Easter's importance and long history of celebration, has given rise to numerous customs and traditions over the years, both religious and secular, some remembered and kept, some forgotten and lost. Hot cross buns and Easter eggs come quickly to mind.

Eggs look as dead as a smooth oval stone, but we know better. We know that if an egg is fertilized and kept warm by the parent, that hard shell will start to crack, and into the world will climb a wee animal full of life. The symbolism of an egg can be found in different cultures and faiths. It is often used to show new life, birth or regeneration. The emergence of a chick from an egg can be symbolic of Christ rising from the tomb. So the egg reminds us that what looked dead and hopeless on Good Friday was actually full of life, new life, because on the third day Jesus broke out of death to be alive forever. This is the good news message, this is the Christian message of hope and of freedom. As I write this to you, the fearful pandemic of Covid still grips the world. Now a new unrest, of conflict in Ukraine, although not global, is also testing our freedoms.

Hot Cross Buns seem to be available all year round now because of their delicious taste. When I was a child a local baker would hand out buns to all the children in my little village, but you had to queue up outside the local pub and wait your turn. Hot Cross buns are but one of many different food related traditions to Easter, but they all have something in common. That is to remind us of God's love for us. It is in Jesus' life and his experience on the cross, that we can taste and see that God is good.

Decorated and chocolate eggs are what we all enjoy on Easter Day. They are always bright and cheerful, colourful, fun and delicious and that's because Easter Day is party time for Christians as we celebrate the fantastic news that Jesus is risen.

However you celebrate Easter 2022, I hope that you will find some joy, hope, and peace.

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Letters from Liberation: Commemorating the Liberation of Bergen-Belsen Concentration Camp

Dr Myfanwy Lloyd will present this online talk and Q&A to be streamed first live from 7pm, Thursday 14th April 2022 - the evening prior to the anniversary of the liberation of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, which occurred 77 ago on 15 April 1945.

On display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in a permanent Bergen-Belsen exhibition is a piece of paper with addresses from across the globe written on it. This sheet of paper represents the compassion of one man of the Yeomanry, Arthur Tyler.

Dr Lloyd will tell the story of how Arthur Tyler met Polish Holocaust survivor Naomi Kaplan during the liberation of the camp, and how that meeting changed both their lives.



Arthur Tyler was a Lance-Bombardier with the 63rd Anti-Tank Regiment (Oxfordshire Yeomanry), when his unit took over Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on 15th April 1945. None of the soldiers could have expected the horrors they witnessed in the camp. Filled with anger and revulsion at the actions of the Nazis, the Oxfordshire Yeomanry men helped survivors as best they could.

Arthur collected from the liberated the addresses of relatives and offered to write to them, a gesture of kindness that would have a huge impact.

In 1946 Naomi Laplan wrote in a letter to him that,

"I met very many British soldiers and I asked everybody to write about me to my family, but nobody did it – only you."

Pieced together during the Covid-19 pandemic, the story of Naomi and Arthur highlights how kindness and integrity can have profound and lasting impacts.

This historical research also raises issues for our own times. What can this story tell us about the ongoing battle against Holocaust denial? How can we use historical research to fight lies and distortions in the era of 'fake news'?

Dr Myfanwy Lloyd is an historian and freelance museum consultant. Her current research includes into Naomi and Arthur's story is supported by the Holocaust Museum Houston and the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum. Other recent projects include co-curating 'Owning the Past: From Mesopotamia to Iraq' at the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford, and the 'Nice Cup of Tea' exhibition at the Pitt Rivers Museum, Oxford. She has been a tutor for Continuing Education at Oxford University for 20 years, specialising in war and memory, women's history and postmodernism.



On Sunday 6th of March an open air service was held in Sutton Wick, Drayton in remembrance of the Sutton Wick air crash which occurred on 5 March 1957 when a Blackburn Beverley C Mk 1 heavy transport aircraft, serial number XH117, of 53 Squadron Royal Air Force crashed at Sutton Wick, Drayton, Berkshire.



Of the 17 passengers and five crew aboard, all but four died in the accident. Two people on the ground also died.

Two civilians on the ground, three crew, 15 passengers and a number of RAF Police dogs died in the initial impact and ensuing fire. Two crew, two passengers and one RAF Police dog survived.

April Post

As I write the Thames Water/Water Resources South East consultation on (amongst other things) the proposed 4 square mile, 30m high reservoir is about to close. Thanks largely to the efforts of GARD (Group against Reservoir Development) there have been hundreds of responses from individuals, organised meetings

and presentations in all the villages immediately affected + questions and a debate in the House of Commons. It is rare to find such unanimity of feeling from well informed residents, Councils and MPs against a major infrastructure proposal. This will be the third attempt by Thames Water to get this proposal through. Each time it has cost the public purse millions. At least this time around the arguments against are better funded and well organised. The "gated" process for decision making may go on for many months more, but hopefully the final decision will finally remove the threat of Europe's largest above ground reservoir supplying water to London and Southern Water being built in Oxfordshire.

The proposed new road (HIF Rd) between Didcot, the Thames and the Golden Balls roundabout, is the other major hot topic for local Councils of all levels. Decision time is almost upon us and there is still some disagreement about the best way ahead. Originally conceived more than 10 years ago as a means of alleviating the traffic congestion – present and future - generated by so much housing development around Didcot and the surrounding area, there have been many changes and events which have made many doubt the original assumptions. Changes in population forecasts, the arrival of new Local Plans, changes in Council administrations, increasing awareness of the Climate Emergency, Covid and (yes) Brexit have created a very different world. Are roads and new road-building the best solution in a world fighting climate change? Urgent discussion of alternatives - better bus services, more focus on Active travel, possible Light Rail lines - are all being considered. Everyone wants to find a 21st century solution that fixes the problem for the foreseeable future and one that is flexible enough to cope with rapidly changing demands.

On the plus side, and just at the moment there is a distinct lack of plus sides, our local science and technology and its development continues to be the envy of most of the country. Advances at Harwell and Culham and MEPC continue to make world news while Milton Park is leading the way on local traffic initiatives.

With a Ukrainian son in law, I am painfully aware of how events in Ukraine are on everyone's mind. It is extraordinary how it has brought the West together and how local people are accepting that the world economy will take a hit, but that is nothing to what Ukraine residents and its President are coping with. While we wait for Government to get a workable system together, people wishing to offer help and accommodation are encouraged to contact VWHDC who have a growing list of those interested.

And, together with all the above, Councils and Councillors are working hard to address all their regular issues - parking, roads and highways, environmental health, housing and never forget dog poo.

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


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Drayton Table Tennis Club

Occupancy rate (persons per household). Occupancy has consistently fallen in every census from 4.4 in 1881 to 2.5 in 2011. The 2011 figure is slightly less than the national average of 3.36. The steady fall is largely down to decreasing birth rates but also due to increased longevity and the consequence of

two and single occupancy households.

The forthcoming 2021 census results may tell us if these trends are continuing. The new estates built in the past few years may also have an impact.

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

At the base of the two images a handcrafted, donated trough which will be situated, into which a piece of grass will be placed. This will enable crosses and poppies to be left as personal memorials.

There has been some mention of concern about these items being vandalised or even stolen. To address these concerns the group of fundraisers will place and remove the Tommy's every day.

I would like to thank those ladies of the village once again for their time and generosity in making this happen and the gentleman who made the lovely trough.

I hope the village appreciates and enjoys the fact that finally we are physically recognising those who have served and lost lives in ensuring our freedoms that we all enjoy today.

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Reservoir

The response to the WRSE public consultation has been staggering. Thank you!

A very high number of resident responses went in to WRSE before the deadline – far beyond any level that I can believe they expected. And they were universally negative and many asking the question: "Why don't you do the Severn-

Thames Transfer link?"

Your responses could make the difference. My own has been sent – it's seven pages long, so I won't repeat it here (The councillors, MPs, and GARD have been directly emailing WRSE over this). I will repeat the four recommendations with which I finished:

Recommendations

- 1 The current Emerging Plan is not fit for purpose and <u>should not</u> <u>be pursued in its current state</u>. By placing SESRO [the reservoir] first, it is inflexible, not cost-effective, has worse short-term drought resilience, maximal negative environmental impact (as far as can be seen), and does not provide necessary information on multiple aspects including flooding and carbon costs.
- 2 <u>Plans adopting STT-first [Severn-Thames Transfer] should be explored and pursued.</u> This will permit a truly holistic approach to water provision nation-wide, maximise flexibility, take into account changing population estimates, provide for better cost-effectiveness and environmental impacts, and take on board widespread feedback.
- 3 <u>Full and timely disclosure</u> of all available costs and modelling (economic, carbon, environmental, flooding, water planning, engineering) should be made prior to consultation.
- 4 The slight widening of WRSE membership should be further pursued (overcoming the principal agent problem). As well as the OCC representation, there should be <u>VoWHDC representation</u> and <u>GARD representation</u>. This would permit plans to be properly scrutinised before coming forwards, with visibility on all assumptions, models, and calculations, permitting appropriate transparency and feedback from representatives of the local area and independent scrutineers.

Thames Water and other water company representatives also turned up at a "drop-in" session at Steventon on the 2nd of March. The Thames Water representatives did not have a good time. They had no answers to the environmental impact question, how they could claim the reservoir was remotely cost-effective, why their plan for reservoir-first left the drought-resilience part until well after 2040, the flood modelling they claim to have...

Instead, they kept trying to insist that despite the intrusive nonnative species problem and the security aspects of a huge strategic reservoir, they would *somehow* manage to provide recreation facilities anyway as if they hoped that would distract us. I did ask: "If you can't find some way around all those problems, would you abandon the reservoir project?" They didn't answer.

The next phase is to see their response to the WRSE consultation.

Ukraine

At the moment, there is little more that the Council can do to help the people of Ukraine than to show where people can donate to support the Ukrainian people and to carry out symbolic actions such as flying the Ukrainian flag in solidarity (which we have done) and issue statements of support.

However, the refugee sponsorship scheme should be opening as I write this on the 14th of March (later than I'd have wanted, but better late than never). It is not live as I write, but should be at the following location when it is: https://www.gov.uk/guidance/local-sponsorship-scheme-for-ukraine

The Council is expecting to receive guidance in the coming weeks on the support we will be able to give to those hosting Ukrainian refugees. I'll update you as soon as we know more.

We did discuss internally whether symbolic gestures were useful; from my background in the military, my firm view is that they certainly are.

The Ukrainians fighting have access to international media and are made aware of such gestures, in addition to the concrete actions such as sanctions, provision of military equipment, provision of humanitarian aid, and diplomatic pressure.

The symbolic gestures are useful in two ways – firstly, in telegraphing that the public in these countries are firmly behind the actions of Governments and people giving that concrete aid and are actually pushing for more. Secondly, in boosting morale. Morale and the cohesion it provides are crucial in warfare (as per von Clauswitz); when you are fighting and in horrible situations, such gestures help more than you would imagine.

In order to support the transition towards electric vehicles, we are providing EV chargers in Dictric Council car parks across the Vale. Work has begun in Abingdon (Cattle Market and West St Helen) and Wantage (Portway), and work is now beginning in Faringdon. The intent is to support residents without off-street parking overnight and provide topups to commuters and visitors during the daytime. 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David Johnston MP for Wantage and South Oxfordshire

I am writing this at home, having caught Covid. I am pretty sure I had it right at the start of the pandemic, in early 2020, but it was before the testing regime we developed so I can't know for sure. This time, I've definitely had the 2 lines, confirmed by a PCR.

It isn't pleasant but I've had all 3 jabs and so I mostly have symptoms of a head cold and fatigue.

I have a partner but being at home alone all day makes me think of 2 things: firstly, how hard it must be to be on your own all the time. If you can, please volunteer for organisations like the Didcot Good Neighbour Scheme, through which I see a widower each week. The second thing I'm reminded of is what a vital job all the various community groups did during the pandemic to support their neighbours.

You may or may not know that PMQs are predominately allocated by electronic ballot the week before they take place. Having been drawn for only 1 PMQ in my first 25 months, I was then drawn for a further 2 in just 3 weeks. The first I used to raise the lack of new GP surgeries we've had to support all the new houses that have been built. The second I used to raise the reservoir proposal, a shadow of uncertainty over the Steventon, Hanneys and Drayton area for over 2 decades now.

For all the yah boo politics PMQs has long been criticised for, it remains the best place to raise a local issue as it is a rare occasion when the House of Commons is full, people outside parliament are watching on tv and it means the Prime Minister's office swings into action to help deal with the issues you're having.

It was very moving to be in the House of Commons for President Zelensky's address to MPs, as it has been to watch him and the Ukrainian people resist the brutal invasion Putin has launched of their country, with support from the UK and its allies. I know people have been frustrated by the pace at which refugees are being brought to the UK and I agree the system did not move fast enough at the outset. It is now moving much faster, and we have several generous strands for entry. It is important that we know we can put in the right support the refugees that we take – we still have Afghans in hotels in Oxfordshire because we don't have houses for them – and so we have to make sure we have the right health, education and pastoral support in place as soon as possible, which the Government is working hard on.

One final thing: Grove library is 50 years old this year and has a great collection of items from 1972 (or thereabouts) on display for a month!

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
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Drayton Diaries
