e are very proud of Deputy Head Girl and Student Senior Leadership
Team member Holly, who, with her horse Gita V-D Neyn, has progressed
to being in the top 25 British show jumpers in the Bronze League
category.

In this highly competitive category, jumps can be up to 1.3 metres in height and league points are awarded for every placing, with extra points given for every clear round. Competitions are held all year round — indoors in winter and outdoors at other times.

Gita was bred in Belgium and although they have only been together for one year, she and Holly are now amongst the country's top 25 in the Bronze League Championship class. Holly and Gita have competed all around the country, quite often against as many as 190 other riders and horses.

Holly has been horse-riding for most of her life and her current ambition is to compete in the next European Show Jumping Championships. Good luck to you both – you are proving to be a formidable team!


Students investigated the causes of racism and what behaviour and language is and is not acceptable in today's multi-cultural society.

Theme days cover major religions and self esteem

There they learnt more about two major religions by visiting the Princes Road Synagogue and the Liverpool Mosque and Islamic Institute in Allerton. They then took part in question and answer sessions before travelling to the International Slavery Museum at the Albert Dock.

The aim of the trip, organised by Subject Leader of RE Mrs Close, was to give students an understanding of their local area, taking in the rich religious diversity of Liverpool and its historical and geographical importance.

On the second theme day students took part in a PSHE workshop organised by Deputy Headteacher Mrs Fraser and Miss Eastwood, Assistant Headteacher (Student Services). Students looked at self-image, studying in groups the pressures placed on young people - through advertising for example - to conform and to look perfect in their appearance. They defined the 'perfect' look and through their discussions quickly realised that such a look is synthetic.

The girls were encouraged to believe in themselves and to celebrate that we are all unique.

The day ended with students filming brief clips recording how, by avoiding the trap of low self-esteem, their positive aspirations will mould their future success. Our Prenton TV team will edit the clips to use in a short film for students to view as a reminder of the day. The film is inspired by the Sport England film 'This Girl Can!'.

Her film's powerful message, entitled 'Too Late', is aimed at teenagers and tracks the ultimately tragic consequences of cyber and social media bullying.





Mathematicians equal to the challenge

he aim of the charity UK Maths Trust (UKMT) is to advance the education of young people in Mathematics. Each year they organise national competitions for students aged 11 to 18 across the UK.

Continuing with the theme, they then made some "instant ice cream" using Mr Morrish's special - and very




popular - recipe, using ice and salt to freeze it over a period of 30 minutes.
