**Budget Impact:** Funding in the amount of \$75,000.00 for this resolution is

projected to be available in FY 2019-20.

**Background:** The Miami Herald Publishing Co. (Miami Herald) has published print and online advertisements for The Children's Trust since 2003. The Children's Trust wishes to continue its relationship with the Miami Herald. Additionally, it has proven to be a valuable and effective advertising partner that offers a significant return on The Children's Trust's investment.

**Request for Procurement Waiver (requires approval of a 2/3 vote of board members present):** This resolution requests a procurement waiver from a formal competitive solicitation to expend monies to advertise The Children's Trust's funding announcements, activities, initiatives, events and programs, and participate as a sponsor at the 2020 Silver Knight and Spelling Bee, with the Miami Herald. A waiver is being sought because the use of a formal competitive process is impractical where the Miami Herald is the only major newspaper company in Miami-Dade County that publishes daily and in two languages. Additionally, the Miami Herald extends its nonprofit rate to The Children's Trust and typically doubles the investment in free added value through advertising campaign sponsorships.

**Description of Services:** The Children's Trust publishes advertisements in the Miami Herald's printed newspaper and on its website to reach a broad audience. These advertisements are used to announce truth in millage rate (TRIM), board vacancies, funding opportunities and community activities, events, and programs. In light of the above, The Children's Trust selected the Miami Herald as its primary print advertisement vehicle. With regards to the awards sponsorship, The Miami Herald Silver Knight Awards is one of the nation's most highly regarded student awards programs. It recognizes outstanding students who have unselfishly applied their special knowledge and talents to contribute significant service to their communities. The Miami Herald Spelling Bee offers the opportunity for South

Florida schools to participate in the Scripps National Spelling Bee program, with the champion representing their county in the 2020 Scripps National Spelling Bee near Washington, D.C.

**Budget Impact:** Funding in the amount of \$50,000.00 is projected to be available

in FY 2019-20.

**Description of Services:** In partnership with The Children's Trust, Hermantin Consulting LLC supports the Haitian-American community in designing and implementing culturally-sensitive, community-driven projects and plans focused on improving neighborhood conditions and building capacity. The intent is to improve communal environmental factors that support children, youth and families. Ms. Leonie Hermantin is the principal partner of Hermantin Consulting LLC. She has developed and implemented strategies to ensure organizations serving the Haitian community are connected to The Children's Trust programs and resources.

Over the past year, Ms. Hermantin has demonstrated her impact and contributions to the mission of The Children's Trust, and more specifically, to the goals of the community engagement team. She represents The Children's Trust at multiple community events and educates the community about the resources and supports provided by The Children's Trust. Additionally, Ms. Hermantin was instrumental in developing and launching the Fit2Read initiative, which offered parents living in North Miami the opportunity to promote early literacy, build vocabulary and create family traditions grounded in the love of reading and learning. She also leads community meetings using asset-based community development strategies. Additionally, Ms. Hermantin represents The Children's Trust through Haitian media appearances.

Ms. Hermantin's principal responsibilities are to:

- facilitate and participate in meetings with individuals, community organizations, professional groups, neighborhood groups, faith-based groups, corporations and others to promote an understanding of community needs;
- promote and raise awareness of The Children's Trust program investments;

- serve as a liaison between The Children's Trust and the Haitian-American and North Miami/Northeast Miami-Dade quadrant;
- facilitate listening sessions and provide support for youth involvement forums;
- convene community/resident leaders to solicit cultural understanding for community issues, needs and priorities;
- work with community groups/collaborations to facilitate the development and execution of resident plans and projects;
- remain informed of data-driven community information, demographic characteristics, growth patterns, projected municipal and community plans and other information affecting children and families;
- jointly plan and participate in the development of community-based special events;
- assist in the planning and development of new community programs and the expansion of existing programs based on community priorities and data demonstrated needs;
- engage in organized youth violence prevention efforts led by the community;
- develop, maintain and implement a community engagement action plan;
- prepare reports of findings, conclusions, and recommendations for improved programmatic, community outreach and engagement investments; and
- perform other duties at the request of The Children's Trust.

**Background:** The Children's Trust community engagement team was established in 2015 to support the core value of the existing strategic plan for The Children's Trust to "See youth and families as change agents, in addition to program participants." The team's mission is to listen, connect, and engage individuals and agencies to support positive community change. The team is comprised of four community-based staff, each assigned to designated quadrants of Miami-Dade County (North, South, Central, Northeast), who collaborate with community stakeholders to promote the mission and vision of The Children's Trust. The role of the community liaison is to provide necessary supports in pursuit of this endeavor.

In accordance with the procurement policy, Section 2000-E, General Purchasing and Procurement Policy – Purchases of Goods and Services greater than \$5,000 and up to and including \$50,000, quotes were solicited for the announced opportunity. Three independent consultants (Hermantin Consulting LLC, Mr. Ludnel St. Preux, and Association of Exchange and Development of Activities and Partner, Inc.) responded and expressed interest by submitting their qualifications and a proposal. Staff reviewed the responses based on the following criteria:

- submission completeness;
- relevant professional qualifications and demonstrable related experience;
- proposed scope of work;
- proposed fee for the services;
- professional references provided; and
- a written summary of activities and outcomes/accomplishments related to community engagement conducted in the Haitian-American community.

Of the quotes received, Hermantin Consulting LLC met the criteria listed above, was the highest ranked, and demonstrated the most experience providing the services requested. The Children's Trust first contracted with Hermantin Consulting LLC in May 2015 to help expand and enhance the overall capacity of the community engagement team. Since then, she has

been working with the Haitian-American community in Miami-Dade County on behalf of The Children's Trust and has successfully supported the team's mission, focus and reach.

Strategic Plan Headline Community Result(s): Children regularly access medical, dental

and behavioral health care; students are succeeding academically; children meet recommended levels of physical activity; children behave appropriately in schools, homes and communities; and

youth successfully transition to adulthood.

Recommended Action: Authorization to negotiate and execute a contract amendment with

Variety Children's Hospital d/b/a Nicklaus Children's Hospital to provide comprehensive school-based health services to West Miami Middle School, in a total amount not to exceed \$71,800.00 for a term of 12 months, commencing July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2020, in a new total amount not to exceed

\$1,466,800.00.

**Budget Impact:** This item is budget neutral.

**Description of Services:** Variety Children's Hospital d/b/a Nicklaus Children's Hospital currently provides comprehensive school-based health services at 12 schools, which include seven nurses and 14 licensed practical nurses. By adding West Miami Middle School, one additional full-time nurse is needed to provide continuity of care to the middle school population. Essential nursing care, disease prevention, and health promotion activities provided under the program include:

- nursing care; medication administration and assistance with self-administration;
- chronic disease management, including one-on-one education for children with chronic conditions such as asthma, diabetes, severe allergies, seizures, and sickle cell;
- state-mandated screenings such as vision, Body Mass Index (BMI); oral health risk assessment, health education, disease prevention counseling based on individual health needs and school climate, and fluoride varnish application; and
- referral and connection of families with needed community services and resources, including other programs funded by The Children's Trust.

**Background:** On March 18, 2019, the board of The Children's Trust approved resolution #2019-54, authorizing the renewal of six contracts, including contracts with Variety Children's Hospital d/b/a Nicklaus Children's Hospital, to provide comprehensive school-based health services. This was following a competitive solicitation process through request for proposals #2018-01.

Citrus Health Network previously provided health services at West Miami Middle School. Variety Children's Hospital d/b/a Nicklaus Children's Hospital is the only other provider in the catchment area besides Citrus Health Network. Based on the proximity of the school and the residential area of its registered students, it was determined, in partnership with Miami-Dade County Public Schools, that Variety Children's Hospital d/b/a Nicklaus Children's Hospital would be the recommended school-based health provider for West Miami Middle School. This allows for feeder pattern alignment with greater synergy and collaboration. Citrus Health

Network's contract will be reduced by \$71,800.00 and the number of schools they staff will decrease from 20 to 19.

Strategic Plan Headline Community Result(s): Students succeed academically; children

Recommended Action: Authorization to negotiate and execute a funder collaboration

contract renewal with Miami Homes For All, Inc., to support partnerships to end youth homelessness in Miami-Dade County, in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2019, and ending September 30, 2020.

**Budget Impact:** Funding in the amount of \$100,000.00 is projected to be available

in FY 2019-20.

**Description of Services:** Miami Homes For All, Inc. (MHFA) coordinates system partners to identify and track homeless youth and provide immediate access to appropriate programs and services, including housing, education, healthcare, employment, mentorship/peer groups, and other supportive services. MHFA is the main support agency for the Helping Our Miami-Dade Youth Collective (HOMY Collective), which is a community-wide, multi-sector effort to create a locally designed, comprehensive system of care to prevent and address youth homelessness in Miami-Dade County. With the help of MHFA, the HOMY Collective has grown to more than 100 agencies with six separate committees. Together, they make sure our community's youth have safe and stable housing as well as wraparound services that will help them become more resilient adults. The collaboration seeks to reach Miami's most vulnerable, and often invisible, youth with the ultimate goal of ensuring stable housing for all youth. This funder collaboration project allows more homeless youth to be served with wraparound services and supports.

Over the past year, MHFA has led the HOMY Collective to improve marketing, outreach, identification and assessment of homeless families and youth. This effort has also launched Youth Access Points, or youth-friendly community locations for outreach, intake and shelter referral within a day, even after normal business hours. MHFA recruited Educate Tomorrow, Pridelines, Miami Bridge Youth and Family Services, Citrus Health Network and Our Kids of Miami-Dade/Monroe to serve as Youth Access Points. MHFA also partnered with the University of Miami to survey, provide technical support and strategic coordination between 40 direct service providers to better serve youth experiencing homelessness. This effort has supported the improvement of iCount Miami, our community's youth point-in-time housing census. The 2018 iCount Miami total youth surveyed was 319, while the improved 2019 strategy surveyed 714 youth.

Earlier this year, MHFA was a sponsor of the 100-Day Challenge to End Youth Homelessness. The goal was to increase youth access to youth-friendly shelter programs and services. In 100 days, 120 youth were placed in a shelter within one day of entering the local youth coordinated entry system. Nineteen youth exited to safe and stable housing, either reuniting

with family or in their own apartment. The remaining youth are still in shelters or transitional housing programs. Importantly, MHFA partnered with CareerSource South Florida to connect 52 youth with education, employment, and training, marking the first time in the national 100-Day Challenge history that the local workforce board partnered to offer a continuum of care designed to prevent homelessness.

**Background**: MHFA, formerly known as the Miami Coalition for the Homeless, was created to promote community efforts to help prevent and end homelessness in South Florida by establishing alliances with agencies and organizations. Since its inception, MHFA has sought to develop formal partnerships to break down silos and support all individuals who experience homelessness at any point in their lives.

MHFA is dedicated to preventing and ending youth homelessness, defined as individuals 13 to 24 years of age, unaccompanied by a parent or guardian who are experiencing housing instability. Homeless youth often couch-surf, live in shelters or live in transitional housing. MHFA, in partnership with the HOMY Collective, aims to provide Miami-Dade County's homeless youth with wraparound services and supports.

MHFA concentrates on advocacy, prevention, and informational services to enhance existing community efforts while filling identifiable gaps in supports. MHFA seeks to work in partnership with multi-sector organizations to create a comprehensive system of care. Specifically, MHFA seeks to:

- improve outreach, identification and assessment of participant needs;
- increase the supply of youth-specific, developmentally-appropriate housing options;
- leverage existing resources and improve systems coordination;
- ensure disconnected and vulnerable youth develop healthy, permanent relationships;
- support the social, emotional and physical well-being of youth; and
- expand homelessness prevention efforts and improve collaboration between systems.

The Children's Trust invests \$100,000.00, while The Homeless Trust invests \$360,000.00 in a funder collaborative investment, totaling \$460,000.00. For every dollar The Children's Trust invests, approximately \$3.60 is leveraged in return. The Children's Trust funds are used to provide operational support and structure for the partnership of approximately 100 agencies working together to address youth homelessness through the HOMY Collective. The funds will be pooled with nearly \$3.4 million to support the work of the HOMY Collective.

Per the procurement policy, section 2006 Match Funding and Funder Collaboration, the negotiation and execution of a funder collaboration contract is exempt from the competitive solicitation process. Renewal of match and funder collaboration funding beyond the initial contract term is at the sole discretion of The Children's Trust and shall be contingent upon satisfactory performance evaluations, quality program results, outcome achievements, availability of funding, and an ability to maintain the underlying primary funding source(s). Given the continued success of the project, this resolution seeks to renew this funder collaboration for another year.
