DIRECTORS' ANNUAL REPORT

The Directors submit their report and the audited financial statements of The Wood Foundation Africa (TWFA) for the year ended 31 March 2018.

Legal and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The accounts comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

TWFA is a wholly owned subsidiary of The Wood Foundation which was established by Sir Ian Wood and family and was officially launched on 14 September 2007. The Wood Foundation is a Scottish based charity with a global outlook.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Nature of Governing Document

The Wood Foundation Africa is a company limited by guarantee (company number SC361033) and a registered Scottish charity (charity number SC040580). The charitable company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Organisational Structure

The Board of Directors administer the charitable company. The Executive Chairman manages the day to day operations of the charitable company.

Recruitment and Appointment of Directors

The powers of appointment and removal of Directors are set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

It is the charitable company's policy to seek to appoint Directors who have a specific interest in its objects or whose skills can complement those already in place.

Induction and Training of Directors

The Directors have been given appropriate information and training regarding their legal roles and responsibilities upon appointment to the Board.

Risk Management

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finance of the charitable company and are satisfied that systems are in place to manage the exposure to major risk.

TRUST OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of TWFA are to promote and advance for the public benefit the charitable activities of The Wood Foundation (Scottish charity number SC037957) both in the United Kingdom and overseas. These aims are achieved by actively promoting and carrying out projects supported or to be supported by The Wood Foundation and by doing anything else of a charitable nature which may further the domestic and overseas work of The Wood Foundation for public benefit and to promote similar charitable purposes, objects or institutions and in such preparation and manner as the Directors shall think fit. Principally, the activities of The Wood Foundation Africa are under The Wood Foundation's 'Making Markets Work for the Poor in Sub-Saharan Africa' which at present mainly comprises of projects to help improve the income and livelihoods of approximately 60,000 smallholder tea farmers in Tanzania and Rwanda.

CHAIRMAN'S REVIEW

Strategic Report

The Directors present their strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2018.

Assessment of Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties faced by The Wood Foundation Africa ('TWFA') relate to climatic conditions; global tea prices; and political stability. These risks are mitigated by choosing areas with a good history of tea-growing conditions; partnering with reputable tea producers where applicable; and by recruiting suitably qualified and experienced staff as our operations expand. Financial controls and systems are also in place to manage exposure to major risks, including ensuring that adequate levels of reserves are maintained to withstand any downturn.

Executive Summary

The Wood Foundation, which was founded in 2007, is the parent charity of TWFA and supports TWFA to deliver The Wood Foundation's African programme - Making Markets Work for the Poor in sub-Saharan Africa. Our strategy is clear - we apply our business acumen and global experience to venture philanthropy to improve the income and livelihoods of smallholder farmers in East Africa.

In partnership with Lord David Sainsbury's Gatsby Charitable Foundation ('Gatsby'), we've continued to develop a range of smallholder tea development projects and are the recognised philanthropist in smallholder tea farming, working directly with farmers and providing long-term finance and operational support to help them become small businesses and thus plan ahead and help themselves. To date our projects have transformationally impacted over 45,000 smallholder tea farmers in Tanzania and Rwanda, and our more recent new greenfield tea development projects which have commenced in the past 4 years will impact a further 15,000. We continue to operate two large tea processing factories in Rwanda which together produce approximately 20% of the tea produced in that country. These are part-owned by smallholder tea farmers, and TWFA continue to progress the plan to eventually pass our shares to smallholder ownership. We also operate three services companies delivering a full suite of financial and operational support to large-scale smallholder greenfield developments which together will plant out approximately 10,000 hectares of smallholder tea supplying new-build state of the art tea factories owned by internationally recognised tea producers. We have successfully leveraged our own funds by attracting other philanthropic investors and donors to impact large numbers of smallholder tea farmers, including the UK Department for International Development (DFID).

CHAIRMAN'S REVIEW (continued)

The Wood Foundation's charitable spend and commitment to date is £92 million, £21 million of which was spent through TWFA. Current funds in the parent charity are close to £111 million.

Charitable Activities During the 2017/18 Year

Making Markets Work for the Poor in Sub-Saharan Africa

We continue to operate two significant projects - 'Chai' in Tanzania and 'Imbarutso' in Rwanda. Chai means 'tea' in Kiswahili and Imbarutso means 'to catalyse' in Kinyarwanda. Both continue to make a significant impact within the tea industry, improving the livelihoods of more than 45,000 smallholder tea farmers in rural communities.

The two tea processing factores we purchased in Rwanda in late 2012, Mulindi and Shagasha, are performing well and as a result of our ongoing investment, are now much better equipped to produce good quality tea. The regular feedback from our smallholder partners is very encouraging as they put the higher income levels to good use for the benefit of their families. During the financial year events were held at both Mulindi and Shagasha factories to celebrate the very significant improvement in the farmers earnings over the period. Between 4,500 and 5,000 farmers attended each event to sing and dance and say thank you. They were very exhilarating and encouraging occasions. We continue to progress towards transferring ownership of the factories to the smallholder farmers upon recovery of our principal investment at nil return, and when they achieve certain capacity and governance KPI's.

The first of our major greenfield developments commenced 4 years ago in Njombe in Southern Tanzania where we fund and support large numbers of smallholders to plant tea. We are approximately half way through the 2,500 hectares development and are training the smallholders in good agronomic practice to maximise yields, quality and therefore income. Unilever recently opened the newly built state of the art factory that will be majority supplied by these smallholders. The project will transform smallholder tea farming through innovation in block management, smallholder irrigation, and mechanized harvesting.

Our other two greenfield developments are located in Southern Rwanda where we have partnered with Unilever at Nyaruguru and with Luxmi at Rugabano who will each build a large tea factory that will be exclusively supplied by the smallholder farmer. These are larger scale projects compared to Tanzania and together will plant out about 8,000 hectares of new smallholder tea. These are key projects in extremely poor areas of Rwanda where the acidic soil is good for tea-growing but very poor for many food crops. These regions were very badly affected by the Genocide and these projects will help transform the lives of many smallholder farmers as well as having a transformational impact on the regional economy.

DFID's UK Aid programme has supported all three of our greenfield developments which together are targeted to significantly impact the livelihoods of 15,000 new smallholder tea farmers as well as the future competitiveness of tea in each country.

Charitable activity spend by TWFA in the year was £5.2 million.

The larger grants made by the charity during the year were £2 million to East African Tea Investments. See note 19.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Plans for Future Year

In addition to continuing the current charitable activities we are exploring potential new smallholder projects in East Africa.

The net incoming resources for the year, amounting to £379,000 (2017 - £3,636,000) have been dealt with as shown in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Directors have prepared financial statements which are in accordance with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice (FRS102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

The income of the Charity for the year ending 31 March 2018 was £5.5 million (2017 - £8.5 million) which includes £1.8 million (2017 - £4.3 million) of donations received from The Wood Foundation.

Charitable expenditure for the year was £5.2 million (2017 - £4.9 million), as detailed in Note 6.

At the year end The Wood Foundation Africa held £4.7m in cash at bank.

Reserves

It is the Reserves Policy of The Wood Foundation Africa to only retain a minimal level of reserves. Projects are funded through a combination of funding from the parent charity, The Wood Foundation, The Gatsby Charitable Foundation, our philanthropic partner and other donors including The UK's Department for International Development ('DFID').

Total reserves held at 31 March 2018 were £5.2m (2017 - £4.8m), of which £12,000 (2017 - £194,000) were held in restricted reserves.

All restricted funds held at 31 March 2018 were expected to be utilised within the next 12 months.

The Directors are satisfied that the level of reserves held at 31 March 2018 is in line with the Reserves Policy, and will be used for ongoing project expenditure.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 MARCH 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of accounts preparation

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006. The company constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

(b) Going concern

The Directors, having made due and careful enquiry and preparing forecasts, are of the opinion that the company has adequate working capital to execute its operations over the next 12 months. The Directors, therefore, have made an informed judgement, at the time of approving the financial statements, that there is a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. As a result, the Directors have continued to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

(c) Income

i) Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

ii) Investment income

Income from investments is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is receivable. Investment income includes the computed tax credit and tax deducted at source.

(d) Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised when the charity has an obligation to make a payment to a third party.

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure is directly attributed to the relevant category in the Statement of Financial Activities where practical. Other expenditure is allocated on a pro-rata basis based on the anticipated allocation between the three main areas of investment.

Grants or instalments of grants offered in connection with projects with institutions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year when the offer is conveyed to the recipient except in those cases where the offer is conditional and the conditions are within the control of the charity, such grants being recognised as expenditure when payment is made.

Conditional grants where the conditions are outwith the control of the charity are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in full in the year in which the offer is conveyed.

Grants which have been conveyed in the year but not recognised as expenditure are disclosed as contingent liabilities in the financial statements.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 MARCH 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(e) Taxation

The company is recognised by HM Revenue & Customs as a charity and, as a consequence of the tax reliefs available in relation to the current year, certain income streams are not liable to taxation. For surpluses which are outwith this exemption, the income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

(f) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are capitalised at cost and written off over their expected useful lives as follows:

Plant and equipment

30% and 12.5% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

25% straight line

(g) Foreign currencies

Assets, liabilities, revenues and costs denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rates of exchange ruling at the dates of the transactions; monetary assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date are translated at the year-end rate of exchange. The resulting profits or losses are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activities.

(h) Joint arrangements

Where the charity enters into a joint arrangement, such that it carries out activities in partnership with other bodies, without forming a separate legal partnership, then the charity's gross share of the incoming resources and resources expended and the assets and liabilities are included in the accounts.

(i) Funds

Unrestricted funds include incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds. These funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor.

(j) Pensions

Eligible employees are members of defined contribution pension schemes. Pension costs charged to the Statement of Financial Activities represents the contributions payable by the company in the year.

(k) Financial instruments

The charitable company only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other accounts receivable and payable and loans to related and third parties.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade payables or receivables, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration, expected to be paid or received. However if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the statement of financial position when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

2 JUDGMENTS IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of financial statements, requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported during the year for income and expenditure. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

19 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Control

Throughout the year the company was controlled by the Board of Directors.

The parent charity is The Wood Foundation, a charity registered in Scotland.

Transactions

The company has taken advantage of the exemption contained in Financial Reporting Standard 102 S33.1A from disclosing transactions with parties wholly owned within the same group.

During the year, the charity made grants totalling £2,172,240 (2017 - £3,028,188) to East African Tea Investments, a joint venture of parent charity The Wood Foundation. A balance of £196,509 (2017 - £NIL) remains outstanding in relation to these grants at the year end.

At the year end the charity had amounts due totalling £417,939 (2017 - £405,286) from Mulindi Factory Company Limited and £276,163 (2017 - £284,524) from Shagasha Tea Company Limited, subsidiaries of East African Tea Investments, a joint venture of parent charity The Wood Foundation. The balances arose as a result of certain cost recharges, and management fees totalling £106,730 (2017 - £97,728) being charged to the companies. In addition, grants of £89,522 (2017 - £177,561) to Mulindi Factory Company Limited and £88,300 (2017 - £163,094) to Shagasha Tea Company Limited were paid in the year. The total of £177,822 relating to the grants was paid in full prior to the year end.

At the year end the charity owed amounts totalling £150,104 (2017 - £NIL) to Mulindi Factory Company Limited and £158,424 (2017 - £NIL) to Shagasha Tea Company Limited, subsidiaries of East African Tea Investments, a joint venture of parent charity The Wood Foundation. The balances arose as a result of certain cost recharges totalling £308,528 (2017 - £NIL) being charged by the companies.

20 CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

During the year the group provided a guarantee in respect of lease obligations to a third party in connection with a charitable project in Africa, the total contingent liability in respect of this guarantee at 31 March 2018 was £80,000.
