Dear Friends and Fellow Enthusiasts,
Welcome to this, our fully illustrated catalogue of Dahlias and Chrysanthemums for 2020, our 99th Growing Season. The season just gone, like many before, has had its own set of challenges, particularly the extreme wet weather experienced at various times and our hearts go out to all that have suffered, and are still suffering, due to the recent flooding. It all puts our minor problems into perspective. We experienced a contrasting flowering season with some areas of our Stock fields producing probably the best displays we have seen, particularly the Giant and Large Dahlias which, in fairness, were planted on the best piece of land we have. Visitors were amazed at the size of blooms we were getting, particularly on the new Louis White and its "relatives" Aggie White and Bryn Terfel. Other areas of our fields did however suffer from the deluge we had one Friday afternoon in August. The result was that we lost about 200 Dahlias and 500 Chrysanthemums and the remaining plants never fully recovered, though I am very relieved to say that we only lost stock of 2 varieties.
There have been a few notable highlights this season, the first of which was on a personal note when I was honoured by being made an honorary Vice President of the National Dahlia Society. In September we were again awarded a Premier Gold Award at Harrogate Flower Show. Looking back and remembering the weather we experienced, there was a point when I felt like cancelling as it didn't look like we would have enough flowers. In fact, on the day of cutting we realised we had suffered some frost damage as a result of a very cold morning a few days before!
As I write this a team are in the process of planting up all the Dahlia tubers in readiness to turn up the heat in January whilst the Chrysanthemum stools have already had a batch of cuttings taken from them. Our order book is already filling up for the early months of despatch, especially for Dahlias, so please bear that in mind when placing yours. Our peak period for sending out plants is April through to Early May, when we aim to despatch up to 500 orders a week. Those of you who have dealt with us for many years know that we do our utmost to despatch all orders as efficiently as we can within the time frame requested. New introductions as you will expect are always in demand and this year's list, like many before, includes several new and exclusive varieties as well as some older ones.
A new issue for us to contend with this year is Plant Passporting. Due to legislation passed in the EU, ALL plants intended for planting out need to be accompanied by plant passporting information which allows traceability. As a mail order supplier and a "Professional Plant Operator" we are governed by this new legislation and the additional charges that this will incur, such as annual inspections by our local Plant Health Inspector. You will see that our plant labels have had to be adapted to include the information we are obliged to put on which may mean we lose some of the descriptive details. The alternative was to use bigger plastic labels which we do not want to do!
Finally I would just like to say a big thank you to everyone who has supported us with their custom over the years. Many of you have become friends and it is a pleasure to catch up with you at either the shows or when you visit the Nursery. We look forward to another growing season with positivity and hope and the knowledge that we will always endeavour to do our best and continue to offer one of the most comprehensive ranges of Dahlias and Chrysanthemums in the UK

## DAHLIA CLASSIFICATION

The classification of Dahlias in this catalogue is based on the NDS Classified List 2020, $34^{\text {th }}$ Edition. Some varieties included in this catalogue are either not yet classified or are no longer included (prefixed U). Where this is the case we have included them in what we believe to be the most appropriate section after trial at the nursery or from historical information.

## POT TUBERS AVAILABLE DECEMBER TO FEBRUARY

These are compact tubers grown in a 9 cm pot and ideal for exhibitors or keen growers who have the facilities (e.g heated greenhouse or propagator) to produce and propagate their own stock. We strongly advise unpacking on arrival and, if necessary, storing in a cool, frost free environment until required for setting away. A minimum of $50^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(10^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$ is required for propagation. Water tubers sparingly until growth is evident. Early ordering is advisable. Some varieties already in short supply are only available through our website where tuber availability is updated regularly.
SPECIAL NOTE. Any tuber which fails to grow must be returned to us by March 30th. We will then either replace with tubers, if available, or mini plants, supply a credit note or refund. No action can be taken unless a tuber is returned.
MINI PLANTS AVAILABLE FROM EARLY APRIL TO W/C 25th MAY
These are supplied as strong rooted cuttings for those customers who have the facilities for potting up and growing on under glass (minimum $50^{\circ} \mathrm{F}, 10^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ). On receipt, they should be unpacked immediately and potted on into a $9-12 \mathrm{~cm}$ pot using a good quality compost. Be careful to avoid over watering, particularly after potting. No mini plant orders (unless for our special collections or on a substitutes acceptable basis) can be accepted after 17th April

These larger plants, grown in a 7 cm paper pot, are "garden ready" after allowing a few days to get over the journey! They are popular with customers who do not have the facilities for growing on, but do however come at an additional cost of $£ 2.50$ per plant on top of the mini plant price and an additional $£ 2$ carriage and packing charge. Orders must be in the office by the 20th April (unless for our special collections or on a substitutes acceptable basis) as cuttings are taken and plants are grown to order.
Please Note we are unable to supply Garden Ready Dahlias to destinations outside of mainland UK

## GIANT AND LARGE DECORATIVES

These "Dinner Plate" Dahlias will certainly create the wow factor either in the garden or on the show bench. Giants (G) produce flowers usually over 250 mm (10") in diameter and can be up to 380 mm ( $15^{\prime \prime}$ ). Large (L) varieties have flowers 260 mm . To achieve full size blooms Giants should generally be restricted to 2-3 flowering stems per plant whilst Large should
be restricted to $4-5$.

## POM AND BALL DAHLIA COLLECTIONS

Pompons are dainty flowers that only reach about $50 \mathrm{~mm}\left(2^{\prime \prime}\right)$ across. Ball dahlias have flowers up to $150 \mathrm{~mm}(6$ ") across. Chrysanthemums are supplied as strong rooted cuttings grown in individual cells ready for potting into at leas a 9 cm pot and are available from February to Mid May. Orders for other than our special collections must be received before March $20^{\text {th }}$

## SUGGESTED STOPPING DATES

For those of you that are showing it is important to have an idea of "stopping" dates. To assist exhibitors in timing their blooms we have now included suggested stopping dates for each variety within their descriptions. These dates are intended as a guide only and are based on aiming for show dates of early/mid September and early/mid November in the North East of England. Adjustments should be made for earlier or later shows Due to longer day length, growers in the south of the country should delay these suggested dates by up to 4 weeks whilst more northerly growers than ourselves would need to stop up to 2 weeks or so earlier. As an extremely rough guide delay stopping by 1 week for every 100 miles south of Newcastle and bring forward by 1 week for every 100 miles further north. If you are not aiming to grow for shows then these stopping dates become much less critical with a delay in stopping only resulting in a corresponding delay in flowering. The serious grower will keep their own records from year to year to assist them in timing for shows.
Please Note: Depending on when your order is received and the period you have requested delivery of your order, some of these suggested dates may have been missed. This will not affect the plant, but may result in some varieties flowering later than indicated.

When it comes to late flowering varieties you will see that most have 2 stopping dates suggested. Exhibitors will tend to flower on 2nd crown buds as this gives the plant a longer growing season, a bigger root system and therefore generally better flowers. Perfectly good results when growing for pleasure can however be achieved on later delivered plants by just using the later date given for the 2nd stop.

The plants can grow quite bushy so need plenty of space but are often strong enough to support themselves. We have found them to be very hardy surviving outside with no protection and flowering very freely year after year.
