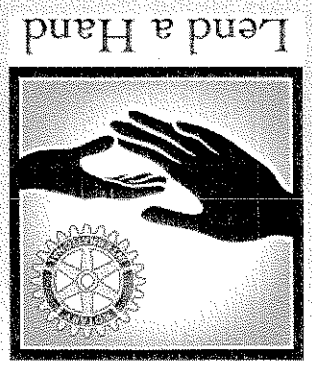


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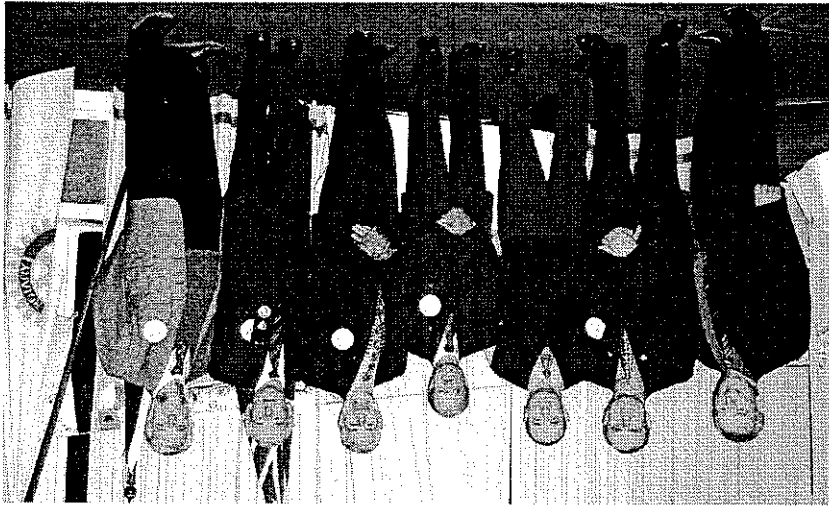

President's Report for 2003-2004.

The 17th year of the Rotary club West Pennant Hills was a good year for Rotary, the Club and its members. 12 months ago we identified the opportunity to have fun whilst serving our community and set ourselves key objectives for the year ahead. I believe we have attained those objectives, and in doing so we have served the community and had fun.

This year the Club recognised two members who had provided exceptional service to Rotary, and the community. At the meeting before Christmas, I presented Paul Harris Fellowships to two outstanding Rotarians of our Club, Richard Bushell and Gary Blackler.

The strength of the club has come from the fellowship of its members throughout all the things we have done, the bond of being members of the West Pennant Hills Rotary Club has dominated. At no time was this bond of fellowship more evident than when the Club faced up to the hard decisions that had to be made during the year. Particularly I refer to the amendment of the Club name and the decision we had to make over the change of venue. Very genuine concerns were held for Club tradition at the time we changed the Club name and added "and Cherrybrook", yet after the decision, differences were put aside and we have moved ahead in unity. Similarly at the time when we had to move our meeting place, from Springfield to the Burning Log function centre at Dural, that Club spirit came forward to ensure we could meet where all members could continue to come.

The community has been well served and the list of projects that Club Service director Denis Carpenter has included in his report reinforces this, the list is long and comprehensive. At the same time we have more clearly defined "our community" by adding "and Cherrybrook" to the name... It now more clearly identifies us with the people we recognize as our supporters and the community we serve.

This certainly applied to the inaugural Cherrybrook Chase Fun Run - a footrace through the streets of Cherrybrook held last July. Col Gage and his committee worked hard and made this event successful. Virtually all the members and many partners contributed to this success. Due to the success, Col and the committee have continued their endeavours and the second Cherrybrook Chase Fun Run will be held in three weeks time - why don't you enter? This was a truly community event involving guides, scouts, SES and the Bush Fire Brigade.

New initiatives in Community service included the joint work project with Glenhaven Rotary Club and the Christmas luncheon for a group of mentally handicapped people. For the joint project with Glenhaven Club, the members of both Clubs worked together over an intensive two day weekend to completely repaint a nine bedroom group home and its living and dining areas. The residents and Inala staff were deeply grateful and we had a real sense of achievement, well organised Denis. For the Christmas luncheon we invited a group of about 25 local people with mental disabilities to share lunch with us at the West Pennant Hills Sports Club. Identified as people least likely to attend other festivities, we received thanks from both participants and carers. In this activity the Club was assisted by partners and five members from the inner Wheel Club of the Hills.

The Club's Centenary of Rotary project has received planning approval from Hornsby Council and the initial phase is now complete. The project, to landscape land adjacent to the Guide Hall at Cherrybrook, will include recognition of the 100 years of Rotary.

The Tree of Joy is an enormous contribution to the wider community of less fortunate people. Last Christmas it was conservatively estimated that **the people of the Cherrybrook community** gave presents worth more than \$35,000 for the Club to deliver to identified charities. Alan Paynter you and your team did a great job.

The amazement on the faces of those at the Burnside Homes when they received an overloaded truck and a trailer full of presents will long be remembered.

Two "Norbby picnics" were held this year and continue our association with the West Pennant Hills valley. The folk at Norbby Retirement Village appreciated the barbeque lunch and pleasant surroundings at Kokoda Rotary Park, Concord. The involvement of our partners adds an extra dimension to this event, their expertise in cooking and caring is appreciated by all. Stan and Gary organised the event and located this Rotary Park which has interest and amenities that suits these older citizens so well.

The stalwart projects in our annual fund raising were again the trailer raffle and the garage sale. The garage sale raised \$9,000, which under the circumstances was a most satisfactory result. The howling gale that kept people indoors and caused early closure on Saturday also damaged some of the goods that were for sale on Sunday. This year the trailer raffle raised \$10,800, which again is an excellent result considering that more clubs have used this type of project and the shopping centres have reduced our access; thanks go to David and Jim respectively for their work in these projects.

The money we collected from the public generously supporting Rotary was about \$22 000. This was used to fund programs and projects of both local and international value. The Club made donations to, the Rotary Foundation, \$2800; Drug Arm NSW, \$1500, Hope for the Children Foundation \$5000; Rotary youth programs approximately \$3000; Rural Fire Service, \$2000; Rotary Youth Driver Awareness, \$1000; and other miscellaneous projects often with a focus on the local community.

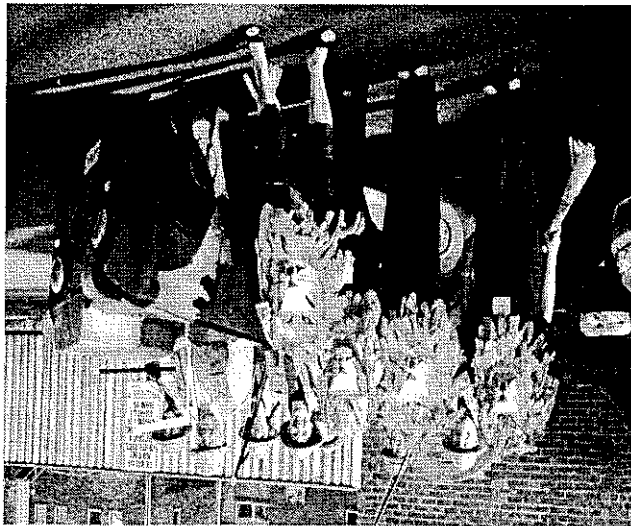
Good communication is essential for a Rotary Club and our Club Bulletin is excellent. It keeps members informed of what is on both socially, at the meetings, and also when news needs to be shared among the members. We have been most fortunate having Bulletin editors with dedication to that time consuming task, Denis continued on from last year and from March Colleen McIntyre has taken over production and continues the high standard: thank you both.

Membership focused on fellowship and enjoyable programs where members are eager to be involved in both meetings and projects, and this has worked well. However despite our best endeavour we have lost four members. We were sorry to have long serving and hard working, Charter member and Past President, Bob Crabb end his membership of the Club. Last year Bob did the major work in chartering the Probus Club of West Pennant Hills and this year he felt it was time to move on; thanks go to Bob for his contribution to the Club. Against the losses we have gained five new members during the year; welcome to Barry Lambert, Colleen McIntyre, Colin Baxter, Colin Wright, and Anthony Scarcella, a welcome also to all new partners.

The program was interesting, a mix of the stimulating and the casual. Our thanks are due to Graham Coles who attended to this somewhat thankless task, for after each week, there was no reprieve but to plan for the next! Perhaps the feature speaker for the year was our Local Member of Federal Parliament, the Member for Berowra, the Attorney General Phillip Ruddock. His ability and willingness to tell us the issues of immigration policy, "as it is" was outstanding. We gained an insight to the issues of security and public safety in the "new-world" that required all of us to be thankful that uncompromising standards have been set.

The Senior Assistant Commissioner of NSW Police, Dick Adams, addressed the joint meeting with Pennant Hills and Beecroft Clubs, it also was a special night. The meeting when Liam Whitley of the YMCA spoke marked a milestone in the Club's move toward creation of a YMCA facility at Cherrybrook.

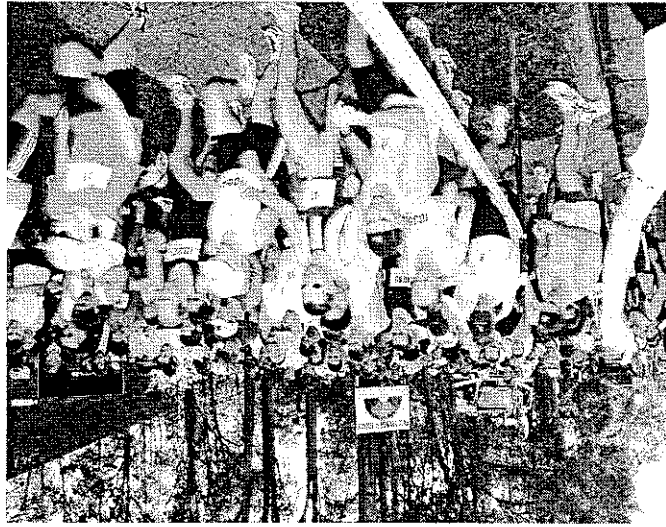

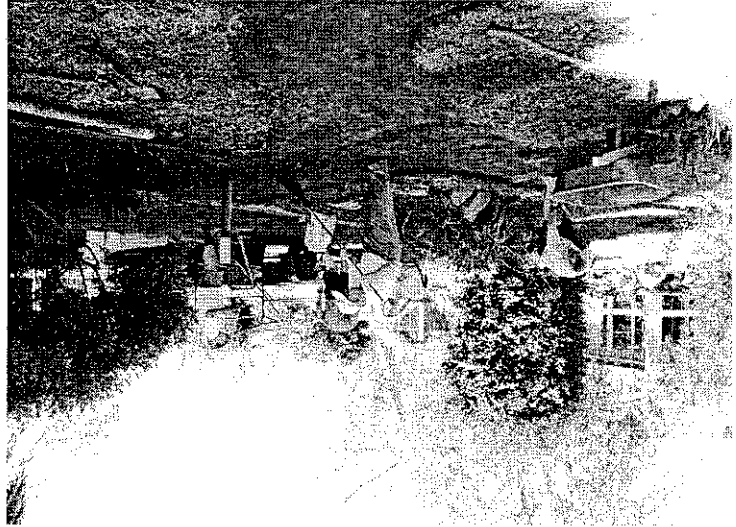

Community Service Report

The aim for the year was to enjoy ourselves while helping others. I am sure that this was achieved, as it was a busy year for all.

Commencing with the inaugural Cherrybrook Chase in July, nearly 200 runners of all ages enjoyed the 5 or 12 kilometre run. The support of the Rural Fire Service, Girl Guides, Scouts, SES and St. Johns Ambulance, was appreciated in staging this event.

During the year we had two Nordby picnics at the Kokoda track at Concord. These picnics are enjoyed by many from the village with excellent support from our own fellows & partners.

"Ground Farce" continued as hands on projects were carried out at Jamieson House in Beecroft, where pathways were laid to make the clients exercise more enjoyable.

At the guide hall in Shepherds Drive Cherrybrook improvement to the steps leading to the guide hall were completed. Further work at the guide hall has enabled the Rotary Centenary Project to proceed, which will be a lasting benefit for the community.

A joint project, with the Glenhaven Rotary Club, at Inala saw the entire nine bedroom room home repainted in a weekend. How fresh the home looked when completed and the clients and staff were delighted with the new colours.

The Tree of Joy was again a great success with approx 1,000 gifts being placed under the tree at the Cherrybrook Village. Thanks to David & Jill Turnbull for their garage.

The value of these gifts being conservatively valued at \$35,000. The schools also joined in the food collection, many hampers being provided to various charities.

Prior to Christmas we sold Christmas trees for a few days. This resulted in approx \$1700 dollars in revenue.

A Christmas gathering at the West Pennant Hills Sports Club was held, when approx twenty five special people from the Hornsby Councils Pennant Hills Health Centre were provided with a luncheon, each person receiving a Christmas present.

We visited Ronald McDonald House, where families of the young patients were provided a BBQ. It was again a wonderful experience for all.

The Bowel scan program was again very successful. It is noted that at least one person received a positive report, resulting in further treatment, a very important annual program.

Sausage sizzles at Mitre 10 at Dural have commenced, giving greater awareness of the club in the community. Funds raised will be used for a special community care project.

Fellows took part in Cleanup Australia resulting in a reduction of waste in the Cherrybrook area.

The Salvation Army Red shield appeal again was a great success with the collection up \$9,000 on last year.

The YMCA project at Cherrybrook continued during the year with positive feedback from Hornsby Council and other local groups.

May I express my sincere gratitude to all fellows & partners who assisted during the year. It was greatly appreciated that the support at "Ground Farce" and other functions was exceptional. A special thank you to Gary Blackler, who, with his very "persuasive" and charismatic manner, enabled our programs to be so successful and cost effective.

A year of fun and fellowship as assistance was given to the community. Thank you all.

Youth Service Report (2003-2004)

International Youth Exchange Programme:

The Rotary year began with the noticeable absence of Anja Hoefelmeier, an exchange student from Germany who spent the previous year with the club. She was hosted by the Ball's, Freeman's, Beyrouthi's and the Blackler's.

The club continued to be in touch with Kowshini Bazil (our outbound exchange student) who left for Austria in January 03. The club was informed regularly about her life in Austria through her correspondence. Kash, as she is known, returned to Australia in January 2004 and was invited to the club on several occasions to share her experience abroad with the club members.

The club decided to host another inbound student in the coming year (2004/5), from Austria. Juliana arrives on Saturday 24th July. She will be hosted by the Bowland's, Bickford's, Ball's and the Bazil's.

Muna:

After a year of planning and preparation, MUNA 2004 was held at Abbotsleigh Girls School at Wahroonga on Saturday/Sunday 5th and 6th June. Fifty teams from thirty two schools represented a different country each in that event. The teams spent that weekend debating many contemporary issues, within the UN guidelines and principles.

An active committee met from December 2003 on a monthly basis and more intensively every week in the last month before the event.

Muna 2004, according to feedback received from students, teachers and Rotarians, was a success. A new electronic scoring system was introduced and despite few initial hiccups, ended up to be a very popular system to use.

Through the sponsorship of Weir Warrman and Clarendon Homes (and surplus from the budget) we were able to offer every student a satchel with a T-shirt and pads and pens. As Chairman of Muna, I have really enjoyed organising the event. My job was made easier through the good efforts of the committee members. It also offered me and the club as a whole an opportunity to take on a project and produce real team work.

Many thanks go to PDG Larry Jacka who took on the difficult role of Secretary General. He was assisted by two very competent members, namely Jim Kehoe and Graham Coles in that role. Many thanks go to Brian Furer in researching the UN current resolutions and proposing 14 motions to be debated by the students. He was ably assisted by Colin Baxter. And to Tim Bowland for organising the catering needs. And the list goes on and on: Graham Cuthbertson as a treasurer and Secretary, Ross Ballinger in producing the signs and prizes, Graham Coles in pursuing many phone calls and to all the Club members and their spouses who helped throughout the event including setting up on Friday afternoon and cleaning and packing up on Sunday.

Other administration and time consuming tasks were also undertaken in organising the teams, seeking and allocating Rotary sponsoring clubs. Firstly by writing to the clubs and to the schools and secondly chasing them up for commitments and providing them with regular feedback. Organising the paperwork in terms of spreadsheets and lists was also an enjoyable challenge.

I have no doubt that next year our tasks as hosts for the second time will be easier and we will with the gained experience do a better job.

Canberra Science Forum:

Three candidates were recommended to the District committee for consideration, they were Andrew Szvec, Matthew Fitzpatrick and Lewis Hill. The first two are from Cherrybrook Technology and the later from Baukham Hills High. I interviewed the three students in early June. Fabian Watson, who attended the Forum in January 2003, helped me in the interviews.

Andrew Szvec from Cherrybrook Technology High was selected by District and attended this year Forum. Andrew was introduced to our club in September 2003 and his introduction to members proved him very convincing. Andrew was subsequently invited to speak to our club in March. He expressed gratitude for the experience he witnessed in Canberra. Andrew intends to do a Science degree when he completes year 12 later this year, specialising in nano technology. Following the Canberra Forum which was attended by over 200 students from across Australia, 6 Students were selected to attend the international Science Forum in London and Andrew was one of them. Our club donated a cheque for \$500 to Andrew to assist him in his trip expenditures

Youth night:

We held a youth night on the first of March and invited Bryce Westlake to speak about his experience at RYLA (see report under the heading), Andrew Szvec about his experience at the National Youth Science Forum, and Alexander Thompson about his experience at RYPEN. These events were held earlier this year in January and February. Kash Bazil was also invited to give a brief talk about her experience in Austria as an outbound student.

Yearly School Debate:

We held our third Annual Debate on 5th April between Loreto Normanhurst and Mt St Benedict. The latter, being the winner from last year, decided on the topic and took the affirmative position on the debate. The students from both schools put forward "a for and against" case on the following topic:

We're better off watching cartoons than A Current Affair

A perpetual trophy was presented to the Mt St Benedict School as the winner of this debate, for the second year in succession. This year we had Louise Luscombe as the adjudicator from the Rostum Club of NSW who was also involved in Muna last year.

RYLA:

Bryce Westlake attended RYLA early this year. Bryce came to the club to share his experience at the Leadership training with the members. From his speech, Bryce reconfirmed the great value of this programme to young leaders. Bryce had few leadership roles in his previous School House, in Music and sport.

An interesting year with some objectives achieved but unfortunately a couple fell short.

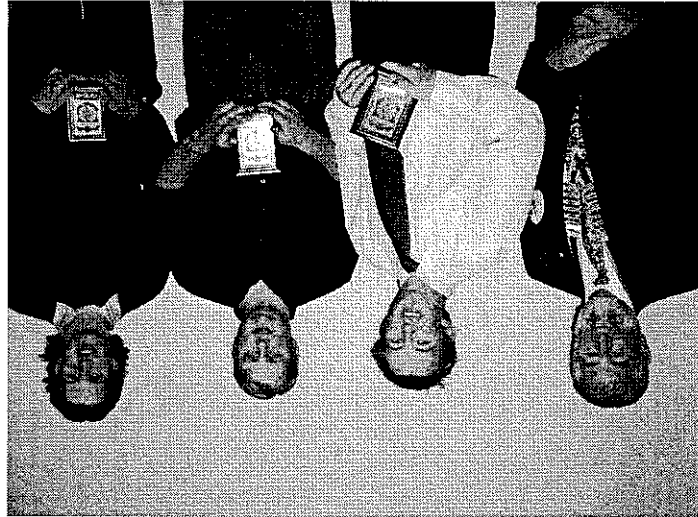

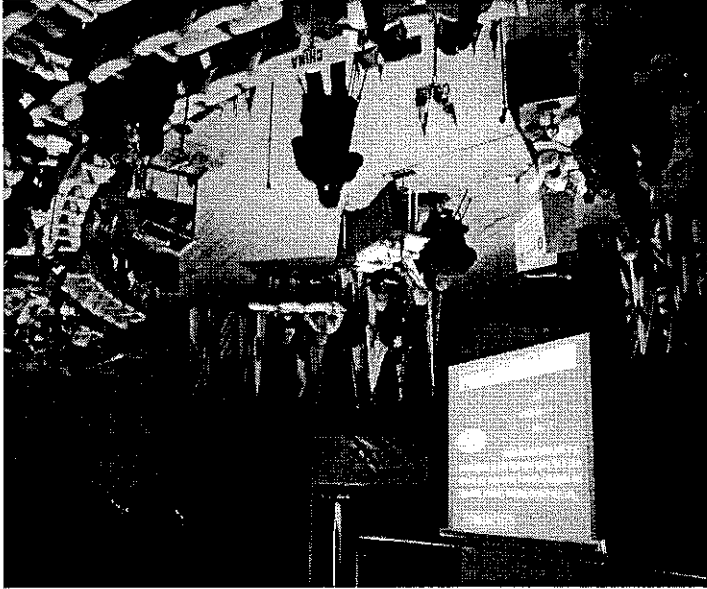
The first night covered Vanuatu early in the year where we learnt about the good work done by the Beecroft FAIM team just back from their two week stint.
