War Memorial for Suckley

Last year the Parish Council asked for comments about providing a permanent memorial to all those parishioners who have given their lives for us in conflict. In recent months, we've been asked to pursue the scheme by a number of parishioners. So, here is what the Parish Council proposes to try to do, using existing parish funds, plus grant aid from County and District level. We envisage a simple stone memorial: possibly one large block like the one pictured below; possibly an assembled structure using local stone.





An example of how the war memorial for Suckley might look. The Parish Council is proposing that the memorial is of a simple design, possibly using local stone.

It will be placed in Longley Green quarry using an area to the north (road) side of the site roughly 20 feet wide by 15 feet deep. The sketch map (overleaf) shows the location and rough size of the proposed site. The site's surface and the roadside verge will be levelled off to provide easy access to the site with excess soil being placed at the rear of the quarry. The site will be bounded with a post & rail fence to prevent vehicles being driven into the quarry and retain the majority of the quarry for other public use. If funds allow, we would like to provide a bench seat on either side of the site. The memorial will bear a plaque intended to honour the parish's dead in all conflicts, not only the World Wars. The plaque's wording is currently suggested to be "In memory of those from Suckley Parish who died serving their country".

Suckley under Birmingham Airport flightpath trials?

Claire McDonald writes: In May this year a national Airport Trial began.

Major airports began to test out new flight paths, including Birmingham, who are trying out new routes and also increasing the concentration over existing routes. The changes are part of a drive to overhaul the UK's airspace by 2020 and use more accurate navigation technology. Instead of following navigational beacons on the ground when approaching or departing airports, airliners will use satellite navigation. This system known as performance-based navigation, will allow pilots to fly their routes more precisely and noise will be concentrated along narrower flight paths.

The change has prompted some airports and National Air Traffic Services (Nats) to test new flight paths for departing aircraft flying below 4,000ft. This has meant that since May, low flying aircraft have been crossing our villages at much lower levels and on a more frequent basis. The noise is audible inside and depending upon the size of the aircraft, can actually effect conversation outside. There have been many complaints made to date, with some trials being postponed early.

News from Suckley Parish Council Meeting Held on 10th November 2014

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR: Anthony Warburton reported that despite his and other Councillors' opposition - majority approval had been given for the appointment of a shared Chief Executive for Wychavon and Malvern Hills District Councils. This would be the present Chief Executive of Wychavon Council. A redundancy package had been agreed with the Chief Executive of Malvern Hills District Council.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR: Paul Tuthill reported on the proposed new Worcestershire Parkway Railway Station to be sited at Norton, on the outskirts of Worcester. This would deliver improvements to rail services to and from London and connections to the cross country network. A public engagement exercise is currently under way – if you would like to put your views over or find answers to questions, please go on-line to www.worcestershire.gov.uk/parkway. The work on the Southern Link Road was progressing well, but so far the County Council only had funding available for a draft design of a widened river bridge. The estimated cost of building a new bridge was £7M.

COMMUNITY GROUP: War Memorial

Cllrs Andrew Grieve and Peter Whatley have made considerable progress with the idea of a large piece of granite as a memorial with an engraved plaque. Draft plans have been drawn up for the memorial to be sited in the Old Quarry at Longley Green (a site owned by the Parish Council).

A suitable area would have to be excavated to provide a flat surface on which to mount a memorial, plus seats for private reflection. The site would lie back from the roadway within the present fenced off area, but access would require changes to the roadside verge. The proposed site is bounded by mature trees in the Old Quarry. Please contact Cllr Andrew Grieve or Cllr Peter Whatley if you would like to help with this project, or the Clerk, Diana Taylor (contact details below).

DEFIBRILLATOR - Cllr A Lewis reported that the defibrillator was now placed in its box on the wall of Suckley School. A significant group of Suckley volunteers have now been trained in basic first aid and the use of a defibrillator. The device itself talks a volunteer through how it is to be used. The ambulance service knows its whereabouts and details which it can pass on if appropriate to a local emergency situation. Cllr A Lewis thanked Co Cllr Paul Tuthill and Suckley Parish Council for providing funding to match the grant from the British Heart Foundation, and to Cllr J Green for coming up with the idea in the first place!

PLAYING FIELDS: No further break-ins or theft have occurred since Cllr John Green fitted a new lock at the Playing Fields Pavilion. However, we still have a mole problem which is being addressed. Cllr J Green also reported that he had filled 8 bags with rubbish left on the field. Unfortunately, this seems to be an ongoing problem. Cllr C Luton reported that Suckley School pupils had been very enthusiastic about new playing equipment and design of the Playing Fields. One Playing Field Equipment Company had already visited the Playing Fields and would be sending in costings and ideas.

FOOTPATHS: As previously reported, with the retirement of our two stalwart Footpaths Wardens, concern was expressed about the future state of our footpaths in the parish. If anyone would be interested in taking on this very worthwhile task, please contact any of our Councillors or the Clerk, Diana Taylor (contact details below).

SUCKLEY CHURCH: Cllr A Lewis reported that the SPACE project continues to move through the Faculty process to the Chancellor for his opinion and decision. Locally the Archdeacon will facilitate discussion between members of the PCC and those who have expressed some reservations about the reordering project in order to find a way for the church to move forwards. The "Parish Profile" has

been passed first to a Bishop's preferred candidate whom the Bishop considers could be right for the Parish. If this person is interested, then he/she could be appointed by Easter. If not, the position will be advertised and the whole process takes longer. The Christmas Fair will be held in the Village Hall on Saturday 6th December.

HIGHWAYS: As previously reported, thanks to Co Cllr Paul Tuthill, quite a lot of progress has been made with outstanding Highways matters in Suckley Parish. Some outstanding areas still need to be resolved i.e. some potholes in Birchwood Lane and the severe state of Blackhouse Lane. However, these are in the system to be repaired. The mysterious white lines along the road from Mousehole Bridge have been put there as a "speed reduction" exercise i.e. making the road appear narrower than it already is!

WIND TURBINES: Cllr Barry Kearley has previously drawn the attention of the Council to the planning applications/consultations being sought by G2 for the erection of a wind turbine 77 metres high just outside the Parish boundary (in Herefordshire). Two turbine applications have now been put forward to Herefordshire Planning. These would be highly visible, and he believed that others could follow, possibly in Suckley itself. There have been a high number of objections from residents in the area, which is on the edge of Suckley Parish. Please contact Cllr B Kearley if you wish to raise any objections, or contact Herefordshire County Planning Department.

Finally – the Clerk and Parish Councillors wish all residents of Suckley a very happy Christmas and New Year!

Miss Smiler meets Master Laughter

As we gear up for the Christmas holidays, Carol Boughton remembers a holiday of a different time and one of warm days and carefree fun with no turkey or presents in sight.

With winter taking hold, I was thinking back over what I had been doing during the sunny summer we had enjoyed. Quite unexpectedly and at short notice, I had been invited to spend a few days at Potters Leisure Resort at Hopton, Norfolk. My husband was planning to take a group of bowlers there late in the year and the Resort was eager that we should assess the suitability.

The very name Hopton-on-Sea sparked a distant memory for me as I recalled a childhood holiday to a holiday camp in 1950. I was delighted to find that the Golden Sands Holiday Camp was still there and actually located adjacent to Potters.

Our family certainly didn't have a car in 1950. We would have arrived in Norfolk by train – my father manhandling two large suitcases and my mother holding a child firmly in each hand. So, once in camp, there we stayed to enjoy the amenities provided or we climbed down the cliff to play on the beach and paddle in the sea.

So soon after the austerity of the Second World War, everyone was prepared to enjoy and make the most of the week's holiday which was as much as the parental purse could manage at that time. Imagine what a paradise it was for a youngster, with so many activities laid on – you only had to turn up and it was all free! With children fully and happily occupied, it also allowed parents to enjoy adult activities of their own. Even if it rained (and I never remembered it raining) there was always plenty to do indoors. These type of holidays freed one from the vagaries of the English climate when one had to wander around in the wet trying to find something to do or the need to build endless sand castles and eating sand with the cucumber sandwiches.

Our accommodation was a wooden chalet in a row of identical chalets. It was little more than a large garden shed with beds but it was our little home for the

week. The chalet next to ours was occupied by an older, childless couple, but, for some reason, known only to themselves, they took to my sister and I and became very friendly with my parents. They became our beloved "Auntie Win" and "Uncle Bern" and remained firm family friends for the rest of their lives.

It must have been lovely for my mother not to have to do any cooking or washing up. We ate in a large dining hall at long tables, canteen style. In true "Hi-de-Hi" fashion, we were summoned each morning over a loud speaker by a voice announcing "good morning, campers, it is 7 o'clock and the first sitting breakfast will be served at 7.30am" One could only hope that you would be allocated a second sitting if you were particularly fond of your bed! However, two little girls were always up and ready long before the allotted time and had to be restrained from finding "auntie" and "uncle" next door.

Whilst my sister and I were fully occupied (supervised by designated staff) enjoying all sorts of activities like a sports day or a games afternoon, my parents along with "auntie" and "uncle" would play tennis, bowls or just enjoy a peaceful cuppa. Of course, in best holiday camp tradition, there were also competitions. The camp shop did a roaring trade in crepe paper as one of the highlights of the week was the children's fancy dress competition. I have vivid memories of my mother and "auntie" sitting outside the chalet sewing crepe paper into some fabulous creations for us girls.



I entered the competition as the Queen of Hearts in a hooped crinoline (goodness knows where mother found the wire for the hoops), complete with a crown and a plate of tarts. My sister was a diminutive Mary, Mary, Quite Contrary, firmly grasping a toy watering can. I am sure we had strict instructions to behave ourselves or else the dresses would rip! I can't remember winning but, I am sure, all the children received some reward.

I did, however, win one competition. Miss Golden Sands had been chosen and a Miss Smiler and a Master Laughter were needed. I stood for what seemed like hours with all the



Suckley Local History Society - Masters Ledbury Landmark

The society's final field trip of the year was a real highlight event – a private viewing of the major (\pm 4m) restoration of The Masters House in the heart of Ledbury.

Our "guide" was Gary Butler, one half of the London based Butler Hegarty Partnership, who are the retained architects in charge of this important building restoration project.

Our group of 20 met at the entrance to a building site and before our tour were fitted up with very fetching blue safety helmets and tabards! We learnt that the property is part of the wider St Katherine's hospital site, founded in 1232 which includes St Katherine's Chapel, Hall, Barn and Almshouses. It is a rare example of a medieval hospital complex that is still intact, although it is now surrounded by the town centre car park. St Katherine's Hospital was founded in 1232 by Bishop Hugh Foliot to provide for the spiritual as well as the material well-being of the poor and the aged, the sick and the distressed, travellers and pilgrims and hospitality to the Bishops of Hereford whose summer palace was in Whitbourne. The hospital was housed in St Katherine's Hall and Chapel. The hospital was set among a range of service and farm buildings and was the centre of a considerable estate which, by 1316, covered an area of 606 acres.

In the 15th century, the Master removed himself from the dormitory and hall to live in a newly completed 'Mansion House', now known as the Master's House. The Master was responsible for the complex and was housed in this fine medieval building, which has been dated to 1487. Over the centuries the complex has been in continuous use by the Dean and Chapter of Hereford cathedral and more recently by Herefordshire county council. As a result, the building has seen many additions and alterations which tell the story of over 500 years community activity.

This is a late medieval, timber-framed open-hall house with cross wings at each end. It is a late example of a medieval hall house because there was an open hearth in the centre of the room with smoke vents in the roof. A fireplace and chimney were added later as fireplace technology improved! The master and his supporters would sit at a top table at one end of the hall where they would receive supplicants for alms and hospitality.

Gary Butler highlighted the many changes to the building and the evolution of the house over the centuries. There were original carpenters marks, mud and wattle panels and original 15th century oak timbers to help trace its history. Members were interested in the similarities and contrasts to the medieval buildings at Lower Brockhampton and Leigh Barns that the Society had visited earlier this summer.

The final talk in History Society's 2014 series of events will on Thursday 11th December at 7.30pm in Suckley Village Hall when our speaker with be Suckley resident Robin Hill who will be presenting "The Working Countryside – a rural past captured on camera"

Damp Ginger Bread

Claire McDonald's recipe is from an old Bero recipe book so the measurements are all in lbs and oz.

INGREDIENTS	
12oz golden syrup	2 tspn ground ginger
4 ½ oz butter	1 tspn mixed spice
9oz plain flour	I large egg beaten
1 ³ / ₄ tspn Bicarbonate of soda	½ pint milk

METHOD

- 1. Line and grease a small baking tray.
- 2. Melt the butter and syrup.
- 3. Place all the dry ingredients into a bowl and mix. Pour over the butter and syrup mixture and mix.
- 4. Beat the egg and milk together. Gradually add this to the cake mix. The final mixture will be of a batter like consistency.
- 5. Pour this into the prepared try and bake in a moderate oven for 50 minutes, but check regularly after 30 minutes (really, this is the instruction regarding the oven temperature! So I opt for 160° which seems to work ok!).
- 6. The Cake should be golden brown. Let cool in the tin, lift and slice into cubes.
- 7. Enjoy
