### 10 Top Tips - Dairy Showing from Nicky Lockyer

### **Early Halter Training**

1.

It is really important that by the time it gets to the Show, your animal knows what to expect, and leads well on the halter. It makes such a huge difference to the appearance of your animal if it walks well and shows itself off. It's never too early to start, and calves will never ever forget. I would suggest training as soon as you have picked your animal; it's much easier when they are smaller!

Start by just tying the calf up to a gate, and stay with it to keep it calm. It may throw itself around but it will soon learn that it can't get away. Don't expect it to walk straight away, just make friends with it, it will soon be following you around like a dream! Don't forget to practice with the leather halter a few times before show day!

### **Clipping**

**5**.

Everyone looks better after a hair cut! Try to clip with someone nearby to help you just in case your calf is naughty. On a dairy calf you clip all the hair off. The most important thing to remember when clipping is that you are trying to make the animal look its best, so there are a few little things you can do to use the hair to hide any small faults the animal may have. If you leave the hair on the animals' topline (backbone) then you can clip it to make it look straighter and hide any weak points.

With a calf/bulling heifer, you can leave the hair on the belly, to make it appear deeper in the body. On a milking heifer, try to clip the udder with the tightest blades you can, as this makes its veins stand out and draws attention to the most important part!

### **Last Minute Prep**

9.

There are certain things you can't do until it's nearly show time! Stand your animal up about 10 minutes before your class is going to start so that you can get her ready. Brush any dust off and put the leather halter on. Brush out and back comb her tail and wipe any snot from her nose! She needs to be as clean as possible, make her catch the judges eye as soon as she walks in.

### **Practice Judging**

2.

It may seem a bit silly, but get someone to act as the judge when you are practicing leading the calf. You want your calf to look its best at all times, so when it is in the ring, make sure you keep its head up high, and walk it slowly. It's easiest to walk backwards when showing your calf so that you can keep an eye on what it looks like as well as on the judge.

When the judge asks you to stop, always make sure the back leg furthest away from you is further back, this makes the calf appear longer. On a milking cow, the back legs should be the opposite way, with the leg closest to the judge over the udder. Get your practice judge to approach the animal to inspect it and feel its skin, this is one part many animals aren't used to therefore jump at in the ring.

### **Check your Show Kit**

6.

Make sure you check you have everything you need for showing well in advance, because you can't pick everything up at Mole Valley! Leather halters and special sprays need to be ordered from specialist show suppliers, so stock up early!

If you are just getting started and don't want to splash out on new clippers/sprays/halters then you can always ask someone who shows more frequently. Usually they won't mind giving you a helping hand if it encourages you to get your cattle in the show ring!



### **Enjoy** it

10.

By this time you will have put in a lot of hours of work into getting your animal into that ring, make sure you enjoy showing all your hard work off to people!! Smile and try to relax as your animal will sense your nerves! There's no point pretending that showing is easy, but it is so rewarding and the preparation makes a huge difference, so your hard work will be well worth it!

### **Bath Time**

3.

Your calf will need a few baths before the show, its best to get it used to being washed and the more often you bath it the better its coat will be when you clip it. You can use an animal shampoo (or just fairy liquid) just make sure that all the soap is rinsed out of the animal at the end. It's really important not to get water in the calves' ears, as this can make its ears droopy which doesn't look as good on show day.

Your calf will want a good wash before clipping and an even better wash on the morning of the show. Just remember to do it in plenty of time as they can take a little while to dry.

### The Day Before

Give your animal a good wash the day before the show, and make sure there is plenty of food constantly available. If you are showing a milking animal it's important to think about how much milk you want to show your animal with. She is likely to look better with a little more milk in her udder than normal, so work back from the time you think your class will be, work out how many hours milk she needs, then you have your milking time.

Don't forget to pack lots of food for your animal for as soon as she gets to the show she needs to be full right up!

### **Analyse your Animal**

4.

Although you will have tried to pick the perfect animal, by now, you may have found a point or two about the animal that could be better. Stand back and look at your animal; let someone else lead it while you take time to think about where it could be improved. You as a handler can try to cover up these faults to a certain extent and it's much easier if you know where your animals' strengths and weaknesses are.

For example, if its locomotion isn't the best, try walking it slower to disguise it. Or, if she arches her back (common when calves are growing) when you stop her, pinch her backbone slightly to make her stand better. If she lacks strength in the front end, make sure she doesn't stand with her front feet too close. If she has lots of loose skin under her chin, hold it up to make her neck appear more feminine.

### **Arrive on Time**

8.

Showing is hard work; don't make it harder by being in a rush on Show morning! Allow plenty of time to get there in likely heavy traffic. Your animal will probably get quite dirty whilst travelling so you need to wash her as soon as you arrive and allow time for her to dry properly before her class. The earlier you can get there the better as you want her to settle into her new environment before her class.



#### **Weekend Self Defence Class**

#### What is the course about?

It is an intuitive self defence system that uses the bodies natural reactions in a positive way. During the session we spend time talking about fear management as well as the biology and psychology behind self defence. Most people find it very interesting to look at things from a different point of view. We then go into the drills and scenarios to make people safer.

#### How long does the class last?

I normally run the session as a 4 hour seminar. It is about an hour of theory and discussion then 3 hours of training in the skills. The system, called Personal Defence Readiness, is world renowned and is the only 'commercial' system to be to be taught to the UK police forces.

#### When can you do the class?

I can run one on Saturday or Sunday; all we would need is a church/ village hall or similar. I bring everything else.

#### How many people can go and what is the cost?

It would largely depend on the size of the venue but I would say 20 per group would be a good size. The 'Group' fixed fee is  $\mathfrak{L}250$  per session; additional to this there would be a small fee to cover mileage. Contact the YFC Office for more information.
