

Annual Report for Suckley - from our Parish Council Chairman

Suckley Parish Council held its Annual Meeting on 20th May, the minutes of which can be found on the Suckley page of www.worcestershire.gov.uk/ myparish. Its Chairman, Walter Huband gives us his report for 2012/13.

Your Parish Council has had a very busy year in 2012/13, especially as it was the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012.

I am pleased to report that the Woodland Road Flood Defences worked very well last year when we suffered a number of heavy rain storms. The Parish Council are still trying to get Worcestershire County Council Highways to put a culvert under Knightwick Road to improve water flow away from Woodland Road, but due to severe budget restrictions this will not be on their high priority list.

As part of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations in 2012, the Parish Council presented bone china commemorative mugs to all the children attending Suckley School and others who live in the Parish. The Community Group organised a very successful Family Fun & Sports Day on the Playing Fields, followed by a Barn Dance, Pig Roast and Raffle. Without my knowledge, Parish Council members nominated me to attend a special Jubilee Reception & Lunch held at the Guildhall in Worcester on 11th July 2012. This was attended by HM Queen Elizabeth and HRH Duke of Edinburgh. I was amazed and honoured to be selected to attend, and it was a day I will never forget.

Our Footpaths Wardens, Mr Richard Harward and Mr Peter Markins have worked diligently throughout the year to keep open and maintain our footpaths in the Parish. Both Wardens clear footpaths, repair stiles, steps, bridges and fences and endeavour to walk all the footpaths at least twice a year. They liaise with landowners and the Countryside Department at County

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Hall and rely heavily on residents/footpath users to report problems to them. They are keen to recruit volunteers to help them in their mission, so if you are interested, please contact any member of the Council or the Clerk – Diana Taylor.

The Community Group, under the Chairmanship of Cllr Andrew Grieve continues to flourish. The Suckley Newsletter has been an outstanding success, with the Health & Wellbeing Group continuing to expand their services. Following the Community Plan Survey, a Results Public Meeting was held on 15th October 2012. The outcome of the Meeting showed that the Parish Council should focus their support for Suckley Post Offfice; Broadband Improvement; Footpaths & Bridleways; Facilities for children; Rate Relief for local public houses; Maintenance of the Old Quarry. The Council will, however, actively consider requests for support of other community facilities, provided that evidence is produced to prove genuine demand exists for the facility.

Under the management of Cllr John Green our Lengthsman -Barry Bennett - has worked extremely hard in the past year to keep our drains and ditches clear. This is proving to be a key factor in preventing our roads flooding. A specialist Jetting Team from County Highways has also been unblocking a large number of drains. A new Land Drainage Team has now been set up by the County Council to liaise with Parish Councils and landowners with the power to order ditches to be cleared.

Speeding issues continue to feature on the Council Agenda, especially along Knightwick Road and through Longley Green areas which show the highest level of hits. Figures have been sent to the Road Safety Partnership but their response was that we did not have enough exact information for them to take any action. The Council has, therefore, agreed with Alfrick, Leigh & Bransford, that we upgrade the data collection unit in the VAS camera at a cost of around £480. This will reset the speed level to 36 mph and will record the date, time, actual speed and vehicle counts. With this information we may be able to get an increased Police presence with radar speed cameras. You have been warned!

The Playing Fields Committee and the Council continue to improve and maintain the Pavilion and Playing Fields, with the Pavilion being completely redecorated this year. Andrew Duncan has been doing an excellent job mowing the Playing Fields, and worked especially hard leading up to the Jubilee Event. Regular risk assessments and an annual safety inspection have been carried out, but we are still having problems with rubbish being dumped on the field. The Council have been advised to have a tree survey carried out by a qualified Arborculturist, and this will take place in the next month or so. Plans are in hand to increase the use of the Playing Fields in the coming year.

We are keen to try and improve the broadband speeds in Suckley, and as you may know, we are trying to register interests with Airband, a Community Broadband company based in Worcester who have been very successful in providing broadband in other rural areas. We need to have 20-30 registers of interests before a survey can be carried out.

The Council considered 13 Planning Applications during the year, mindful that Suckley is an AONB area, but also balancing the needs of the Community for work opportunities and housing.

In September 2012 we welcomed on board Dr Anne Lewis as our new Councillor to replace former Councillor Rosemary Harward. Cllr Lewis has already proved to be a very valuable member of the Council.

The Council decided to freeze the Parish Precept for 2013/14, but with the huge cuts in District and County budgets, it looks increasingly likely that County services will be reduced or withdrawn. This will bring pressure on Parish Councils to take on more responsibilities under the Localism Bill.

The Parish Council is up to full strength with nine Councillors who give their time and services on a voluntary basis. We all look forward to 2013/14 and will continue to work hard for the best interests of the Parish.

Finally, I would like to thank our Clerk, Diana Taylor, and all the Councillors for the support given to me throughout the year.

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Stories of the deep - from a Suckley author

Richard Wall, a technical writer by profession has turned creative and published an ebook of short stories entitled "Five Pairs of Shorts". One of the stories is printed below, but first Richard tells us a little of his background.

I was born in Bromyard in 1962 and after a brief spell working in a dark, dismal factory decided ran away to join the navy at age 18 with dreams of enjoying sunsets in the far east witnessed from the flight deck of a magnificent destroyer. The navy had other ideas and so I spent the next 22 years in and around dark, dismal submarines. Still, you've gotta laugh.

I left the navy in 2002 and became a technical author working first for a documentation company in Cheltenham then going freelance with his company Black Dog Technical Writing Ltd.

My wife, Barbara (the chiropodist and yoga teacher) and I moved to Suckley in 1992, renovating The Poplars and quickly becoming Jim Griffith's favourite neighbours. In 2010 we moved from The Poplars to The Boat House, where once again we embarked on a renovation project which is now finished, as is our bank account.

"Stand-by to surface!"

Cocooned in the warmth of his sleeping bag, Able Seaman Dave "Dinger" Bell opened his eyes and blearily checked his watch. 22:30, two more hours to go. Happy days.

Dave grinned and said, "What's the movie about?" No response. "Is there a car chase?" "Clear off, Dinger."

Dave laughed, finished his soup, rinsed his mug and made his way along the semi-dark passageway, climbed a ladder and turned to his left.

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Recipes from the Suckley Masterchef

Saffron Risotto with griddled Chicken and Parmesan

Serves 4

4 x 6oz free range breasts of chicken, skinned	1½pints of chicken stock
12oz risotto rice	4 fl oz of double cream, half whipped
Pinch of saffron strands	2oz buttor
2 cloves of garlic, peeled and chopped finely	Juice of half a lemon
2oz of shallots, finely diced	1 bunch of fresh chives
2fl oz of olive oil	

Salt and freshly ground pepper

Parmesan shavings

- In a large pan heat the olive oil and sweat the chopped shallots and garlic, stir for 2-3 minutes, add the rice and the saffron strands and stir for a further 5 minutes, then add the chicken stock
- 2. The risotto should be bubbling, whilst the endless stirring continues
- 3. Test the rice by biting a single grain which should be intact but firm, at this point stir in the half whipped cream, lemon juice, chives, butter and season well
- 4. Season well and griddle the chicken breasts until cooked through
- 5. Serve the risotto at once, placing the chicken on top of the rice, top this with the parmesan shavings

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Suckley History Society goes rabbiting into local history

At the latest History Society meeting on 18th April our secretary, Liz Devenish, welcomed Deborah Overton from the Worcester Archaeology & Archive Service to give her entertaining presentation on the History and Archaeology of Medieval and Post-Medieval Rabbit Warrens. Deborah introduced her topic of Coneygrees & Warrens by telling us that 'coneys' were the adults and the young were called 'Rabbits 'and were imported by the Normans from the Mediterranean area.

In medieval times coneys were an important asset. Apart from the social status accorded to the Lord of the Manor for owning the rabbits, they provided meat for the Lordships table and the fur was used as luxury trimmings and items of clothing.

Because of their delicate nature of managed burrows, great thought went into their construction. Typically they were constructed to form a large mound with stone rubble & sand, then topped with turf so that the water would run off. Rabbits like to be warm & cosy without getting their feet wet, but they also needed water nearby to drink. Some of these mounds could be very long, hence the term 'Pillow mounds'. A ditch would be dug around the mound with lots of holes & tunnels for the rabbits to come out and enjoy the grazing. The mound was enclosed with a stone wall, topped with a willow woven fence, which was part of the warreners job to maintain.

In order to look after this investment the Lords of Manor would appoint a 'Warrener'.

This prestigious position came with a house and could be the forerunner of today's gamekeeper.

Field names indicating their usage included 'Coneygraze', 'coneygres', 'Coneygreen', 'Coneyard' and farm & house names such as 'Warren' give us a clue to their origins.

Of the 'pillow mounds', there are a few local examples in Alfrick and Old Storridge.

This fascinating talk continued over refreshments in a typically friendly and informal History Society social session. Deborah left us with a copy of the transcribed 1830's tithe map of the Suckley area – copies available from Andrew Grieve (01886 884795 andchris2@btinternet.com)

The Suckley History Society's next event will be an afternoon tour on Wednesday 19th June of the fascinating 18th century mansion of the Gaines just over the county border in Herefordshire. For the past 50 years this house has served as a Christian Youth Centre and is a real hidden treasure right on our doorstep. Leading architectural historian Julia Ionides will give us an illustrated talk on the evolution of the house from its early beginnings to the present time, which will be followed by a guided tour of the house and grounds finishing with refreshments.

Timely tips for the garden in June (from Laylocks)

- Plant up summer containers. Add a slow release fertiliser such as Phostrogen time release plant food. (Follow packet instructions carefully for best results.)
- Hanging Baskets use as large a basket as your budget or bracket will support. Large baskets are always easier to look after as they don't dry out so quickly. They will do best in a lightly shaded position.
- Deadhead any faded Rhododendron flowers.
- Dig up and store tulips after flowering
- Hedges start trimming fast growing Leylandii, Privet etc.
- In the Vegetable Garden keep sowing and planting out warm and wet conditions are ideal for young plants to establish themselves. Hoe often to control weed seeds this is best done at the start of the day so the sun will kill the weeds.
- Guard against pests such as carrot fly, cabbage root fly and greenfly.
- Now is the time to prune Spring Flowering Shrubs if required e.g. Forsythia, Flowering Currant (Ribes) etc.
- Provide support for tall herbaceous plants (e.g. delphiniums) while they are small.
- Watch out for Vine Weevil attacks on plants. The adult beetle eats the leaves, but the real damage is done by the white grubs which eat the roots. Treat established plants with *PBI Provado or pot new plants in *Plant Protection compost.
- Roses treat with *Rose Clear to help prevent blackspot and greenfly attacks.

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"Heart Start Suckley"

Would you like to be better able to save a life? There is a growing interest in Suckley to better equip ourselves with basic resuscitation skills. Thanks to Chris and Jo from 'HeartStart Defford', who are prepared to offer their time, skills and equipment free of charge, we hope to set up a training course in Suckley (probably 2 or 3 hours), with refresher courses as needed. If there is enough interest we may be able to equip the village with a defibrillator and a team able to use that too. We can all of us benefit from being better equipped to deal with the emergency that we hope will never happen.

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News from Suckley Parish Council Meeting

Held on 13th May 2013

This Meeting was the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council. Cllr Walter Huband was re-elected as Chairman and Cllr J Green as Vice-Chairman. Other Councillors were nominated to represent the Council on various posts - i.e. Planning, local Charities, Playing Fields Committee, Worcs CALC, Police. NHS, and Suckley School. The Council also noted/reviewed their Standing Orders, Code of Conduct, Financial Regulations and Risk Assessments.

Speeding Issues - The Clerk reported that former Co Cllr Clive Smith had offered to pay for the upgrade to the VAS camera out of his parish budget, but unfortunately this did not come about, so all three parishes would now be paying for this upgrade. The camera in Suckley had logged hits in March as follows - Village Hall 1,211 and Opposite Church Lane 4,427. When the upgrade was in place, more detailed information relating to cars and speeds would be available. Following the concerns expressed re speeding in Suckley Green, the Clerk had contacted Highways. A Highways Traffic Engineer had visited the site and had recommended junction warning signs for the junction adjacent to Stores Cottage. The Council felt this would be wholly inadequate and the Clerk had put in a request for at least triangle signs with an exclamation mark or hazard warning on them. However, the response back from Highways was that this signage did not meet the criteria, so it would appear that the only signs we can have are the T junction signs.

Broadband Improvement – The Parish Council are still hoping for enough parishioners to sign up to Airband to make it a viable proposition for the Company. The Clerk had arranged for an Airband Presentation to be held at the Annual Parish Meeting on 20th May. Hopefully, we might get enough people interested to start up this service in the Parish. Highways - A large number of drainage problems in the Parish have been resolved, thanks to the efforts of ClIr J Green, Barry Bennett our Lengthsman and the Jetting team sent by Worcestershire County Council Highways. However, some potential flooding problems still remain, and the Land Drainage Officer

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Mr Tom Palmer visited a few sites with Cllr J Green and the Lengthsman. Most of these concern ditches having to be cleaned out, or new ones constructed, to help with the run off water. The Land Drainage Authority (LDA) will be writing to landowners asking them to clear their ditches. Cllr J Green reported that the ice warning signs (snowflake) in Longley Green had been stolen. The Clerk has ordered replacement ones, but they may not arrive until later in the year.

Local Police - Crime figures for Suckley in April were reported as NIL.

Suckley Playing Fields - The Annual Safety Report has been completed, with no major issues to be dealt with. The long and time consuming Severn Trent Water saga regarding water leakage was now coming to an end, with Severn Trent finally relaying new pipe, and repairing a blocked drain pipe. Unfortunately, the problem of dumping garden waste and other materials on the Playing Fields continues, with hedge trimmings and half a tree being the most recently dumped items. Because of this, the Playing Fields Committee have decided to erect a removable bollard at the entrance to the car park. This would be about 650 mm above ground, painted yellow and black. Keys would be available for regular users and also held by ClIr C Luton.

Footpaths - The Footpaths Team of Harward & Markins has continued to prosper. The chief occupation over the year has been the clearing of windblown trees which have been falling and blocking the Worcestershire Way. Some of these trees are potentially dangerous, so the Wardens are asking for help in locating the owners of woods in the area so action can be arranged. A new bridge has recently been built replacing the old plank one which crosses the brook forming the boundary between Joe Roper's Lower House Farm and John Lewis' Low Yearsett Farm.
