- 2 16, Dallam Avenue BD18 4PA: Last year's winning garden features flowers, fruit and late summer colour with contrasting areas to front and rear. Also open for Shiatsu massage.
- 3 47, Albert Road BD18 4NS: The garden of a stone maker's house features succulents, herbs and exotics. Hear stories of local connections to the succulents and also learn about the house.
- 4 21, Albert Road BD18 4NR: This mature site attracts birds, bees and other wildlife and includes both planted beds and pots. Cards, coasters, calendars and more for sale.
- **5 9, Albert Road BD18 4NR:** Cacti and buns on sale for Water Aid plus a vintage jewellery stall. Also, find out more about Forest of Saltaire as this project is launched.

- **(6) 7, Albert Road BD18 4NR:** A shingle front garden with a sleeper-edged bed. The back is home to a collection of plants in pots.
