LOCAL RULES

OUT OF BOUNDS

White markers

7th HOLE – a ball lying to the left of the white Out of Bounds markers between the tee and the road for the first part of the hole and for the first hedge on the left once round the corner.

8th HOLE – a ball lying to the left of the white markers between the tee and the stream

CAR PARK – the concrete, tarmac and paved areas surrounding the Clubhouse.

The PRACTICE GREEN and all FLOWER BEDS surrounding the Clubhouse.

ALL BOUNDARY HEDGES, DITCHES AND STREAMS.

A ball lying under a boundary hedge is out of bounds if it lies beyond the centre line of the hedge. A ball is out of bounds in a boundary ditch or stream below the level of the surrounding grounds.

STONES IN BUNKERS

Are movable obstructions – Rule 24-1 applies.

TRACTOR AND GREEN-KEEPING EQUIPMENT MARKS

To be treated as ground under repair. Rule 25-1b applies.

IMMOVABLE OBSTRUCTIONS

Relief without penalty under Rule 24-2.

Pylons and Staked trees

A ball coming to rest adjacent to any other trees on the course must be played as it lies.

All Roads and Artificial Paths

All Bridges

Except when the ball lies on the bridge between the yellow water hazard markers. Water Hazard Rule 26-1 applies.

Fixed Sprinkler Heads

If the sprinkler head is within two club-lengths of the putting green of the hole being played and intervenes on the line between the ball and the hole, relief without penalty is obtained as follows :-

If the ball is within two club-lengths of the sprinkler head (not in a hazard) it may be lifted, cleaned and dropped at the nearest point which a) is not nearer the hole, b) avoids the obstruction and c) is not in a hazard or on the putting green.

WATER HAZARDS : ALL DITCHES, STREAMS AND PONDS

Relief obtainable under rule 26.

Lateral water hazards – RED MARKERS

Other water hazards – YELLOW MARKERS

POWER CABLES

If a ball strikes any power cable (not the pylon) within the course the player must disregard the stroke, abandon the ball and play another ball as near as possible to the spot from which the original ball was played without penalty

– Rule 20-5 applies.

PLUGGED BALL IN THE ROUGH

Relief for Embedded Ball

"Through the green", a ball that is embedded in its own pitch-mark in the ground may be lifted, without penalty, cleaned and dropped as near as possible to where it lay but not nearer the hole. Before lifting the ball, the player must mark its position. The ball when dropped must first strike a part of the course through the green.

Exceptions:

1. A player may not take relief under this Local Rule if the ball is embedded in sand in an area that is not closely mown.
2. A player may not take relief under this Local Rule if interference by anything other than the condition covered by this Local Rule makes the stroke clearly impracticable.

PENALTY FOR BREACH OF THE LOCAL RULE

Match Play: Loss of Hole

Stroke Play: Two Strokes

MARKER POSTS

Marker posts indicating water hazards, distance or direction should be treated as movable obstructions – Rule 24-1 applies. If these are not easily movable (for example distance markers set into fairways) they should be treated as immovable obstructions – Rule 24-2 applies. Posts indicating out of bounds (generally white) are an integral part of the course and cannot be moved nor relief obtained.

Any disputes should be referred to the Handicaps and Competitions committee, whose decision will be final.
