The PCC was elected at the APCM in 2016 and has met seven times in the last year. Each member serves for one or three years after which time they can put themselves up for reelection. After the APCM in 2016, the PCC was delighted to welcome Charlie as a new PCC member and to welcome back Anzo and Janet who had been re-elected as well as Pauline and Keith elected as Churchwardens for 2016-17.

PCC agendas cover all aspects of life at St Mary's. A key agenda item for the PCC is St Mary's Mission Action Plan and this is regularly reviewed by the PCC to ensure we are on track for achieving our mission priorities. The PCC receives reports from different committees including Building & Finance and Lettings and also receives updates on the activities of Churches Together in Balham and Upper Tooting, Deanery Synod and Trinity St Mary's. Other key agenda items over the last year have included discussions on replacing the organ, stewardship and social events.

The PCC was very sorry to see Mtr Wilma move on in July but are grateful to Nigel for acting as Chair of the PCC during the vacancy. Much of the focus of PCC meetings has been on the vacancy and on 20 July the PCC was joined by Archdeacon John Kiddle to discuss the process for recruiting a new vicar. The PCC would like to take this opportunity to thank Daphne and Martin for stepping forward to act as Parish Representatives and for agreeing to be co-opted on to the PCC to be able to fulfil this role. We are hugely grateful for the hard work they put in to guiding St Mary's through the vacancy process and are looking forward to welcoming Rev'd Robert Tobin and his wife Olivia to St Mary's in September.

In August Pat Nevard retired after 12 years volunteering as the Parish Administrator at St Mary's and the PCC would like to thank Pat for all her generous hard work over these years. The PCC have had a number of discussions about the role of Parish Administrator and appointing a new administrator will be a key priority once Robert starts. In the meantime, we would like to offer sincere thanks to all those who have taken on extra responsibilities to cover the vacancy and particularly to Diane and Keith for taking on so much of the administrative work.

The PCC was sorry to lose Graeme Calf and Janet Jones partway through the year and thank them for all their work as PCC members and for all they continue to do for St Mary's. We were fortunate that Bruce Knight and Rosemary Kennedy kindly stepped forward to replace Graeme and Janet and thank Bruce and Rosemary for bringing in new ideas and enthusiasm.

On behalf of the PCC, thank you to everyone who makes St Mary's such a special church to be part of. Electoral Roll Officer's Report

Since the 2016 APCM, we have added 9 new names to the Electoral Roll which now has 151 members. The Electoral Roll is updated as and when we receive a compliant application form. As a general rule, anybody over the age of 16 living in the parish or anybody over the age of 16 not resident in the parish but who has regularly attended worship at St Mary's for six months is eligible for enrolment on the Electoral Roll. The Electoral Roll is fully revised every six years but we did not need to prepare a new roll this year.

Churchwarden's Report: Fabric And Ornaments 2016/17

This is an official report on the present state of the fabric and ornaments of the church. This includes buildings, land, furniture, fabric, candlesticks, church plate etc. Inevitably there will be some duplication with the Building and Finance Report but this is cannot be avoided.

I can report that there has been no change in church plate or candlesticks this year.

A lot of what we have achieved this year has been fire or health and safety related. Whether you live in a flat or a house and whether you rent or own you will know there is always some sort of maintenance to be done. This building is no different except that it is very much larger and the bills are a lot bigger.

Before Christmas we decided we could postpone the floor coverings no longer as they were becoming dangerous. They ranged in age from 30 years to 60 years and to 110 years. We settled on a like for like replacement, grey in the pews and blue in the rest of the church, and the work is now completed and paid for partly from donations and partly from fabric reserves. My wish list for improvements is getting longer but we have to prioritise as our income cannot allow us to do everything at once.

We've had a run of ageing taps, door handles and locks needing replacement. Not only in the old toilet block but even in the "new build" narthex and balcony areas.

Routine maintenance has been carried out to ensure safety for all church users including portable appliance testing, lift maintenance, fire extinguishers inspection and we propose to update some of the electrics.

We have ageing seamless aluminium gutters but they have to be joined at angles and these joints are now deteriorating.

We have replaced two dangerous ladders, one for the light bulb fitter, triple section with stabiliser and one for the sacristy with safety treads and handrails. A new handrail was fitted on the very steep staircase to the clock tower in time for Christmas so we could get the candlesticks down safely.

Our priorities now, in no particular order, are security floodlighting for the front of the church, handrails to the fire exit on the Irene House side of the church and a major overhaul of the old toilet block.

At no cost at all the small balcony room has been reinstated as a meeting room available for lets and by church groups for up to 4 people by prior arrangement with the administrator.

My thanks again to the entire Building and Finance Committee. The work they do is essential for the existence and maintenance of a building this size and its content.

The coming year will be another very busy one and an important year in the life of our St. Mary's family as we welcome the arrival of our new vicar Robert Tobin and his wife Olivia.

Building and Finance Committee

Building

Matters on the building front have been much quieter this year with most of the jobs being small in nature as we had expended most of our annual budget on the Narthex water heater and other boiler repairs early in the winter 2015-16.

However throughout the year we monitored our 'regular' contracts for gas, electricity, water, telephones, broadband, insurance, fire extinguishers, fire alarms, boilers, sound system, timber floor polishing, movable partition maintenance, refuse collection, lift servicing and gutter maintenance, seeking to ensure we comply with legislation and keep the building safe for all to use in a cost effective way.

We continued with our gutter maintenance company and they came and inspected and cleaned out our gutters at the end of 2016. Their work includes a full report with photographs identifying some work required in those inaccessible places we cannot get to ourselves.

During 2016 we worked on deciding and obtaining quotations for the renewal of the deteriorating floor finishes throughout the nave and transepts. With PCC approval we were able to place orders for a replacement carpet through-out the nave, transepts, pews and choir stalls before the annual price increase in January 2017. The work was then progressed early in 2017 and was substantially complete in time for the parish visit by the shortlisted candidates for our new vicar. With the resulting minor snagging having been resolved the work is now complete. We trust you like the finished result and that it is safer for everyone as well.

Looking ahead slightly we are currently obtaining quotations for an update on the electrics and renewal of the floodlighting to the front which should also improve security. Something for us to action later this year.

Finance

The main audited finance report for the year to 31 December 2016 is available elsewhere.

The finance team continues to work well with a dedicated group dealing with weekly matters such as paying bills out and monies into the bank. The treasurer produces a variety of cash flows and forecasts for PCC throughout the year as well as drafting the PCC's annual budget and accounts. For that work we are very grateful.

The stewardship working group has been quietly raising awareness of items of expenditure (most recently the carpets) and gently raising the need for regular planned giving. More on this will follow in 2017 as we have lost a number of regular givers and need to consolidate that income for future plans.

The 2016 accounts include the £19k cost of the carpets, partially funded by drawing on the Fabric Reserve. We are now fundraising towards a replacement organ, for when the present electronic organ stops working completely. The options of another electronic organ or to install a pipe organ are not yet decided.

On behalf of the Building and Finance Committee I wholeheartedly thank you for your continued generosity and support.

Deanery Synod

The best way of describing Deanery Synod is that it represents the most local of the Church of England's hierarchical structure. Tooting Deanery Synod comprises 11 parishes with a geographical boundary that covers The Ascension, Balham Hill to St. Mary's, Summerstown. It also includes Wandsworth Prison, Springfield Hospital and St. George's Hospital. Its aims are essentially twofold – to be a source of information and decision-making to Diocesan Synod and, more importantly, a support to the parishes and other institutions within it.

We meet 3 or 4 times a year, sometimes discussing ways in which we tackle the mission of the Deanery and at other times having a guest speaker to present a topic which we think might be useful. In the past this has included speakers from SPIDIR, to talk about how we might find Spiritual Direction something useful to have, and Welcare, to talk about help available to families and children and need in Southwark Diocese. We also hold meetings that are open to everyone in the Deanery, whether Deanery Synod members or not.

Churches Together in Balham and Upper Tooting (CTBUT):

After discussion and consultation with member churches CTBUT voted to take a sabbatical for a year to allow time to reflect on the importance we attach to working together as churches of varying denominations in our local community. Members have expressed the view that, although we have continued to meet together to worship and mark specific events, what has been lacking in our life as CTBUT has been outreach into the community in which we live.

So, during this time work has continued. We had an extremely successful Flower Festival in September, "Shakespeare in Bloom", hosted by Balham Baptist Church and attended by around 400 people. Many of these were people who came in from the streets, with no previous contact with "church". The opening was marked by a Gala Evening - a cheese and wine reception followed by an evening of entertainment on a Shakespearian theme - music, poetry, play excerpts etc.

From the enthusiasm demonstrated by people who had had no previous involvement in CTBUT, it has become clear that people respond to being engaged in activities where the various churches work together for our community. So, when we reconvene in July this year I anticipate that we may well decide that this is where our emphasis will be.

Report from the Stewardship Working Group

Stewardship is a way of showing that we care about God's kingdom and recognition of the fact that all that we have comes from God. It follows, then, that the Church encourages its members to give time, skills, talents or money to the church and other efforts to support, nourish, sustain and grow God's kingdom. At St. Mary's, many members of our congregation give generously of their time and talents, many make regular financial donations and many do both to support the work of our church. For this reason, the PCC decided that it was time to start up a working group to lead on stewardship at St, Mary's.

The Stewardship Working Group (Rhea, Eileen, Anzo, Charlie and Laura) has met several times to discuss ways of raising awareness of the broad nature of stewardship in our church and to break the misconception that stewardship is just about money. Did you know, for example, that your donations or weekly giving help to pay the utility bills? Did you know that members of our congregation care for our garden? You may have seen notices in the pew sheet about ways that you can give to St. Mary's such as signing up to easyfundraising or funding a piece of the new carpet. Report from Trinity St Mary's School

This year has been a year of change and much success at Trinity St Mary's School.

Julie Davey, our previous headteacher left last summer. Lynn Anderson is leading the school forward as our acting headteacher. We have been advertising for a new headteacher but did not appoint at the first attempt. We advertised again and have interviews at the start of the summer term. Please pray for the governors as we interview to appoint the best leader for our local church school.

Ofsted visited us on 21 March for a one day inspection. It went well but as this church report goes to press the final outcome is not yet public. We will issue an announcement at the beginning of the summer term.

Trinity St Mary's had outstanding national test results in summer 2016. Wandsworth has awarded the school for being

- one of the top five schools with the highest proportion of pupils meeting the expected standard in KS1 reading, writing and maths
- one of the top five school with the highest average progress score for KS2 reading, writing and maths combined
- one of the top five school with the highest proportion of disadvantaged pupils meeting the expected KS2 standards for reading, writing and maths.

The school was also presented with a special award for being one of the highest performing schools nationally for above average progress for disadvantaged pupils.

Ironically, despite excellent academic achievement, the school roll is falling. We need to keep pupil numbers up to ensure our income. We have set up a special public relations committee to promote our delightful and very effective small school. The admissions criteria have been widened to increase the number of families from the local area. Please spread the word about our very special church school.

St Mary's continues to have strong links with Trinity St Mary's with input to assemblies, religious education lessons and visits to the church. Your church governors are Janet Jones, Sarah McDermott, Robert Stevenson, Diane Holmes and Penny Holloway. We are currently in the process of filling two vacancies for church governors.

We look forward to the next year when we will have a new headteacher and a new vicar to work well together for school, church and community.
