Who we are:

New Paths Music Limited is a charity with registered charity number 1176545. It is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 1 September 2017 with company number 10941917.

New Paths Music is headquartered in the East Riding of Yorkshire, one of the largest local authorities in the country, with a population of more than 330,000 people



The festival:

- promotes and encourages high standards of music and singing;
- widens opportunities for the poor. children and the elderly to participate in and experience high-quality music; and
- educates the general public and children about the art of music.

Our aims are to:

- raise music to a more visible and influential position in our culture:
- increase public access to high-quality music-making;
- widen opportunities to engage with music through education and performance;
- · encourage community and family participation and involvement in musical activities;
- stage performances by international, national, and local artists and provide a platform for amateur musicians, young musicians and students;
- · promote excellence and enjoyment in music;
- educate the minds of the public as to the art of music:
- · foster public awareness and appreciation of music as an international art form and encourage international musical cooperation;
- strengthen links between music and the other arts: and
- encourage the creation of new music and further the art of musical composition. --

Our vision is to be widely recognised as one of the most innovative and exciting arts festivals in the UK and as a leading provider of excellence in music through performance and education.



What we've achieved so far

We are proud that since the launch of the New Paths festival in Beverley in 2016, we have delivered a meaningful increase in public access to high-quality music making. Alongside an exceptional programme of concerts, we hold children's events, participational workshops, talks, masterclasses, free fringe events, and visits to those unable to attend main festival events.

The twenty events in our inaugural festival attracted over 2,000 people from the local community and further afield; and our second festival featured more than thirty musical events attracting an audience of over 3,000. Over half of our events have been free in every festival, and we work hard to take music to the young, the elderly, the poor, and the unwell.

2018 was New Paths' maiden year as a charity in which we raised over £50,000 to deliver our biggest festival so far. Attracting over 4,000 people, the festival comprised more than 40 events at fifteen venues across Beverley.

Highlights of 2018 included:

- Viking Voyage, our flagship project with Frederick Holmes School, an all age community special school in Hull for pupils with severe physical disabilities and those with profound and multiple needs. The project involved a team of four professional musicians working with pupils and staff in school on a piece written especially for the project by Hollywood film composer, David Buckley. The project culminated in a high-profile public performance of the piece in the festival to a packed house.
- Commissioning veteran composer, Diana Burrell, to write a new set of songs and giving the world premiere in the festival.
- A public masterclass for three highly talented young organists from Oundle for Organists by a world authority on Bach organ music. Those students were also given a performance platform in the festival alongside two international recitalists.
- The Easter Sing, a joyful community singing event for over one hundred local amateur singers led by leading choral conductor, Joanna Tomlinson.
- A residency by the choir of Jesus College Cambridge at the festival. The esteemed college choir gave numerous performances throughout the festival and received expert Swedish language coaching during their time in Beverley.
- A Musical 'Take-over' of Beverley, an entire day of free music performances all across town.



We will accomplish our aims by presenting festivals and events which:

- feature performances by national, international and local artists of a range of classical and sometimes other types of music:
- stage free musical performances which specifically afford access to those who might otherwise not be able to experience them due to financial means;
- stage musical performances in nursing homes which specifically afford access to those who might otherwise not be able to experience them due to age, infirmity or disability;
- provide public performance opportunities to further the education of aspiring young musicians of excellence;
- provide musical workshops, projects, masterclasses, and tuition to educate amateur musicians, school children and students;
- present family concerts and music events that extend access to music for children and their families;
- promote community music-making events in which members of the public can participate regardless of musical experience or ability;
- stage public talks, lectures and seminars to educate the public about music, the arts and culture;
- programme musical events which · · · · include or explore other art forms; and
- promote high standards of music by commissioning the composition of new music and stage performances of new music.

rice the beginning we have provided nine free workshops and masterclasses for teenagers and for students at the University of Hull. These include a session in which local musicians studied with and played alongside some of the leading baroque musicians in the country, a holiday singing club for young children and an opera masterclass for university students.

In 2018, New Paths took over the running of the long-standing Beverley Chamber Music Festival. Libby Burgess is now Co-Artistic Director of the festival with renowned pianist Martin Roscoe.

The festival is an important part of the cultural landscape of the region having brought international artists to the East Riding every year during its quarter century history.

New Paths will strive to nurture that rich heritage, whilst taking steps to make sure that the festival is accessible and inclusive. The first Beverley Chamber Music Festival under the management of New Paths saw increased audience sizes throughout and the introduction of a schools concert for over 400 children and a family concert.
