A museum fit for the future

As we reported in the last newsletter, Bradford on Avon Museum has been taking part in the Sustainability Pilot Programme funded by the South West Museums Development Programme.

The project has been running since January, and is due to finish at the end of March. Together with Tim Burge, the museums advisory service office for Wiltshire, we have been through the 'self assessment' phase, and we have begun work on our 'improvement plan'. This plan enables us to capture and prioritise tasks to make the Museum more sustainable in the long term.

As a result of our involvement in this programme, we are eligible to apply for a grant to help us to carry out some of the tasks in our

Improvement Plan. We have decided to apply for funding to put together a professional prospectus, which states the Museum's vision and mission, and our ambitions for the future. The aim is for the prospectus to help us to raise our profile in the local area.

As you'll know from previous newsletters, we are continuing to search for new and expanded premises with space to mount temporary exhibitions, and to carry out research, as well as storage space to allow our collection to grow. The new prospectus would help to support any such bid for new premises.

Briefly ...

Bradford is still attracting television programmemakers and again the Museum is playing its part. The latest was the first episode of the series Great Canal Journeys, in which husband and wife Timothy West and Prunella Scales call in on a trip along the Kennet & Avon canal. The programme, which was shown on Channel 4 on 10 March, featured an image supplied by the Museum. The programme's makers, Spun Gold, are giving us a generous donation.

After a long wait, we have now signed a lease with Linden Homes and Pentland Estate Management to site the Iron Duke alongside Kingston Road.

We can now move on to design and build the supporting plinth, and then seek funding to refurbish, rebuild and re-site the 19th century calender machine in Bradford on Avon.

The Iron Duke, built in 1848, was used to roll sheet rubber and cotton together and vulcanise them to make waterproof fabric. This was the actual machine with which Stephen Moulton started the rubber works in Bradford in 1848 and is important not just in Bradford's history, but in the history of technology.

Acting on a tip-off that a set of tools relating to the former Uncles iron foundry in Bradford on Avon were coming up at an auction at Ludlow, the Museum put in a bid and waited with fingers crossed. We are happy to say that we were successful in acquiring these items and will tell you more about them in the next edition of *The Museletter*.

The museum has just produced its latest booklet: *The Domestic Woollen Industry at Bradford-on-Avon*, written by well-known local historian Ken Rogers.

The booklet covers the history of the industry from the mid-13th century to 1790, when the factories largely took over the woollen trade. It's available now, price £3, from the Museum and Ex Libris in the Shambles.

Kingston House option explored

A group of Trustees and Honorary Curator Roger Clark recently viewed Kingston House, to see whether it could provide suitable museum accommodation.

It is a large building on three floors, with its principal entrance sited on the north side facing Kingston Road. Sadly, the only access from the attractive south façade facing Kingston Square is at lower ground level into the cellar area.

The interior has some attractive architectural

features, but it requires major internal refurbishment to become useable.

While the situation of the building is close to the proposed site for the Iron Duke, it would be challenging to attract visitors to it, as it is significantly outside the town's commercial and business centre.

Linden Homes has a potential buyer with a current option to purchase the lease. We will keep a watching brief.

Floods offer up some natural history exhibits

One consequence of the recent floods was that some emergency dredging work was carried out on the river. This meant that large numbers of shells of some freshwater molluscs were dragged out of the water – unfortunately for many of the owners, who were still in residence at the time.

The opportunity was taken to collect a few

for the Museum's collection – a rare foray into the realm of natural history, due to the difficulties of preserving organic materials. Roger Clark, the Honorary Curator, entertained them to an illustrated talk and gave them an opportunity to look at some of our

small collection of rock samples and fossils. They were also able to handle some tools used in stone quarrying and masonry, including the giant stone saw known as a frig-bob.

The visitors were generous in their contributions to our donations box – and had perfect weather for their visit to the Murhill quarries.

The Museum has arranged to excavate on land to the east of the Tithe Barn, near Victory Field.

The dig started on Saturday 29 March, and will continue for up to two weeks, working 9.30am to 4pm each day.

To find us, we are just above the small car park at the end of Pound Lane.

We know little about archaeology in the town, so anything is possible. Near the Tithe Barn we may see signs of activity in the Middle Ages, but it's a shot in the dark.

We plan to investigate other sites in Bradford over the next two years.

All are welcome to try their hand at digging, but volunteers under 16 years old need to be

accompanied by a parent, and all workers need to wear sturdy boots.

• We will be holding a Finds Identification Day on Saturday 5 April to run alongside our Community Dig site. Roy Canham (former Wiltshire county archaeologist), Roger Clark (museum curator), and Sophie Hawke (archaeologist) will be on hand to help identify finds. Bring along any type of find (please note we do not give valuations) to the dig site (just east of the Tithe Barn, near Victory Field) and see anything we have found on the dig.
