### Nurse's Office

Welcome to all new students and families of Hodgson Vo-Tech! Thank you to all those who turned in their ORANGE Emergency Cards! If you are in need of additional cards, or have any contact changes during the school year, please contact the Nurse's office and Guidance.

Please contact us if your child has Diabetes, Seizures, Asthma or Food/Insect allergies. These students are required to have an annual Emergency Action Plan. Emergency plans require us to have on hand a 3-day supply of medication for a serious medical condition such as Diabetes, Seizures, or Asthma. A physician and a parent/guardian must sign these written orders.

Parents/guardians please be advised that all 9<sup>th</sup> graders will have hearing, vision, and postural/gait screenings performed this year. If you do NOT want your child screened, please notify the nurse's office in writing.

If your child has had any major changes in his or her health status such as injuries, surgeries, major illnesses, or medication changes; please contact the nurse's office. If your child will be taking any prescription medications in school, please contact our office. All over the counter and prescription medications (excluding asthma inhalers and epipen) must be stores and dispensed in our office. Medications MUST be sent in a correctly labeled prescription bottle and accompanied by a parent note. You can access our Nurse's Office website at hodgsonde.com under Student Services.

The cold and flu season is approaching quickly. The CDC recommends these steps to decrease the spread of the flu virus. We encourage you to reinforce these strategies with your child to keep them healthy this year. The CDC recommends:

- \*WASH YOUR HANDS with soap and water!! If soap and water is not available, use alcohol sanitizers. Students may bring in their own cough drops.
- \*Use a tissue when you cough or sneeze and dispose of it properly. If tissues are not available, sneeze or cough into your elbow or sleeve.
- \*Avoid touching your nose, mouth, and eyes. This is how germs are spread.
- \*Do NOT share personal items such as phones, cups, lipsticks, utensils, etc.
- \*Clean surfaces such as computers, phone, and doorknobs.
- \*STAY HOME if you're ill or experiencing flu-like symptoms (aches, couch, fatigue, and/or fever over 100F). A student may return to school when they are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medicine.
- \*Keep tissues, juices, fever-reducing medications, etc. at home in case of illness.
- \*Develop a contingency plan for pick up, if your child is ill and you are not available for transportation.
- \*Practice good health habits such as getting enough rest, eating a well-balanced diet, exercise and stress reduction techniques.

# HVT Students Participate in ACE Mentoring Program

Hodgson's Technical Drafting sophomore, junior, and senior students are participating in the ACE Mentoring Program for the fourth year in a row. This nationwide program is designed to introduce them to the wide range of career opportunities open to young people in the fields of architecture, construction, engineering, and related areas of the building design and construction industry.

At weekly meetings, student teams work directly with professionals from leading area firms, who volunteen their time to mentor the teams as they design hypothetical projects, tour local construction sites, and visit architectural, engineering and construction offices.

For students, it's a unique chance to discover and develop new skills, solidify future goals and get on track to exciting, rewarding careers. In addition, many students form positive relationships with industry professional who can provide important references for obtaining college admissions, scholarships, internships and full-time employment.

Students in the ACE program work closely with their mentors on projects that provide hands-on experience in solving the types of design, engineering and construction challenges industry professionals confront every day. The teams learn the basic fundamentals of a construction project from site selection, to design, procurement and finally construction. In addition to the basic fundamentals students are also exposed to advanced computerized design tools, such as AutoCAD, Revit, and BIM (Building Information Systems).

This year's design challenge is to develop open space in the new Town of White Hall in Middletown, DE. Students were given a tour of what the existing site looks like and asked to develop ideas to fill the surrounding space.

Through the yearly project and related activities students quickly learn about the industry's demand for young people skilled in math, physics, economics, art and other disciplines.

Students will work throughout the year to prepare and deliver comprehensive development plans for the site. The culmination of this preparation is the year-end presentations. These presentations are delivered to various industry professionals, state legislators, NCCVT personnel, and parents at an end of the year breakfast in March.

Each year the mentors and Board of Directors identify exemplary students and award scholarships to those deserving individuals to assist in furthering their career development through college or trade school. To date ACE Mentor of Delaware has awarded \$30,000 in scholarships! Last year ACE awarded Hodgson students over \$7500 in scholarship money.





### Attendance Reminders

PARENTS-A Few Reminders from the Attendance Office, please reference "Section IV: Attendance" beginning on page 27 of the Student Parent Handbook.

- 1. Please remember if your child requires an early dismissal, he/she must turn a note into the Main Office BEFORE 9am.
- 2. If your child is late to school, he/she will not be considered tardy unexcused. Four <u>unexcused</u> lates will result in a detention. An <u>excused</u> tardy is given when the student provides, at the time of the tardiness, a written note of explanation from the parent/guardian for reasons listed in the handbook.
- 3. Upon returning from an absence, a student must submit a written note from a parent/guardian citing the reason for each absence to the Attendance Office. Recently, we have received a large number of absence notes without the reason listed. We cannot excuse an absence without a reason. If a student does not present a note containing an approved excuse within three days of returning to school, the absence will be considered unexcused. Please also make sure that your child's absence note includes their first AND last name and the date of the absence.
