# CATCH UP FUNDING REVIEW 2018/19 FEBRUARY 2019

#### Catch up Funding

The literacy and numeracy catch-up premium gives schools additional funding to support Year 7 pupils who did not achieve the expected standard in reading and/or maths at the end of Key Stage 2.

In 2017/18 the College received £16,000 catch-up funding. This amount is expected to be the same in 2018/19.

#### Catch Up Funding

The table below shows that students in receipt of English catch-up support performed well across all curriculum subjects in 2017/18. In English their performance was particularly strong and comfortably exceeded the average minimum target of a grade 3.

Summary Judgement – Outstanding

- Throughout each year group and across the curriculum, including in English and mathematics, current pupils make substantial and sustained progress, developing excellent knowledge, understanding and skills, considering their different starting points.
- Pupils read widely and often across subjects to a high standard, with fluency and comprehension appropriate to their age.
- For pupils generally, and specifically for disadvantaged pupils and pupils who have special educational needs and/or disabilities, progress from starting points is above average across nearly all subject areas.
- From different starting points, the progress in English and in mathematics is high compared with national figures.

And from the Effectiveness of Leadership and Management descriptors:

 Governors systematically challenge senior leaders so that the effective deployment of staff and resources (including the pupil premium, the primary PE and sport premium, Year 7 literacy and numeracy catch-up premium and special educational needs funding) secure excellent outcomes for pupils. Governors do not shy away from challenging leaders about variations.
