# Stop B2H Coalition: Report to the Oregon-California Trails Association 4th Quarter 2018

At the close of the 3rd quarter, the State of Oregon Energy Facility Siting Council (EFSC) announced the next step in their review and siting process (aka permitting) for the Boardman to Hemingway transmission project. This step was not a public hearing; rather they held "information meetings" in all five counties that B2H is proposed to cross, to notify the public and advising agencies that the Idaho Power application for a site certificate is "complete." With a completed application, the state will begin its evaluation, which is expected to take 1-2 years. We anticipate the next and very important steppublic hearings—to happen in 2019.

Stop B2H took advantage of these meetings to energize our outreach, fundraising, and coalition building activities. STOP was present all four nights during the week-long series of meetings. We tabled with our literature, asked questions and networked with concerned citizens and landowners. Our campaign's "sign on" list is now at 350 individuals and 8 member organizations. See many Facebook posts (@stopb2h). We also had four letters to the editor, a press release and received coverage in the Ontario paper, Baker paper, Union paper, and others.

After the public meetings where approximately 200 people throughout the region turned out, STOP held an organizational & public meeting in La Grande with 30 people and created two additional working groups. Two "house parties" informing people about B2H and the state process were also held: one in an affected neighborhood in La Grande; and another in Pine City, Morrow County with affected rancher and farmer families.

The working groups are currently developing a web site; power point presentation (B2H 101); a direct mailing to landowners; and a brief training for citizens wanting to research the application in preparation for the EFSC public hearings. The training includes tips for

filing testimony/challenges. Stop will offer 1:1 technical assistance for any individual or group upon request; as well as, posting action alerts and talking points at the appropriate times on Facebook and to our mailing list in the hopes of increasing citizen engagement.

The #Giving Tuesday fundraising effort and year-end fund appeal, seemed to spark interest and a sense of urgency among many supporters too. It was a very successful campaign and we experienced a sense of affirmation for our efforts. The fundraising campaign also enabled us to streamline internal systems, including transition to a new Quicken bookkeeping system. Finally, it should be mentioned that we are awaiting final payment from Facebook and have not encumbered all of the revenue from #Giving Tuesday in this report.

Additional activities, "in a nutshell" this past quarter included:

- Meeting with Jessica Keys, Senator Jeff Merkley's new EO representative
- Attending Idaho Power's kick-off 2019 Integrated Resource Planning (IRP)
  meeting; the monthly IRP advisory meetings in Boise since September; and a
  micro-grid conference
- Meeting and consultation with transmission expert, Steve Knudsen
- Meeting and reviewing questions with our attorney; his legal opinions in reply; and working on legal strategies
- Published a <u>Summer Wrap Up</u> newsletter; an <u>Action Alert</u> and a <u>Fall Update</u> with briefings on the State/EFSC Informational Meetings
- Attended EFSC meetings (observing processes and tracking the pending rulemaking litigation) and participation in State Senator Olson's legislative oversight task force of the Department of Energy (ODOE) and the Energy Facilities Siting Council (EFSC)
- Preparation for litigation in local Circuit Court regarding EFSC ruling; but then it was determined to be poor timing (legal advice is to wait.)



- -Cultural significance of Oregon/California/Mormon Pioneer Trail ruts
- -Historic one lane bridge
- -Duck, geese and migratory waterfowl sanctuary along the South Platte river.

## George Edwin Billings 1927 - 2019

George Billings, the brother of longtime OCTA Crossroads Chapter stalwart Bryce Billings, has passed away. Most recently, George was a fixture on both T-Rail marker work parties and field trips.

George Edwin Billings was born February 17, 1927 in Delta, Utah, to Gerald Oraian and Anna Wilcox Billings. He was the fifth of eleven children. He graduated from Delta High School in 1945 and was immediately drafted into the Army, and honorably discharged in

1947. Later in 1947 he served a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Western Canadian Mission. He was a student at BYU and active in the Delta Phi Chorus. He moved to Salt Lake City and worked at Salt Lake Hardware, the Salt Lake Post Office, construction in Duchesne County, a downtown music store, and a Sugarhouse paint store.

Wherever he lived he sang in ward choirs. He belonged to the Utah Oratorio Society for many years, especially enjoying their Jerusalem trips and singing in Handel's "Messiah" yearly.

#### Russell Allen Genung 1938 - 1919

Russell Allen Genung of Deshler, NE the son of David and Olive (Gardiner) Genung was born May 26, 1938 in North Platte, NE. He departed this life Sunday, January 6, 2019 at Blue Valley Lutheran Nursing Home in Hebron, NE at the age of 80 years. He was baptized at the Presbyterian Church in Nelson, Ne and confirmed July 17, 2005 at St Peter Lutheran Church in Deshler by Pastor Kurt VanFossan.

Russ attended grade school in Oak, NE and graduated from Nelson High School with the class of 1956.

He furthered his education attending Fairbury
Junior College in Fairbury, NE at the Teachers
College at Kearney. He taught at Wood River High School for one year before deciding to go into the construction business.

He entered the United States Army November 8, 1956 and was honorably discharged November 30, 1958.

Russ married Janet Crossland June 3, 1968. This union was blessed with three children. He worked as a pharmaceutical representative for Blue Cross Serum from 1971 to 1980. He then went to work for Fort Dodge Laboratories until his retirement.

After retirement, Russ did volunteer work at Mary Lanning Hospital, Children's Advocacy Center, Kansas State School for the Blind, National Wildlife Refuges in Santa Ana and Anahuac, TX, Hidalgo County, TX. At the refuges he built observation piers, banding geese and maintenance. He volunteered at the Nuckolls County Historical Society and was a lifelong member serving as secretary. Russ was a member of the Nebraska Chapter of the Oregon-California Trails Association, serving as president, Nebraska Historical Society, Audubon Nebraska and Izaac Walton League. He was also active in marking the Oregon, California, Pony Express, Mormon Pioneer, and various other historical trails in Nebraska and Kansas.

On April 5, 2003 he married Donna Dondlinger at St. Peter Church with Pastor Duane



Fahr officiating. They made their home in Deshler. They enjoyed spending their winters in Texas, camping, fishing, traveling, and playing cards. His high light was a trip to Abu Dhabi to visit his son and family and Texas visiting his daughter, and watching his granddaughter's ice skating competitions, and traveling to Pennsylvania to attend Russ's grandson's wedding. Most of all spending time with his blended family.

He is preceded in death by his parents, sister Janet Mumma and husband Chuck sister-inlaw Donnis Genung.
