Since then we've had the joys of three Summerfests – all different, all a great blessing – a youth group (also from Harrogate) where a number of young people committed their lives to following Jesus for the first time, and a wonderful Half Term Holiday. 'Jesus turned to his disciples and said, "The harvest is great, but the workers are few. So pray to the Lord who is in charge of the harvest; ask him to send more workers into his fields.'" Matthew 9:37

I have been asked to write about recruitment because we NEED more community to join us – NOW! Joining community though, has to come from a calling, a desire to spend a year or more away from the 'every-day' to follow a Pathway of Life. To enter into a life-style with prayer at the heart, that creates a community able to fully welcome guests and visitors into their home. Currently we have a community of around 25 members, while we need 30 or even 35! Since we closed, a number of community have left but there has also been a steady, if small, flow of new community arriving, many for only three or four months, but what a blessing they have been and oh how sad to say goodbye.

In a couple of weeks we will be welcoming Remiel from Hong Kong and hopefully Gilbert from Uganda – his interview has taken place, we now wait and pray for the visa. There are also a number of applications from overseas which have reached the interview stage, none from the EU, sadly, and very few from the UK. We need those who can stay for two years or more and support our team leaders. For example, there is an immediate need for an experienced person to join our Kitchen Team. So **recruitment is certainly an urgent area for prayer**, but can we also give thanks for those who have just left and for those who remain - there is much to do.

Song without end

Psalm 136 has the wonderful refrain that runs through it: 'His love endures forever'. The psalmist retells the history of the people of God, of how they are brought out of slavery into the wilderness and eventually into the land of their inheritance. The psalm is written in retrospect, but we know that at certain times it was hard for them to see God's enduring love. I mean, coming into the wilderness was tough, full of unknowns with plenty of agitation and complaints.

We have much to be thankful for here at Scargill where we have experienced the love of God that 'endures forever'. Looking back, though, I know there have been times when this was hard to see or experience. For instance, it felt like a 'long goodbye' as we parted from Community members from March to September last year, people that we loved and cared for.

But we can look back in thankfulness that those of us who were left behind were held together, sometimes through gritted teeth, and that somehow this experience has grown us closer together.

We can look back in thankfulness at the rhythm of prayer, where experiencing corporate silence has blessed us.

We can look back in thankfulness at the generosity of friends and supporters that allows Scargill not just to survive the pandemic but to have a future and a hope.

As we look back, it is both wonderful and joyful to be able to look forward. It will mean keeping community centred on Jesus with all our fragility and vulnerability as we seek to offer hospitality and welcome. It will mean being a place of hope where gentleness can be experienced so dis-ease and agitation can be relieved, and where healing can be received. A place of risky loving. A place where the Kingdom of God is breaking through. Bring it on! For we have known 'His love endures for ever'.

Tree Planting Service for Archbishop Janani Luwum

On Saturday 23rd October 2021 at 2pm, a tree was planted in memory of the martyred Ugandan Archbishop Janani Luwum in the Marsh Garden at Scargill House by his son Andrew Luwum and the Revd Canon Phil Stone, Director of Scargill. A plaque originally erected in memory of the Archbishop at St. John's College Nottingham on 18th April 1977 just two months after Janani's tragic death was also relocated, following the closure of St. John's. In the original ceremony in 1977 in Nottingham a tree was also planted, which sadly blew down in high winds in 2012. The concrete base for the plaque and site for the tree were prepared by the Scargill Estate Team. The tree planted is a serviceberry

(Amelanchier grandiflora ballerina), which blossoms with white flowers and small red berries, which turn purple, deeply symbolic colours for Janani's life, service, and sacrifice. The service of remembrance was attended by many people including, Andrew the Archbishop's son, his wife Harriet and daughter Precious Samalie, as well as Canon Dr Christina Baxter CBE and the Right Reverend Colin Buchanan, both former Principals of St. John's Nottingham, former students, and Mrs Kate Galpin (86) who was a missionary with her husband Alan in Northern Uganda when Janani was Bishop there.

Harriet, the Archbishop's daughter-in-law, who spoke on behalf of Andrew and the family said, 'Thank you so much for this beautiful event and occasion we shall remember always, and we hope to be part of your community going forward!' She added, 'I've never seen Andrew actually come to terms with the death of his father. I think giving Andrew the opportunity to take part in this ceremony has helped him open up. Meeting with the community at Scargill and all the visitors, he was able to talk about his dad and the family back in 1977 when everything happened, so I think this is a way forward for him to actually remember his dad now and deal with the very great loss.'

Harriet went on to speak of the Archbishop's great care for everyone he met. Mrs Galpin remembers walking with the Archbishop in Northern Uganda and encouraging him to have a day off. He replied, 'I cannot turn people away from my house. If they come to me I have to receive them.'

Christina Baxter commented how very moving it was to lead a weekend at Scargill on the privilege of Christian suffering during which we were able to set in its new home the plaque taken from St John's grounds. She went on to say that St John's Council is delighted that the Scargill community was willing to give a home to this memorial of a remarkable Christian leader who had spent two years studying at St John's when it was still located in London. Scargill will also receive some other items from the archive relating to Janani Luwum.

It is hoped that an act of commemoration can take place at Scargill every year on the 16th February, the day the Archbishop was killed in 1977. In Uganda, 16th February is Archbishop Janani Luwum Memorial Day and a public holiday. Scargill has a long tradition of connection with Uganda, with young people from that nation coming to be members of community over the years, and we hope that tradition is revitalized post pandemic and in years ahead.

Why should we care for creation?

Like many other Christians, here at Scargill we followed the COP26 climate change conference in Glasgow in November, as the 'last best hope,' for our world. But why should we care for creation? The theologian David Brown argues nature as creation shows us the generosity of God. Part of that generosity shows through the 'book of nature,' with God speaking to us through natural symbols about His extravagant love for us.



Brown believes that many people outside church hear God speak to them through these symbols, but that the church has lost the language of these symbols. The poet Rainer Maria Rilke says something similar: 'Everything beckons us to perceive it...' In created things there is something more that becomes a window to God for us, and anything can be used as a window by God. There is the witness of ecotherapy. Nature and creation are good for our wellbeing, and yet we have become separated from wild nature. The late Howard Clinebell, pioneer of pastoral counselling, calls this 'ecoalienation'. In his book 'Ecotherapy', he argues that ecoalienation happens to all human beings when we lose our connectedness with nature. Even watching programmes about nature can move us into a calm place where we begin to be filled with wonder.

However, it has also been argued that nature should be valued for its own sake, not because of any benefit to us. From a theological perspective as Christians, believing the world was created, then we should hold the earth as a gift from God, a gift that we should steward with love, respect, awe and wonder. My prayer is that our eyes will be opened to recognize the earth in this way.

It is not just for my own sake that I want to take care of creation. I have children and I am concerned about their future, and the future of all young people. Howard Clinebell poignantly and starkly says, 'Our children will ask the world of us'. The question is, 'Will we be able to give it to them?'

Saying 'Yes' to God

Di Stone writes: This brief reflection comes from my Advent Weekend talks. Enjoy.

'Beyond the tinsel fairy is a presence that's divine.
There's a child to change the future, turning water into wine
The stable holds the echo of the tomb that's yet to be.
On the manger lies the shadow of the cross he's yet to see'
(Beneath the paper wrappings - Singing the Faith - The Methodist Church)

As soon as I saw this pietà by Oleg Supereco, I knew it would lead me to Advent. Here we are given Mary gently leaning over Jesus after he has been taken down. Patrick van der Vorst, (www.Christian.Art), writes: 'She is depicted with dignity, composed, solemn and with a caring gentleness towards her son!' For me there is a tenderness we also see in many nativity paintings, and it helped me to appreciate how Mary journeyed with her son from conception to death, always aware of who he was and of her role to care for him, protect him, guide him.

Trust and surrender

Mary's journey started with the visit of Gabriel where she said 'Yes!'. Where she trusted and surrendered herself into God's hands. A gentle 'Yes' to a huge unknown. Leanne Brown writes: 'I imagine the warmth of the Holy Spirit rushing upon her- a fire of love welling up within her. Her entire being taken by the grace of God's closeness'. But perhaps it really began years before when she first said 'Yes' to the God she loved. And Mary kept saying 'Yes!'. Her family must have questioned her about her pregnancy and telling Joseph must have been challenging. But Mary was saying 'Yes' to bearing Jesus again and again, possibly as much to herself as to those around her. I hope this Advent we can all hear God's call, feel his presence and say 'Yes!'

Laughter, joy, tears - and love

After a year and a half of waiting, we finally joined the Scargill Community at the beginning of September for a three month sabbatical from parish ministry. Our experiences have been different as Trevor worked on the house team changing beds, cleaning bathrooms and preparing the rooms for the arrival of guests, whilst Elaine got to grips with the workings of the Scargill kitchen. Sharing a flat with other members of community made us feel welcome and very much part of it from the start which was important for us as we explored distinctive Christian community living and reflected on how that might inform life in a more secular setting.

Community life is busy, sometimes too busy, especially as the community is small at present. We juggled our working duties with getting used to the rhythm of daily prayer three times a day, what time the house meals were, how to forage for food in the community pantry or how the tumble driers worked! On top of this we were expected to serve food to guests at meals at least twice a week and join the rota to prepare and lead Morning Prayer. All of this helped set a pattern for our sabbatical and soon became the norm alongside joining one of the community small groups for prayer and reflection which helped us share in their faith journey.

Until you are part of the team you cannot really appreciate how much thought and hard work goes into running a ministry like Scargill House. Alongside the hard work there have been some tears and many moments of spontaneous laughter and joy. The genuine love the community hold for each other has been special to share and is an important gift. We have much to reflect on and be grateful to God for as we return to our parishes. God has blessed us in this journey and we hope the community has been blessed by our presence as we all seek to journey with God together. We would certainly recommend it if you are willing to commit to seeking God in the work, the people and the space.

An unexpected adventure

It wasn't my plan to come to Scargill. To be honest, I didn't really want to come at all. I've been ordained in the Church of England for the past 20 years. In August 2020, I went through a significant change in my personal circumstances which led to me stepping back from ministry for a while. A few months ago, I was fortunate enough to be appointed as the new Rector of St Margaret of Antioch, Barking, in the Diocese of Chelmsford. I will be starting there on Monday 6th December, so just in time for Christmas! Originally I had hoped to have started by now

but circumstances meant that this was not possible. So I had some time on my hands and a friend suggested I look at joining the community here at Scargill. My time here has not been spent doing things that I would normally do as an Ordained Minister. Instead I've been working for the past three months in the kitchen. That's been challenging at times. There are four deadlines every day, breakfast, lunch, afternoon tea and dinner, and we work a split shift system, from 7am till 3pm or from 12:30pm to 8:30pm. But it is also a great team to be part of, in fact I think the kitchen team here at Scargill has been one of the best teams that I've ever worked in. The way people work together, support and look out for each other is, in my experience, second to none. I've been really impressed with the quality of the food produced here and the attention to detail.

Living in community also brings its challenges. Just over a year ago I was living in a large four bedroom vicarage. For the past three months I've been living in a small room in Pent with a shared kitchen, lounge, toilet and shower. What have I learnt during my time here? I've learnt that sometimes it's good for me not to be in charge. I've learnt the value of teamwork and that when you're part of a community, you can't afford to fall out with anybody for very long. I've seen how you can work hard, sometimes really hard, and have a really good laugh at the same time. And I've learnt that you don't have to be upfront in everything you do to serve God.

So thank you Scargill for welcoming me into your family and allowing us to walk this stage of our discipleship journeys together. I will remember my three months with great affection. And if you find yourself at an unexpected crossroads in your life one day, maybe God will open up the opportunity for you to join the community here, or one like it. If so, I encourage you to take it because life would be really boring if all we had was our own plans.
