Running for Rémi

I'm running the London marathon on 22 April 2018 to remember our son, Rémi (13), who died suddenly in December 2016 from heart failure. Both myself, Catrin (Rémi's mum) and his two sisters, Sian (now 16) and Cerys (now 11) were with him when he died. I'm also raising money for The Rainbow Centre, a local

Bristol charity, that supports bereaved children and their families.

Rémi was an active, fun-loving boy who lived all his life in Bishopston. We had moved to Bristol from London as a family of three in 2003, and later that year Rémi arrived, an active riot of noise and energy. A people person from the start, Rémi loved company, family, films, gaming, reading and so much more. He attended Bishop Road Primary School and Redland Green Secondary school, and played for Bishopston United football team. Over the years we spent a lot of time on Gloucester Road as a family - coffees and Orangina in the old Spice Route café, frequent visits to Totally Toys. the Green Room in later years for haircuts, regulars at Cheltenham Road library and the Amnesty book shop (Rém was a voracious reader) and the occasional lime and soda at The Flver.

Rémi's death was completely unexpected and the unimaginable trauma continues to profoundly affect us. Our house is quieter now. There is no shouting and whooping from the shared Minecraft games played with friends in various bedrooms across Bishopston, and we get through less Weetabix and

honey. There is a Rémishaped hole, never to be filled. As we journey through the changed landscape of our family life we have received love and support by the bucket load from family, friends and the local community. We are grateful to them all.

Death and bereavement are not something I had a lot



think they get talked about much. Now I find myself wanting to

talk about them all the time, wanting to say Rémi's name to anyone who'll listen. To tell his story, and with it my own.

Rémi watched me run the London marathon several times, and this April when I take part in the event again, I will be running remembering him, wearing a vest with his name and picture on it, and with him in my heart and my soul. I will also be running to raise money for The Rainbow Centre, just off Wells Road. It is somewhere which supports bereaved children and their families. They have provided us, particularly the girls, with uncomplicated care, kindness and specialist support. They are a small local charity which we are very grateful to be able to access. They provide a range of services, particularly for children, who need support, love, care and understanding to move forward in life, alongside grief.



Clifton High School deliver Masterclasses on the Move

As part of the British Heart Foundation's national Call Push Rescue training scheme 'Nation of Lifesavers', Clifton High School recently delivered a CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) workshop at a local primary school as part of its 'Masterclasses on the Move' initiative, with the aim of teaching young people vital lifesaving skills. The Heart Foundation's scheme aims to increase awareness about cardiac arrests, CPR and defibrillators and to provide better access to CPR training.

Clifton High staff, along with several sixth form students working toward their Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award, delivered the CPR Masterclass to fourteen Year 6 children, who learnt when and how to act if ever they come across someone who has collapsed, using stateof-the-art CPR training equipment. Children learnt how to check for breathing, perform CPR, place someone into a safe airway position and how to use an automated external defibrillator. The young





pupils were engaged throughout the Masterclass and demonstrated excellent maturity and calm under pressure.

CPR is just one of the workshops offered by Clifton High as part of its Masterclasses provision: its colourful and bespoke Masterclass Bus is now a familiar sight in the area, delivering complimentary and tailor-made workshops to local junior schools and groups. Alongside workshops such as eye dissection, camp craft and WWII experiences for junior-aged children, this spring the School is delighted to be able to offer musical workshops to a younger audience, delivered by its EYFS specialists.

HOW COULD TECHNOLOGY HELP US STAY HEALTHY AT HOME?



Healthcare is changing and more conditions need to be managed outside hospital. SPHERE is working with homes across Bristol to explore this challenge and test an exciting new solution.

SPHERE sensors are placed in the home to create a picture of how we live – from eating and sleeping to how active we are. Other sensors will measure room humidity, temperature and energy use.

This information will help clinicians and researchers improve healthcare at home in the future - by spotting early warning signs of medical issues such as strokes and predicting falls.

It could also help manage other conditions including obesity, depression, diabetes and asthma.

100 homes in Bristol can trial the technology.

News from the Ardagh Community Trust

Ardagh Community Trust held a successful, new membership scheme launch and Project Ardagh update at the Café on the Common on Saturday 3 February, which was attended by around 120 local residents and supporters - despite the terrible weather! Thank you very much to all who came along and supported the event.

ACT Trustees were on hand to talk to attendees about the membership scheme, which has been designed to ensure that the local community are able to both support, and influence the work of the charity as it develops in the future.

ACT invites all local people who support ACT's aims to join as a member and help ACT to develop and expand the opportunities available for local people to meet, share and participate in community, sports and leisure activities at the Ardagh. Full information and an application form are available on the website at www.theardagh.com. Membership forms will also be available from the Café on the Common when it reopens on 23 March. ACT continues to recruit local volunteers and are keen to hear from anyone who is interested in becoming a Trustee of the charity and/ or volunteering to support the wide range of projects and activities that are already taking place at the Ardagh.



In addition to the launch of the membership scheme. there was also a presentation of plans for the new year-round community hub and café project, which were enthusiastically received, and ACT staff, Trustees and volunteers were able to update those attending with the latest news and progress for the project. There were lots of questions about plans for the community-hub, regeneration of the sports courts (to enable wider community use and provide informal play and sports facilities for people of all ages) and opportunities for local people to get involved in and support the project through volunteering and donating funding to help the project to completion.

The headlines are that planning permission for the new community hub has been secured, funding is in place (although there is still some way to go - please see below for the fundraiser launch info) and negotiations with Bristol City Council for the Community Asset Transfer lease are progressing well. If all goes to schedule, ACT hopes that the capital project will begin on site in April 2018, with the new facility opening in Autumn 2018 - so providing a seamless move for the café indoors so that it is able to stay open through Autumn and Winter 2018. Next month's BM will include detailed plans for the project, and describe the new facilities and future use of the Ardagh site, which include improvements to meet minimum accessibility legislation so that it is fully accessible to all members of our community.

ACT has done incredibly well to secure more than £300,000 in funding from a range of sources to enable Project Ardagh to go ahead. The team needs to raise a further £20,000 to ensure that the project is able to proceed as planned in April. ACT will be running a range of community fundraising activities over the next few months (keep an eye on BM for full info!) but if you are able to make a donation now to support the project team - every pound will make a difference! "The change we have seen in Jacob has been huge! He is so much more confident going into new situations and I am sure this is because of Little Foxes Forest School," Hannah, local mum.

News from Friends of Horfield Common

Horfield Common Litter Pick took place on Saturday 10 March 2018, as part of the National 'Spring Clean' campaign.

Thank you to all of the brilliant volunteers (not all pictured!) who came along to the first 2018 litter pick and helped us to clear 16 full bags of rubbish from the common - helping to keep it clean and safe for enjoyment by people and wildlife. We will be organising more events through the year, and hope that the amount of litter will reduce each time. It is horrible to see litter across the park, as well as causing a hazard in some cases. We are lucky to

have a small, dedicated team who pick up litter daily on individual walks around the park, so the problem is kept under control, but this recent team effort has made a huge difference to removing the debris that has built up in hedgerows, water courses and corners of the park over the winter months.

Please keep an eye open for next dates and come and lend a hand - it is so satisfying to see the common looking so lovely and clean; this will also hopefully inspire other park users to think twice before littering in future.

FoHC are celebrating the completion of two long-term projects which volunteers have been working hard on over the last 2-3 years!

Horfield Common Accessible Footpath

We were thrilled to see the speed at which the new accessible footpath was installed once the work started and we have received dozens of emails from park users thanking FoHC volunteers for their work

to fundraise to aet this muchrequested path installed.

The requests were for three main reasons - to enable all to walk a circuit of the common without needing to go too near to Kellaway Avenue: to enable people with limited mobility to be able to access the common



during the winter; and to enable the hundreds of people who walk across the common every day to access the shops and bus services that run from Kellaway Avenue to use this route year-round.

FoHC Volunteers submitted a funding application to the Bags of Help scheme which was shortlisted and put to the public vote at Tesco Golden Hill in late 2016. Thank you very much to all who used their tokens to vote for our new pathway!

While the grassed areas around the path will take time to re-establish fully, this is being carefully monitored and will be reseeded if necessary later in the year.

FoHC Volunteers 'Garden Room'

The Friends Volunteers Garden Room installation was completed in February and is available for use in the Café yard at the Ardagh. This space replaces the previous container-space, which was refurbished by FoHC volunteers in 2015 to provide an indoor meeting space and place where volunteers could meet, share ideas and shelter from the rain on the rare (!) occasions that we experience it!

It has been fantastic to see the space being installed and we are looking forward to hosting FoHC meetings in this lovely, light and fully accessible garden room throughout 2018.

in the **family** way

When our second baby arrived, Freddie fed well, was a good colour and was bright in himself. He did however have spells in the day and particularly at night, of laboured, noisy breathing. The midwives referred us to the Children's A&E at the BRI. We received great treatment there but the cause of the breathing problems was inconclusive - something he should grow out of. The doctor reassured us if Freddie was suffering with any serious heart or lung conditions, the laboured breathing would be all the time and not intermittent. This was indeed good news but not any help when you are fraught with worry when your precious bundle is struggling with breathing in the middle of the night.


Freddie was born very quickly and as a result was mucousy for several days. Right from the start I felt the speed of his birth, being forced out guickly was key to his breathing issues, and I had every confidence that Juliana and her skilled team at the Family Practice would be able to resolve this problem. My confidence was born out of the positive and effective treatment of our first child Henry, who was the opposite to his brother and took 32 hours to eventually arrive with the aid of ventouse. Henry's head was positioned awkwardly during the birth and as a result he was only happy feeding from me on one side. After a couple of cranial-sacral sessions at the Family Practice, he was a different baby.

On examining Freddie, they found he had incredibly tight muscles at the back of his neck (due to the pressure of arriving so quickly) and a tight rib cage (due to not taking a big first breath and needing some encouragement to do this). Juliana and Nina gently worked on him and sent me away with some simple exercises to do with him each day. I returned a week later with a much happier baby and they were delighted with how well he now felt. As I write this. Freddie is 6 weeks old and has not suffered with laboured breathing since his cranial-sacral sessions, and is even sleeping better at night every parent's dream!

Prevention is better than cure

Both Freddie and Henry's problems were typical of those that the practice sees, frequently linked with the impact of birth on the baby. While observing as they worked on Freddie, Family Practice owner, Juliana, explained they were slowly starting to change the way they approached mother and baby's health. Herself and colleague Niamh were currently taking a 2-year women's health diploma that has revolutionised the way they feel about their work in the treatment

Juliana explained. "We would like to encourage women to come in for a session with one of our specialist practitioners when they are thinking about trying to conceive. We will then assess how prepared their bodies are for birth. Key



Until they are at a time when they are treating women pre-birth, the practice is now giving joint sessions to mothers and their babies. Juliana told me, "It cannot be underestimated how the physical and mental health of a new mother impacts on the health and wellbeing of their baby. Mums will always find the time and money to do whatever is best for their little ones but push their own needs to one side. It is essential women take the time to ensure they are fit and well too so they are best equipped to care for their family." This rings true with myself and knowing how exhausting life is with a new baby and keeping the rest of the family going. I urge all fellow women in my position to make the time for themselves. I can assure you that, yourself and precious bundle will be in the best skilful and compassionate hands at the Family Practice.

Walking to heel in Bishopston



Whether you are out and about with your loval companion or taking your first steps with a new puppy, it can be difficult to know what collars and leads will best suit you and your dog. Not just as a fashion accessory but in a practical sense too. Are you training a young dog? Going for a walk in the

countryside? Or walking to the shops?

This article is a guick run through of things to consider when choosing collars, leads and harnesses for your dog.

Collars are important for emergency situations when you need to catch hold of your dog quickly. Dogs can be sensitive to people touching their collar and so make sure they have a positive association with you going to reach for it. By law, see Control of Dogs Order 1992; every dog out on the highway should wear a collar and ID on it. Be careful that the collar doesn't get caught on a fence or when playing with another dog.

Leads are mainly for safety but are also a legal requirement. If your dog is not on a lead on a public highway you could receive a fixed penalty fine. It is also a good idea to check the rules for your local park or dog walking area. Different leads give varying levels of control to the owner. The retractable leads can be good for giving your dog a bit more freedom but can send mixed messages and produce a nasty burn if tangled. Long lines are good for training whereas stretch leads can help with dogs that pull.

Harnesses are particularly good for brachycephalic breeds, such as pugs, and small dogs, such as Yorkshire terriers, because they do not restrict the airway in the same way as a collar. Also, for dogs who have had neck or eye surgery. It is important to choose a non-restrictive harness which leaves the entire front leg free to move and therefore will not cause movement problems. It should fit snugly but without causing friction or excessive pressure. A harness is less suitable for directional control.



Coats are great in the wintertime especially for dogs with shorter fur and thin skin, such as whippets. The light reflective designs are perfect for when it is dark.

Back in September 2017, we reported on the latest project by St Andrews-based photographer and long-time North Bristol Artist (NBA), Paul Bullivant, who is aiming to photograph in portrait style all of the (now more than 100) NBA members. After nearly 18 months, he has met over one-third of his target, photographing his fellow artists at home, in their studios, in their gardens and sometimes on their street.

Here we focus on three of Paul's subjects, founder members of the trail, Cath Read, Laura Cramer and Sarah Cowper, who all share enthusiasm for Paul's ambitious project.

For Laura the trail is an important way of keeping in touch with her clients and supporters:

"It is lovely to meet people who are interested in my work. It doesn't always result in an immediate sale, but helps me to stay in touch with them and spread the word more widely on upcoming events. It's all valuable and it's great to see the same faces coming through the door year in and year out."

Sarah and Cath met when they both put on a weekend house art exhibition in 1999. The following year they joined together and the third year its popularity increased to 8 artists opening up their homes. So, they decided to put an advert in St Bart's community newsletter and, with 20 artists getting in touch, the first trail with 7 venues was born. It's now almost 20 years that they have been sharing their homes with the public for the North Bristol Arts Trail. Now Cath, whose experience is in community arts, specifically the Bristol Playbus, sees an exciting future for the North Bristol Arts Trail, and with growing interest from younger artists they could lead to some surprising developments.



"For me the fact that it has become an established part of our community's annual calendar is great and I love the buzz on the streets during the Trail." Cath shared.

"The trail is a great way to promote local artists and crafts people of all ages working in a wide variety of mediums, and over the years has encouraged new members launching their careers as well as those more well-established artists. With now over 100 artists showing their work in around 40 venues over one weekend in November, the trail has helped us to place 'ART' very much in the heart of the community and on the cultural map of Bristol. Paul's portrait project forms a

unique record of this creative collective and is also another way of spreading the word about some of the many artists living and working in north Bristol."

When completed, Paul hopes to exhibit the portraits and possibly to self-publish another book to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the first North Bristol Arts Trail.



Community: The condition of sharing or having certain attitudes & interests in common = Window Wanderland 2018

It's without a doubt that Window Wanderland defines community rather well. The idea for Window Wanderland started while Lucy Reeves Khan, local resident, did short therapeutic night walks around her local streets to improve her mobility, and she

noticed seeing inside homes with the lights on and curtains open took her away from her pain. Sometimes it was as simple as noticing the fluffy cushions; sometimes it was imagining she knew these neighbours, as she had done where she grew up. Living in a city was far more anonymous but it was this curiosity/nosiness that took her out of herself so she asked her friends:

"What would you do if I asked you to put something in your window for a night for others to see?" And in 2015, Window Wanderland Bishopston lit up our windows for the first time.

Three years on with Window Wanderland thriving residentially in Bishopston, it seemed a natural progression to continue it along our much-loved Gloucester Road. Lucy met Anne-Louise Perez of Bristol's Independent District (managed by Gloucester Road Business Improvement District) for a coffee and the planning began. Recognising the challenge with small

businesses was their lack of time, this also presented the ideal opportunity to invite and engage with the local and wider community. GRBID was delighted with the positive response they had when they approached schools and community groups who were only too happy to volunteer their time to support their local shops.

"It was really heartening to see these groups and their ardent support for local businesses and their willingness to help and enable traders to take part in Window Wanderland 2018." Said the GRBID Team

Businesses along Glos Rd Central, such as Joe's Bakery, Lunar Optical and Room 212 were all pleased to both take part with a display and to sponsor the event. Boston Tea Party had a wonderful display thanks to the local group SENDaWELCOME (see page 49 for more details).

With this multitude of local schools and groups all volunteering their

time, they brought around 22 displays to the area!

On Window Wanderland Saturday, Gloucester Road and Bishopston were buzzing with people,



Create a Garden Design Strategy this Spring

As we head into spring, do you have plans for your garden but don't know where to begin when it comes to turning ideas into reality? Secret Garden are here to help.

In my experience, as the owner of the garden you are the most qualified person to do the design because you live with it. That is the key to a good design, to intimately know the garden. Are there particular problems? Like drainage, shade or nowhere to sit. Does the space suit your needs? All of our circumstances change. The arrival of children can completely transform a garden from sun a bathing haven into a mud bath!

Things to consider – After taking a realistic look at what we need from the garden, we can then begin to make plans. When it comes to structure, the key things to know are - Aspect in other words what direction does the garden face. Where and when do you get the sun? This will affect where seating, planting and play areas go. Movement – how do you move around the garden? This is important in both a practical and aesthetic sense. Paths can be laid out in a way that gets you from A to B while influencing how parts of the garden are viewed.

Aspect, movement and what we need from the garden are key to the design, they determine the way the garden is set out. Other important things to look at are: Does the style of the materials. plants and colours go with the architecture of your house? Are there any views you would like to hide or expose? Is the garden balanced? Sometimes a garden can have all the tall or heavy things on one side. A new garden can often be flat. It makes sense to create a height dynamic in the garden with structures like pergolas or maybe an investment in a semi mature tree. Planting is essential to a beautiful garden and really determines the level of future maintenance. If you don't know much about plants. then some research would be wise; the trick is to have the right plant in the right place. So often I see



a garden of blobs where large shrubs are cut to size losing their natural form and engulfing all the other plants. Sometimes it's best to go to a small garden centre and ask the staff's advice about the final size of a plant. The great thing about planting is that you can move things around and experiment; nothing is

BCR Community Partnership launch at February 2018 AGM

At the Bishopston, Cotham and Redland Community Partnership inaugural AGM, the constitution was approved and the new committee appointed. The group members are - Alison Bolton - Friends of Bishopston Library, Alison Bromilow - Redland & Cotham Amenities Society, Peter Browne -Gloucester Road Enterprise and Trade, Kevin Chidgey – Westbury Park Community Association. Roger Gimson - Sustainable Redland, Kevin Molloy - Bishopston Society and there is one individual partner, Sarah Nutchey.

Andy Stamp Neighbourhood Beat Manager for Redland A&S Police confirmed that the beat teams would be happy to attend future meetings to continue their engagement with the local community.

The Mayor had agreed to attend the forum meeting but at short notice pulled out. Cllr Nicola Beech. cabinet member for Strategic Planning and City Design, spoke about how the council is responding to the need to provide housing especially given the proposed university expansion of 25%. She introduced the Local Plan review consultation which will update Bristol's planning policy to take account of the Joint Spatial Plan which Bristol is working on with other West of England councils.

A number of people had attended to put questions to the mayor, and there was general disappointment that he had failed to explain his absence. Cllr Beech agreed to take back any questions and get responses. There was a request for information on how the council proposed to work with communities now Neighbourhood Partnerships were no longer being supported, how communities could influence decisions on local issues and how groups with funding for projects could bring them forward.

There was concern about the lack of openness in council matters, e.g. Cllr Negus, as chair of the scrutiny commission for libraries, had not

been allowed to see the brief for library closure options without a Freedom of Information request.



Bishopston, Cotham & Redland Community Partnership

An update as given on the North Bristol Baths - when the baths closed, there was an opportunity for development of building a car park and public toilets, new home for GP. flats and library to replace Cheltenham road library. The developer failed and there have been issues with the poor-quality workmanship. The council still owns the baths building which was to accommodate a GP practice, hydrotherapy pool and chemist, etc. The flats above the new library are finished and occupied and the Cheltenham road library site has been sold and is being developed. Cllrs Fi Hance and Martin Fodor have met up with the property department and have finally had an update: nothing has been done to complete conversion. The future of many council assets is in question; possibly the baths building will be sold as it is, or BCC may finish it or find alternative use. The property department is suggesting putting it on the market. Martin and Fi are still on the case.

Local History Matters

Churchways

BHA local history research -Copyright Denis Wright.

Joseph Leech (founder in 1839 of the Bristol Times) is probably best known for his feature articles on churches in the Bristol area. Leech visited Horfield in May 1845.

I don't know any place [he wrote] that in my recollection, has been so much improved, in fact, so completely metamorphosed as Horfield.

His admiration extended from the buildings to the priest and congregation:

a Church neatly kept, the services decently and devoutly performed, the school children taught and clothed, and all through the exertions and liberality of a permanent Curate of some £80 a year

Leech was also pleased to accept some of the churchwarden's 'home brewed and double Glo'ster' at three o'clock after a baptism.

Leech walked the two miles from Bristol to Horfield along the turnpike road and saw the church.

some way in, on an eminence to the left of the main road...from which you get a glimpse of the little tower and parsonage. The bells were ringing, and I sat for a while listening on the

little wooden stile that led from the road into the fields.

Leech's description is confirmed by the parish tithe survey (1841), which reveals a group of three fields having the same name (tithe nos. 100,101, 271 'Churchways'). They are linked by a footpath which is also called 'Churchways', leading from Horfield Downend to the parish church. This path is conserved by the modern street pattern: Downend Road. Strathmore Road and Churchways Avenue to the church. Why Mr Usher and/or his sub-tenant should repeatedly fail to mend a stile for a period of at least eight years is anybody's guess. Three detailed presentments (below) may provide clues, but all we know for sure is that the stile had been repaired by the time Leech sat on it in 1845.

In 1799, the said Jurors present that a Path or Churchway lying through a piece of Ground called Churchways being part of the Copyhold Estate belonging to Mr John Usher has been obstructed and stopped up and do order that the same be forthwith opened and a Path made and Stile put up in the place where the former stile stood.

In 1804, the said Jurors also present that the Stile Against the Turnpike Road leading through a certain Piece of Land called Churchways belonging to a Copyhold Estate of Mr Usher in the Occupation of Job Tovey is removed and as the same was Originally a Churchway the Bailiff is hereby required to give the said Mr Usher and his Tenant Job Tovey notice to Erect a stile where the Former one stood by the Twenty first day of December next.

In 1807, the Jurors aforesaid further present that the Field called Churchway thorough which a public way from Horfield Downend to the Parish Church for time immemorial is obstructed by removal of the stile against the Turnpike Road to the public Inconvenience And they therefore order Job Tovey the present occupier of the said field to replace the Stile and render the said Pathway passable and convenient by the 25th day of March next.



News from our Ashley, Bishopston & Redland Councillors

Ashley Ward News

As we have written about previously, a lot of the correspondence we have received from residents of St Andrews over the past two years has related to the myriad of parking and road safety-related issues in the area. Along with the councillors for Redland we are supporting a local residents' action group that has formed, and there was recently a meeting between the councillors and the Cabinet Member for Transport. Your MP Thangam Debbonaire is also aware of these concerns and has arranged a meeting to hear from residents about what they would like to see happen next, including whether a new residents' parking zone should be investigated. The meeting will be held at the King's Centre, 16-18 King Square, BS2 8AZ on Saturday 12 May, 11am -1pm. An online petition has also been set up by the residents' action group, which you can find at http:// bit.lv/2sAO8MG.

We share concerns that have been expressed by park users and the Friends of St Andrews Park regarding an 'invitation to tender' by the Council Parks Department for the park's Tea Garden, run by Fay Aldridge since 2006. A petition on this has received over 4,000 signatures and the issue was debated at the March meeting of Full Council. At the time of writing we do not know what the outcome of the process will be, but we hope that the Parks Department will listen to the voice of the local community in reaching their decision.

Over the past few months a number of councillors (including ourselves) have been making representations to the council over the issue of lived-in vans and caravans on public highways, which has prompted a draft policy and action plan to be drawn up. There will be a consultation around this, and you can contact us if you would like more information.

The council is initiating a consultation on a proposed 'additional licensing scheme' for houses in multiple occupation (HMOs) in a number of central wards of the city, including Ashley Down and Bishopston wards. A licensing scheme involves landlords paying an annual fee which covers the cost of council officers inspecting properties to ensure they meet adequate standards (and the cost of legal action that may need to be taken if these standards are not met). A 'mandatory licensing scheme' already exists across the city for HMOs containing five or more people living as two or more households. The proposed additional licensing scheme will cover HMOs containing three or more people living as

two or more households. The intention of this scheme is to tackle the high proportion

of HMOs that do not meet minimum housing standards. The consultation will run until 13 May and can be accessed at bristol.citizenspace.com.

Great British Spring Clean last month. Volunteers with Friends of Horfield Common collected 16 bags full – mainly wrappers from eating on the go. We can all help keep our streets, parks and green spaces clean and safe. The first way is to make sure we take our rubbish home with us and dispose of it properly.

If you can do more, Parks' Friends groups organise litter picks and other activities throughout the year, so why not get involved? Or if you are particularly concerned about your street or an area near where you live, why not organise a community litter pick of your own – Bristol Waste have kits you can borrow and will help you to set it up and collect the bags afterwards. Bishopston, Cotham and Redland Streetscene Volunteers also do a great deal of work all year round and make a massive difference to our area. We can put you in touch with any of these local organisations if you are interested.

Developments across Muller Road – As those who live at the Ashley Down end of the ward may be aware, planning permission has been granted for an Aldi store on the former B&Q site. Lidl, who had permission to build a store or the former Brunel Ford site, are now back in planning applying to build instead on the bus garage site. Although it would be great to see the old bus depot

coming back into use and to have a new affordable food store for local residents, we have concerns about the traffic impact on Muller Road. These are shared by the planning officers and so the deadline for this decision has been put back to April, by agreement with Lidl, to allow more time to try to resolve them.

Meanwhile, the Cathedral School Trust are starting work to develop a new secondary school on the old Lockleaze School site on Romney Avenue. North Bristol needs more school places, so this should be a welcome addition, and not impact negatively on Fairfield or Orchard Schools. However, we are aware that this is another potential source of traffic on the Muller Road. Hopefully, the Trust will take as many pupils as possible from within walking distance of the school, and come up with a good travel plan for those further afield, so that the traffic impacts are minimised.

Redland ward news

Bristol North Baths - The half-converted old building and uncompleted toilet block that is now available are being reviewed. Fi and Martin have been chasing officers who have told us that unfortunately Bishopston Medical Practice has made it clear that they are no longer interested in moving in there, despite the Nevil Road surgery being a temporary site for them. Over the last few months officers have reviewed the building options and it appears very likely that that the old bath building and potential retail unit (in place of the toilet) will now be sold, as it was felt that further capital investment wasn't tenable. We understand it will go on the market imminently. Like many residents we appreciate this will frustrate those who have sought a community use.

Air quality — Options have at long last been presented at Cabinet which will start to curb Bristol's poor air quality. The council is now looking at five options, four of which will involve a charge on some or all vehicles which emit high levels of nitrogen oxide. The studies have been paid for by central government, who, in response to a legal challenge from Client Earth, are now compelling up to 27 local authorities to take action. We are delighted at the news and will be encouraging the Mayor to take bold action that achieves legal air quality as a minimum

Libraries – While a number of Bristol libraries are under threat, pending further exploration of alternative models by the Mayor, the good news is that our new local Bishopston library on Gloucester Rd looks safe. There's a lot going on there; contact friends@bishopstonlibrary.org.uk to join the local group. For those who also use Redland library, do join their Friends group of course.

Plastics – There has been a lot of interest in the proliferation and disposal of plastics over the last few months. While the council's waste company does sell the plastic containers from green box collections for recycling, significant amounts still end up in our waterways and black bins. Reducing the amount of plastic at source is of course incredibly important. If you'd like any advice or help in reducing your plastic use then please get in touch. At the time of writing, Martin's petition to get the council to do more to tackle single use disposable plastics is still live, at epetitions.bristol.gov.uk/epetition core/view/plasticsban.

Parking Pain – Regular readers will know we often comment on local parking issues raised by residents. These are a problem for several reasons with many competing pressures on our streets. Fi and Martin are working with groups in several parts of the ward where parking is not being managed effectively but sadly frustrations will continue for some time due to council cuts and the Mayoral priority being to review existing parking schemes. We are working with officers and the Cabinet member to try and find a way through current council RPS guidance which puts various obstacles in the way to a solution.

Budget cuts — The bad news is more council budget cuts are on the way with the recent council approval of finances for next year. With reduced government grants and rising social care costs, these are bound to affect many people in Redland, either directly or indirectly. Greens on the council managed to secure many £10s of thousands extra to spend on protecting the most vulnerable residents who are dependent on the local crisis prevention fund, plus funds that will build two children's homes for young people otherwise housed far from the city at great expense. There are also new funds to hire a planner to collect evidence that enables student housing to be managed better by the council.






