Mokone Primary & Barcelona Children's Home

The first week of the winter school holidays we ran a holiday club (vacation Bible school) at Mokone Primary. This was the 8th year of hosting a holiday club at the school, and the second year running it with a team from Common Ground Church. We also had 10 students from high schools in Langa helping, which was fantastic. They really enjoyed the experience. We had 125 children on the first day, and peaked at

175. It was a challenging week, as some of the children were very poorly behaved, but most of the children had a good time, and some asked key questions about faith. One boy even kept a journal of each day's teaching.

Leslie spent a lot of time helping the high school children at Barcelona prepare for their mid-year exams. A donor recently gave them 50 warm blankets, which was a direct answer to Irene's prayers, as this has been a particularly cold and wet winter so far and the children were struggling to stay warm.
