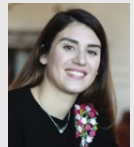

FHEQ signifies the framework for higher education qualifications in England, Wales and Northern Ireland. Undergraduate years are FHEQ Levels 4–6. Postgraduate study at Master's level is FHEQ Level 7.

Other study pathways

If you want to find out what it's like to be a student here, why not try a short or online course? It's a great way to gain an understanding of what it feels like to be a student at ICE. Many of our students start with a short course and go on to study award-bearing courses with us.

Short courses

Alongside our award-bearing programmes, we run a number of short courses, many of which take place at our headquarters, Madingley Hall. Come for a day, for a weekend, or regular weekly classes. Most courses require no background knowledge, just an interest in the subject area. Our short courses are taught by leading academics in small, informal groups. It is possible to stay at Madingley Hall during your short course study.

Online courses

If you want flexibility, or are not within easy reach of Madingley, why not try one of ICE's Online courses? These allow you to study at any time, wherever you are in the world. You will receive personal feedback on your work from an expert tutor, and join a growing community of online learners in our Virtual Learning Environment (VLE).



International Summer Programmes

Local, national and International students attend our open-access programmes on a residential, or non-residential basis. Some people stay for all six weeks, others just for one or two. It's possible to attend a weekend course just before, or after a number of Summer Programmes, as teaching takes place on weekdays. Programmes include Literature, Creative Writing, Shakespeare and the Renaissance, Art and Visual Culture, Ancient and Classical Worlds, History, Medieval Studies, Science, Business and Entrepreneurship and Interdisciplinary Studies.

This certificate course is based on, and updates, W. G. Hoskins' iconic – and poetic – book, *The Making of the English Landscape*, published in 1955, revised and annotated, but still in print. It uses the evidence of the landscape itself together with maps and documents, archaeological and ecological evidence as well as that of churches and secular buildings to trace long-term continuities and changes in the making of the rural English landscape from prehistory into the nineteenth century.

The Undergraduate Certificate in Local History: Evaluating the Past through British Local History begins with an introduction to local history, in order to provide you with some of the key skills and concepts used by local historians, and continues with units on communities in early modern England and religion during the First World War.

This Certificate course addresses the hotly-debated question of continuity (or lack of continuity) between Romano-British and Anglo-Saxon culture, the emergence and character of the Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, and the expression of these changes in archaeology, art and architecture. It explores the impact of the Vikings on established Anglo-Saxon culture and it discusses the expression of cultural innovation in archaeological evidence, secular and religious buildings, and

in the art of the period. Key contextualising debates will be those around the changing character of Anglo-Saxon society, the role of migration and conquest in cultural dynamics, the development of political and religious institutions, and the shifting balance between subsistence and market economies.

The new Postgraduate Certificate in Britain and the Holocaust is the only course of its type in the country. Taught in a series of three-day teaching blocks over three terms, the course explores the multiple ways in which the rise of Nazism and the Holocaust touched Britain, both before, during and long after WWII. The first term examines the refugee crisis of the 1930s, as those fleeing Nazism sought refuge in Britain, only to face antisemitism and rising fascism in the UK too. In the second term students will learn about the impact of the Holocaust and Nazi persecution in the Channel Islands, the only part of the British Isles to be occupied. The third term explores the legacy of the Holocaust since 1945 in the realms of heritage, literature, culture, education and film.

What is knowledge? How does it differ from mere belief, or a lucky guess? Do we have minds? Can thoughts and sensations be identified with states of the brain? How should human beings be treated? This Certificate course will help you to find answers to these and other questions. You will engage with some key debates in the history of philosophy, as well as in contemporary discussions in the philosophy of mind, and you will be given the opportunity to reflect on the current socio-political trends whilst examining the pivotal developments in modern social and political philosophy.

Darwin's theory of evolution by natural selection changed the way that we view the world and our own position in it. Over one hundred and fifty years later it is still the very foundation of modern biology; a Rosetta Stone by which the morphological and behavioural characteristics of organisms can be interpreted. 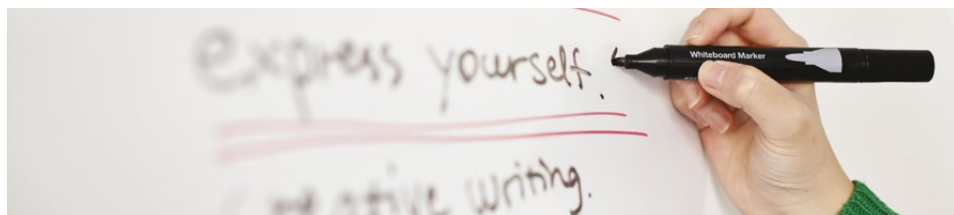

The Diploma in English Literature will provide the chance to look at the adaptation of literary works into films and other forms, Medieval literature, and 17th-century poetry and prose whose moral and religious themes characterise much writing of the period.
