Victoria's Statewide 700 Mile Race Coongoola 9th of October 2009 By Dr. Colin Walker

This years Victorian Statewide 700 mile race was conducted on Friday the 9th of October. For those not familiar with the race, it is conducted most years and is open to any flier in Victoria whose loft is more than 500 miles from the release point. This year, with the Victorian federations flying the north line, the race was from Coongoola in southern Queensland. Birds were entered from lofts in Shepparton which is about 580 miles from Coongoola right through to Geelong and Pakenham which are about 740 miles from Coongoola. The race is designed to stimulate interest in long distance racing.

As most fliers would be aware, the largest Victorian feds are based in Melbourne. Because of Melbourne's geographical location on the coast the lines of flight are NW, N and NE. With the prevailing winds into Melbourne being principally north and west this means that we get a lot of high velocity races. At times fliers become frustrated by the large number of wind biased, high velocity, 'blow home' type races where the winning birds are pushed into a particular area. Disappointingly many fanciers breed mainly from the winners of these sort of races which means that with time these are the only sort of races in which they can be competitive. Typically, in an average season 1/3 of Victorian fliers do not race competitively or do not race at all past our 350 mile produce which is only 7 federation races into our 18 federation race program.

Long distance racing identifies the birds that have the stamina, navigational ability, intelligence and genes to home and win even when the going is a bit tough. It also identifies the fanciers who have the ability to develop real fitness and motivation in their birds. It also takes away the 'luck component' determined by loft location, wind direction and 'mob' entries. I believe the identification of the birds able to return and win under these circumstances is vital so that their genes can be used to improve racing generally. Their pedigree is not just a stud or breed name but is based on performance and written in the basket and sky.

This year 45 fliers sent 189 birds. Entry numbers were significantly down on earlier years where the races lowest entry in previous years had been 500 birds. Birds were basketed on Tuesday the 6th of October at the VHA headquarters at Notting Hill, the VHA centre at Diamond Valley, at the WPF headquarters in Sunshine and in Shepparton. Birds from Geelong were transported to the WPF rooms. The birds at Shepparton were collected on the way north by the convoyer on Wednesday morning. Our convoyer this year was one of our veterinary clinic's nurses, Marcia McDonald and her sister, Rae. Wednesday night was spent in Cobar. The birds reached Coongoola early Thursday afternoon. The Australian Pigeon Company had bought a 2000 bird unit specifically for the race and so the birds had plenty of room. Melbourne water was taken and the birds were fed a race mix supplied by Ian Mckay. Marcia is very experienced with pigeons. Frequent stops were made for watering and in addition to trays on the outside of the unit, trays were passed into the tiers to ensure that all birds could eat and drink freely.

Friday morning was a beautiful morning at Coongoola. Clear blue skies, about 25C and no wind. The birds were released at 7.50am, about 15 minutes after the sun had fully cleared the horizon. When I spoke to Marcia after the release she stated that sometimes when she tosses my birds they seem to go round and round before leaving but she explained that these birds had simply gained height very quickly to the point where the sun could just be seen catching their wings and that they were out of sight on the line of flight in under 1 minute. She had time for one photograph.

For the long distance pigeon fancier the uncertainty of the outcome is one of the most intriguing aspects of long distance racing. Each year you breed pigeons that should have the ability to do the job but you never know until these particular birds are put to the test if they are truly capable. Also, in a short distance race, you know pigeons will come, it's really just a matter of when. With long distance racing the hope is that with each passing minute the birds will be heading closer but with them coming from so far, is almost seems like a mini-miracle when one finally sights the folded outline of the returning bird diving for it's loft. I have spoken to fanciers who have been racing for 50 years, minutes after clocking a bird from 700 miles and they have the excitement in their voice of a teenager who has just clocked a bird in his very first race.

The returning convoyer reached Cobar after driving 300 miles from Coongoola at 2pm, which is probably about the same time as the birds and reported a very slight easterly drift, no rain and temperatures in the mid 20s. Through the balance of Friday and Saturday morning the weather remained basically the same but with the easterly wind very slightly increasing. Based on the weather conditions it was thought that the birds would arrive around midday on Saturday. Sure enough, this years winner was clocked by Greg Edwards at 11.50am in Croydon, a north eastern suburb of Melbourne. This was Greg's only entry and is a direct daughter of his Greater Melbourne federation 600 mile fed winner. I remember Greg's remark on basketing night when people commented that he was only sending one bird. He said 'I knew which one to send'. Following this, 5 birds were clocked in Geelong and Werribee (in Melbourne's west) fairly quickly over a half hour period from 12.45pm to 1.15pm. Interestingly 3 of these birds were only separated by 1.5mpm and must have flown side by side for the whole 700 miles. Greg's bird put up an exceptional performance and must have had the confidence to break very early to beat these birds. Throughout the day approximately 40 of the 189 birds were reported home. Of note, long distance guru, Godfrey Stevens, reported 7 of his 11 entries home with the first 4 being in the top 15. Dean Collins of Geelong, a previous winner of the event, clocked an exceptional bird. His RCC was second overall and the only cock in the first 20 birds home. He reports that it is a Goodger/Smeulders cross. Dean said that the bird still looked pretty fresh on arrival and stated that this was probably because it wasn't such a hard race with the bird only flying for 18 hours! It is interesting to note that several of the Geelong birds were actually flying over 730 miles with the birds flying the longest distance in race time belonging to G Matthews of Geelong with his bird flying 740 Miles.

Overall everyone was very happy with the race. A total of \$1463 was paid in prize money with the race costing \$1787 to conduct. As always the Australian Pigeon Company donated \$500 to the race.
