## FIVE PAST TEN


Private Thomas [Tommo] Peaceful is a young soldier in the trenches during the First World War. The novel opens with these words:

They've gone now and I'm alone at last. I have the whole night ahead of me and I won't waste a single minute of it. I shan't sleep it away. I won't dream it away either. I mustn't, because every moment will be too precious.

I want to try to remember everything, just as it was, just as it happened. I've had nearly eighteen years of yesterdays and tomorrows and tonight I want to remember as many of them as I can. I want tonight to be long, as long as my life, not filled with fleeting dreams that rush me on towards dawn. Tonight, more than any other night of my life, I want to feel alive.

The book opens with a chapter that asks you to do a lot of **speculation** (guessing). Make some intelligent guesses and answer the following questions:-

- 1. Why do you think the chapter opens with the time 10.05?
- 2. Who do you think the "They" might be?
- 3. Why do you think Tommo wants "tonight to be long"?



## **Structure of the Novel**

The novel is organised with 2 story lines going on. One (with the time given in detail) tells us what is happening in the **PRESENT**, the other tells us of Tommo's **PAST**, his childhood, growing up, joining up, the events that lead up to where he is at present, a soldier in WW1.

What can you remember about your past, your **first day at school?** Fill in the table to jog your memory, then write 2-3 paragraphs about that first day, giving as much detail as possible.



## FIRST DAYS AT SCHOOL

Charlie is taking me by the hand, leading me because he knows I don't want to go. I've never worn a collar before and it's choking me. My boots are strange and heavy on my feet. Charlie has told me how terrible this school-place is: about Mr Munnings and his terrible tempers and the long

whipping cane he hangs above his desk.

A new boy to add to my **trials** and **tribulations**. Was not one Peaceful enough? What have I done to deserve another one? First a Charlie Peaceful and now a Thomas Peaceful. Is there no end to my **woes**? Understand this, Thomas Peaceful, that here I am your lord and master. You do what I say when I say it. You do not cheat, you do not lie, you do not **blaspheme**. You do not come to school in bare feet. Your hands will be clean. These are my **commandments**.

- 4. Look up and write down the meaning of these words used by Mr Munnings: **trials tribulations woes blaspheme commandments**
- 5. Tommo went to a village school in Devon. Schools were very different in the early 1900s. **Work with a partner or on your own.** From the information on page 3 write down any differences between schools in the 1900s and schools today.
