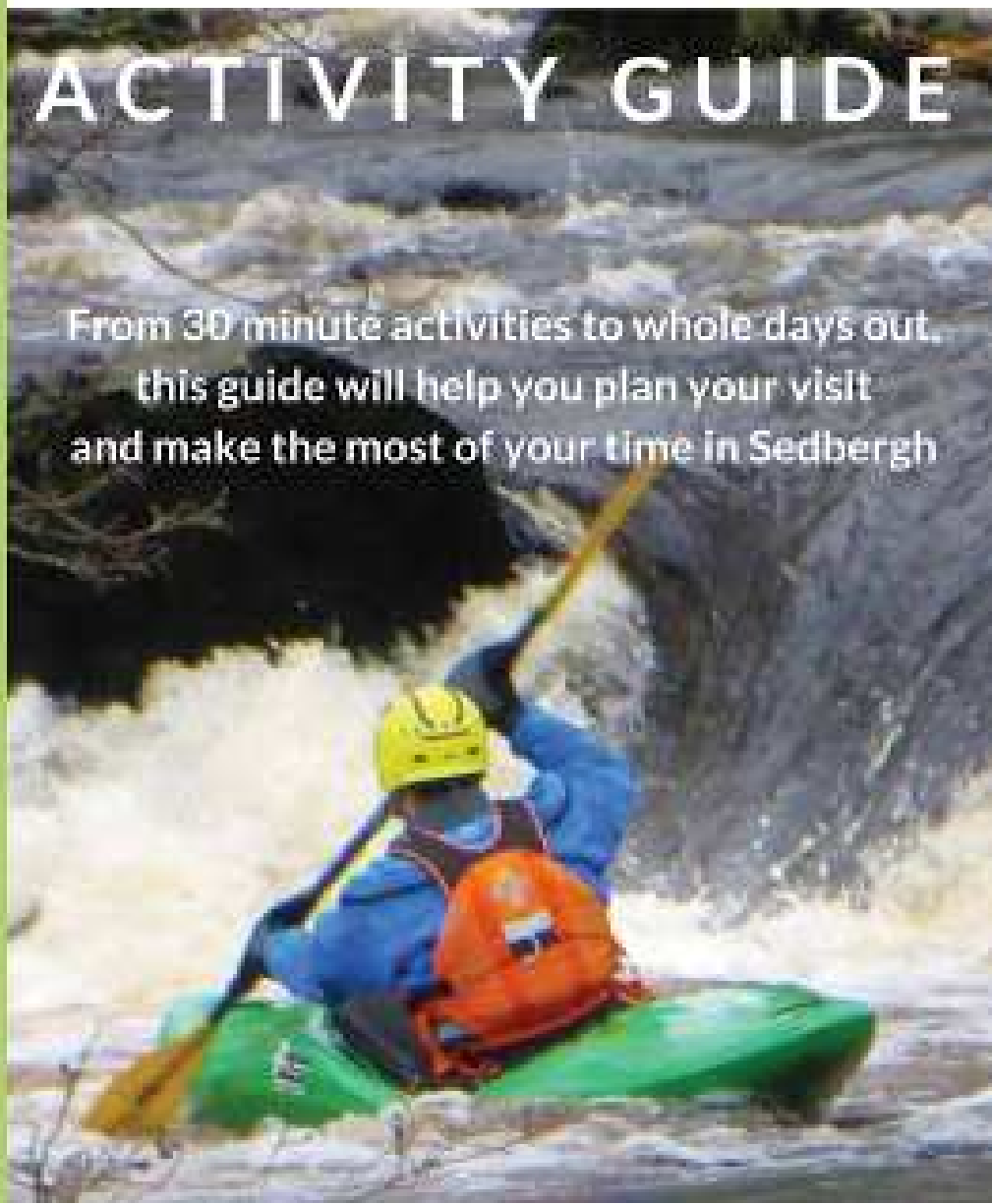

Walk through Sedbergh's hidden yards. The building in Weavers' Yard dates to the early 14th century. In the 18th century the first weaving looms in Sedbergh were set up there. The side of the shop has 13 filled-in windows, the top ones of which provided light for hand-loom weavers.



St Andrew's church, at the corner of Main Street and Finkle Street, is Sedbergh's oldest building, dating back to around 1130. Have a look at the tapestries, detailing the history of the town. There are several local churches to explore. RD



Go geocaching. Download the app, solve the clues and see where the trail takes you. The geocache in this photo can be found if you walk up Joss Lane and head towards Winder.



Now a private residence, Cannon House on Back Lane was originally an inn known as The Swettenham Arms. It took its name because of the two cannons left outside by Bonnie Prince Charlie's men on their retreat during the Jacobite Rebellion. The house was built circa 1670.



Find a cave. Park at Langstone Carpark on the A684 towards Garsdale and join the Sedgwick Trail. It takes about 15 minutes to reach the cave. If you have more time, head down to the river for a picnic and a paddle. CR



Head to Lock Bank Farm on Howgill Lane (only 5 minutes walk from town) for a delicious icecream. Children will enjoy the playground which you will pass on your way. Walk back along the fell wall and enjoy the wonderful views.

Akay Woods is a magical place to explore. Forage for wild garlic, discover the ruins of Akay Manor, look for woodland fairies and visit the Pepperpot before heading back into town for hot chocolate and cake.



Sedbergh is lucky to have a lovely selection of independent shops. Spend an hour (or more) indulging in some retail therapy. RD



Visit Castlehaw Tower, a motte and bailey castle. Dug into the bailey are the remains of a Royal Observer Corps monitoring post, opened during June 1965 and closed in October 1968.

Pack a picnic and head down the river. Build a dam, skim some stones or just enjoy a gentle stroll along the banks. You may be lucky enough to see the salmon leaping during Autumn.



Fox's Pulpit, 4 miles to the north of Sedbergh on Firbank Fell, is a significant Quaker landmark. Here, in 1652, George Fox, founder of the Quakers, preached to a congregation of a thousand for three hours from a large rock on the fellside.

Put your wellies on, pick up a map from the Information and Book Centre and go for a walk - there are lots to choose from. Why not visit Cautley Spout, England's highest waterfall, and afterwards enjoy lunch at the Cross Keys, a 400 year old Temperance Inn.

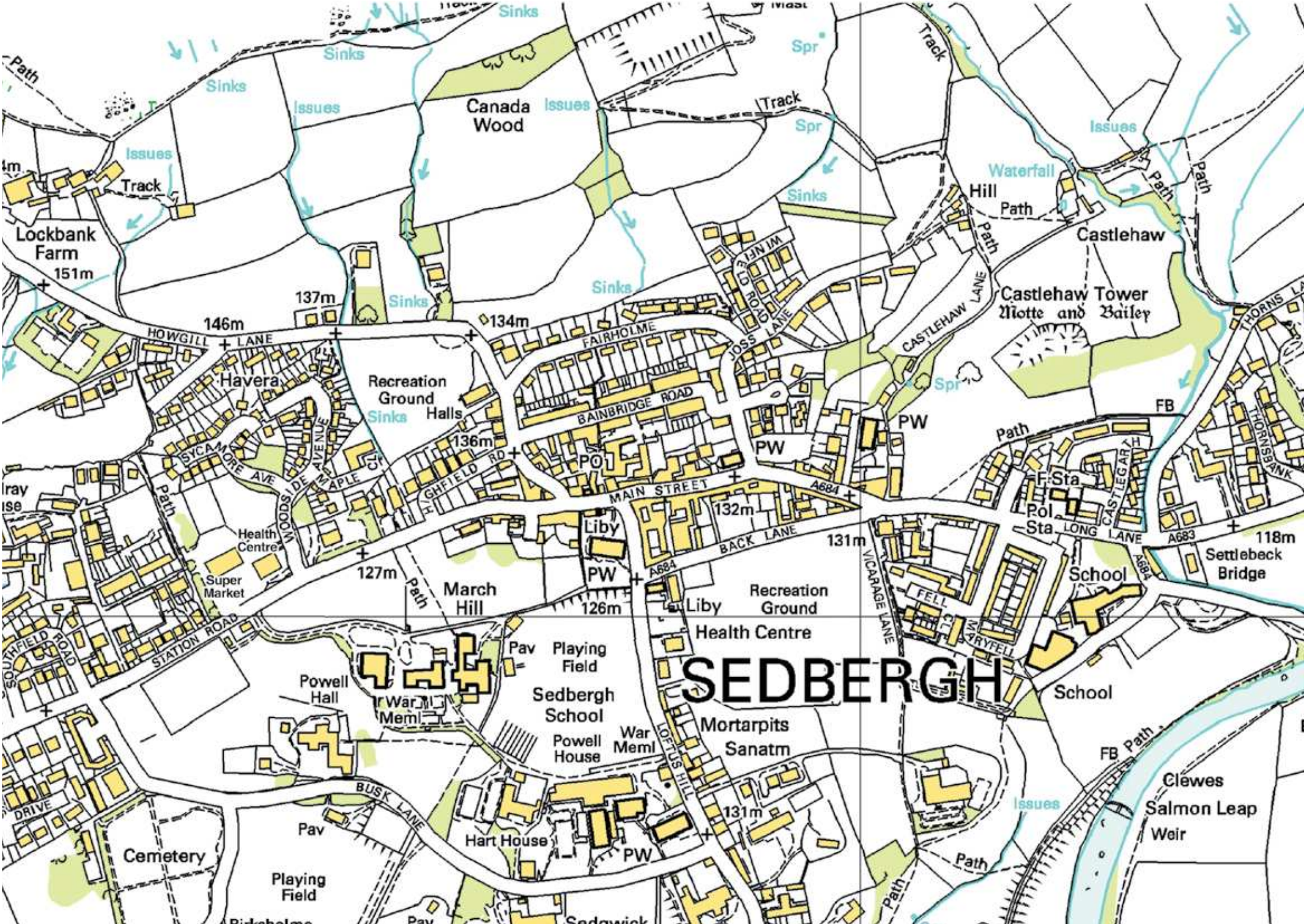

Farfield Mill is housed in a restored Victorian Woollen Mill - you will find heritage displays, working looms, exhibitions, craft demonstrations, art and craft for sale by resident and visiting artists, workshops and events - plus delicious food in Weavers Café. There is free parking, or you can walk there along the river and over the fields. www.farfieldmill.org. **RD, CR**



Take a ride on the Settle - Carlisle Railway. At 1,150 ft above sea level, Dent station is England's highest mainline station, and provides stunning views of Dentdale.
