## ST PETER'S LETTER

#### Find Life – read in Lent!

Many of us would remember from school days talking about what we would 'give up' for Lent. It was usually chocolate, sweets or biscuits. Lent – being the time between Pancake Day (this year 1<sup>st</sup> March) and Easter – has become associated with, 'giving up, usually enjoyable things, to become a better person.' It was following Jesus' example of the time he spent in the desert before He began His ministry.

Today there are many articles, books and podcasts about how to become a better person: eat well, rest more, take exercise, meditate, read, do voluntary work, avoid alcohol, be mindful, look at your carbon footprint ... and so on. For many of us, it tugs at something inside. We do want to become better people and leave the world a better place. The list can often feel very daunting, and sometimes we feel guilty for not trying or for failing. Or, if we do achieve it, we can feel superior to others. So, what do we do with these inner 'side-effects' of wanting to be better?

Christians believe that becoming a better person is something that God does for each one of us by His Holy Spirit. He starts in our hearts. This is what was happening for Jesus when He was in the desert. He was being challenged about what kind of person He was - where did His identity lie? Was it in what he does (turn these stones into bread)? Or what He has (I will give you all the Kingdoms of the world)? Or what others said about Him (do something spectacular - jump off the Temple and come down unharmed)?

Jesus overcame all these temptations that we wrestle with because He believed what He was told a little earlier at his baptism. He is God's Son - loved and accepted for who He is - no self-



improvement plan, no achievement necessary. Later in His life, through dying on the Cross and raising again, Jesus offers that gift to us today - the gift of becoming a son or daughter of God, loved and accepted. Like a present, it can be received and opened.

Intrigued? Try and read through one of the stories about Jesus told by his friends at the time - Mark, Luke, Matthew or John, on the internet (BibleGateway) or in the Bible, for Lent! Get a version that you will find easy to read or listen to - there are plenty around, and just enjoy finding out about Jesus through their eyes and see what you think. Many Christians will be doing something similar as we too want to get to know Jesus better this Lent and to remind ourselves all that He did to know that we are loved and accepted by God.

May we all become aware of the touch of God's grace and love in our lives this Lent.

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## DRAYTON PARISH COUNCIL



### The Parish Council has been busy in the past

few weeks - in addition to the routine work we undertake, we have been focusing on traffic/speeding concerns, improving village footpaths, progressing art projects, and continuing to work with the developers at the Manor Farm and Walnut Meadows housing developments to ensure that the outstanding work is completed on these.

### Sports Survey – Walnut Meadows

The Parish Council would like to thank everyone who completed the Walnut Meadows Sports survey that we recently conducted to determine what sports facilities and activities residents would like to have in the village at the large public open space at this site.

We received 350 completed online and paper surveys, representing the views of approximately 800 residents, which is a very good response for a survey of this type. The Parish Council have been analysing the completed surveys. As well as the provision of a Pavilion, MUGA (Multi-Use Games Area) and associated car parking, the most popular activities requested were:

- Aerobics/Gym/Keep Fit
- Tennis •
- Athletics/Running/Jogging
- Children's Football
- Table Tennis
- **Five-a-side Football**
- Cycling
- Basketball
- Cricket

The Parish Council is now engaged in discussions with Miller Homes, to enable them to finalise a planning application that will accommodate some or (hopefully) all of these elements, as well as take account of feedback from the Vale of White Horse Landscape Officer and Archaeologist. An important factor is the need to reduce the level of the site, which has been left too high, apparently following the burial of construction material on the site by Miller Homes. We are actively pushing this project forward to resolution, and are hopeful of Millers achieving a plan that will be acceptable to the Parish Council and Vale of White Horse District Council, so that we can begin work on the sports facilities. We will keep you updated in future editions of the Chronicle.

#### Benches

The Parish Council received funding from Richard Webber's Councillor Priority Fund which we have utilised towards buying four new benches for the village, and two planters. These are made out of recycled plastic, so are eco-friendly and will hopefully be a welcome addition for those walking around the village. We are hoping to position these at various sites around the village, most likely at Manor Farm, the Burial Ground, the Village Hall and the small green at Walnut Meadows (the area alongside Barrow Road). We look forward to the planters providing a colourful floral display.



#### Traffic

We continue to chase Oxford County Council (OCC) -Highways department to get their feedback on the list of traffic calming measures which the Parish Council proposed that OCC should implement (including the proposed new pedestrian crossing on the High Street). Things are moving more slowly with OCC than we would like, given their team shortages, Covid and other priorities.

In the meantime, the Parish Council is applying to OCC to be considered for a new 20mph speed limit in all or certain parts of the village, with support from Richard Webber our County Councillor. It is not guaranteed that the reduced limit will be implemented in our village - OCC will consider a number of factors including accidents, presence of schools, walking routes etc., but hopefully we will be in the mix for consideration. I am sure you will ask who will enforce this limit - it will still be up to the local police, and so enforcement does largely depend on police being in the relevant area at the right time to spot speeding offenders. However, it is generally thought that a lower limit will ultimately reduce the speeds that people drive, even if not to 20mph itself, then significantly below the 30mph+ that we are currently witnessing.

## DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

#### <u>Reservoir</u>

Starting with this, because there's something all of us can do.

The unnecessary megareservoir that Thames Water wants us to all pay for to go onto their balance sheet is currently being put forward as the only plan for the Water Resources South East (WRSE) group – which is comprised solely of water companies (unlike the water resources groups for other regions). This is an attempt to pressure RAPID/OfWAT into being more likely to approve their reservoir.

WRSE have a (not very well publicised) public consultation going on here: <u>https://wrse.uk.engagementhq.com/the-proposed-solution</u>

The response time is 14<sup>th</sup> March. GARD have put together a bunch of useful arguments and suggestions here: <u>https://www.abingdonreservoir.org.uk/</u>

You can fill out the online form at the WRSE site (which is rather laborious and involved, unfortunately. I wonder why...), and you can also email responses to <u>contact@wrse.org.uk</u> (make sure you state you wish your response to be taken into account).

Remember:

- This will be a huge storage tank jutting eight stories up above the Vale (so we can't exactly gaze out over it like Farmoor; the edges will be way above our heads).
- There's every possibility that no recreation use would be allowed due to fear of intrusive non-native species and security risks
- It doesn't solve any water issues; the Severn-Thames Transfer link does that (and could come online before this is likely to be completed: they estimate a decade to build, but no megaproject like this has ever come on close to on-time, so could easily take 15-20 years).
- It's unnecessary the Severn-Thames Transfer (which they admit would need to be built, anyway) would be done in 3 years at far lower cost and minimal disruption, providing plentiful <u>new</u> water to the region (which is why it solves the issue).
- The environmental damage, carbon impact, cost (put on our bills for the next half century and more), and loss of biodiversity would be long-lasting and devastating. Parts of the village will see the sun set in winter half an hour earlier than before, due to being in the shadow of the reservoir.

My response will be: Build the Severn-Thames Transfer first and then see if you can come up with any reason for this thing (spoiler: they can't, the mega-reservoir would be redundant, which is why they want the reservoir first).

Before you say, "What's the point?" bear in mind that the last time this was put forward, the weight of negative responses, marshalled by GARD, was crucial in getting it stopped. Public opinion is the currency of democracy – make yours felt.

#### Vale Budget

My own eyes tend to glaze over at the word "Budget" so I may well lose a whole bunch of readers right here. Although this Budget was always going to be a more interesting one than normal due to the impact of coronavirus on the finances and the reduction in central government funding – leading to quite a few Local Authorities elsewhere going "broke".

I've got to admit, I was expecting the worst, so the draft plan was surprisingly positive (in my opinion, anyway). On the downside, the much-publicised increase in government grant came in at £377.

That's not "per person" or "after inflation." It's a grand total increase of £377 for the entire council before inflation (so a fairly chunky decrease in real terms after inflation).

Meanwhile, the cost for subsidising the 2 hours of free parking in council carparks has leapt from £300,000 just a couple of years ago to £450,000 per year. And, on the one hand, we don't want to encourage car use – but we REALLY don't want to damage shops and businesses in our towns and make shopping much more expensive. So whilst ending the subsidy for free parking had to be at least <u>considered</u>, we really didn't want to go there. Reducing it to one hour lets us preserve it and still helps people to pop in and go shopping and covers most of what people want to do, so that is what's been put in.

(And if we didn't do *something* about it, that ballooning subsidy would just grow and grow and we'd have to bite the bullet sooner or later). There'll be a new £1.50 for 2 hours rate, and other fees will go up by 40p - but one hour free parking will be retained. This should make it sustainable long-term)

We're also putting £150,000 in to improving CCTV and £200,000 to resurfacing car parks and improving lighting – aiming to reduce risk of crime.

There's also £450,000 for improvements to play areas and public open spaces, £250,000 for tree planting, £250,000 for the climate emergency, and we've managed to tap other funding sources to get us £1.5 million for leisure projects in Faringdon, Wantage, Abingdon, and Botley.

Given that I was bracing myself for bad news, this was far better than I anticipated.

#### Rough Sleeper numbers over winter reduced to zero

As it says – the number of rough sleepers in the Vale and South Oxfordshire put together this winter was reduced to zero for the first time since 2013. The housing needs team has added to their targeted prevention and intervention measures (which translates into preventing hundreds of households each year from becoming homeless or rough sleeping). Despite the 85% success rate, there had been an entrenched small number of rough sleepers with complex needs, and thanks to working with partner agencies to address the physical and mental health issues and reasons for refusing help, the team succeeded in helping everyone off of the streets in both the Vale of White Horse and South Oxfordshire this winter.

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## COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

For the past 15 years, my colleague, ClIr Bob Johnston of Kennington and Radley has been trying to persuade me to explore Thrupp Lake as a haven of peace and wildlife. This last Valentine's weekend, my wife and I went on a bicycle ride to see if he was right. In spite of the mud and rain, we thoroughly enjoyed the journey and would recommend it to anyone on foot or bicycle. Living next door to Sutton Wick gravel pits, as we do, still a major active quarry site, it was great to imagine how our area might look after many years of restoration.

Havens of peace are in short supply in my own area at present. With the threat of the Thames Water Reservoir, whose banks may well cast early evening shadow over Drayton, and the proposed HIF1 Road between Sutton Courtenay and Appleford potentially affecting traffic, noise and air quality in both villages, peace, quiet and wildlife could all become distant memories. The two projects together have a cost tag amounting to billions and dwarf any other projects in the whole of Oxfordshire. It begins to feel that the infrastructure gods have got it in for us. Decisions on both will be made in the next few months.

In the case of the Reservoir, it is important that all those of us who have views on the need and advisability of the scheme should engage with and support GARD\* – the group of scientists who believe there are better options, and also respond to the Thames Water consultation. Silence from local residents can be used as aquiesence by those who wish to see these schemes coming about.

In the case of the Hif Rd, please engage with your Parish Council and write in to OCC\*, the planning authority, with your views on this scheme. I am aware, from residents who contact me, that there is a great deal of concern over already growing noise disturbance from Appleford Sidings. Few complaints have been received by the environmental health team so far, so please write in to them with your concerns if you have them. Given the potential addition of noise from the Hif road together with any reverberation from the banks of the proposed flyover, it is essential we have a full understanding of the present baseline noise levels before we inflict any more on local residents.

In the end, it will be the data which decides if, when and how these massive projects. The more data we can give them, the more we will be heard.



GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

#### <u>Abingdon Reservoir – Latest from GARD</u> Public Meetings

Thank you to everyone who came along to our public meetings. It has been great to be able to update you on the latest plans and to get your ideas on more ways to fight this mega reservoir.

#### Meetings with MPs and Councillors

Huge thanks to Councillor Sally Povolotsky for pulling together a zoom meeting with MPs David Johnston and Layla Moran and a multitude of councillors from the Vale of the White Horse District Council and Oxfordshire County Council. All voiced support for GARD and it was great to hear the leader of OCC, Cllr Liz Leffman, update us on the ways in which OCC plan to make sure local government and residents views are properly reflected in water plans for the region.

#### The current consultation

The southeast water plan is being developed by Water Resources Southeast (WRSE – a group comprised only of water companies). Unsurprisingly, the plan favours their profits over customers and local residents. After years of saying the Thames Valley is the most water stressed region of the UK, WRSE now plan to sell water out of the region for profit - so the reservoir isn't just for London as we have always been told.

We asked the adjacent grouping, Water Resources East, why they weren't offering water transfer to the southeast. Their answer: WRSE had independently concluded they didn't need it. How can it be cheaper to spend £2-3 billion on a reservoir than simply connecting to WRE?

<u>What can you do?</u> We need everyone to respond to the consultation to tell WRSE that their plan is not fit for purpose and must be rethought:

- A few questions start 'Do you agree..?' The answer is always no. Boxes for 'other comments' are a chance to say you oppose the reservoir as unproven and unsuitable

## LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER

I took part in a productive meeting regarding the proposed Abingdon reservoir (which continues to be an odd name for it given where it is actually proposed to be located) with GARD and other local politicians. I know that not everyone who writes to me feels the same about the proposal, but it continues to be true that Thames Water have failed to adequately make the case for the reservoir, or to demonstrate they have properly considered alternatives or to show they have truly measured the environmental impact of it. I'll be using my platform in Parliament to try and ensure we can get better answers to the questions local residents have.

I'd much prefer to spend all of my time on infrastructure that people actually want, like Grove Station and improved health facilities. I'm having discussions in Parliament about how to fix the fact that our population has fast outgrown our infrastructure, particularly our GP surgeries. This is a constituency-wide issue although it's particularly frustrating to hear the long-overdue GP surgery on Great Western Park is still no further forward, despite assurances I'd been given by local health leaders at a meeting I chaired in September. It's very difficult to understand what is so difficult to deliver this, as both council leaders and health leaders say they're supportive and it was part of the original proposal for the development. It won't solve the problem we have by itself, but it is the minimum we need to ease a bit of the pressure in the Didcot area.

For what it's worth I think we should be very proud of the role the UK has been playing in trying to support Ukraine in this period. No-one wants to see a war and if one happens it will be due to unprovoked aggression from Russia, rather than anything Ukraine has done. In addition to warning Putin of the consequences should he attack, we've been providing training and capacity-building through Operation Orbital which has helped to train over 20,000 Ukrainian personnel as well as provide anti-armour weaponry and encouraging other countries to take a more robust response. Having attended a session with the Ukrainian Ambassador in Parliament, I know our efforts are appreciated.

It's not often one of our councils makes it into the national news and for Oxfordshire County Council, it's unfortunately not for the right reasons! I have nothing against anyone deciding to choose veganism if that's what they want to do, but eating vegan meals should be just that, a choice. It does not help the environment if we shun locally reared meat in favour of imported meat or imported avocados. We have many farmers in this constituency and across Oxfordshire who produce highquality meat yet often struggle to make a living. I regularly visit farms and it is very hard work for small profits; they are frequently subject to theft and abuse/vandalism from animal rights activists. They deserve our support and I hope the Council will reconsider.

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

#### CENSUS

The first Census in England was in 1801. The population of Drayton was recorded as 484. There has been a Census every 10 years since then apart from 1941 during World War two. The 1881 Census recorded a lower population of 287, living in 65 houses. By 1911 the population had increased to 513 and despite the loss of life from the first World War and the influenza pandemic it increased to 592 by 1921, 307 males and 285 females, living in 145 dwellings.

The 1921 Census has been in the news recently following the release of the original Census documents completed by each household. Unfortunately, access is not free, but you can find it at <a href="https://www.findmypast.co.uk/1921-census">https://www.findmypast.co.uk/1921-census</a> . You can search for a relative by name and birth year.

The 1961 Census recorded 1,916 persons in 574 households and the 2011 Census 2,353 in 958 households.

The 2021 Census was held on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2021. Information from that Census will start to become available in May of this year with the publication of statistics for local authorities. Parish data will appear later.

The Census can tell us a lot about the social aspects of our village and, subject to the editor, I will reveal this information in subsequent articles.



#### Beware the Menace about to Overshadow our Lives

There has been much publicity about the impending threat to our area by the proposal from Thames Water to build a reservoir on the site between Drayton, Steventon and East Hanney.

This article isn't a detailed description of the facts, but a synopsis of the effects to local communities of such a construction in our midst.



Many of us thought that the threat had gone away, owing to local protest making Thames Water's proposal untenable.

However, they have started up again, and this time are determined to go ahead with the proposal. WE HAVE TO DO SOMETHING, and time is running out.

Thames Water is circulating an aerial view of the reservoir. (Image A). This is what they want you to see. What they haven't shown is an ELEVATION of the actual size and height of the reservoir in proportion to the houses nearby (Image B). What we have illustrated are the proposed new houses in the development in East Hanney, with the reservoir as a backdrop in *real size*.



I hope this shocks you, as it did me, when I went to a meeting held by GARD on Friday evening in the village hall. There should

have been a better turnout of local residents, but obviously most people are not aware of the impending threat. Well, here are some figures for you to ponder:

- 1. The area of the reservoir will cover the same area as the whole of Abingdon.
- The height above the plain will be 30 metres, in order to prevent waves from spilling over the edge. The view from houses at the top of Milton Heights will be blocked.
- 3. A huge shadow will be cast, which will affect the times of sunrise and sunset in the neighbouring areas. In fact, houses here won't be able to see sunrise or sunset until after and before the rest of the country.
- 4. House prices will be affected in a negative way.
- 5. There will be three towers in the reservoir (2 secondary draw-off towers for pumping water and one to measure algae blooms). These will be at least 40 50 metres above the plain, and will be comparable to half the height of the Didcot Power Station chimneys. Aircraft warning lights will have to be fixed. These structures will be the highest buildings in the Vale landscape.
- 6. The total weight of water will be 150 million tons. I don't even need to point out that under that amount of pressure, a small breach in the wall would lead to a catastrophic collapse with the entire area flooded by a huge deluge of water.
- 7. 5 million tons of rubble will be required for the build, although it will be brought in by train, huge vehicles will be necessary to move it around the site. Moreover, tens of millions of tons of earth will have to be moved to scrape out the bottom of the reservoir, and move the earth to the embankments. Other material will have to be moved by lorry up the A34. The noise and pollution of construction vehicles, traffic congestion and disruption will be a permanent feature of our lives.
- 8. The damage to the environment will be immense, with emissions, dust, noise, destruction of habitat and danger to wildlife. The water will be too deep for nesting birds to use for their breeding grounds, and the likely build-up of toxic algae would poison anything living in the water. A water treatment works opposite North Drayton will have to be built to treat water before it is put back into the Thames.
- 9. Thames Water says that construction will take 10 years. All huge projects have long overruns if we only see 3-5 years of delays, that would be very optimistic. We'd hope for it not to take double the length of time.
- It will take two years to fill the reservoir with water, so the estimated time for completion would be 2040-2045 – or later.
- 11. There will likely be NO recreational activities allowed, due to security and the real danger of sabotage. It is doubtful whether even walkers would be allowed to walk round it for this reason.
- 12. This reservoir isn't necessary, because if Thames Water even halved their leakage by 2040, they would save more than the amount provided by the reservoir
- 13. A much cheaper way of drawing water to areas that need it would be from the River Severn. Why not link our region to the "wet" areas to the west of us, who have surplus water, and who could fulfil both our needs, as well as London's, at a fraction of the cost? This would be far cheaper and be achieved far quicker. AND IT IS ALREADY PLANNED – DO THIS FIRST AND WE ALMOST CERTAINLY WON'T EVER NEED THIS RESERVOIR!
- 14. WHO WILL BE PAYING FOR THIS? We will be. Our water bills will go up to pay for the £2 billion construction bill.

15. WHY????????? Because Thames Water are in debt to the tune of £13 billion with interest at the current low rates of £400 million a year. The most scandalous FACT of all is that THEY WANT TO CREATE AN ASSET TO SELL ON. I have had to gloss over a lot of the facts due to lack of space and kindness to this month's editor, but I hope that there is enough here to incense you as much as it has incensed me. The full info is on GARD's website at www.gardoxon.org.uk

GARD isn't just an organization of NIMBY's. GARD is supported by eminent scientists and engineers, who have come together with our MPs and Councillors from across the political parties to talk sense and reason in a bewilderingly obtuse scenario.

#### WHAT CAN WE DO TO STOP THIS?

We have to act before 14<sup>th</sup> March by going to www.gard.oxon.org.uk where all will be explained. We need to voice our opposition by saying that the whole enterprise is unacceptable. You can also register at wrse.uk.engagementhq.com and complete the consultation, OR email direct to contact@wrse.org.uk saying you oppose the plan as not fit for purpose, that you believe the environmental, carbon and financial cost is unacceptable, the plan is not adaptive or transparent and that calculations such as population increase, and sustainability reductions are not credible, being far too high. Please cc the email to your MP and Councillors so that they can register your disapproval and act on our behalf. Good luck and thank you for reading this and for helping to stop the madness.

## **OXFORD WOOD RECYCLING**



Did you know that the Social Enterprise '**Oxford Wood Recycling'**, based in Sussex Way just off the Drayton Rd, is an award-winning charity?

The aims of Oxford Wood Recycling are:

- to relieve unemployment by providing jobs, work placements, training and volunteering opportunities for people whose circumstances, such as disability, mean that they are very often excluded from work.
- to protect the natural environment by recycling and reusing waste wood and by promoting the use of sustainably-produced timber – meaning well-managed local woodlands.

Currently, OWR collects over 1500 tonnes of waste per annum and returns 300 tonnes back into use for DIY. The remainder is passed on for recycling as panel board or for energy recovery by UK- based Biomass power stations. The Company employs around 20 people and works with volunteers, work placements and trainees, many with disabilities, to support their personal and career development. They collect all types of wood waste (but not trees or garden waste) from homes or gardens, return it to their workshop and ensure it is 100% recycled and reused. They will collect wood within a 25-mile radius of Abingdon, at a cost of £20 call out plus £20 per m<sup>3</sup>, with a minimum charge of £60.

The other side of the business is Abingdon Wood Shop. Here you can buy good quality soft and hard wood reclaimed timber in many sizes. From battening up to  $12'' \times 12''$  beams in unusual lengths from 1 to 5 metres. Also 3.9m scaffolding boards, pallet wood, board and natural edge timber. Staff are on hand to offer advice on projects.

In addition, they have developed a range of reclaimed wood furniture. Handmade and crafted from their reclaimed wood, this solid wood furniture collection has a modern rustic feel for both outdoor and indoor living. There is also, if needed, a wood-cutting service for wood bought from OWR. Why not pop in for a browse? Or contact via email:


