The Challenge is about helping to feed our vulnerable children in Kenya. We hope you will have fun doing it through challenges and projects reflecting the vibrancy and beat of Africa.

We hope the challenge represents what we want for our children; has freedom, opportunity and challenge. There is no set number of activities - all we are asking is for you to think outside the box, challenge your boldness and think beyond your boundaries, whilst raising a few pennies to support our amazing students who attend Brainhouse Academy.

The school, which Akamba Children's Education Fund (ACEF) supports, is found in Mathare North - one of the world's largest slums, just outside Nairobi in Kenya. Raising just £1.25 will feed a child for a whole week. It is that easy to help a child facing hardships, which we find difficult to imagine. As we are a volunteer led charity, we can keep our costs to an absolute minimum, so you know your money goes to a child and really makes a difference.

The Activities

We want to share the creativity, innovation and rhythm of Africa. Too often the image of Africa is of poverty but is so much more; a tapestry of energy, vibrancy, excitement, a hullabaloo of noise and colour - it is such an exciting and challenging place to be and we hope to capture this in some of the art, music and food challenges we present.

In researching and designing the activities we thought it would be wonderful to be able to showcase the creativity and out of the box thinking at a celebration event - where you could use your entrepreneurial skills to raise additional money to support our young people or even other young people who need your help.



Chapter one - Thinking beyond your boundaries

In Africa kids and adults are incredible at creating something new out of something old - they do it without even thinking, particularly with their art and music. In Africa tins are turned into beautiful finger pianos, shoes made from car tyres, bowls made from the inside of telephone cables, toys made from bits of wire and rubber. Can you do the same? Can you create something new out of something you might throw away?

- Create an art masterpiece out of everyday objects and waste products look at the stuff you normally throw out and decide how you could create a sculpture, a huge flower, a 3D picture, a piece of art for the garden, a plant pot from tin. - Make new paper from old, add flower petals, glitter, food colouring to jazz it up and then

- Depict Africa through a mosaic of paper, pictures, beans, leaves, flowers and grasses.
