### CEO Update

#### **Chief Executive Officer – Update**

I would like to start by thanking everyone who completed our Annual Voluntary Sector Survey and apologise for what may be described as us pestering you. Your views however are very important to us and have helped us to conduct our annual review Thanks to your continued support; we received 165 responses to our Annual Voluntary Sector Survey which for us is an impressive 25% return on the numbers circulated. We also received 90% response from our service satisfaction and partnership involvement questionnaires.

We used the data provided to revisit and revise our Vision, mission, aims & objectives, prioritised our services, and agreed to continue our pledge not to compete with other local charities, community groups and not for profit social enterprises within the borough for the delivery of frontline services.

We had hoped to have moved our Volunteer
Driver Service and Carer's Service to a more
appropriate local organisation by now, however
we are waiting for RMBC to put the Community
Transport Service out to tender, and have been
informed by NHS Heywood, Middleton &
Rochdale Clinical Commissioning Group that our
dementia carer's project has been extended for
6 months whilst a review of services is being
conducted.

The past few months have been very busy but also very exciting; we have been involved on behalf of the public service reform board in the Making A Difference on Kirkholt Pilot project which has been a new kind of challenge for us. The Kirkholt Million plan has also been approved by Big Local and we will be acting as the Local Trusted Organisation for the Kirkholt Million Partnership and are looking forward to

We have continued to support NHS Heywood, Middleton & Rochdale Clinical Commissioning Group (the CCG) with their Social Investment Fund, this has involved us being part of the decision making panel and supporting the Advisory Group. Many groups have been funded through this valuable support to the sector, however many others have been left disappointed. We have provided support to some of those groups who are no longer funded through this grants programme and those who were unsuccessful to research and apply for alternative sources of funding. We are hoping to continue this work for another year, and broker more effective relationships between the CCG and the sector. Through joint commissioning plans between the Council and the CCG we are also hoping to better support the health & wellbeing services.



# Admin Apprentice

My name is Aneesa Raza, and I was attracted to the apprenticeship opportunity within CVS Rochdale as the organisation provides support to the voluntary sector in the borough of Rochdale. As most of their work is supporting the development of local charities, social enterprises, community and faith groups, this was an added bonus as I am very passionate about the sector and have been involved in a number of local groups as a volunteer.

When I looked into it more, I felt that this was a perfect job for me as it gave me a chance to learn more about the voluntary sector and increase my work skills around business administration at the same time.

My main role is to provide admin support to the staff; this includes supporting the financial management support officer by processing invoices, recording cheques and banking.

I provide more general support such as photocopying, word processing, dealing with incoming and outgoing post, and dealing with telephone calls and filing.

I also support the partnership development officer with the facilitation of meetings, setting up the room, taking minutes of meetings, circulating other documentation and assisting other preparations.

This has been very interesting and has enabled me to meet more groups working in the borough.

I have also recently become more involved in supporting the Volunteer Centre work, contacting residents who have accessed the service to find out if they have been placed in a volunteering role, and if they have, what difference it has made to them.. I also do regular newsletters and E—Bulletins.





### Volunteer Centre

The Volunteer centre has been working in partnership with Oldham Voluntary Action, Community Voluntary Action Tameside and CAB Oldham on a joint project to deliver free training within the boroughs of Oldham, Rochdale and Tameside to engage with organisations from the voluntary, community and faith sector that are already delivering some level of advice/welfare/financial support in their local settings. CAB will look to form long term relationships with these groups and will offer them:

- The one day training in reception, information and 'signposting' skills
- The option for building skills further through Citizens Advice 'gateway' training
- On-going support from CAB staff to ensure all advice the organisations' offer is up to date

A referral mechanism directly to CAB advice services to escalate issues once they have been through the local gateway service.

The Volunteer Centre and CAB has engaged with a number or Statutory and VCSE organisations in Rochdale Borough over the last couple of months including Burnside Community Centre, Riverside Housing, Royal Voluntary Service, Sure Start Children's Centres, Rochdale & District Mind, The Lighthouse Project, Rochdale Libraries, Rochdale Connections Trust, The Bond Board, Stepping Stones project, and Freehold Community Group.

#### **Forever Manchester Awards**

On a cold Friday night in March 2015 it was time for the Forever Manchester awards ceremony held at the Midland Hotel. Forever Manchester is a charitable organisation, formally known as The Community Foundation for Greater Manchester, who source funds from individuals and organisations that they then award to worthwhile local community initiatives.

Archie Kelly from Phoenix Nights was the compare for the evening that included entertainment from youth groups and presentation of awards in front of an audience of four hundred people raising £38,000 on the night.



Harry accepted the award with a note of thanks to Bruce Learner, manager of Kellogg's who were sponsoring the award and Nick Massey, chief executive of Forever Manchester for his continued support.



Awards were presented to a variety of individuals and groups who tirelessly work in their local communities to enhance the lives of other, organising events and workshops that help people from many different backgrounds achieve goals.

The ultimate award on the night was the Lifetime Achievement Award and that was awarded to Harry Alldritt of Middleton for involvement in different charitable organisations over many years. Harry has worked in the past with St. John Ambulance and The European Scout Federation to secure funds which has helped purchase uniforms and camp equipment respectively.

Other projects have been arranging a model railway display at a local children's hospital and creating improved commuter experiences at Mills Hill and Rochdale railway stations by making planters and situating them with plant boxes on the platform and clearing the access areas to make the area safer.

Harry has a long association with Forever Manchester and has been a member of their funding panel for many years.

### Learning and Peer Support

### <u>Learning, Development & Peer</u> Support

I have recently returned to Rochdale fulltime after my secondment over in Tameside came to an end. Since my return I have spent most of my time doing some work in relation to the Public Service Reform Board.

The Public Service Reform Board is, initially, intending to work with people in Balderstone and Kirkholt to better understand how people access public services and use the local residents to help co-design any new delivery models and make improvements to existing ones. The work that is being done is going to focus on meeting the challenge of continuing to deliver vital public services such as urgent care, GPs, policing, fire service and social services etc in the face of reduced resources.

The pilot scheme in Kirkholt will be used to test how services may be delivered and as part of this I worked on behalf of CVS to help plan and run a community engagement event where we wanted to capture the views of local residents. The event took place on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> April at Kirkholt Community Church and was open to residents of Kirkholt and Balderstone. We got lucky with the weather and had a good turnout

A number of public service organisations were present and all of them reported back that they had found the event really useful and they had all had some very good conversations with local residents.

As the event took place during the Easter Holidays we had a number of exciting activities on offer including badge making, sunflower seed planting and face painting. Now that I am back in Rochdale I will also be focussing, once again, on the delivery of Peer Support. As I outlined in my last update, Peer Support is run in partnership with Rochdale Council and is there to help any voluntary or community organisation that works in the Borough of Rochdale.

It is designed to help you in areas such as funding, monitoring, finance, managing volunteers and business planning.

I have also attended some training around the Grant Finder portal since my last update and will be sending out some information about this in the coming weeks.

#### Care Act 2015

The Care Act comes into effect from April 2015 and brings with it major reforms to the social care system, including the strongest ever rights for carers.


According to Carers UK, "The Care Act replaces most current law regarding carers and people being cared for. It outlines the way in which local authorities should carry out carer's assessments and needs assessments; how local authorities should determine who is eligible for support; the new obligations on local authorities; and how local authorities should charge for both residential care and community care. "

For Carers, the new act means that they will no longer have to show that they provide "regular and substantial care" in order to be entitled to a Carer's Assessment. Instead, Carers will be entitled to an assessment where they have needs that "match the rights of the person being cared for."


