the others.

Along about 1867 several meetings were called to talk over repairs which were very much needed. But the clerk reports meetings without a quorum and "no interest in repairs." By 1867 it was decided that it would be impossible to raise the money needed. Finally in 1875, the last regular church service was held. About that time the Methodists build their church and the other church societies had become extinct. The building was fast falling into a ruinous condition.

But as in 1825 so in 1893 the community spirit again waxed strong. The citizens still felt much affection for the old building which had served the community so long and so well and they felt it was a shame to allow it to go to pieces. It was no longer needed for religious services as two churches had been built. It was proposed, therefore, that it be made into a village hall, and, under this changed aspect, go on with its work of friendship and service to the community, where it had been located in faith and loyalty 68 years before.

To think was to act. The Union Hall Association was formed and to this new body the Union Church Association deeded all its rights in land and building. \$2,300 was raised, the building was remodeled and the basement added.

All persons who subscribed to the rebuilding became members of the Union Hall Association and there were a large number. According to the constitution the Association can fill vacancies in the membership so it is a self-perpetuating body.

In forming a new constitution the members tried to profit by experience of the past and provide for all contingencies that might arise in the future. So no society or association of any kind is recognized as a member but the Union Hall Association is made up of individuals and all matters are decided by a majority Vote. There are eight trustees who hold the property in trust for their successors in office.

The Union Hall is to be used for all religious, political and other purposes not of an immoral nature, that the trustees of said hall deem proper.

During the war it was opened for the French Relief and the Red Cross work. And the old building, could it speak, might have told us of other war days, when the young men of Williamson met in the church before marching off to help preserve the Union. The spirits of patriotism made itself felt and the spirit of brotherhood and neighborliness was around us like a protecting garment. So will we again, when there is an occasion, work together as we did under the Red Cross, and may the old Union Hall be a witness and helper on many community occasions yet to come.

From the Archives...

In the last several months, Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society has been the recipient of many meaningful gifts, through the facilitation of President Nan Hance. Thank you to:

Greg Davis offered us a bound copy of *The Evergreens Guest Book*, circa 1940's through mid-1950's. This lodging was located at 4343 Lake Road, Ernest and Hera Davis, Proprietors, were grandparents of the donor.

Martha Cornwall McCain, Fred Cornwall's daughter, brought a file of papers regarding Centennial Park and Gates Hall, a marvelous collection of writings from Florence Cornwall (from which we made copies and returned the binder album), a Book of Records of The Union Society of Pultneyville, 1851, the Constitution and By-laws of the Union Society, Pultneyville, 1825, and the Centennial Park Record Book, 1880 – 1945 from the Cornwall family collection.

Reginald Ameele has provided us with a wonderfully complete set of *Minutes from 1843-1847*, *East Williamson New York District School Meetings*.

Beverly Verbridge has given to our Archives Department pictures of the Class of 1917 Williamson High School reunion picture from 1959, as well as photos of the Ladies Mission Band from the East Williamson Reformed Church, circa 1917, and those of both the Women's and Men's Sunday School classes for that church.

Bill and Brenda Walvoord have shared a 1969 purchase offer and Indenture for their property, a tape location map, land contract, 6 mortgages, 13 warranty deeds, an 1842 indenture copy, and a box of memorabilia from former owners.

William H. Poray gifted W-PHS with a unique Digital Collection of over 700 Images and Research on a USB stick chock full of information on local family histories and various locations. Among the highlights in this vast collection are images regarding the Broekhuizen, Poray, Keck, Eaton and Garfield families, Hollands Cove, agricultural photos of the area, B. Forman Park, the Cuyler School . . . and more.

Ms. Beth Sahrle sent research papers accrued by Mrs. Frank R. Shumway, Jr. from her lengthy investigation of the U.S.S. Ontario ship model given to the Rochester Yacht Club and later donated to the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society.

The collection of papers includes a conclusion offered by the Department of the Navy as to whether or not it represents a ship that sailed Lake Ontario.

James and Eileen Fairbanks have donated part of a beam from the Williamson Quaker Meeting House which stood on Pearsall Road. It had been in the possession of Eleanor Fairbanks and is a wonderfully tangible part of local history. It surely relates, as well, to our Griffith Cooper display insomuch as his family were members.

We feel fortunate to be able to preserve these materials for reference by future inquirers, as our W-PHS holdings are being increasingly used by researchers.

The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the Auchampaugh home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years.



Rooms in the home contain exhibits, archived information, a gift shop and business office. The Society House is regularly open the third weekend in June through the first weekend in October, Friday through Sunday, 1-4 p.m., by appointment and throughout Homecoming weekend and during the Annual Community Garage Sale.
