
Clarendon Primary School, Bolton Key to the window









- 1. 2. & 3. represent the children, their faces surrounded by petals.
- 4. A stylised Protea flower, the seed of which goes through bush fires to germinate afresh, a reference to the move from the old fire damaged school to the new. It's the flower version of a phoenix!

Bolton's history, its traditional textile industry and its growth during the industrial revolution are depicted in the flowers, there are;

- 5. & 6. The patterns of Bolton's historic 'Caddow' quilts (Bobby Heywood's family business was based on the weaving of quilts and counterpanes)
- 7. Flying shuttles from the looms, the wheel of a steam engine
- 8. Traditional narrow boat decoration, for the Manchester, Bury and Bolton canal
- 9. A white cotton 'boll' flower for Bolton as one of the foremost 'Cotton towns'
- 10. A red rose to reference that Bolton was once part of Lancashire
- 11. A red poppy, for remembrance, the date 2014 which marked the centenary of WW1 and a poppy is included in the school's time capsule. The school uniform is red too!
- 12. & 13. Hidden among the flowers are some of Bolton's famous elephants!
- 14. The school logo.
- 15. A special flower, the patterns in the centre were painted by Year Six children and the teachers during their visit to the stained glass studio.
- 16. They also painted the red balloon.

The green hills above the flowers contain some notable Bolton landmarks;

- 17. The town hall (with the hands of its clock at 20.15, the date of the opening ceremony of the new school.
- 18.The Hall i'th Wood
- 19. The Macron Stadium
- 20. The Pigeon tower and 21. Rivington Pike Tower in Lever Park.

The red balloons floating up into a clear blue sky recall the release of balloons by the children at the official opening of the school. They also symbolise going out into the world to 'reach for the stars'!
