#### Platinum Pudding Competition Marmalade Bread & Butter Puddings



#### **Dried Ingredients**

30 grams caster sugar Zest of one large orange (squeeze the orange retain the juice for later in the recipe) 250 grams of fresh breadcrumbs (made from left over bread or crusts.)

#### **Wet Ingredients**

50 grams melted salted butter 2 medium eggs 15 millilitres of freshly squeezed orange juice 50 millilitres of home made or bought marmalade 250 millilitres of milk

Butter to generously grease 6 ramekin pots

#### Method

#### Stage 1.

Grease the ramekins and return to fridge to chill butter.

Set the oven for 180 electric /5/6 if gas, leave to heat up whilst you prepare the pudding. Put shelve in middle position.

#### Stage 2.

Combine all the dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl.

#### Stage 3.

In a separate bowl add all wet ingredients and whisk together until all the ingredients are combined.

#### Stage 4.

Add the bowl containing the liquids to the bowl with the dry ingredients in. Combine together using a wooden spoon. You now have the mixture which will become your puddings.

#### Stage 5.

Divide the mixture equally between the 6 ramekins. Wipe away any spills to the sides. Using your finger run it along the inside rim of the ramekin to give a clean edge before baking.

In a small pan pour the remaining squeezed orange juice and add 15 millilitres of orange marmalade. Heat until bubbling. Keep an eye on this stirring all the time.

When the liquid has reduced by  $\frac{1}{2}$  turn the heat off and put to one side.

#### Stage 6

Place the ramekins on a large baking tray ensuring you space them apart to maximise even baking.

Set timer for 15 minutes.

Check after 15 minutes, if firm to touch the puddings are cooked. If still very wet & spongy give them a further 5 minutes.

Remove and place on a cooling tray.

Run a knife around the rims of the ramekins to loosen the puddings.

Turn out on to a warmed plate.

Take a spoonful of the marmalade syrup and drizzle over the pudding.

Drizzle a few drips around the plate.

Serve with custard, ice cream or pouring cream.

During lock-down people experienced shortages of certain items of food.

I am sure from her life during the war her majesty is only too familiar with the importance of making something out of very little. I hope she would be proud to know there are still people like myself who value the food we buy and by being inventive we reduce our waste to virtually nothing.

Although my entry didn't win or even get short listed in this competition, I truly believe you will find this a lovely light, fresh and delicious pudding to serve to your families.

**WRSE Draft Regional Plan consultation** – WRSE's response to all the comments made on the plan are anticipated 20 May; we will keep you posted.


WRSE have commented (but TBC) that the significant Oxfordshire response (almost 20% of responses across the whole South-east) could weigh heavily in the way the plan develops.

There are six self-contained bungalows with communal gardens that are beautifully tended by one of the residents.

In recent months we've been pleased to welcome two new residents, Elizabeth who moved from Suffolk and Bob who moved from Lincolnshire. Both wanted to be nearer to their families who live in Drayton and without the Almshouses they may not have been able to make the move.

The **Drayton Alms house charity** is managed by a group of Trustees who volunteer their time to manage the requirements of the properties and oversee the welfare of the residents.

#### **Council Report**

#### B4016

This has been the subject of much discussion for many years now. Indeed, my first piece of casework when elected in May 2013, was to try to get proposals for a buildout to happen. After months of arguing over first the costing, then the type of build out and

its positioning and finally changes to Highway policy and Covid, the scheme was put on hold. Happily, a change in administration last year breathed new life and money into the proposal such that it will now happen this year. What this scheme, and others have taught me is that it is impossible to get unanimous agreement on Highway schemes.



Concerns about speeding and safety along the whole stretch of this road between Sutton Courtenay and Drayton have been around as long as the buildout. Indeed, I remember walking the road with our MP and OCC Highway officers some years ago to discuss what could be done to prevent any further fatalities. The two new mobile speeding signs have now been commissioned but there have been further disagreements over the siting of the polls to support the signs. To get things moving, I have agreed with Highway Officers on the initial siting's of the poles, but there is no reason why other poles could not be put up in the future. There is an increasing case for speed signs in Marcham, especially around Sheepstead Road.

Drayton and Sutton Courtenay and Marcham Parish Councils are considering applying for 20mph zones within their villages.

Finally, if the HIF1 road scheme goes ahead (and there remains some uncertainty), the traffic modelling suggests that the new road would take away a proportion of the traffic currently using the road. It may be little more than a mile of road, but at last things are happening. Hopefully, many of the proposals will make the B4016 a safer road to live beside.

#### Noise

Electric vehicles may well reduce traffic noise, but the amount commercial activity in our area is giving rise to increasing numbers of noise complaints over lost sleep and impact on mental health. The trouble with noise is that it comes and goes so unless the measurements are taken at the worst time, the evidence is difficult to pin down. However, it is becoming apparent that the impact of heavy traffic is not just its effect on air quality and physical human health, but increasingly on mental health. It is not clear what can be done about this, but it is something Councils need to be taking more seriously.

#### **Elections**

For many years, Oxfordshire has been a hotbed of political dispute. At first glance, last week's elections might seem to have heated the atmosphere even further. There is one positive in that politicians across the County are realising the need for compromise and the need to take account of all opinions if they wish to get things done. This must be a good thing.

#### **Holiday season**

It seems we may be in for a long, hot summer. For those able to afford them, holidays postponed or curtailed thanks to Covid are, at last possible. With the world in its current state, sometime in the sunshine, time to reflect and reorganise, may be just what we all need.

For a while now, when parking my car, especially when I have purchased a ticket, I take a photo of the ticket as a reminder of when I am due to return. I usually forget the time that I parked! If I don't take a


photo I often regret not doing so. This is most likely to happen when no ticket is required as with the two hours of free parking in Didcot.



#### Bridleway resurfacing complete

You may remember an article published in the Chronical back in June 2021 concerning improvements to the bridle-ways and footpaths in the village, or, if like me you are new to the village, I will revisit some of its points or you.



As is the case during and following the Winter months, a number of the routes connecting parts of the village become muddy and rutted in places making it difficult for people using them.

Fortunately, as a result of housing developments in the village over the past few years the Parish Council has access to a sum of money specifically earmarked for improvement of cycle-paths and footpaths. The initial plan was to focus our attention on some key routes that are popular for recreational use and provide links to other footpaths and cycle ways in the area. The idea was not to replace rural pathways with tarmac or concrete but to use a more natural compacted gravel surface, where appropriate. We were particularly careful to ensure that the surface used will be longlasting and suitable for all users.

Now, following a few weeks of work we are pleased to report the refurbishment work on two of the Parish's Bridle-ways is complete and would like to express our thanks to Drayton Construction for undertaking this work with such excellent results. Feedback from residents via our Facebook page and at the recent Parish meeting has been very positive.

Bridleway 9 which runs from High Street to Millennium Green and Bridleway 29 passing the old scrap yard and connecting Sutton Wick Lane with Gypsy Lane has had undergrowth cleared and a new durable, sustainable surface applied rendering the bridleways suitable for horses, walkers and cyclists alike.

The long term objective of this work on Bridleway 29 is to provide a route from the village, via Gypsy Lane, Oday Hill and Peep O'Day Lane to Abingdon. A route I cycled in reverse at the weekend and found to be far more scenic than the path back from Abingdon adjacent to the main road.

The Parish Council are in the process of planning work on other footpaths and bridleways in the village, including sections of Eastway.

We encourage you familiarise yourself with where they are from the map, and to get out and see these refurbished paths for yourself particularly now that the warmer weather looks like it is here to stay.

#### Children and Military Lives Exhibition -Stories of Adventure, Family, and Exile



Exhibition running from 2 June to 24 November 2022 at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock.

Explores the experience of children of serving military personnel and also children who have been affected by conflict, historically and contemporarily

Collaboration between charities - Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust, War Toys, and Little Troopers.

Combines objects, personal stories, oral histories, art and photography.

Opening from 2 June and running until 24 November 2022, this new exhibition will tell the stories of today's service children (children of serving British Armed Forces personnel) and their experiences of living life in the military community, as well as stories of children who become victims of war, experiencing the effects of military conflict - from Second World War evacuees to today's refugees and asylum seekers. With a focus on Oxfordshire people, our visitors can see and hear what living through conflict is like first hand, from recordings of evacuation memories to present day accounts from children who arrive in the county and experience a new culture here, processing their life experiences through art and personal stories.

To bring this exhibition to visitors, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum have partnered with two charities, Little Troopers and Brian McCarty's War Toys.

**Little Troopers**, is a charity which supports all children who have parents serving in the British Armed Forces, will give visitors the opportunity to discover the stories and experiences of military children who have grown-up in the Armed Forces community.



#### **Brian McCarty's War Toys**

Since 2011, photographer Brian McCarty has been collaborating with children who have been affected by war on a unique photo series titled War-Toys. The project invokes principles and practices of expressive art therapy to safely gather and articulate children's accounts of war. Under the guidance of a specialized therapist and working through NGOs and UN agencies, boys and girls become art directors for narrative photos of locally sourced toys.

#### **Homes for Ukraine**

Proof of residency letters have begun to be issued to guests. This enables guests to open bank accounts and relieves pressure from GPs being the only route for providing this confirmation.

We are currently putting into place arrangements for the city and district councils to

hold pre-paid payment cards that are used to issue £200 payments to guests. This is in addition to the county council as part of our collective approach to supporting those in need quickly through whoever has the first face to face contact with our guests. The process for issuing the £350 thankyou payments to hosts is now in place. We expect to receive the first grant funding from government for these payments in June.

We are also working at pace on a proposed process and procedure for rematching guests with hosts should the relationship break down. This will only take place where it is unviable or unsafe for the sponsorship relationship to continue.

Applications for school places are being progressed with additional resources helping to process these quickly, along with accommodation checks being carried out in an appropriate and proportionate manner.

We can confirm that guests from Ukraine **can** look and apply for employment without a National Insurance Number.

#### Abbey Meadow's outdoor pool future secured

Despite spiralling energy costs that have closed pools around the country, we have managed to agree a deal to ensure the pool can remain available. This year, the pool is scheduled to open on 25 July and will remain open for six weeks throughout the holidays. The splash pad will open a few weeks earlier; from Saturday 28 May ahead of the Platinum Jubilee long weekend. (This may seem rather a random thing to highlight, but it provides such an appreciated facility and there were real fears we wouldn't be able to subsidise it any more – heating bills for it have doubled from £47,000 to over £100,000, so finding a way to do it – by aligning its opening period with the school holidays, expected to be the busiest time – is a real relief).

#### **Energy Bills Rebate**

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils have paid out more than £8 million in energy bill rebates.

All households living in properties which are in council tax bands A-D are entitled to a £150 payment. The government is providing this money, also known as the 'council tax rebate', to help people with the rising costs of energy bills with the payments being made by local councils.

Over 54,000 households across South and Vale who pay their council tax by direct debit should now received the rebate payment from their district council.

Those who are eligible who have not already received this rebate (if, for example, they are not on direct debit) should have received a letter from the council to complete an online form to confirm their bank details so they can receive the money directly into their bank account. Anyone who is not able to complete the form online will be able to call a special customer service team for assistance. If you are eligible (living in Council Tax Band A-d) and haven't either received the money or a letter, please email me at andy.cooke@whitehorsedc.gov.uk

#### Park and Charge scheme

124 EV chargers have been installed around the ten councilrun car parks to assist where people have electric vehicles and cannot recharge overnight at home. There was a delay in finalising the installation due to a worldwide shortage of microchip components, but this should have been addressed by the time you read this article.

#### **New Local Plan**

Following up on my comments last month about the legislation around planning – one of the most important documents (and one which we can control) is the Local Plan. We are embarking on creating a new Joint Local Plan with South Oxfordshire to tackle shared challenges and make savings on the cost of creating it (rather than spend money twice on two near-identical Plans). After all, traffic congestion and shortages of affordable housing don't stop at district boundaries.

Whilst we do need to provide housing in it (with targets assigned from central government), we want to make sure infrastructure (schools, transport, leisure facilities and more) are highlighted, and we can outline ways to meet targets to be carbon neutral by setting environmental standards for developers. The Plan will go up to 2041 (the current Plan goes to 2031).

A consultation has been launched to get YOUR views into the Local Plan. At this stage, we're not in a position to address how much development will be taken – it's early stages and this is on the issues the Plan should tackle. This is an opportunity to influence that legislation I mentioned.

David Johnston MP for Wantage and South Oxfordshire

I recently passed over 25,000 constituent cases dealt with since I was elected in December 2019 (to those who don't like it when they don't get a fast reply, I hope this helps you understand why!). One of the first things to

strike me when I became an MP was how the correspondence you get is so different to that in almost any other job, in a good way. Many MPs are councillors before they enter parliament, but even then, my ex-councillor colleagues might have represented 10,000 people at county or equivalent level and typically had a narrow range of topics they were contacted about. MPs represent tens of thousands – Wantage and Didcot is one of the largest constituencies at near 100,000 – and are written to about every issue under the sun; during the pandemic, veteran MPs said the rate of correspondence we received was 3 times the level they'd ever seen. But the more people who contact me with problems the better, as being able to help them is the most rewarding part of the job.

Alongside individual cases I've been supporting 4 campaigns recently. One is continuing to help the local AEAT Pensioners obtain redress, and I am pursuing something that I hope will give them an avenue for this. Another is to help Didcot resident, Sharon Gaffka, with her campaign on spiking. The Government recently moved the GHB drug – used in most spiking cases – up a category so that the prison penalties for carrying it or producing it are increased. I took Sharon to meet the Safeguarding Minister so that she could explain what else she wants to see happen, including better education of young people.

I'm then supporting the Epilepsy Society's Zach's Law campaign to punish people who – believe it or not – send those with photosensitive epilepsy flashing images online in the hope that they will induce a seizure in the recipient. We're hopeful the Online Harms Bill will clamp down on this. I was also pleased to join 70 colleagues in calling on companies not to digitally alter body proportions in pictures, which give people – particularly young people – an unrealistic body image to aspire to, with negative consequences for their mental health.

Visit highlights since I last wrote include Faringdon Junior School, where I took tough questions and learnt about dragons; the new Kingsgrove Cafe; the fabulous charity Mission Motorsport, which supports those affected by military operations over in East Challow; and being in Wallingford for the first day of Wallingford Radio's FM license (tune in at 107.3FM)!


