


Dear Friends,

As I write this letter there is huge political uncertainty about the future of Britain. The Brexit plan has been passed by the Cabinet and Brussels but will it get through Parliament? And if not, what then? Since the Brexit referendum opinion has been sharply divided.

When Jesus was born there was also a lot of political uncertainty. Palestine was a vassal state under Roman rule. Insurrection and rebellion were never far from the surface of society. Opinion was sharply divided between those like the Sadducees who were happy with the status quo and benefitted from it financially, and, at the other extreme, the Zealots dedicated to the overthrow of Rome and everything and everybody Roman. And in between were the ordinary people, taxed to the hilt, who were not sure what was best.

Jesus resisted getting involved in the divisive political issues of his day. His message of love and forgiveness transcended the squabbles and arguments of those who were politically opposed, and it says a lot about his unifying message and presence that among the disciples were those of all political persuasions and none.

Again at Christmas the message of the angels announcing Jesus' birth rings out, "Peace on earth!" Amidst all the political divisions of today, and the deeply held opinions on all sides, let us remember our unity together in Christ, and let us have the grace to be able to disagree agreeably.


The Christingle Services are always a very happy occasion on Christmas Eve. We do need volunteers to help make up the **600 Christingles!**

Bishop Paul's Christmas Message 2018

In the dark, small hours of the night, the time when our sleep is most disturbed as sombre thoughts invade our minds, a child is born. No ordinary child. A child born to banish the darkness and shining a light of hope into all our hearts.

On that night, fearful shepherds gathered around the child to worship him in wonder before going out to tell others. Shortly afterwards the child would be visited by wise people from the East, again worshipping him before heading off to share the news. And throughout his life Jesus would be encountered by many who reflected in wonder and then shared what they had seen.

Was there a common thread?

Of course. Everyone who encountered Jesus was transformed. Transformed in different ways. The shepherds found strength. The Eastern sages had their intellectual curiosity satisfied. The blind were given sight. The outcasts received friendship. The hungry fed. The poor given hope.

They were transformed. How were they transformed? An encounter with Jesus transformed them. How do we know they were transformed? Because they stepped up and spoke about that transformation. In other words they had an inner journey of encounter and an outer journey of proclamation.

Over the last year in the Diocese we have been developing our Rule of Life. I have been talking about both the inner and outer journey. The inner journey where we Pray, Read and Learn as we try to deepen our faith, and widen our understanding of what it means to know Jesus and to act as he did. The outer journey where we put that action into practice - we Tell, Serve and Give. In these ways we show what it is to be a disciple of Christ, part of a transforming movement that longs to make a bigger difference so that more people know Jesus and there is more justice in the world.

Because the world is longing for that justice. From the massive political uncertainties and conflicts between nation states, to the fearful parent wondering how they will feed their child. We see darkness surrounding us, we have our own pressures, the fears and stresses of the world engulf us. In such a world we need hope.

Some seek for hope in luxury, in the excessive commercialism of Christmas. Expensive presents, lavish parties, over-indulgence. Attempts to find release from the day to day. But as people of faith, we find hope in Jesus. In the precious Christmas gift who transformed the lives of those he encountered. Who can, and is, and will, and wants to transform you, and me.

I pray for you, friends, that you seek hope in Jesus, I pray that you encounter that living and transforming Jesus - and I pray you tell others about that Jesus in word and action, this and every day.

Distracted

Sometimes when we open the morning paper we are presented with a full-face drawing of a person wanted by the police. Recently there has been some amusement over the poor representation but all these portraits are shown full-face, staring straight at us. This is the usual way of presenting an image of a person, but the Walker Art Gallery in Liverpool has put on an exhibition which takes a different approach.

Called "Between You and Me," it has given over a gallery to painted portraits of people not looking at you, the viewer. This can be disconcerting as you want to know what has caught their attention or what is on their mind as they are paying no attention to you. They seem to be saying that you are not relevant to their lives, certainly not at that moment. There is a narrative in the painting which you have to guess at, there being no clue as to what has made them look away.



Also in the Walker Gallery is a wonderful picture of the passion of Christ, the Master of the Aachen Altarpiece, painted in the early 1600's. Fixed to the back are two side panels. One of these shows a miracle, a pope is faced with a man saying that he does not believe in Christianity. The pope prays at the high altar for evidence to convince the man and Christ appears as a vision for all to see. The picture concentrates on the pope seeing the vision with two priests and patrons of the church, but the man to be convinced is not in the picture. But there, in the foreground, a young acolyte holding a candle is looking back behind him either distracted from what is going at the altar, or maybe he wishes to see if the vision has affected the atheist.

It can be disconcerting when the person depicted does not look at the viewer. We, the viewers do not matter, the distraction is too strong.

There is one portrait everyone hates and that is their passport photo, we are grateful it is only seen occasionally by an unknown official. This self-conscious approach as to how we are projected as an image to others probably interferes with how we want to be accepted; the portrait limits this.

There is a Renaissance painting which shows a child being handed over to an old man dressed in rich robes. The child is reaching towards him with delight and not bothered by the aged and disfigured face. This is part of the Christmas message for Christmas allows us to see the Holy Child and He is unconcerned as to how we look. We are accepted as we are by Him and the Holy Spirit.

A retired optician donated glasses & trained Revd Sheilagh Williamson to conduct basic eye tests – allowing the ladies to further utilise the light for their enterprises.

This, in addition to the electricity infrastructure that is currently being installed, will make a great deal of difference to the ladies, school & church. Thank you for all of your support – Sheilagh (after a visit in November) reported that the ladies were 'thriving' and 'all was going well with the school and church projects'.

The Uganda Committee (a sub-committee of the PCC) met this month to hear progress reports and consider some options going forward. A similar group, made up of representatives from the three groups in Uganda, also met to discuss their aims & objectives. With the instalment of electricity, it is hoped that a plethora of options will open up; assisting with the site's security and expand educational capability. Anne & Ted have received the names of those interested in a return trip next May and there will be more news in the February magazine. Ted is in regular email contact with Bishop Eridad in Kalule; who is fully supportive of our project and hopes the team will join him for a meal at 'his place' when we return.

We have also received some lovely pictures of the sports equipment being used by the school and we look forward to hearing from Sheilagh all the latest news. We can keep up our support here through talks, awareness and prayer.

Thank you to all who have raised or donated funds for the Uganda Project - To David and St Peter's Choir & friends for a wonderful concert for the Project raising nearly £1000; the Voices from the Churchyard team (£700) and TSP for a sponsored run on World Food Day for funds for the chicken project (£340) and for all the personal donations that have made such a difference. Thank you!

<u>Decorations</u> Choose sustainable materials. Rather than buying new decorations this year, revamp your old baubles and give your tree a whole new theme. By re-covering them with recycled papier-mâché or even newspaper, you can create a cheap, eco-friendly home spun look that saves money, packaging and energy. For an even more organic approach,



why not use nature to decorate your home. Try using holly branches, berries and ivy. Another really special Christmas present idea is to dedicate a tree for someone.

<u>Wrapping paper</u> Buy gift wrap made from recycled materials. Make your own gift wrap from cloth and other materials. Save wrapping paper from gifts you receive to use next year. Reuse boxes for shipping and gifts, rather than buying new ones.

<u>Christmas cards</u> As well as recycling the cards you receive in the post, why not get crafty with the kids and make your own eco-friendly Christmas cards to send. Use recycled card and envelopes and cut down on plastic packaging, or you can buy recycled cards if crafts just aren't your thing.

<u>Limit Lighting</u> Use LED Lights. These small Light Emitting Diodes use 80% less energy and last 10 times longer than incandescent bulbs, plus they're cool to the touch. Look for the Energy Star seal for ones with the highest energy efficiency rating. Turn Christmas tree lights on only when you're in the room to enjoy them.



<u>Cleaning for Christmas visitors</u> Use eco-friendly products such as" eco cover "and Delphi's eco, all the bottles are made from sustainable products and our recyclable too They have the whole range from washing up liquid toilet cleaner to multi-surface cleaner.

These toys help families who cannot afford to buy Christmas presents in the large toy shops and also raises crucial funds for supporting families affected by cancer.



A brief report on the November meeting of St Peter's PCC

- → REPORT FROM ALLAN JONES, CHAIR OF GOVERNORS OF TRINITY ST PETER'S PRIMARY SCHOOL:

 This is an annual report covering the life of Trinity St Peter's School. The number on the school roll is 233. Governors there are 14 Governors of which St Peter's two foundation governors are Paul McHenry and Allan Jones. St Peter's Diocesan governor is Sue Wong. Issue facing the school and Governors is the move towards Diocesan Multi Academy Trusts. This would not happen without full consultation with all concerned over a 12 month period. Admissions Policy the admission criteria is being reviewed at present through a public consultation and will commence in September 2020.
- → VICAR'S ITEMS the Vicar plans to take study leave in 2020.
- → CHURCHES TOGETHER St Peter's have a vacancy to fill on this Committee.
- → UGANDA PROJECT as reported in the magazine.
- → REPORTS FROM SUB COMMITTEES
 - → Finance: Receipt of £20,000 legacy from the estate of Bob Fairburn was reported with thanks. Accounts and investments were looked at in detail.
 - → Fabric: New item: Holly Trees The holly trees on the path leading up to the main entrance to church are dead or are dying and will be removed next year.
 - → Faith and Outreach Singing for Fun has increased in numbers. Christmas Shoe Box Project was well supported. There will be Carol Services at St Joseph's Care Centre, Halcyon House and Woodlands Nursing Home with pupils from TSP.
 - → Horizons With the remaining funds the following will be sent donations Claire House (£300); DEC Indonesia (£330) and Toilet Twinning, Zambia, (£360).
 - → Social future plans include a Table Quiz and Summer Fair in 2019.
- → ECO GROUP REPORT an up-date was presented.
- → DEANERY SYNOD REPORT A report on the Deanery Synod meeting of 2nd October was given.



St Peter's Shoebox Appeal 2018



At our meeting on 3rd November Nick Phillpot spoke on 'Mr. Bradshaw comes to Southport,' a history of the Liverpool to Southport railway line. The line opened in 1846 from Waterloo to Southport, then beginning to develop as a seaside resort, but was soon extended to Sandhills.

At first there were no comprehensive timetables published. George Bradshaw was a Quaker, born in Pendleton in 1800, who in 1836 began producing a series of comprehensive guides of all train times and prices. The first Southport line guide was published in the late eighteen-forties. Since then the line has followed the same track and the stations mostly remain in their original locations.

Freshfield was added in the eighteen-fifties when Thomas Fresh was Superintendent of Nuisances in Liverpool and arranged for night-soil from Liverpool to be brought to fertilise his fields at what became Freshfield. The line had a tremendous impact on the development of the Sefton coast. The two worst crashes occurred at Waterloo in 1903 and Hall Road in 1905. In the 1960s the line was earmarked for closure by Dr. Beeching but was reprieved. Today it is one of the most heavily used local lines in the country with a 96% record for punctuality. New coaches are now in production.

We are grateful to Nick for giving us such an interesting and informative talk.

Lest we forget

Recently I watched a programme on television about the real Emmerdale, the village of Escholt where it was originally recorded. Escholt is the village where my Mother's family lived and as a child we visited an aunt there regularly. The programme was about the village during the World Wars and showed how the people lived then. My grandfather was in the battle of the Somme and as he came out of the battle for rest he met his son going in there. He knew what his son, my uncle Sam, was going into but could do nothing but pat him on the shoulder and wish him luck. They both survived but did not go back to Escholt as there were no jobs there.

Each November 11th we remember those who did not survive, but is it enough to stand for two minutes to think about those who died for our freedom; two minutes out of a whole year? There are many things and people who should be remembered by all of us. In every family in the land there is someone who stands out in our memories to be thought about and be thankful for. I was a very sick child and think with great affection of my old doctor, who came out to me day or night and stayed until all hours with me until I was on the mend. I remember my wonderful parents who had to scrimp and save to pay the doctor's bills, or I would not be here now. My teachers, who were very patient with me as I missed so much schooling and had to be taught in playtimes to catch up with the rest of the class, I often think of them with affection, but to them I suppose I was a pest who spoilt their break time. All these people, now long gone stay in my memory and prayers, but I don't forget what they did for me.



I remember the sick children I taught in the hospital, for they gave me such humility, as they never complained but were little stoics who accepted their treatment with no problem and just "got on with it."





CLERICAL ODD-BALLS!

I've always been fascinated by the idiosyncrasies and foibles of clergy. Nearly all of them come from the past and there are fewer "characters" around today. In recent decades clergy selection and training has been more focused and harmonized resulting in more of a clergy jelly mould! Although some still are able to break free from it!

But church history provides a rich harvest of eccentrics and odd-balls.

The founder of the modern Harvest Festival was one such. The Revd Robert Harker was the vicar of Morwenstow in Cornwall in the 1800's. He was usually followed into church by nine or ten cats who clambered over pews and people during the service. He "excommunicated" one of his cats who killed a mouse at one of the services. Hawker forbade the cat to enter the church again. The church-going cats were not his only idiosyncrasy. He wore multi-coloured clothes in those days when clergy always wore black. His coat was purple, his gloves were scarlet and he wore a yellow poncho. He built himself a wooden hut out of driftwood – perhaps the first man-shed? – where he would sit for hours in a haze of opiates chattering away to the birds and writing nonsensical poetry.

Archbishop Trench of Dublin was a hypochondriac who also had the habit of talking to himself out loud. He expected that the first sign of impending death would be paralysis. Sitting at a reception one evening he could be heard declaring to himself, "It's come at last! It's come at last! I have been pinching my knee for the last 20 minutes and there is no feeling whatsoever." Whereupon the lady sitting next to him said, "Your Grace, it may be of comfort to know that these past 20 minutes it's been my knee you have been pinching!"

One of the most famous of eccentric clergy was the Revd William Spooner who was born in London in 1844. He is so well known for his verbal confusions that the word "spoonerism" has come into the English language. Announcing the notices in church one morning he said, instead of "I publish the banns…", "I banish the pubs!". - which didn't go down well with his thirsty parishioners. At a dinner one evening he was called upon to toast the Queen, which he did by raising his glass to "The queer old Dean" instead of "The dear old Queen."

After the last war Bertram Pollock, Bishop of Norwich, was largely responsible for the rebuilding of Norwich Cathedral. A dinner to celebrate the restoration work was held on the same day that the bishop's young wife gave birth to their first child. A very tired and exhausted bishop attended the dinner that evening and, not surprisingly, nodded off during the speeches. The final speaker ended by saying, "I am sure we would all like to congratulate the bishop and his wife on their most happy event earlier today." All eyes turned to the sleeping bishop. His chaplain shook him hastily and whispered, "My Lord, they are congratulating you." Bishop Pollock rapidly rose to his feet, and thinking they they were talking of his work for the cathedral, replied, "Please, please, ladies and gentlemen. I assure you that the Dean had as much to do with it as I did!"

So it was a great delight to be told of a new book that has been published called "A Field Guide to the English Clergy" by a Liverpool curate, the Revd Fergus Butler-Gallie. It's subtitled, "A Compendium of Diverse Eccentrics, Pirates, Prelates and Adventurers; All Anglican, Some Even Practising."

In it there is an Archbishop of York, Lancelot Blackburne (1658 – 1743) who began his career as a privateer in the Caribbean.

There is the Revd Ian Graham-Orlebar, a vicar in St. Alban's who travelled round his parish on a ride-on mower.

William Webb Ellis, to whom the game of rugby is attributed, was a breaker of many rules in school. Though the one he is famous for is having "a fine disregard for the rules of football." When he caught the ball, instead of kicking it backwards as the rules laid down, he ran forward placing it with a great flourish in the goal. And so rugby was born. He later became Rector of St. Clement Danes, a role in which he was "devastatingly unimpressive."

The Revd Jeremiah Carter was a curate in the early 18th century. In those days vicars were often absent from their duties, leaving their poorly paid curates to do all the work. Carter's stipend from his vicar was £20 a year, which didn't go too far as he had a wife and 13 children to support. He remedied the situation by becoming the landlord of the local pub and each Sunday after the morning service he would play his violin and lead the congregation, conga style, from church to pub where he exchanged preaching for pulling pints!

Yes, the church produced many odd-balls and misfits, and if you want to hear about more of them then read Fergus Butler-Gallie's book "A Field Guide to the English Clergy" published by OneWorld ISBN 978-1-78607-441-6. Could be one for your Christmas present list!
