# Celebrations and remembrance





North East charity Walk of Life has enjoyed a busy few months of activities that recently culminated in a spectacular remembrance event celebrating 100 years since the end of World War 1.

The North Tyneside charity - sponsored and supported by Helping Hands - held a wartime themed remembrance party for local disabled, vulnerable and elderly people.

Lending a helping hand were volunteers from the British Legion along with staff from Helping Hands. Everyone got into the spirit of the occasion and dressed in vintage clothing.

The community hub – also known as the 'Vets Hut' - was decked out in patriotic bunting with hand-made poppies decorating the entrance and garden.

Managed by Sylvia McBrien, a former team manager at Helping Hands, the Walk of Life charity, set up in Holywell in 2012, works at grass roots level to support vulnerable and elderly people and those suffering from social isolation. The charity manages an allotment garden and community hub, running activities and encouraging people to meet friends and go on outings.

During the recent remembrance event, Scott Arries, one of our specialist care and support officers, handed a cheque to Sylvia for £380, which he raised after a sponsored Kielder

Marathon in October. Sylvia said:

"It was a lovely day with people really enjoying the vintage teas, cakes, singing and all the volunteers dressed in period costume. It was especially nice to receive the donation from Scott and all the ongoing support from Helping Hands."

Money raised and donated helps the charity buy plants and materials for the allotment and organise more activities along with coach trips to locations further afield.

Huntington's disease is an illness caused by a faulty gene in your DNA and affects the body's nervous system - the network of nerve tissues in the brain and spinal cord that co-ordinate your body's activities.

#### Treasure in **Seahouses**

The dedication of our carers means many service users get to enjoy and experience things they wouldn't often be able to do on their own.

Carer Joe Kelly enabled his client Christian Steward to experience his first ever 'Geocaching' exercise while in Seahouses.
