Summary Care Record

From March 31st 2015, the Summary Care Record will come into force.

Summary Care Records (SCR) contain important information about any medication, allergies, and adverse reactions which you may have suffered.

Who can access my SCR?

Only healthcare staff involved in supporting or providing your care can access the information via their NHS smartcard. Their details will be recorded each time

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they view and will only be able to see the information they need to do their job. You can ask your surgery for a copy of your SCR, and although you will not be permitted to change any information written by the healthcare staff, should you notice any errors or incorrect information, please let the surgery know.

If you would prefer to opt out of the SCR and have not previously done so, then you must let your GP know by filling in and returning an opt-out form, which will be available at the surgery. For more information, please visit www. nhscarerecords.nhs.uk/ or call in at the surgery.

Suckley's Defibrillator

Do you know how to access Suckley's defibrillator? It could be lifesaving.

Do 'Spread the Word' so that anyone and everyone who could use or benefit from a defibrillator knows that there is one on the wall of Suckley School. It's climate controlled cabinet is NOT locked (but it is alarmed and will squeal while the door is open!)

Remember:

Urgency is vital. Shout or phone for help.

Dial 999 or 112 (112 works throughout Europe and will override a 'locked' mobile phone).

Look after your safety and the immediate needs of the casualty (prioritise first aid like chest compressions) and send someone else (by phone if you are alone) to collect the defibrillator.

Anyone can use a defibrillator, even with no training. It will instruct you step by step and will not deliver a shock unless a shock is needed.

Our children and pets don't understand speed limits. Neither do they appreciate the danger when there isn't a limit. For the sake of ALL, great and small, please SLOW DOWN !

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An autumn cake for Suckley's bounteous produce. Richard Allen's apple and walnut cake

Hilary Pitt writes: This recipe was one of the cakes served at the Stocks Farm Open Day. I had a request for the recipe and here it is. I cut this recipe out of a magazine around 12 years ago but have forgotten who Richard Allen is! All I can say is, thanks Richard, nice cake and perfect for this time of year.

INGREDIENTS	
40g (1½oz) sultanas, soaked in 35ml (1½fl oz) brandy or cognac for several hours or overnight	1 tsp vanilla extract
350g (12oz) apples, Bramley preferably	1 tsp ground cinnamon
the juice and zest of ½ a lemon	185g (6½oz) plain flour, sifted
100g (3½oz) butter	½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
150g (5oz) sugar	½ tsp baking power
1 egg	50g (2oz) chopped walnuts

METHOD


- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/gas mark 4.
- 2. Line a 15cm (6in) cake tin with paper and set aside. Peel the apples and slice enough to arrange and cover the bottom of the tin. Grate the remaining apple and mix with the lemon juice and zest.
- 3. Cream together the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy. Gradually add the egg and vanilla extract, beating after each addition. Fold in all the dry ingredients as well as the grated apples and sultanas. Pour over the arranged apple slices in the tin and level off.
- 4. Bake for 40 minutes to one hour, reducing the temperature to 150C/300F/ gas mark 2 (if the cake colours too quickly) for the last 15 mins. A knife when inserted will come away clean when the cake is cooked. Cool in the tin for half and hour, then remove from tin to finish cooling.

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A glimpse into life in Suckley in the 16th Century

R M O Capper of The Stocks writes about an early ancestor and discovers an inventory of his ancestor's goods and chattels as listed after his death.

My earliest recorded ancestor Richard Whittingsloe, alias Caper, lived and died in Suckley in 1646.

The Worcester Records Office let me have a copy of the settlement of his estate, a total of £4-3-10 at that time. It appears he was a butcher, possibly supplying the inhabitants of the parish. It would be wonderful to know where he had lived as there could not have been may houses in Suckley at that time.

His wife Maria neé Whittingsloe, was illiterate, making a rough 'M' on the document, not many people could read or write in the 1600s. The name Whittingsloe was part of the family name for some generations. I understand the name is derived from the occupation of wool bleaching or whitening.

The Cappers were those who made woollen caps, generally worn in the middle ages. Wool was the wealth of England. In the 14th century King Edward III (1327-1377) commanded that his Lord Chancellor whilst in council should sit on a wool bale, now known as "The Woolsack", in order to symbolise the central nature and huge importance of the wool trade to the economy of England in the Middle Ages.

Richard was buried in Bromyard, when the town was seeing much activity during the English Civil War.

Suckley History Society goes back 900 years in Leigh

On a warm and sunny evening last month, members and friends of our local history society gathered in the magnificent splendour of the medieval Leigh Court Barn, courtesy of the Advani family. Our Chairman gave a brief talk on its almost 800 year history, explaining that it is the largest and one of the oldest surviving cruck barns in Britain with a tile roof of ½ acre. Dendrology and radiocarbon tests suggest that it was built around 1325 for the monastic grange owned by the Abbots of Pershore. With the dissolution of the monasteries, Leigh grange passed into private hands in 1540 and the barn has been used as farm building until the mid 1980's when English Heritage funded a careful preservation and the building was opened to the public.

After exploring this ancient cruck framed barn, which is around 10 metres high and wide and over 40 meter long, the history group wandered along to the adjacent Leigh Church of St Ethelburga, which forms part of the classic medieval grouping of church, tithe barn and manor house. Here we were welcomed by Sheila and Jeffery Wright who entertained us with a presentation on the history of this 900 year old church. It is believed there was a 10th century monastery in Leigh, administered from the Benedictine Pershore Abbey, which was mentioned in the Domesday Book. The church was developed over three hundred years with the tower finally added in the 14th century.

We learnt that key features of the church are its imposing Early English Arcade, a Norman Font, a fine carved and painted 15th century screen, several fine tombs and a very rare 12th century stone effigy of Christ in Benediction which almost ended up in the Victoria & Albert Museum in London. This is now housed in the Lady Chapel but was originally placed in a Norman Arch high on the North wall. Following the dissolution of the monasteries in 1536, the Leigh estate (as well the Suckley estate) passed to Edmond Colles as Lord of the Manor and his family are celebrated in a fine tomb within the church.

The church has number of fine tombs and effigies including that of Sir Walter Devereux, Viscount Hereford who acquired the estate from the Colles and built Leigh Court. During the Victorian period the church was sympathetically modernised to include many fine stained glass features. Our group then enjoyed refreshments in the church kindly provided by Jean Colley and Sheila Wright.

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Where does a squirrel hid his nuts?!

Well, in my garden, a squirrel has been busy over the past few weeks burying nuts and seeds all over the garden including my plant pots. I cannot help but smile as I watch it carefully 'plant' the hazelnut, finding just the right spot in the lawn and daintily patting down the grass to fully cover its winter food store.

The grey squirrel, now the most common form found in England since the demise of the red squirrel, originally came from north America. As a species squirrels have been around for more than 35 million years and Australia and Antarctica are the only continents in the world that don't have squirrels. You may love them or loathe their destructive behaviour, they are however, a pretty smart and resourceful animal.

Squirrels can run as fast as 20 mph, survive a fall from a height of 100 feet (it has padded feet), jump a distance of 20 feet, and has a lifespan of (usually) 10 to 12 years if not eaten by a fox or owl or killed on the road.

A squirrel has a very large appetite. In a week, it eats a quantity of food that is almost equal to its body weight. They are mostly omnivores, eating nuts, fruits, seeds, buds, flowers, and even the bark of trees. Another delicacy for them is tree sap and they also feed on insects, small birds and their eggs. Squirrels cannot differentiate between the colours green and red and will often eat unripe fruits.

Squirrels have very sharp teeth, which continue to grow throughout their life. These incisors are used for cracking nuts or chewing through things to find food for example, horse chestnuts. They keep their teeth sharp by gnawing on wires or rocks.

And how, do you wonder, does the squirrel finds its nuts that it so carefully buried in the autumn? Well, they lick or rub the nut on their face, before burying it. This leaves a scent which allows the squirrel to find it when hungry. Now that's smart, isn't it?

News from Suckley Parish Council Meeting Held on 8th September 2014

District Councillor – Anthony Warburton reported to the meeting. He emphasised his continuing concern and opposition to the proposed sharing of a Chief Executive with Wychavon District Council. Malvern Hills District Council did not appear to be considering other options. He was looking into taking further action on this proposal

Community Group – First World War Centenary 2014

Cllrs Andrew Grieve and Peter Whatley are still investigating the idea of a large piece of granite as a memorial with an engraved plaque. It was agreed that this would have to be a worthy tribute to the men and women of Suckley Parish who had given their lives in the two World Wars and others since.

Playing Fields – Since Cllr John Green fitted a new door and frame at the Playing Fields Pavilion, it has been broken into and the large copper hot water cylinder has been removed. A new lock and keys have now been put in place. The planning process for new Playing Fields equipment is ongoing. Cllr Carol Luton will be visiting Suckley School to find out what type of play equipment the children would like.

Suckley Church - The Christmas Fair will be held in the Village Hall on Saturday 6th December.

Highways – Thanks to Co Cllr Paul Tuthill, quite a lot of progress has been made with outstanding Highways matters in Suckley Parish. Potholes and resurfacing work has been completed in Birchwood Lane/Mousehole Bridge/Nelson Pub/ Tundridge Mill. Blackhouse Lane is also listed for pothole repair work in the next few weeks with a "midi" patcher being used to carry out a more permanent repair later this year. Reports have been received about the danger of overhanging branches/hedges in the area. The Clerk is following these up with County Highways/landowners.

Footpaths – The Clerk had received a letter from our Footpath Wardens – Richard Harward and Peter Markins. Both of these stalwart Wardens have looked after our footpaths in the Parish for some considerable time – Richard for

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ten years and Peter over four years ago. Due to health reasons, they are both now wishing to retire. The Council recorded their very grateful thanks to Richard and Peter for all the excellent work they had done over the years to ensure that Suckley footpaths were kept in good repair. The Council are now looking for one or two volunteers to keep up the good work – if you are interested, please contact the Clerk, Diana Taylor, or any of our Councillors. Both Richard and Peter would be pleased to help any new volunteer(s) to get started.

Police/Crime Report – Cllr P Whatley has been keeping an eye on the Police Crime Reports. So far, one ASB has been reported on their statistics in July. However, there have been a number of thefts recently from outbuildings in the area (including our Pavilion) and we wait to see what the figures will show for August. In the meantime, all parishioners should be aware of this recent spate of thefts and take extra security action.

Vas – Speeding – Cllr Peter Whatley has analysed the speeding data retrieved from the VAS camera from 14th July through to 26th August. The latest data was consistent with previous recordings, showing speeds in excess of 30 mph but the majority of vehicles exceeding the limit by under 5 mph. The number of vehicles exceeding 40 mph is very low, and a very small number of vehicles recording speeds of 55-60 mph generally in the early hours of the morning. Knightwick Road remains more prone to speeding than Stocks Road through Longley Green.

Wind turbines – Cllr Barry Kearley drew the attention of the Council to the planning applications/consultations being sought by G2 for the erection of a wind turbine 77 metres high just outside the Parish boundary (in Herefordshire). This would be highly visible, and he believed that others could follow, possibly in Suckley itself. Co Cllr Paul Tuthill stated that it was against Worcestershire County Council's policy to have turbines.
