


various ways (hint: laminate it too!)

-Use the whole sheet as a low-tech communication board for students to select what they want to say

-Cut into 8 separate pieces to use as communication cards. Student can choose which card to hand to recipients to communicate different messages

-Cut into 8 separate pieces to use as prompts for switch users. Program one of these messages into a switch communicator and place the corresponding card in the symbol holder or tape it over the switch.





Greetings Signs

Print these signs to act as visual prompts for students, reminding them to greet or even say goodbye.


-Place them in the doorway of your classroom or other appropriate locations to visually prompt students to initiate a greeting.

-Hold it up at appropriate times to visually prompt a student to initiate a greeting


-Non-verbal students could use it as a communication card, to hold up or give to others to say hello or goodbye

Communication Corner

Ideas for using different switch communicators to practice greeting skills




Program in a simple greeting message, such as "hi". Students can activate their switch to communicate their message whenever appropriate, such as to initiate an interaction or respond to another's greeting.




Program in individualized greetings for each of a students classmates (ex. use their names). The student can then step through the messages to greet each of their peers personally. Great for during class routines, such as morning meeting. Be sure that the order in which the student is greeting others matches the

order in which the messages are programmed!




Program in an assortment of greeting phrases. Students activate the switch to play one of the messages at random. This can be a useful tool for teaching students that there are many different and acceptable ways to greet somebody.



Take greetings a step beyond by responding and engaging in a conversation. Program in a social script, then connect an external switch and have a second student (or yourself) play the other role as you have a back

and forth conversation. Fantastic for learning the turn-taking aspect of a conversation - one cannot respond until the other has finished their message.



Assign one switch to always play one message and the other to always play a different one. This can introduce students to the option of choosing a different greeting based on situational context or simply personal preference. It could also work as a hello/goodbye switch (tip: place by the door to prompt students to communicate a greeting). It can also be useful in the beginning stages of responding to greetings, like with sequencing. It can specifically benefit students who cognitively need two different switches for perform two different functions.



Program in an assortment of common greeting phrases. The student uses an external switch to step through the series of messages to line up the desired one, then presses their main switch to play the selected choice at full volume. Students could choose messages simply based on personal preference (ex. "hello" vs "what's up", or even situational context (ex. "good morning", "good afternoon" "good evening")

A different idea would be to externally step through the message options yourself to line up a message for the student. For example, if a student wants to individually greet each classmate but you are unsure of the order in which students will interact, you can program in the personal greetings ahead of time, then line up the appropriate message when necessary.
